I will be a full time commissioner who will make an honest effort to give each and every person the attention and services they deserve.

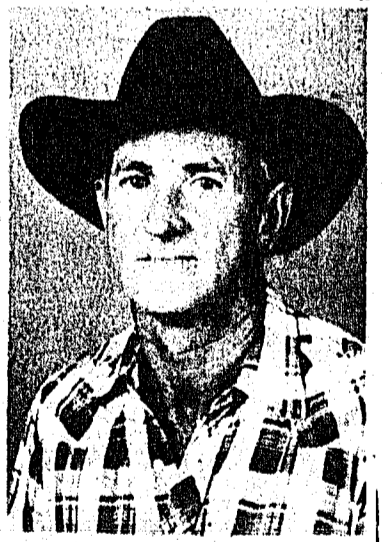


Eddie Jones

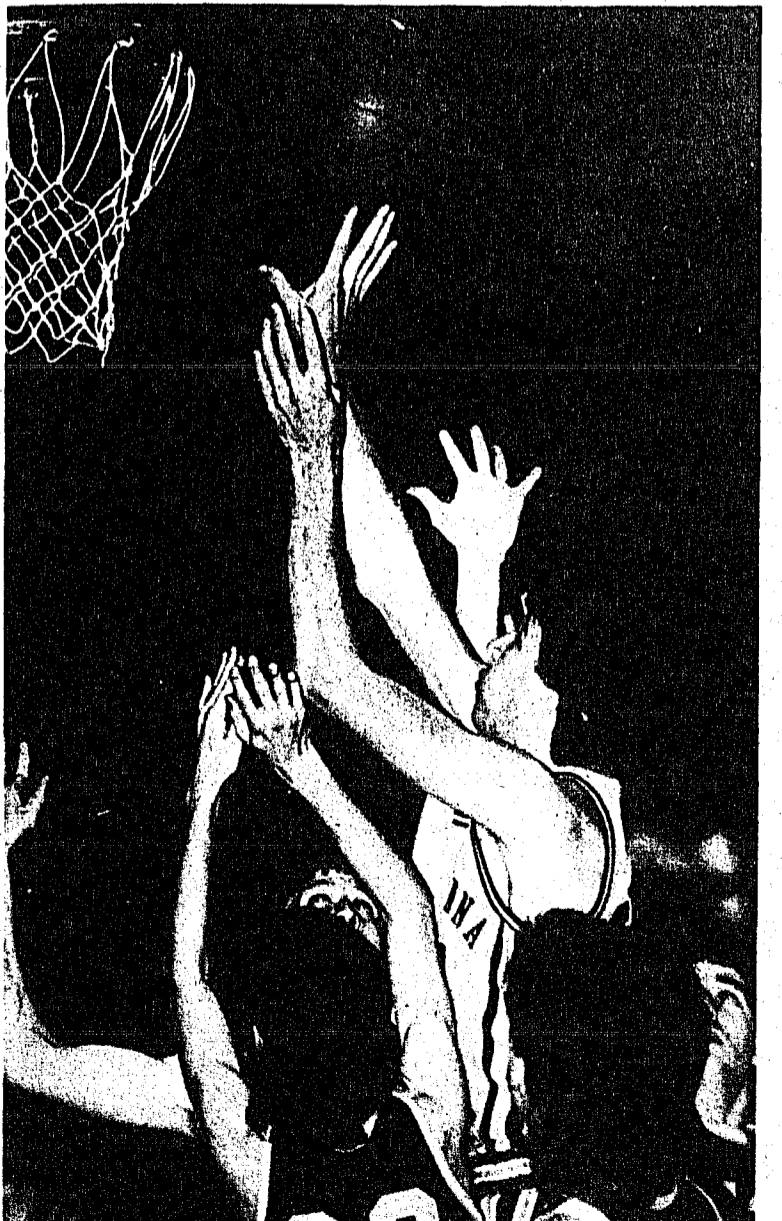
Billy Don McCrary

I am not a public speaker or politician, just a hard worker who will offer fair, honest and conservative representation on the Commissioners Court.

