Ten Mountaineers Tapped For All-District Honors In 15-A

Ten Santa Anna Mountaineers have been named for All-District honors in District 15-A. Four Mountaineers captured six spots on the First Team, All-District.

Scotty Anderson 6'1"-185 lb. senior lineman was named first team on both Offense and Defense.

Herbert Jackson, 5'10"-185 lb. junior also received double honors, named as running back on offense and secondary on defense.

Alonzo Hernandez, 6'-195 lb senior lineman was placed on First Team Defense.

Scott Valdez, 5'10"-190 lb junior received First Team honors as linebacker.

Others in the district receiving First Team honors on offense were, Quarterback Justin Phillips of Bronte; tight end Rodney Chant of Eden; wide receivers Bill Windham and Charlie Williams of Bronte; center Bobby Marsh, Eden; linemen, James Badgett of Bronte, Robert Benton of Eden, Allen Binder of Miles, and Tim Heyman of Menard; running backs Tim Davis of Bronte and Amalio Ramon of Menard; kicker Darrell Lucas of Bronte.

Others receiving First Team defensive honors were: Linemen Rodger Ruiz, Eden; Allen Binder, Miles; Tim Heyman, Menard; linebackers, James Badgett, Bronte, Michael Zepeda of Eden, and David Murry of Miles; Secondary, Brandon Marshall of Bronte, Scotty Rodgers of Eden; Charlie Williams of Miles and Jimmy Crisp of Menard; punter, Lionel Robles of Eden.

Second Team Offense Honors went to Quarterback Johnny Betts of Santa Anna, a 5'10"-165 lb senior. Other Mountaineers receiving Second Team Offense honors were Garry Keas, 6'3"-175 lb senior tight end; Bradley Wise 5'10"-160 lb senior center; Scott Valdez 5'10"-190 lb junior lineman; Ken Brixey 5'10"-160 lb senior lineman; and Byron Dowdy 5'10"-185 lb junior running back.

Mountaineers named to the Second Team Defensive squad were lineman Ken Brixey; Johnny Betts in the secondary; and Michael Betts, 5'10"-175 lb senior linebacker.

Rotan Defense Ends Mountaineer's Season

The powerful Rotan Yellowhammer defense combined with Joe Huitt's lightning speed were too much for the Mountaineers as they put up a good battle for 48 minutes of hardfought football last Friday at Ballinger. The Mountaineers have nothing to be ashamed of. They held Rotan to 13 points, although the Hammers piled up 277 yards rushing and 19 passing. Although they didn't get on the score board, the Mountaineers hung tough throughout the game. They just couldn't get their offense untracked.

The Santa Anna defense had another stellar night as they held the Yellowhammers at bay on three separate goal line stands. Senior Scotty Anderson again led the Mountaineers in defense with a

whopping 28 tackles for the game. Others in the double figures were Alonzo Hernandez with 19, Scott Valdez with 18, Bradley Wise with 12, Ken Brixey with 11, Michael Betts with 11, Byron Dowdy with 10, Garry Keas with 10 and a fumble recovery.

The Yellowhammers limited Santa Anna to 52 yards total offense. The lightning fast Huitt scored for Rotan from 43 yards out in the first period but then the Mountaineer defense held him out of the endzone until late in the final quarter when he found paydirt again from 47 yards away with 1:13 left on the scoreboard clock.

Rotan needed all of its fine defense to fight off the Mountaineers. Especially late in the third quarter when Huitt, this time acting as

punter, bobbled a high snap and Santa Anna swarmed the head 'Hammer at his own 12. Down by just 7-0 it was the opportunity of the game for the Mountaineers.

But after only two plays and gaining only four yards they fumbled the ball back to the Yellowhammers.

Rotan will face powerhouse Munday for their next state playoff game.

The Bi-district champion Mountaineers will turn their attention to basketball. But before they do, let's congratulate the Mountaineers and their fine coaching staff on a super football season. Santa Anna is proud of you, Mountaineers!!!

Thoughts From Our Pastors

READY OR NOT, I AM COMING

When you played hide and seek, the cry, "Ready or not, I am coming," was a warning. It did not come as a surprise. You knew the count-down had already begun, and he would be coming.

It was the same with the coming of Christ into the world the first time. They should have been ready, for God had been telling them and preparing them for it over a long period of time. The Jewish people had been told in the Old Testament nearly 700 years before Christ was born. The prophet Micah had foretold where Christ would be born. Their hearts were prepared through the law and Jewish teachings. Every altar that smoked with its victim pointed to the cross and prepared the heart of men to hear the message of the gospel. The Bible says in Galatians 4:4 that "when the appointed time had come, God sent forth His Son..." So if they were not ready they could not blame God.

