which has a very high arch and high instep, with the toes slightly retracted. Even if the foot structure is good, solid and wellbalanced, the high arch can still lead to a lot of problems.

It is not unusual for people with cavus foot to experience pain of the bottom of the heel and arch (heel spurs and plantar fasciitis). There may also be pain and calluses on the bottom of the foot where the toes connect to the metatarsal bones. One can also get pain under the middle three toes where they connect to the metatarsal bones (anterior metatarsal bursitis).