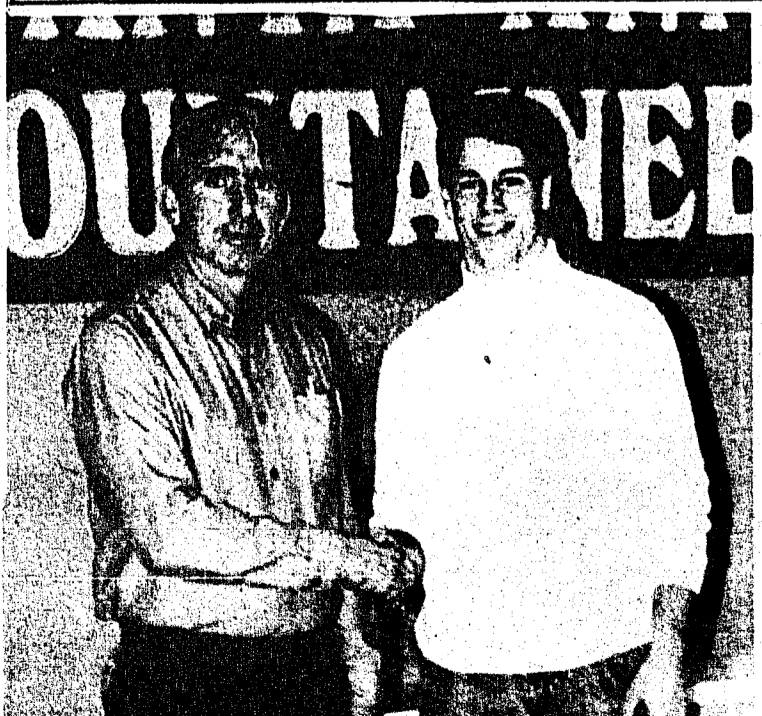

NOT OFFENDING GOD OR MAN

Recently, Kim Hubbard and her six-year-old son, Clay were driving into Santa Anna and there were patches of fog along the way. Kim, sensing there was a "teachable moment" at hand suggested that Clay look at the fog ahead.

"Really, Clay," she said, "it is a cloud, but when it is low we call it fog. In just a moment we will be driving in the cloud." Without any hesitation, Clay replied, "Well don't hit God." "What?" asked Kim. "You know. God lives in the clouds," Clay responded, "so don't run over God."

O that adults were as concerned about offending God as this little boy was about hurting God. We are so quick to forget that our sins are offensive to a Holy God.

We offend God in two ways: directly and indirectly. Any sin against God is offensive to Him and when we sin against a fellow human being, it is indirectly offensive to God. The Apostle, Paul said, "I strive to have always a conscience void of offense to God and man." Acts 24:16.

When we offend God by sinning, we are to forsake, renounce that sin, and accept the forgiveness that is ours through the shed blood of Jesus Christ. What about when we offend our fellow man?

In the Gospel of Matthew, we learn that if we have offended anyone we are to go to that person and try to make it right, even before we come to worship God. Mt.5:23 & 24. Also, if someone has offended us the responsibility is still with us to GO and seek reconciliation. Mt.18:15ff. We who desire to remain in fellowship with God must take the initial steps, as God's Word instructs us, to make things right whether we have offended our brother, OR he has offended us.

Recently, I have talked with several persons who will not shop in certain stores because somebody, somewhere, at some time way back when, offended them by not being friendly, sold the wrong size, etc, etc. As important as the economic loss might be, the failure to apply these Biblical principles is far more important. Some of these people who have been offended and chose to remain offended, subsequently seek to worship God. The Bible makes it clear that you can not truly worship God if you are at odds with your fellow man. It just will not work.