Some were not ready. Herod was nominal Jew who subscribed to the Jewish faith, but he was not ready for the Messiah. The innkeeper was not ready. He had made a lot of preparations, but his preparations were all for business. Christ came to his own and his own received him not. However, there were some who were ready, like Mary and Joseph, the shepherds and the wise men.

Just as it was with the first advent of Christ, so it will be with the second advent. Some will be ready and some won't. There will always be people who miss God's greatest gifts. The second coming will be the most exciting and the most anticipated event that the world has ever known. This event has been foretold on both the Old and the New Testaments. In the New Testament alone, the truth of this event is mentioned more than 380 times. The fact that Christ was born, lived, and died is history.

The fact that he will come again is prophecy. Prophecy is just as sure as history. God is going to keep his word. Jesus Christ will surely return.

Titus 2:23 tells us that our position is to be looking for His return. That means we are to have a personal expectation, to be ready with a welcome. We have promises that give us "blessed hope". We are already seeing things in Matthew 24 and in I Timothy 3:1-7 coming to pass. The disasters in the weather and the changes in the seasons alone are enough evidence that we are living in the last days. And add to that our moral and social conditions. How long the last days are we do not know. For the folks in Noah's day it was 120 years.

As we approach Christmas the issue is not when He will come but will we be ready when he does. His coming again when every eye will see may be a while. But in the meantime his coming into your heart can happen right now by accepting Him as Lord and Savior. Ready or not, He is coming.

How will it be in your home this Christmas? Will it be a time of noise, turkey and dressing, presents and Santa Claus only, or will Christ be given His rightful place. As the phrase states, "Jesus is the reason for the season."

Ready or not, He is coming!

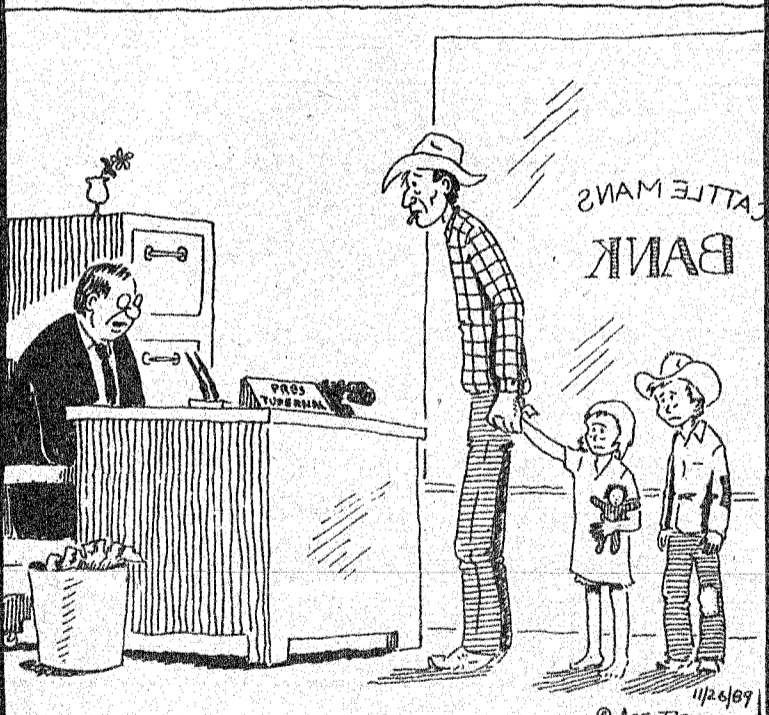

Recently I had been shopping and was unpacking the sacks. On the side of one sack was part of the old children's story The Velveteen Rabbit. It reminded me all over again how much fun it was to read as a child.

Since it is time for Christmas shopping- remember to buy books for the children. Here are some ideas.

Classics, listed from youngest age interest. If you or your children have hon read these, do so soon. Share the experience. *The Story of Babar, the Little Elephant*, Jean DeBrunhoff; *Just So Stories*, Rudyard Kipling; *Cat in the Hat*, Doctor Seuss; *The Velveteen Rabbit*, Marguerite Henry; *Tales from Shakespeare*, Charles and Mary Lamb; *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, Mark Twain; *The Virginian*, Owen Wister. There are many others but this list will serve as a starter.

In the next few days the library will have a longer list of suggestions that you can study.

Did you know that there are 77,660 children's books in print? There are 350 U.S. bookstores that sell only books for children.

Here are a very few suggestions of the newer books for children. I want a Dog by Doyal Kaur Khalsa is about a girl who wants a dog and how she finally earns one. *Mother Night* by Denys Cozet is about animal families and night activities.

