State Spent \$2,717,714 For Welfare Programs In Coleman County Last Year

Included Protective Services For 80 Abused Or Neglected Children

The State of Texas spent a total of \$2,717,714 last year for major welfare programs in Coleman County, according to Ray. L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$1,626,938 spent for the aged and disabled residents of the county and \$323,970 for families and children in the

county," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$615,088 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$151,718. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

Busy Month For Local Police

January turned out to be another busy month for Police Chief Carlos Torres. In a report to filed this week he lists answering 49 calls which break down as following:

- Burglaries—8
- Thefts—3
- Emergency assistance—8
- Violation of city ordinances—4
- Motorist assists—6
- Family disturbances—5
- Prowlers—2
- Criminal mischief—3
- Vandalism—1
- Harassment—1
- Missing persons—1
- Reckless driving (hotrodding)—5
- Loud music—1
- Vehicle accident—1

Officer Torres reports that 7 of the 8 burglaries have been cleared up. According to Torres, in that one not cleared, the suspect has left town but the investigation is continuing. Two of those cleared were done so as the result of the victims not wishing to file charges.

Two of the three theft cases have

been cleared by arrests. The other is still under investigation.

In all, there were 19 arrests made during the month.

Four arrests that were made cleared four of the family disturbance cases.

One arrest took care of one of the reckless driving cases. The suspect also was driving while license suspended.

The other fourteen arrests had been reported earlier. They came as the result of an ongoing investigation of numerous burglaries in the community, some offenses happening over a period of several months to a year or so. The 14 arrests also included cases criminal mischief and vandalism. Some of the stolen property has been recovered and returned to owners. Other is being held for evidence. Officer Torres says that continuing investigations will probably result in more arrests in the above cases. Several suspects have been interrogated and released.

11th Last Day To Register To Vote In Primaries; Absentee Voting Begins 21st

February 11, (Sunday) is the last day to register to vote if you want to be eligible to vote in the March 13 primaries. You may register at the Tax Assessor's office at the courthouse Thursday or Friday. You may also pick up a registration card at the Post Office to be mailed. It

will be valid as long as it is post-marked by the 11th, (Sunday). However if you mail the card locally, you will need to place the card in the outside dropbox at the post office by 5:30 p.m. Saturday as there is no mail pickup in Santa

Mr. Barkley was born November 24, 1944 in Brownwood and had lived there all his life. He married Carolyn Sue Houchins December 18, 1964 in Brownwood. He was a graduate of Brownwood High School and Howard Payne University, and an honor graduate of the School of Pharmacology at the University of Texas.

He was a member of the Church of Christ, a member and past president of the Santa Anna Lions Club, a Boy Scout leader and was an Eagle Scout. He was a Little League coach and a member of Texas Muzzle Loaders Association.

Civil Rights Leader Remembered

The birthday of Frederick Douglass, one of America's most eminent civil rights leaders of the 19th century, is celebrated on Feb. 7.

Born Frederick Augustus Washington Bailey in 1817 in Tuckahoe, Md., Douglass escaped the bonds of slavery in 1838, changed his name and began a new life in the Northeast.

Having learned to read secretly as a boy, Douglass developed a literary brilliance and oratorical style that catapulted him into the forefront of the abolition movement. His speeches on the dehumanizing effects of slavery led to his new career in 1841 as an agent for the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Society. Later, Douglass compiled his memories in his autobiography, "Life and Times of Frederick Douglass," completed in 1882.

Douglass was the first black citizen to hold high rank in the U.S. government. During the Civil War, he was a consultant to President Abraham Lincoln, and later fought for full civil rights for freedmen. He also held various other government positions, including U.S. minister and consul general to Haiti in 1889-91. He died Feb. 20, 1895, in Washington, D.C.

He died at 7:50 a.m. Wednesday, January 31, 1989 in Brownwood Regional Hospital.

Born Feb. 9, 1922 in Rockwood, he had been a lifelong resident of Coleman and Brown Counties. He was a farmer and a U.S. Army veteran of World War II.

He married Catherine Dumas in France.