We should ask ourselves if we should have been offended in the first place. The Psalmist said, (Ps. 119:165) that if we truly love God and His Holy Word, we'll have great peace and NOTHING would offend us. That is a great and precious promise that some fail to claim for themselves. May people are offended easily and those who are offended EASILY are also offended FREQUENTLY. My friends, it ought not to be so among us who believe in the name of Jesus.

All of us should be as concerned about offending God and man as Clay was about running into Him in the "cloud". Each one of us should examine our own lives to see if we have offended, OR been offended and then GO to the person concerned and seek forgiveness and reconciliation. THEN, we can truly worship God our Creator, Who alone is worthy of worship.

Today most people in town have at least one TV. Limited time is allotted to news and books, so most people only reflect the views of their favorite news commentator.

Plans for moving the library have the goal of improving the use of the library. A pleasant convenient place containing books most of us could not buy should appeal to people of all ages.

That 1940 report contained a report of the children's reading program. The present library board will soon be making plans for the 1990 Summer Reading Program. If you have ideas to add excitement, please tell us.

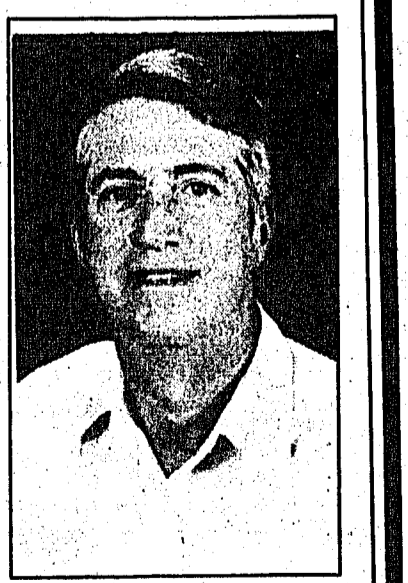

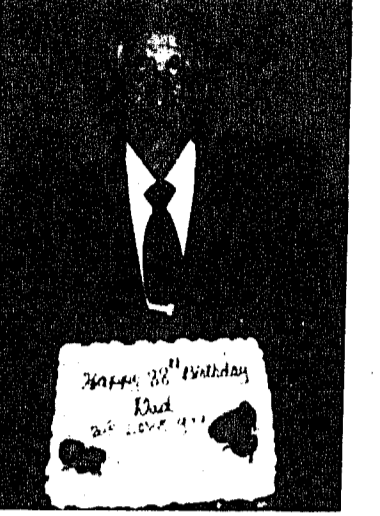

It is supposed that lightning struck the tanks during the electrical storm in the area on that morning. According to a department spokesman, the lightning blew the top off two tanks. One of the two

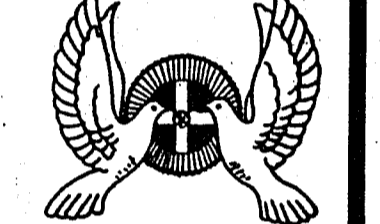
was afire and another closed top tank was blazing.

Scotty is the son of Norman and Pam Anderson.

