Cancer Society Drive

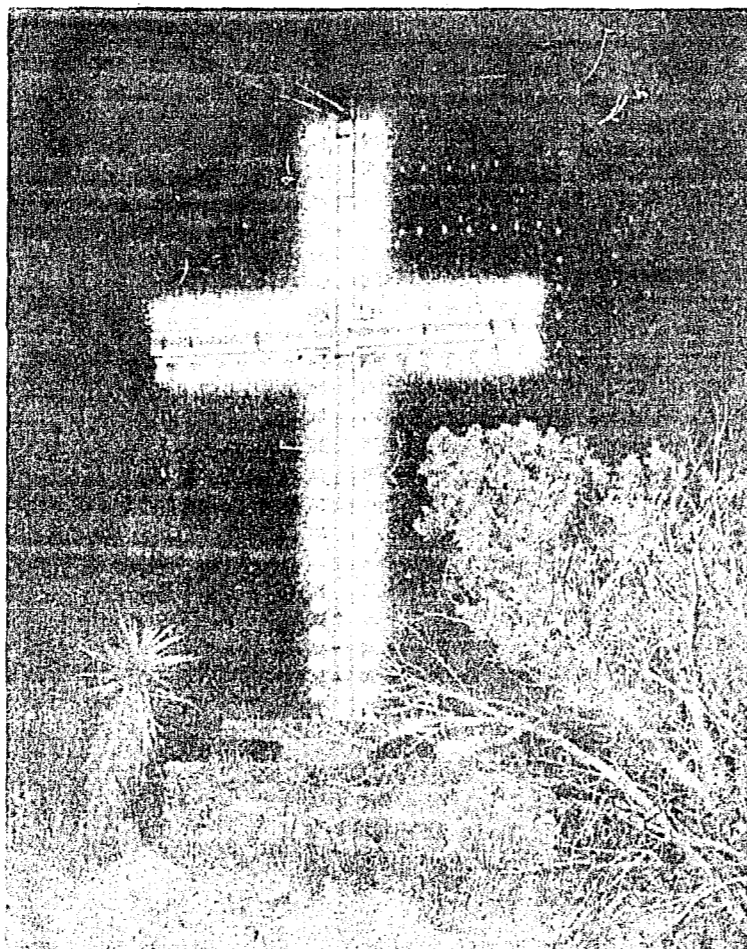
The Coleman County Cancer Society drive is underway. In the next few days you will be receiving visits from those collecting for the Cancer Society.

Holt Tractor, 1917 Vintage Will Be Featured At Funtier Day Antique Machinery Show

This 1917 Holt crawler tractor was built for the United States Government during World War I to move heavy artillery guns and supply wagons. At the end of the war it was sent to Runnels County where it was used for several years by the county precincts to grade roads with a drag type grader. It soon became worn out and was sold to the George Pruser family, five miles south of Winters. They used it from the mid 20's to about 1936 to break land, build terraces and

power a thresher. It was to be sold for scrap iron during World War II but the war ended before it could be destroyed.

In November of 1988, Bill Garrett of Santa Anna learned of this rare tractor through a good friend who lived in Winters and with his help was able to negotiate for the rare Holt.

After about eleven months of hunting for and making parts for the Holt, it was finally brought back to life after some fifty-four

