## Santa Anna Youth Fair Sat; County Show Begins Sun. Barbecue Meal At Noon Sat.

The annual youth fair for Santa Anna FFA, FHA and 4-H members will be held Saturday at the show barns on the high school campus. Judging for livestock will begin at 10:00 a.m. with sheep to be shown first, followed by swine and rabbits. Curry Allen of Jim Ned is judge for this year's show. Weigh-in of swine will take place beginning about 5:00 p.m. Friday.

The clothing, foods and craft show will be held in the Ag Barn. Entries will be accepted starting at 8:30 Saturday morning. Judging will begin at 10:00 and exhibits will be open to the public at about 11:00 a.m.

As in recent years, the Santa Anna Livestock Association will be serving a free barbecue meal at noon; however donations will be accepted. The Association is also in need of donations to offset the cost of agricultural programs for the youth of the Santa Anna area.

Everyone in the community is

invited to attend the show to view the agricultural and home-making projects.

Norman Fryar is Ag instructor for Santa Anna schools and Karen Burns is Home Economics teacher.

The youth will take their animals from Santa Anna to Coleman immediately after Saturday's event for the County Show to begin Sunday at the Coleman Rodeo grounds show barns.

Weigh-in and sifting will take place beginning Saturday afternoon.

The swine show will start things off Sunday afternoon followed by the rabbit show. On Monday morning the sheep show will lead things off and Monday afternoon will feature the steer and heifer show. The heifer show will be a new event beginning with this year's show.

Tuesday morning will be taken up with the moving of animals to the sale barn for that afternoon's auction to begin about noon.

## Race On For County Offices

Seems politics is the name of the game in Coleman County as 21 candidates are now in the running for seven county offices up for election in 1990. The present field of candidates represents the largest number to seek Coleman county offices in many years.

For District Clerk: Incumbent Louise Thompson.

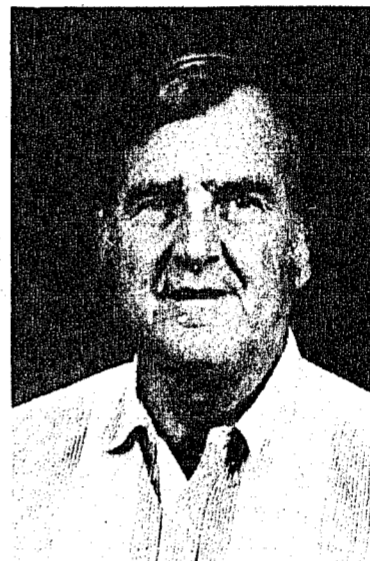
For County Clerk: Incumbent Glenn Thomas and Jo Dean Chapman.

### Mountainside Viewpoint

When the new year 1990 began, a number of new laws took effect in the state of Texas.

One that many charitable organizations will be most interested in is that one which now allows charity raffles. Texas law has previously considered these raffles to be lotteries, which technically they still are. However, they have been a mainstay of fund-raising for many organizations and officials have long looked the other way to allow local non-profit groups to raise money for their projects in this manner.

Even those who object to gambling as such have participated in raffles conducted to raise funds for hometown youth groups, booster clubs, and civic organizations. Local groups have "given away" rifles, quilts, paintings, baked goods and other items of value in raffles. Of course, "given away" is not quite the proper term because participants must purchase a ticket or "chance" in order to be eligible for the drawing. Thousands of dollars have been raised for good causes through these events—and up until now they have been against the law.

While groups who operate charitable raffles are no longer in violation of state law, publicizing these fund-raisers is still a tricky business. Postal regulations prohibit sending gambling information through the mail and therein lies the problem as far as this or any other newspaper and other publications which are mailed to their subscribers. For this reason, the Santa Anna News and other area newspapers will still have to refrain from spreading the word about your group's raffle. For a while, at least.

According to information recently received, there is a possibility that these postal regulations may be amended in the coming months in as far as charities are concerned. If and when the expected amendments come about, the Santa Anna News will be able to help local non-profit groups get the news out about your raffle fund-raiser and groups can advertise their projects without

## Wild Horse Adoption In B'wood Fri. & Sat.

Fifty wild horses will soon be coming to Brownwood looking for good homes.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is planning a "Wild Horse Adoption" the weekend of Jan. 12-14 at the Earl Q. Wilson Arena. The event will begin at 8 a.m. Friday, Jan. 12.