Night Care by Teddy Jam is about what a baby sees from his window at night. *We're Back: A Dinosaur's Story* by Hudson Talbot is a humorous story in which dinosaurs visit the Thanksgiving Parade. In *Death of the Iron Horse* by Paul Goble, Cheyenne men attack a locomotive. In *Granddaddy's Place* by Helen V. Griffith a visit to the country by a grandchild brings happiness to all. Issac Asimov has a new series of books about space written for younger readers. *Exploring the Past, Ancient Egypt* by George Hart has pictures and illustrations that may fool the reader but he will be learning too.

By the way, I recommend a TV show. Yes, there is good programming. *The Reading Rainbow* has book reviews that could inspire children to read. At least they will be enjoying programs of high morals and inspiration.

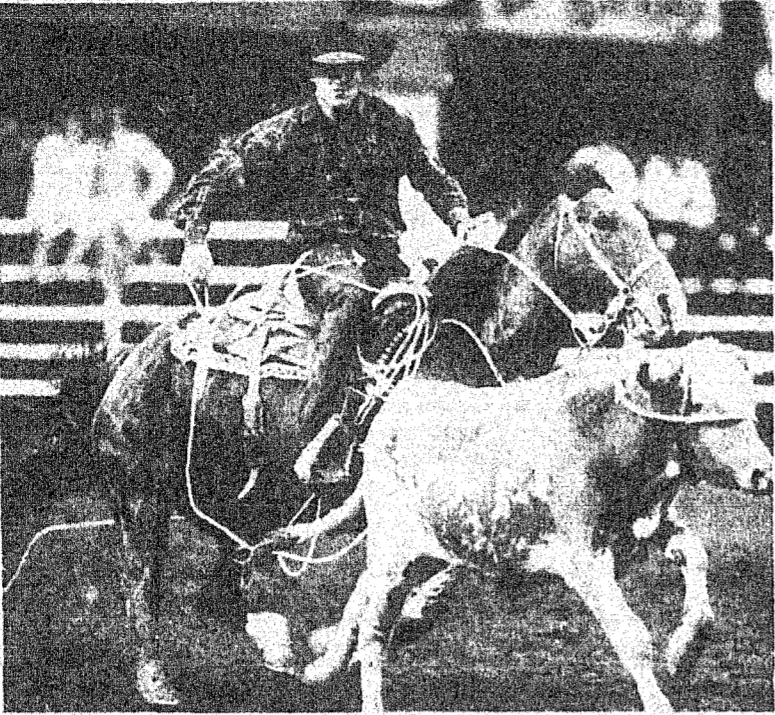

Former Santa Annan Captures World Title

Santa Anna native Guy Allen, now of Lovington, N.M., won his fifth World Champion Steer Roping title Saturday at Guthrie, Oklahoma, setting a number of records as he took the PRCA honor. The contest went to the wire as he and his good friend, Tee Woolman of Llano were the leading ropers until the last of the ten-steer roping. Allen finished with 144.2 seconds for his ten steers that topped the average and gave him the prize money in three go-arounds. Woolman took two loops on his final steer and was runner-up with 172.5 seconds on ten steers.

The 1989 title is the fifth for Allen, tying that record with that of the late Everett Shaw, who was five-time champion during a 20-year period of his roping career. Allen was only 19 when he won his first championship title in 1977. He has since been World Champion in 1980, 1982 and 1984.

In addition to picking up over \$6,000 in prize money at the finals last weekend, Guy received a trophy saddle, a diamond championship ring, a savings bond and an expense-paid trip to the National Rodeo Finals in Las Vegas in early December. His total earnings for this year now total over \$44,000. Woolman, who was runner-up as they entered the finals, kept his second-place status with a total of over \$37,000 for the season.

Allen still holds the record for the fastest time in the finals roping, tying a steer in 9.9 seconds in the 1984 series. On Saturday he set the record for the fastest time on ten steers at the finals series. Only six of the 15 title contenders roped and tied all ten of their steers during the two-night event.