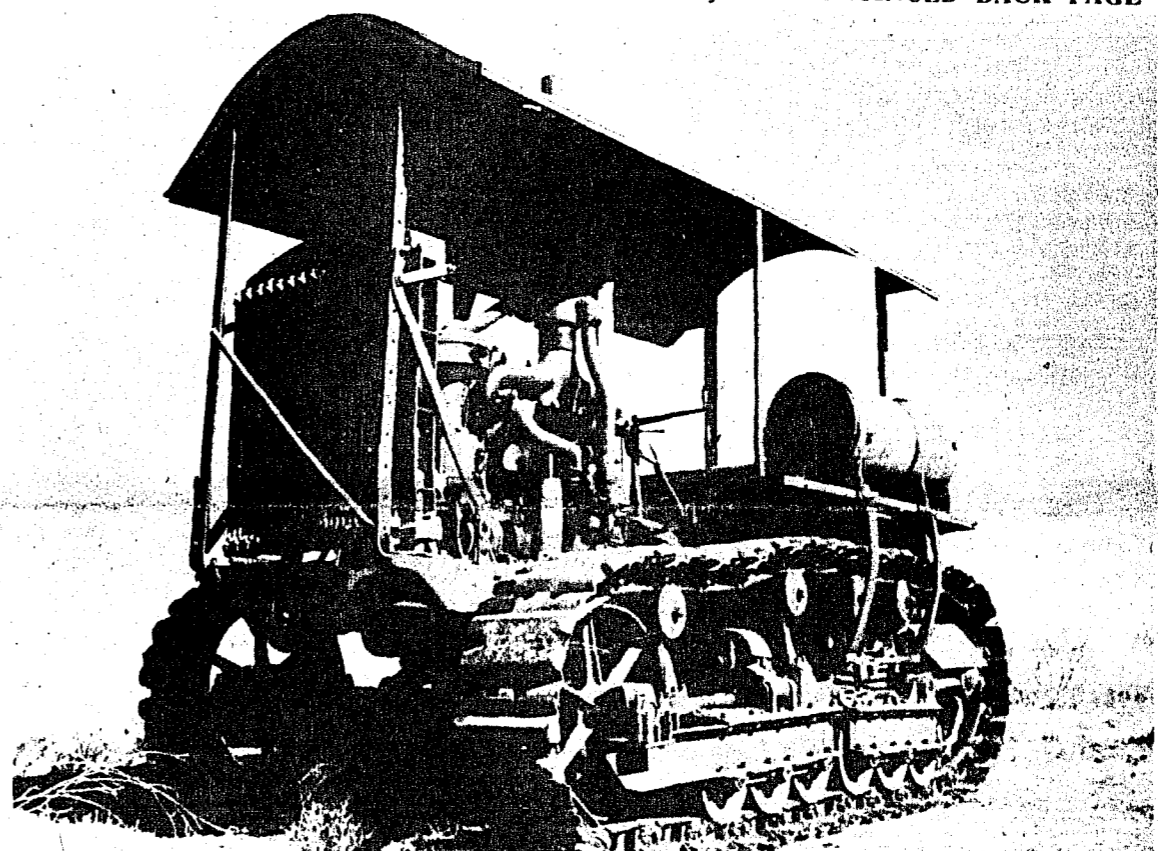
years of retirement. It is now alive and well in the protection of Bill's antique tractor collection.