Survivors include his wife of Brownwood; eight sons, Steve Valdez Jr. of Bangs, Reuben Valdez of Snyder, Frank Valdez, Raymond Valdez, Danny Valdez and Marty Valdez, all of Brownwood, and Jimmy Valdez of Early; four daughters, Susie Traueck of Bangs, Linda Shackelford of Early, and LeRay Valdez and Jaunita Linn, both of Brownwood; and 26 grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a son, John Will Valdez.

THE CROSS OF CHRIST IS THE TOWERING CROSS

Hebrews 12:2 - *Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith: who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of God.*

There are two well-known pictures, each with the same title, "The Shadow of the Cross". One by Halmon Hunt represents the interior of a carpenter's shop, with Joseph and the boy Jesus at work. Mary also is present. The boy Jesus pauses in His work, and as he stretches Himself, the shadow of the cross is formed on the wall. The other picture is a popular engraving depicting the infant Jesus running with outstretched arms to his mother, the shadow of the cross being cast by his form as he runs. Both pictures are fanciful in form, but their underlying idea is assuredly true. If we read the Gospels just as they stand, it is clear that the death of Jesus Christ was really in view from the onset of His earthly appearance.

Till He hung on it, the Cross was a symbol of slavery and vulgar wickedness; but He converted it into the symbol of heroism, self-sacrifice and salvation. It was only a wretched framework of coarse and blood-dotted beams, which it was a shame to touch. But since then the world has gloried in it. It has been carried in every form of beauty and every substance of price. It has been emblazoned on the flags of nations and engraved on the scepters and diadems of Kings. The cross was planted on Golgotha a dry, dead tree, but lo! It has blossomed like Aaron's rod. It has struck its roots deep down in the heart of the world, and sent its branches upward, till today it fills the earth, and the nations rest beneath its shadow and eat of its pleasant fruits.

1 Cor. 1:18 - *For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God.*

The significance of the cross has been captured by some of our greatest hymn writers. On a hill overlooking the harbor of Macao, China, Portuguese settlers once built a massive cathedral. But a typhoon proved stronger than the work of man's hands. Some centuries ago the building fell in ruins except for the front wall. High on the top of that wall, challenging the elements down through the years, stands a great bronze cross. When Sir John Bowring saw it in 1825 he was moved to write those words so familiar not to many:

*In the cross of Christ I glory,
Towering o'er the wrecks of time;
All the light of sacred story
Gathers round its head sublime.*

*When I survey the wondrous cross,
On which the Prince of Glory died,
My richest gain I count but loss,
And pour contempt on all my pride.*

Thank God for the Towering Cross. God bless you.