Interested people should plan to get there early, as it will be first-come first-served, with an adoption fee of \$125 per animal.

BLM spokesman Pat Hofmann said, "We would like to invite the public to come on out and look at these horses. As far as I know, this is the first time we've been in Brownwood."

Hofmann added that adopters must properly care for these animals for one year, before receiving title to them. Until that time, they remain the property of the federal government.

The adoption itself is free to the public. It will take place 8 a.m.-5 p.m. that Friday and Saturday, and will continue until noon Sunday, or until all animals are adopted. Any animals not adopted are returned to a BLM facility. Hofmann manages the Oklahoma Wild Horse and Burro Adoption Center near Lindsay, Okla., a year-round facility open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

### Dr. Thomas H. Campbell

Dr. Thomas Hardesty Campbell, 82, former president and dean of the Memphis Theological Seminary, died December 21, 1989 at the Boone County Hospital in Harrison, Ark. Funeral services were Tuesday, Dec. 26 at Harrison Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Burial was at Maplewood Cemetery in Harrison.

He was born November 16, 1907 on a farm near Santa Anna, Tx. and graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1922 at the age of 15. He was valedictorian of his senior class.

He attended Daniel Baker College in Brownwood for three years and then transferred to Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn. for his senior year, graduating with a B.A. degree. He received his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1929 from Bethel and later earned a M.A. degree at Southern Methodist University.

He began preaching at the age of 17 and was ordained by Memphis Presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1927. Through the years, he served churches in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Tennessee. He also wrote several books concerning the history of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

He married Nellie McClellan in December of 1928. She died in 1933 leaving a daughter, Jo Nell.

He married Margaret Estes in 1935.

He was a teacher, dean and administrator at Bethel College for a number of years and in 1947 became dean of the Cumberland

Theological Seminary, was named president in 1956. He moved to Memphis when the school was relocated there and was renamed the Memphis Theological Seminary. He retired 16 years ago and again served seven years as a pastor in Harrison, Ark.

Survivors include his wife, Margaret of Harrison, Ark.; a daughter, Jo Nell Reynolds of Odessa, Mo.; three sons, Samuel H. Campbell of Platte City, Mo., Thomas D. Campbell of Powell, Tenn., and Paul D. Campbell of Platte City, Mo.; 12 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

Reading Labels: What Does "Lite" Mean?

Just about everyone is counting calories to keep their weight down. And I'd like to share with you a few helpful tips I've learned on how to read labels to keep track of calories.

First, I found out that "lite" means different things on different products. "Lite" can refer to the color, taste, alcoholic content or number of calories in a product.

Second, counting calories: Per serving can help in comparing foods. If a label says there are 1.5 servings in a can of peas, and 100 calories per serving, you'll be getting 150 calories if you eat the whole can.

When comparing calories, make sure the serving sizes are comparable from one product to another. For example, two cereals may each have 110 calories per serving, but one serving size is two-thirds of a cup, while the other is more than one cup. The second is the lower-calorie product.

Third, it's important to remember that "sugar-free" does not always mean fewer calories. Some artificial sweeteners such as sorbitol contain as many calories as sugar.

Fourth, you might want to "add up" ingredients listed on the label of a product, from most to least amount in one serving. If sugar is listed fifth, it seems reasonable to assume that the product is fairly low in sugar. However, when you add up sugar, brown sugar, corn syrup, honey, malt and dextrose, "sugar" may actually be the number one ingredient.

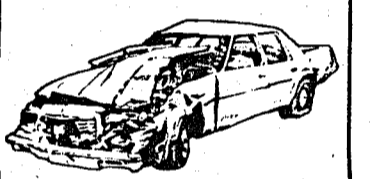

## Be Prepared for Trip To Emergency Room

By their nature, medical emergencies are unpredictable. Even so, people can prepare themselves for a trip to the emergency room by having some vital information readily available when an emergency occurs.

Upon entering an emergency facility, individuals will be asked many vital health questions. The facts supplied enable hospital personnel to secure an accurate medical history and assess the patient's needs. The Emergency Services Department of Methodist Hospital offers the following advice that will make a trip to the emergency less hectic.