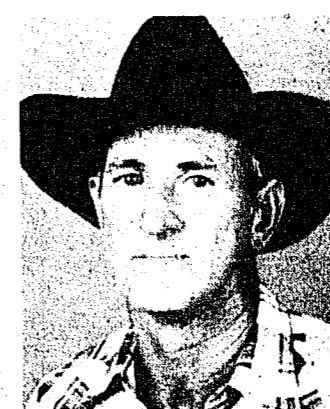
Cemetery Rose Garden To Be Restored

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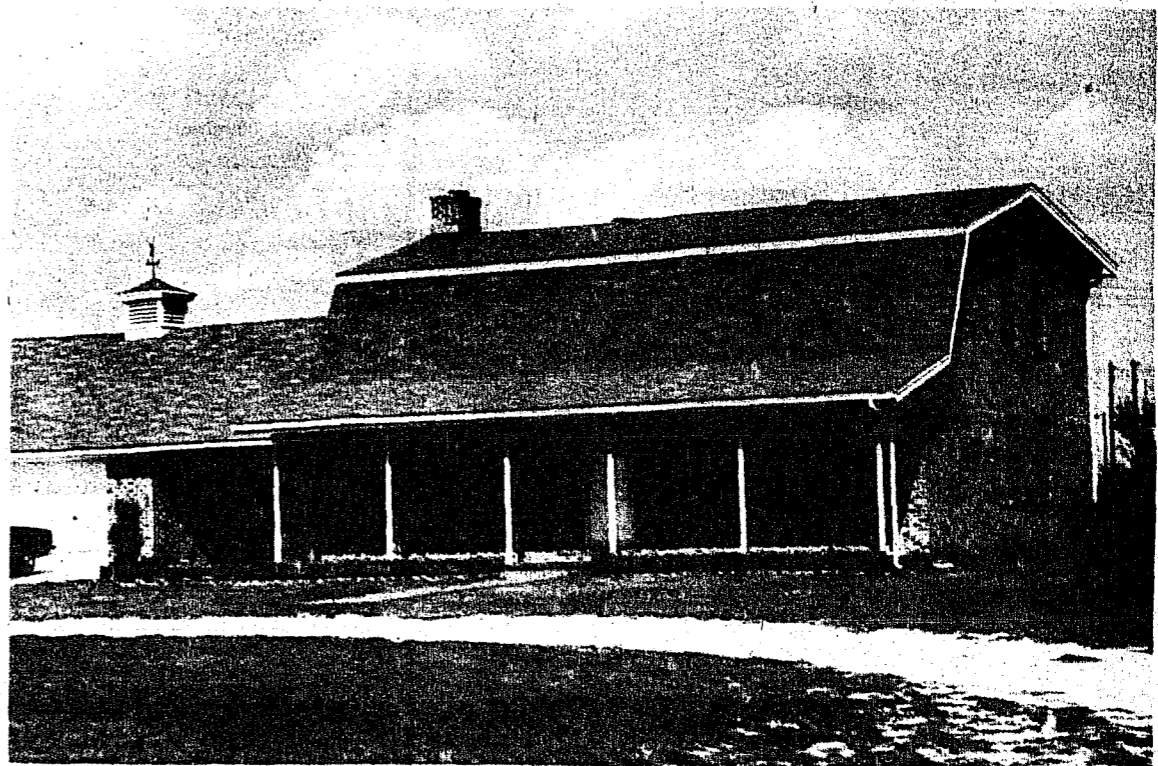

H.F. Fenton Jr., 67, longtime sheriff of Coleman County died last Wednesday, April 4, in Temple.

Services were at 2:00 p.m. Friday, April 6, at First Baptist Church in Coleman with the Rev. Gary Boyd officiating, assisted by Capt. Joseph P. Middleton. Burial was in Coleman City Cemetery, directed by Stevens Funeral Home.

He was born and raised in Coleman County, grew up in the New Central community and graduated from Centennial High School.

He served as sheriff of Coleman County for 28 years, retiring in 1988. He also served as deputy sheriff for five years and was a Special Texas Ranger for nine years.

He was a longtime member of the Coleman Rodeo Association, Farm Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, West Central Texas Law Enforcement Association and an honorary member of the Coleman Fire Department.

In 1978 he was recognized with a special award for his work by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association of which he was a member. Coleman County honored him on July 12, 1978, by designating "H.F. Fenton Day." He was chosen "Citizen of the Year" by the Coleman Chamber of Commerce in 1985.

Mr. Fenton was featured in a Texas Monthly Magazine article in 1985 as one of 13 outstanding sheriffs in the state.

He was included in a book titled Texas High Sheriffs by Thad Sitton, which was published by the Texas Press, and he was one of only 11 sheriffs interviewed for this publication.

He was a U.S. Army veteran of World War II. He was discharged with the rank of first lieutenant and was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star and Clusters, two Purple Hearts and other medals. He was involved in six major campaigns and two invasions.

He was a member of First Baptist Church of Coleman.