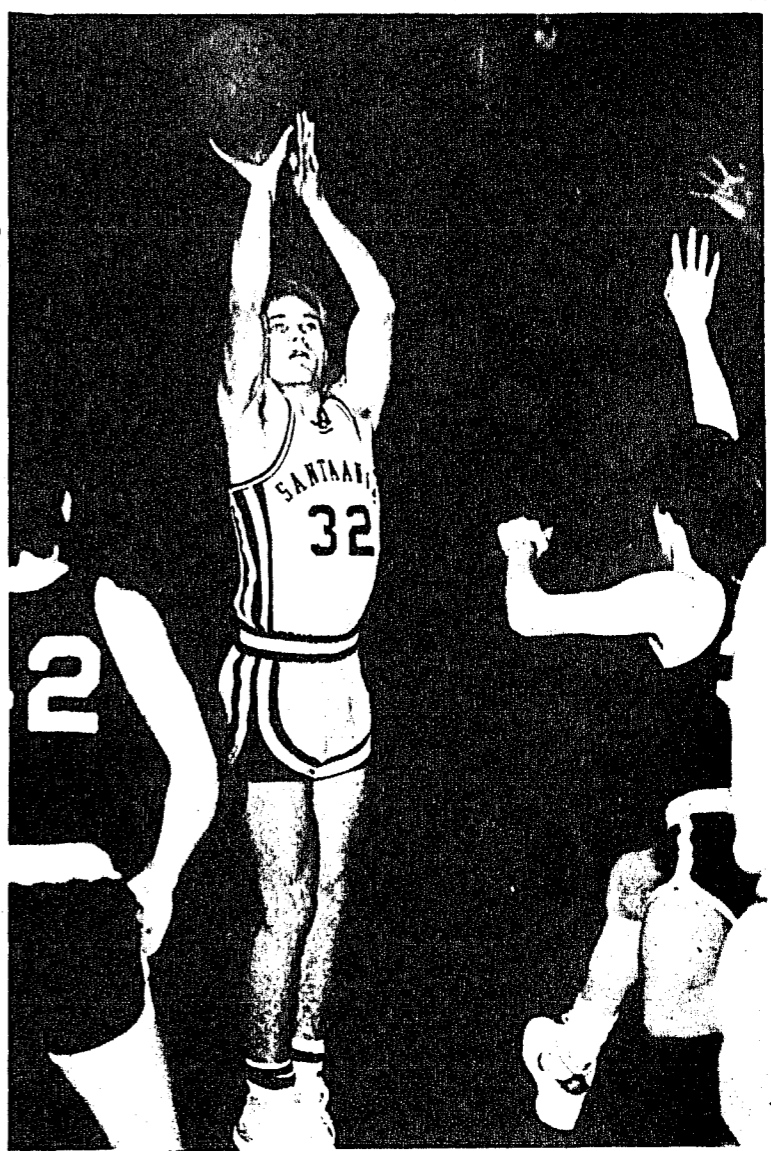

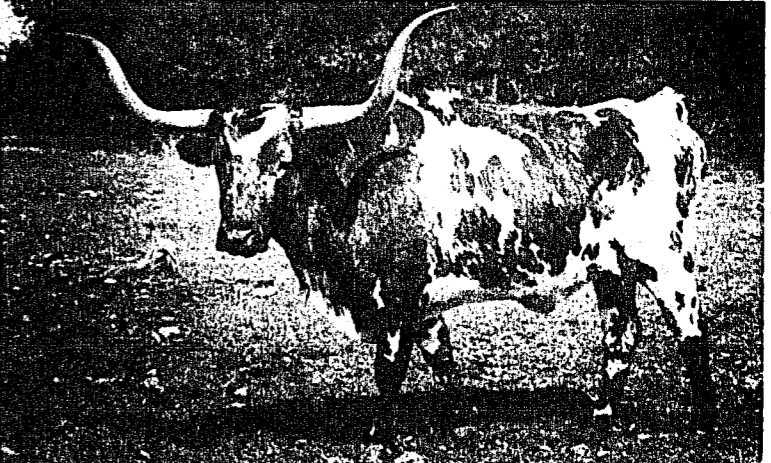

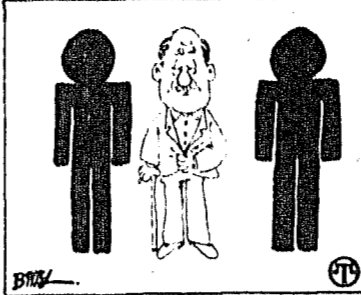

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received an application for financial assistance from the City of Santa Anna. The specific elements of this proposed action are to construct a 1.7 acre facultative treatment pond; a 1.7 acre oxidation pond; and construct a bench level terrace gravity flood irrigation system.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of the proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environmental impact statement for this project.
