Activities At Funtier Square Promise Entertainment For All Ages On Funtier Day, May 12

The annual Funtier Day in Santa Anna promises events and entertainment for all ages on Saturday, May 12. The new location at the Civic Center, dubbed *Funtier Square*, will provide more space for activities in addition to shelter in case of rain.

Booth spaces already assigned at *Funtier Square* include painted clothing, oil paintings, jewelry, computer portraits, wooden toys, spin out, fabric crafts, face painting, inflatable toys, Texas Tators, and probably others since this information was received.

The first event on the agenda will be the Fun Run with Sharon Guthrie and Michelle Morgan in charge. The Fun Run had a number

of participants last year, and a new course is planned for the 1990 race. People who enjoy walking are also invited to take part for a slower pace. Registration can be made at the time of the vent, with participants to meet at the Civic Center (Armory) at 7:30 a.m. that morning.

The official opening of the day will be a parade in the downtown area the Civic Center grounds starting at 7:30 a.m. The event will be heralded with a flyover by the Coleman Aviation Club. Decorated

floats and cars, bands and riders on horseback will take part. Thelma Brooker and Charles Wetzel are in charge of the parade and enlisting entries.

Kelly Simmons is chairman of the concession and food booth committee. A number of groups and organizations will have a variety of foods for sale during the day. The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department will be on hand with their famous broiled hamburgers and fries, and several other selections including Mexican food will be available. There will be games for children and adults, displays of art, quilting and crafts, and an ice cream freeze-off. Entertainment will continue throughout the day. A very interesting exhibit will be the Pioneer Exhibit which will include spinning, tortilla making, butter

churning, lye soap making, grain grinding, wood carving, rush chair seats, and sheep shearing. Peggy Hensley is Chairman of the Pioneer Exhibit.

One of the events that will be held at a separate location will be the antique farm machinery display. The exhibit will be on Wallis Ave. next to Hartman Construction office which provides ample space

for parking. Bill Garrett and Clint Day are coordinators for the event that has grown each year to include exhibitors from all over the state. A small admission is charged those who view the display within the fenced area. Prizes and ribbons are given the outstanding entries. The farm machinery show will conclude on Sunday, May 13.

The Santa Anna Rodeo and Youth Association will also be having roping activities at their arena area on the San Angelo cutoff. What is billed as a County roping will include anyone who is a resident or past resident of the county. The entry is 3 for \$12. Events are scheduled to begin about 1:00 p.m.

People from the entire area are invited to be in Santa Anna May 12 to enjoy the day of family entertainment designed to interest all ages.

"Nope," answered a boy. "He's not working here anymore."

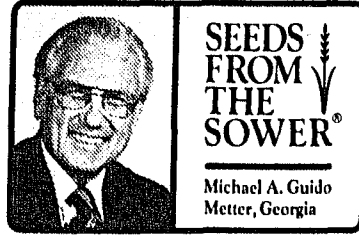
The customer asked, "Do you have anyone in mind for the vacancy?"

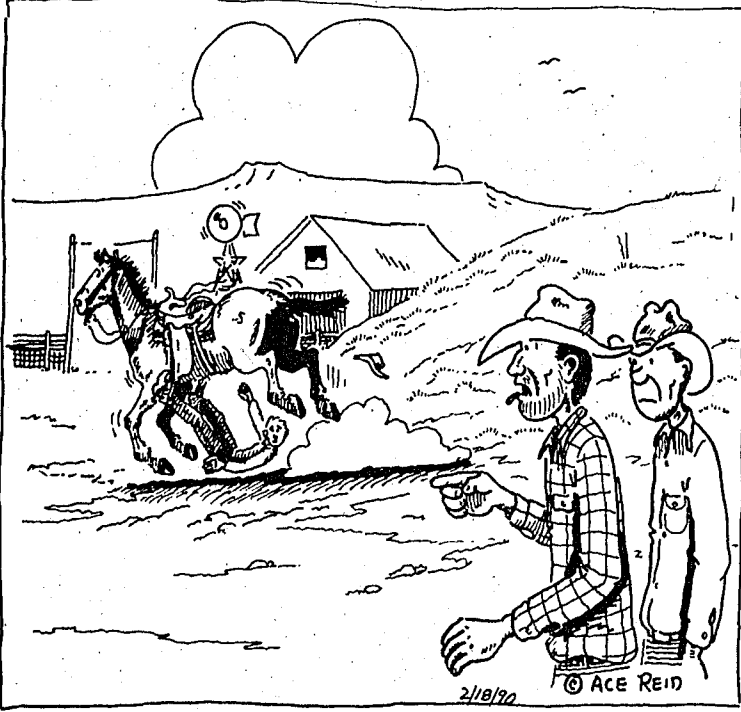

A student once wrote: "It is bad manners to break your bread and roll in your soup."



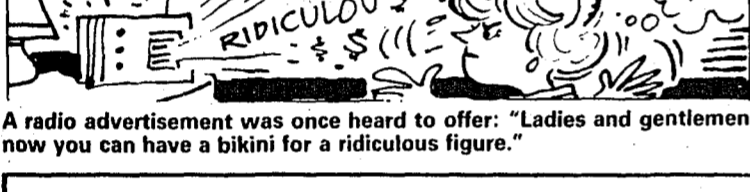
A student once handed in a paper claiming that a triangle with angles of 135 degrees is called an obscene triangle.