Survivors include his wife, Loretta Fenton of Coleman; two daughters, Ginger Ann Waddle and Judy Marla Fenton, both of Abilene; a son, Shawn Frank Fenton of Coleman; three sisters, Blanche Agnes Armstrong of Perryton, Pauline Oleta Smith of Abilene and Mary Juanita Jones of Santa Anna; two brothers, Ernest Eugene Fenton of Amarillo and Billy Rex Fenton of Ozona; and four grandchildren. Memorials may be made to American Cancer Society.

In the City elections, absentee ballots may be cast at the City Hall from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Those voting

absentee in the school board election may do so at the school business office between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., also during the weekdays. Absentee balloting in both elections will close at the end of the business day on May 1. Both elections will be held May 5.

Candidates running for City Council include, Thomas Hays and Alex DeLeon, both incumbents, joined in the race by Joe Baker, Emmitt Simmons, J.T. Avants, Mark Turney, Karen Morris and Norman Asher. Three council members will be elected in the at-large election, with the three top vote getters being seated.

Mayor Gale Brock is asking to be retained in her position and is unopposed in the election.

The five candidates seeking to fill two spots on the Santa Anna Inde-

pendent School Board of Trustees are incumbents Terry Melver and Eddie Jones, joined in the race by Gary Absher, Roddy Dean and Kim Hubbard.

School Taking Nominations For Gifted, Talented Program

In order to serve the needs of all students at Santa Anna Schools, grades K-12, a Gifted/Talented program will be put into operation for the 1990-1991 school year.

Parents in the school district will be receiving a letter this week regarding the program and explaining the selection process.

The rest of this school year will be used for identifying students for acceptance into the Gifted and Talented program. Entrance will be determined by a four phase process: nomination, screening, selection, and admittance.

Nominations will be made by teachers, counselors, parents, and others, using forms provided by the school. The forms may be obtained at the offices of the school principals. All nominations become part of a nomination pool which will be screened.

According to School Superintendent Gerald Brister, it is important to remember that not all children

benefit from a gifted and talented placement. The decision about nomination and approving admittance into the program should be very carefully considered.

The Santa Anna ISD Gifted/Talented program is organized around the idea of not pulling students out of class for separate instruction, but is based on extending classroom work into higher levels of critical thinking. The program for 1990-1991 will involve only "Language Arts". The program may be extended in the future.

The Santa Anna ISD, grades K-12, will be accepting nominations for the program until April 27. All nominations must be in the Principal's office by the end of the school day on April 27th.

Traditions For Passover And Easter Have Common Theme

April brings to mind the time for religious observances. Far more often than not, two religious holidays occur during this month.

On EASTER, Christian families celebrate the end of Lent and the resurrection of Jesus Christ after his crucifixion. Easter is described as the most important Christian holiday and falls on April 15 this year.

One tradition that is very popular among children is the Easter Egg hunt. This custom was derived from ancient Persians and Egyptians who colored and ate eggs during their new year's celebration which came in the Spring. Christians adopted the egg as an Easter symbol because of the relationship between Easter and the renewal of life.

One of the oldest and most recognized Jewish celebrations, PE-

SACH (Passover), commemorates the exodus of the Jews from Egypt in 1300 B.C. after an enslavement of 210 years.

The holiday of Passover is celebrated for eight days and begins April 10 this year. Only unleavened bread (Matzah) can be eaten during the eight days. At the beginning of Passover, one Matzah is broken and becomes the Afikomen, which is hidden. It's customary for the young children to search for the Afikomen - a prize being awarded to the won who finds it. Looking for the Afikomen is quite similar to the Christian practice of hunting for eggs on Easter.

Despite vast differences between the two observances of Passover and Easter, they do have a common theme - that of rescue.