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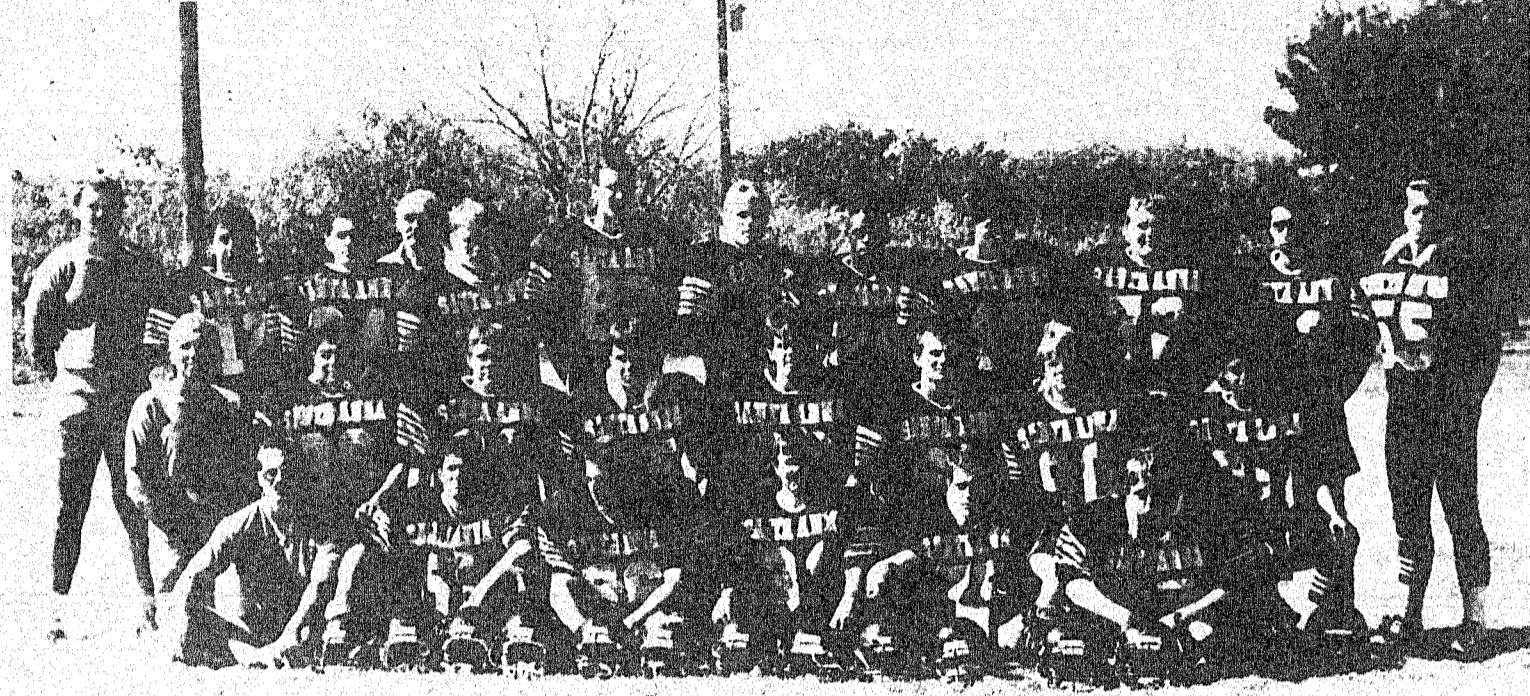

Mark Twain: American Humorist

November 30 marks the birthday of Mark Twain, one of America's best-loved humorists, lecturers and writers.

He was born Samuel Clemens in 1835 in Florida, Mo. His work as a steamboat apprentice and pilot on the Mississippi River inspired his famous pen name, Mark Twain, adopted in 1863. "Mark twain" was a river term for a depth of two fathoms.

Twain's humorous articles and lectures brought him nationwide recognition, but it was his novels of boyhood adventure and innocence that became the toast of American fiction. Twain wrote most of his famous work after settling in Hartford, Conn., in 1870, including "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" and "The Prince and the Pauper."

REMOVING SPLINTERS

Anybody who goes barefooted, even rarely and in their own house, is bound to get something stuck in their foot sooner or later. In many cases this foreign particle - whether it's a wooden splinter, a particle of glass, or a metal fragment - can be removed easily at home. The following procedure is included to make sure that this is done as safely as possible.

Begin by soaking the injured part in vegetable oil for a few minutes. (This should make the foreign particle loose and easy to remove). Then apply ice to the area until it begins to feel numb. Using a sterilized pin, needle, or tweezers - using a flame or alcohol - try to move the foreign particle out. After accomplishing

this, apply an antibiotic cream and cover with a bandaid.

Naturally, if you cannot succeed in removing the object yourself, see a podiatrist immediately. This is also called for if there is any persistent redness, swelling, or drainage from the area.

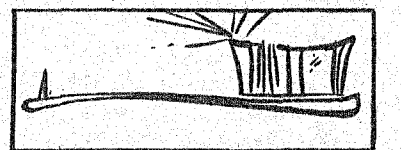
