## Measures Of Faith

One of the great topics of the Bible is that of "Faith", and as every Bible

student oughth to know, great deal of information has becn written in the holy scriptures in this important subject; and yet, it is, as are most great Biblical themes, widely misunderstood and misinterprceled. I shall endeavor in this brief article to clear up a litle of the fog and confusion on this sub-
ject.
The Bible does not set forth or discuss different faiths, of various kinds of faith, but rather it teaches one and only one faith. (Ephesians 4:4-6) Paul teaches, "There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are calice in

pcople seem to have no problem understanding that there is only one God people seem to have no problem undersianding that there is only yone God
and one Lord Jesus Christ, but when it turns to the one body and the one faith they get all muddled and confused. Why is this? Jude in verse 3 exhorts us, "Hat ye should carnestly contend for the faith which was once for
faith. Romans $12: 3$ "According as God hath deall to every man a measure of faith." Romans 12:6 "Let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith." I am definitely dedicated to the proposition that the MEASURE of one's faith makes the difference in the quality and accomplishments of his