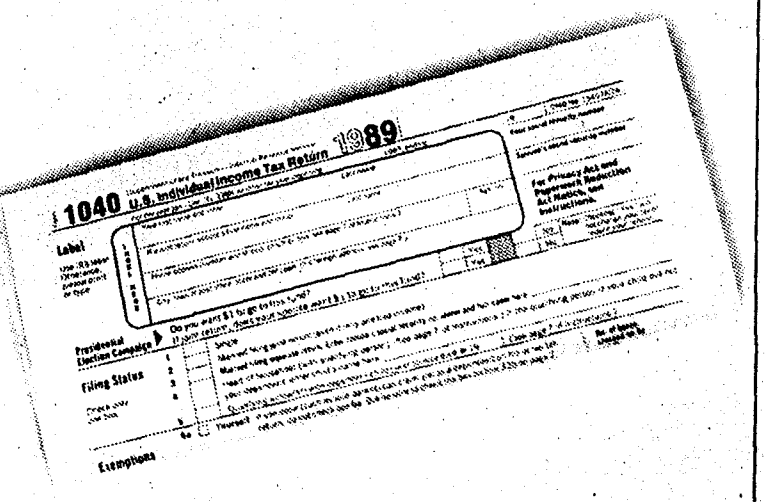

Otto received several pictures, a guest and photo album, and a money tree from family members. The party was enjoyed by all attending.

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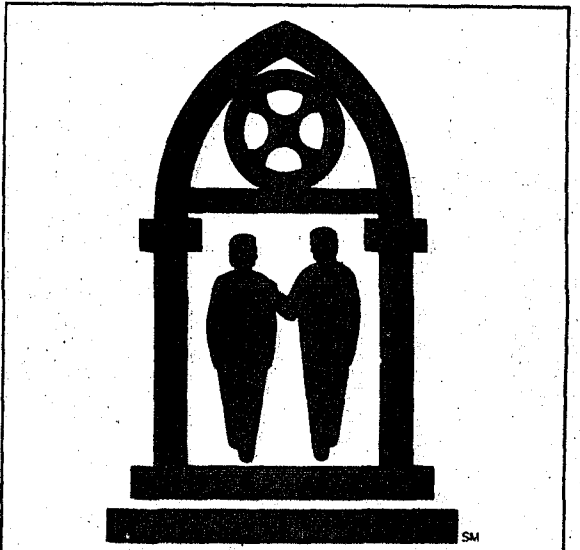

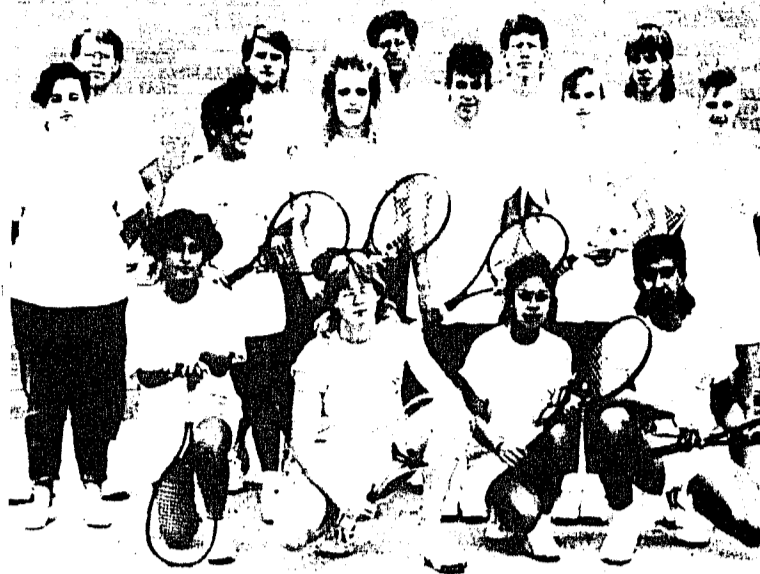

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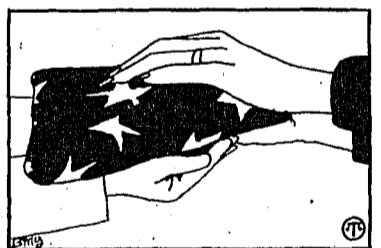
Friday the 13th Fosters Fear

Fear of Friday the 13th evolves from "triskaidekaphobia," fear of the number 13, and the long-held notion that Fridays are unlucky.