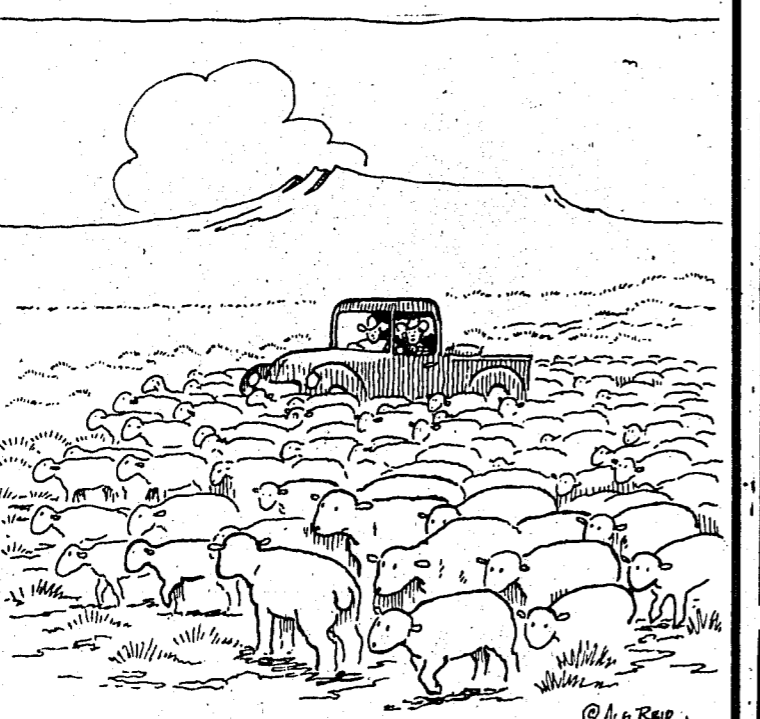

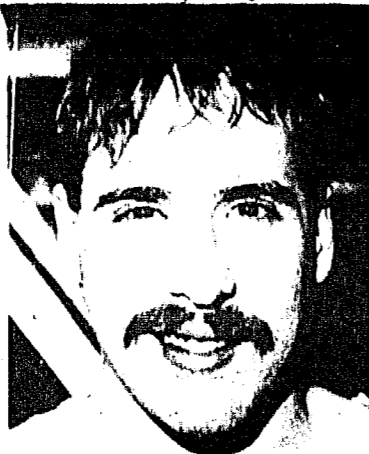
A talk from each member honored God.

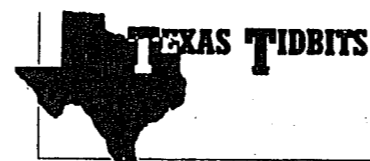
The deadline for nominations is Feb. 16, said Thomas Valco, Texas Agricultural Extension Service agricultural safety engineer and a member of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council which presents the annual rural heroism award. Send entries to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, P.O. Box 2689, Waco, Texas 76702-2689.

Valco said the recipient of the award will be announced March 12 during the 51st annual Texas-Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition at the Hyatt Regency Downtown in Houston.

"To qualify as a candidate, a person must have performed a human lifesaving act related to farming or ranching in 1989 within Texas," Valco said.

He said a nomination should include a written account of the incident and the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all the people involved. Photos and news clippings should accompany the nomination if they are available.

Winner of the award in 1988 was David Roberts of Morton, who rescued his younger brother, Dakota, from being injured by an electrical wire near their home in June of 1988. David received his award in Dallas last March.

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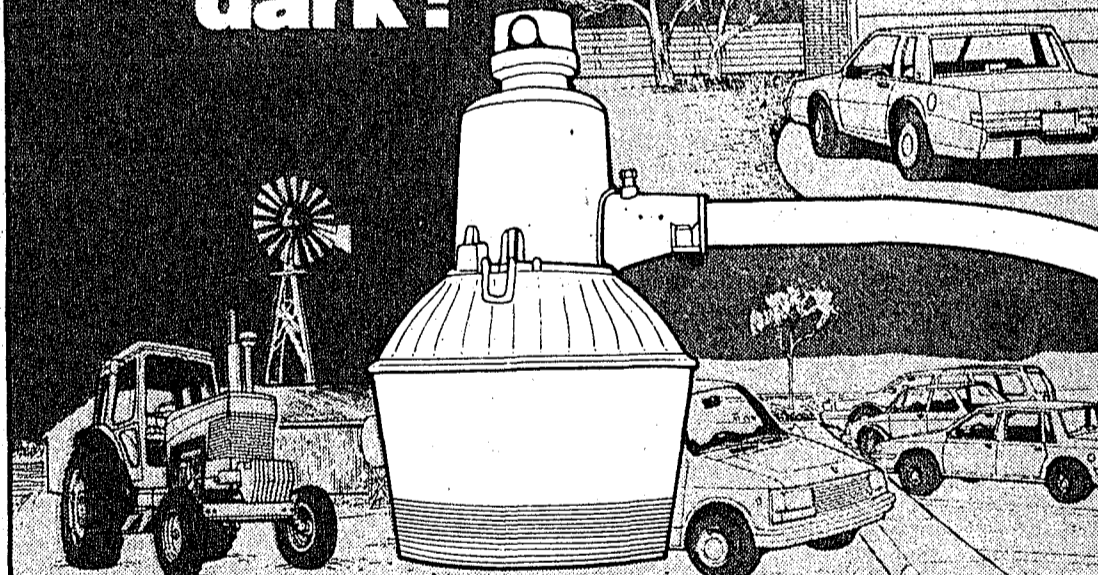
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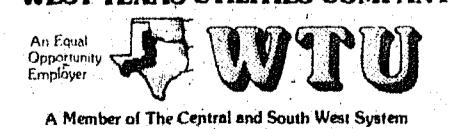


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
