He advises the office will be open from 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday, March 3. Absentee balloting will close at 5 p.m. Friday, Feb. 9 for the primary elections. The County Clerk's office is open from 8-5 on weekdays.

March 6 will be the last day that applications for ballots to be mailed will be accepted.


ENVIRONMENTAL REQUIREMENTS
