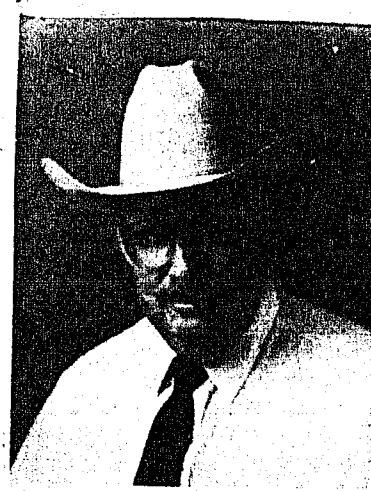
I attended Baylor University with a major in economics and a minor in accounting. I studied law in the Baylor School of Law and LaSalle Extension University.

A vaudeville comedian once advised, "Always leave'em laughing." Ace Reid does it. Cowboy cartoonist and humorist Ace Reid, author of Cowpokes, seen each week in the Santa Anna National Bank advertisement in the NEWS, is to be the speaker at the March 17 Chamber of Commerce Banquet when the Chamber names the Citizen of the Year.

The Chamber of Commerce banquet is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. Saturday, March 17 at the school cafeteria. Things weren't always so funny for Ace as a young boy. He was born at a place called Lelia Lake, near Amarillo, during the "dust bowl" of the depression years.

His dad, Ace Sr., worked as a roughneck in the oilfields around Burkburnett in Wichita County. When Ace (real name Asa) was a baby the family moved to a little community called Fawkes Station, near Electra. Their 3-room house had no electricity, running water or indoor plumbing. Their heat was a wood stove and their light was kerosene lamps. Drinking water came from a cistern that caught runoff water from the roof. It sometimes contained dead birds and wiggle-tail bugs. To this day, Ace cannot drink the last swallow from a glass of water, but he has never lost his appreciation for water. His family had so little of it. Ace Sr. also ran cattle and Ace Jr. decided at that time he wanted to own a ranch and see that his cattle were never thirsty. His talent for drawing and his sense

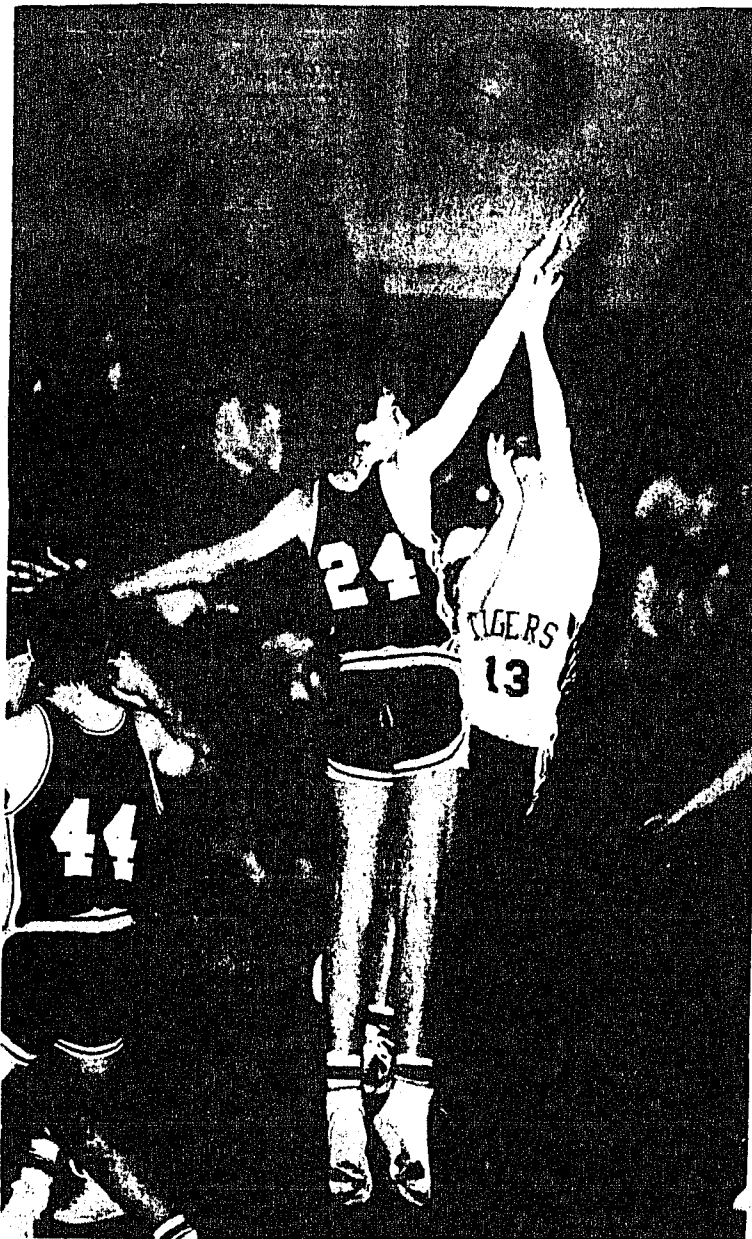

BUNION: ORIGIN AND TREATMENT

A bunion is an inflammation and swelling of the bursa at the base of the big toe, accompanied by a considerable thickening of the skin.

Unlike most other medical terms, the origin of the word bunion remains something of a mystery. One source has it coming from the Latin word BUNIO, meaning turnip, another ascribes it to the Latin word BULLA, a bubble. Certainly both terms are most descriptive.

There is also some question about how best to treat bunions. Surgery may or may not help to relieve the pain from bunions. Sometimes, bunion operations immobilize the joint and cause weak arches; other times, they bring excellent results.


Nonsurgical podiatric treatment may require stretching of the joint which reduces the adhesions and so alleviates the pain. Other therapies include: oscillation, ultrasound, and shortwave, all designed to stimulate circulation to the affected joint.