Knowledge Is Key To AIDS Diagnosis

A 1989 survey revealed that most Texans don't know the symptoms of AIDS—and with good reason, says the Texas Medical Association. The symptoms of acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) vary with the individual and can be confused with everything from flu and tuberculosis to the Friday afternoon droops. Stated simply, the body begins to lose its ability to respond to infections. Richard Grimes, PhD, principal investigator of AIDS regional education and training centers for Texas and Oklahoma, lists the following complaints that should begin to raise one's suspicions: —diarrhea, occurring several times a day and lasting longer than a month, especially if accompanied by unintended weight loss of more than 10 percent; —unusual sores or lesions inside the mouth or a white coating on the tongue; —night sweats; —unexplained fever lasting more than a week; —confusion or slowing of mental

functions; —loss of feeling in the feet, legs, or hands, especially great pain in the legs; —difficulty in breathing; or —constant fatigue or general malaise. The symptoms may be different in men and women, with women possibly having pelvic infections. Suspicions should increase if one has a previous history of sexually transmitted disease, has had sex since 1977 with multiple partners or high-risk partners, has been an intravenous drug-user, or has had a blood transfusion since 1977. The only way someone can find out whether they've been infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is to get tested. However, said Dr. Grimes, the test will not pick up infection that has been contracted within six months. One who tests positive may not develop AIDS, but that person's high risk behavior and suspicious symptoms may eventually lead to a diagnosis of AIDS. "Early diagnosis is useful," said Dr. Grimes, "because treatments are available to preserve the immune system and prolong life—even a fairly high quality of life." For more information about AIDS and testing, call your doctor, local health department, or the Texas AIDS information line at 1-800-248-1091. The Texas Medical Association is a professional organization of more than 29,000 physician and medical student members. It is based in Austin and has 116 component medical societies around the state. 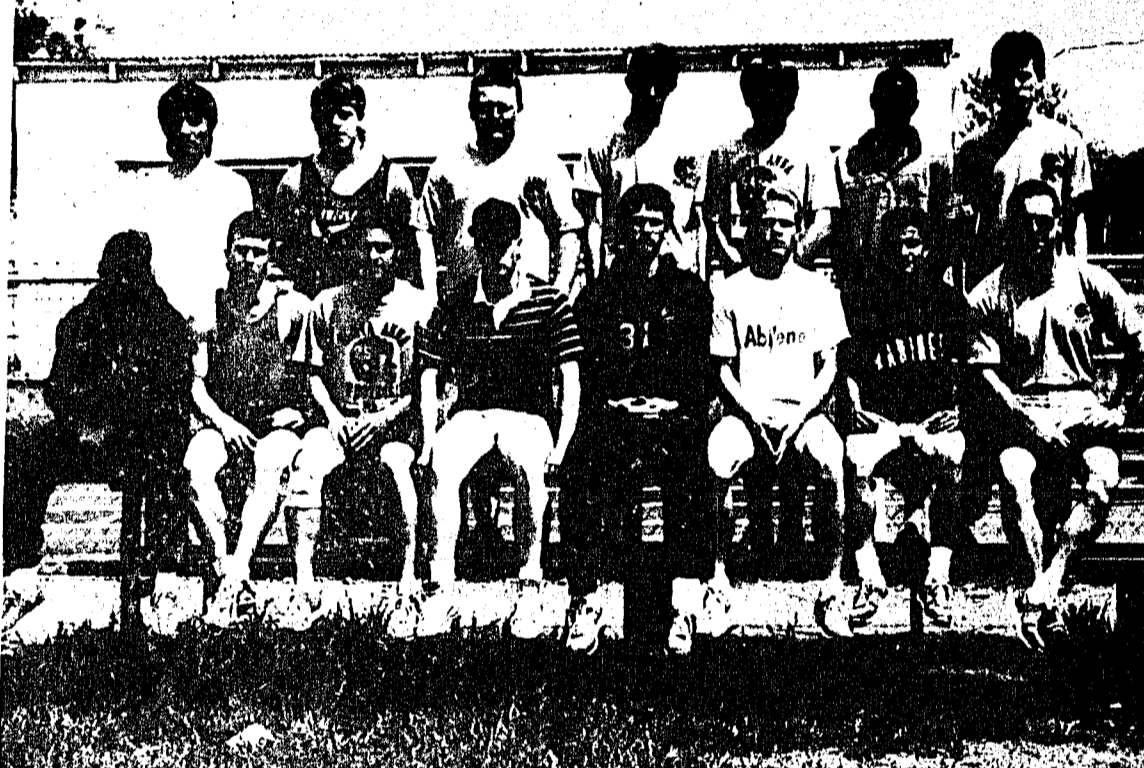
SAHS To Send Several To Regional Track Meet

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CAVUS FOOT

The cavus type of foot is one which has a very high arch and high instep, with the toes slightly retracted. Even if the foot structure is good, solid and well-balanced, the high arch can still lead to a lot of problems.

It is not unusual for people with cavus foot to experience pain of the bottom of the heel and arch (heel spurs and plantar fasciitis). There may also be pain and calluses on the bottom of the foot where the toes connect to the metatarsal bones. One can also get pain under the middle three toes where they connect to the metatarsal bones (anterior metatarsal bursitis).

Corns on the toes are also not to be unexpected.

The podiatrist can help someone suffering problems due to cavus foot. Individual symptoms should not be ignored. Delay of treatment can lead to unnecessary complications.

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