The uneasiness about 13 may be related to the fact that 13 sat down to the Last Supper, that the Romans associated 13 with death and misfortune or that 13 is one more than 12, a number of completeness. The additional number, 13, has the connotation of dangerously exceeding proper limits, of going beyond a natural cycle, or starting on a new and uncertain course.

Every year has at least one Friday the 13th, but never more than three. Two Fridays in 1990 fall on the 13th day, the one in April and another in July. II

Taking Care Of Easter Lilies

Easter lilies are traditional flowers of the Easter season and one of the few bulb crops still produced by commercial greenhouse growers.

These plants can be found at a wide range of retail outlets and are generally available in 6-inch pots.

When purchasing an Easter lily, be sure to examine the plants carefully and avoid those which have flowers that appear to be water-soaked or transparent. Look for plants with strong, healthy stems and flowers with a velvet-like texture.

Also remember that plants which have less than half of their buds fully open will not develop properly in the home or office. Because Easter lily bulbs are chilled artificially, there is usually some variability in the size and number of flowers per plant.

Once in its new environment, an Easter lily can provide long-lasting beauty if given some basic care by doing the following:

1. Remove or punch holes through any decorative foil or wrapping on the pot. Although it may be attractive, foil wrapping

impedes drainage and holds water. This may cause the roots to rot and the plant to deteriorate quickly.

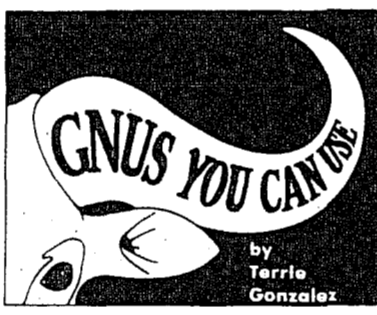
2. Keep the plant out of hot or cold drafts. Excessively hot, dry air from heating ducts and appliances will reduce the keeping quality of the plant.

3. Keep the plant where temperatures remain above 60 degrees Fahrenheit. Between 70 and 75 degrees is ideal.

4. Place the plant in good light, but not direct sun.

5. Easter lilies use a moderate amount of water and should be checked daily. Make sure the soil remains moist but be careful not to over-water. When adding water, allow some to run through the root mass and out of the pot.

To be sure you receive a quality Easter lily, ask for a Texas product. It's your assurance of a locally grown plant at its peak of freshness.



Hog's Cousin Digs Nightly 'Pig-Outs'

Talking about a pig-out... A hungry hippo may consume as much as 200 pounds of food in a single night of foraging.

"Typically, they eat grass, herbs and leaves," said Ray Sutton, wildlife manager of the International Wildlife Park in Grand Prairie, Tex.

Considering hippos are distantly related to hogs, their nightly foraging frenzies are aptly described as 'pig-outs.'

STRESS FRACTURES
The metatarsals are the long thin bones that attach to your toes. They can be bruised or broken under the stress of running, hiking or other activity which places an unusual burden on the foot. You may feel some pain. There may even be a little area of redness or swelling on top of the foot. If you press at that point, there may be considerable tenderness and pain.

The trick is NOT to simply ignore such symptoms. You may have a stress fracture and not be aware of it. There is no sudden snap when it happens, no unmistakable signal. It's actually many micro-fractures that occur somewhere along the shaft of the bone.

An X-ray is the best means to diagnose a stress fracture — though clinical judgement is also important. Then the foot will have to be immobilized, either with a soft cast or a combination of padding and a Reese boot.