**Medication**—If an individual is taking any kind of medication - prescription or over-the-counter - take it to the hospital. This information may help with the diagnosis and avoid conflicts with any medication an emergency physician may prescribe.

**Allergy Records**—If the patient is allergic to any medication, be sure to inform the emergency room staff immediately.

**Know Your Physician's Name and Telephone Number**—It may be necessary to notify your physician about your condition, so have his or her name and number available.

**Immunization Records**—It is helpful to know whether immunization records are up-to-date or if immunizations will be required.

**Insurance**—Bring accurate insurance records, including a current identification card, policy and policy number, to the emergency room. If an individual is bringing in a neighbor's child for treatment, bring a signed authorization for medical treatment and information on how to get in touch with the child's parents.

**Medicine Containers** from a Suspected Overdose—The person accompanying a patient suspected of a poisoning or drug overdose should bring the bottle that contained the solution or pills.

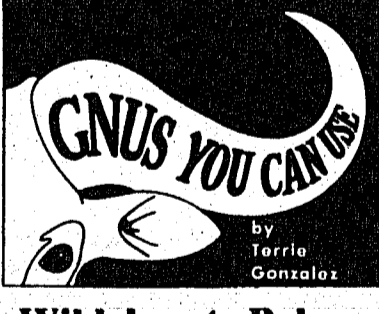
## Stephen Foster Memorial Day

Remember sitting around a campfire singing "Oh! Susanna" and "Camptown Races"? January 13 honors the writer of those songs, Stephen Foster, one of America's most famous and best-loved songwriters.

Foster, born July 4, 1826, in Lawrenceville, Pa., began writing songs as a young boy. He was influenced by popular, sentimental songs; minstrel show songs; music from local black church meetings; and songs from black laborers.

Foster published his first song, "Open Thy Lattice Love," in 1842, followed by "Oh! Susanna" in 1846. Later, he was commissioned to write songs for Edwin P. Christy's minstrel show, the most famous being "Old Folks at Home," also known as "Swanee River," in 1851.

At the time of his death on Jan. 13, 1864, Foster had composed more than 200 songs, including "Beautiful Dreamer" and "Jennie With the Light Brown Hair." The anniversary of his death has been remembered by presidential proclamation since 1952. ©1989, PM Editorial Services

wood area, the event is structured to be an informative educational seminar regarding the rise of Satanism and occult groups in Texas, Carlin said.

"We of Michael-Paul and Associates have letters from 153 law enforcement agencies requesting whatever information we can provide them with on occult-related ritualistic crimes," he said. "These go all the way from animal mutilations to abductions to human sacrifices."

Michael-Paul and Associates is a consulting firm for churches and law enforcement agencies that specializes in satanism and occult-related practices.

A check with Coleman County officials informs us the Sheriff's Department will have representatives at the seminar to seek information on this growing menace. The public is also invited.

Dr. Michael Haynes and Carlin have been involved in the occult education process for 10 years. Carlin had previously been involved in the criminal justice field for 12 years.

"Working in the prisons in Texas, I met a tremendous number of men prisoners who said they committed their crimes in the name of Satan. These men did not make it a secret by any means," Carlin said.

"Charles Manson, who is in a California prison, once said, 'Satanism is everything that human beings don't understand. It is all their fears, all of what they are not sure of. To me Satan would be god.'"

"Henry Lee Lucus also said, 'I murdered to bring about the reincarnation of Satan.'"

"The purpose of our association is to expose satanism and occults. Young people are the targets. We think that protection begins with accurate information," he said.

"In the 1/2-hour slide presentation, we not only review the history of satanism and identify cult groups, but we also provide parents with signs to look for in their children's behavior patterns," Carlin said.

"There are certain hooks that satanists use on young people. These are drugs, sex, heavy metal music, fantasy roll-playing games and a promise of independence from parental authority," he said.

"We have been conducting these seminars throughout Texas for the past six months and have had from 1,000 to 2,500 people to attend the seminars.

"People are interested in this subject because it made national news with two incidents," he said, explaining that in Matamoros the group that killed Mark Kilroy was Santeria, an occult church.

"Last week, (Gen. Manuel) Noriega was discovered to be a satanist. The United States troops found his sacrificial altar."

The significance of Noriega's relationship with the occult further esta-
