The Brownwood Area Farmers Market will open for the sixth season on May 36 on the Weakly-Watson parking lot at 8:00 a.m.

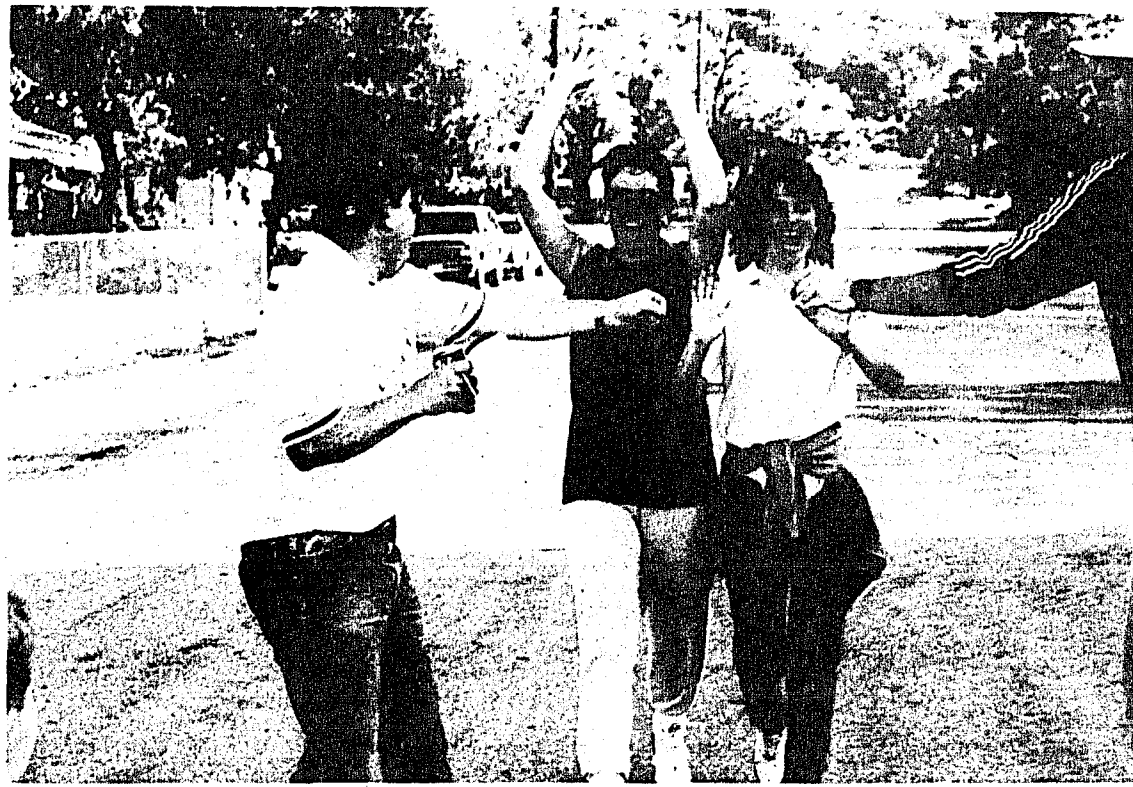
Market days will be Tuesday and Thursday afternoons at 4:00 p.m. and on Saturday mornings at 8:00 a.m.

Only members will be able to sell. Memberships are available at each market, and members may sell as often or as seldom as they wish.

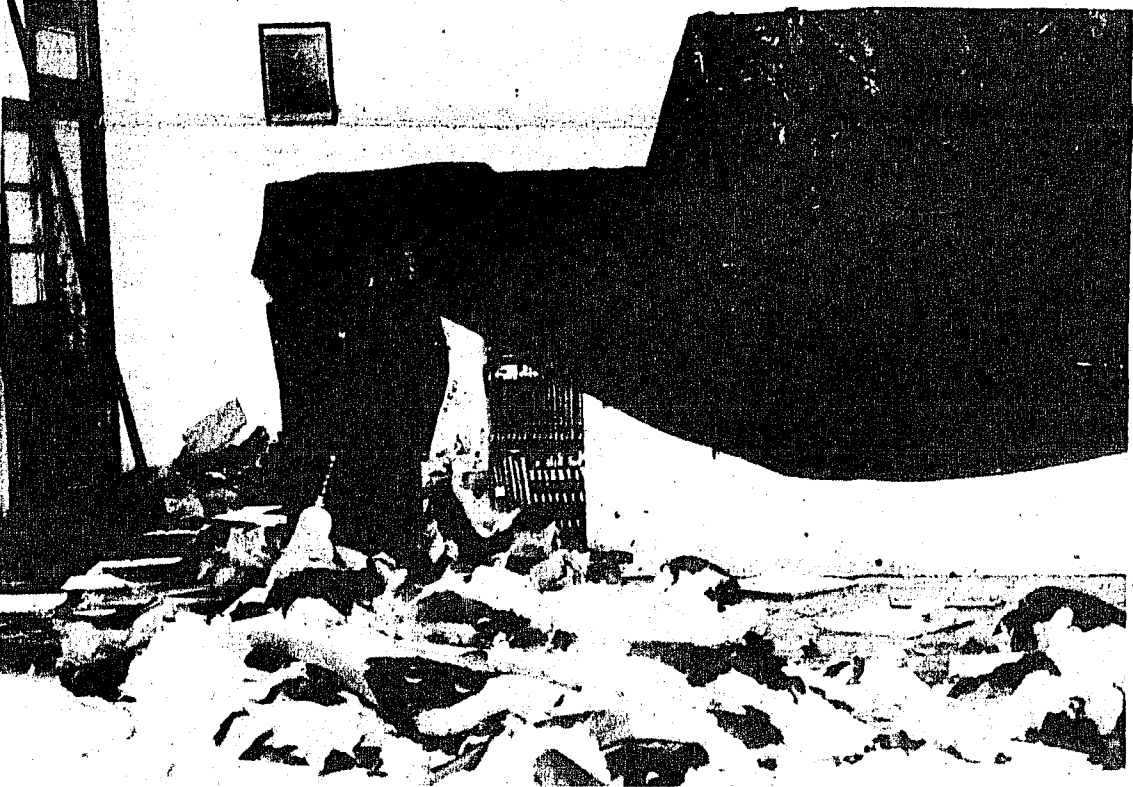

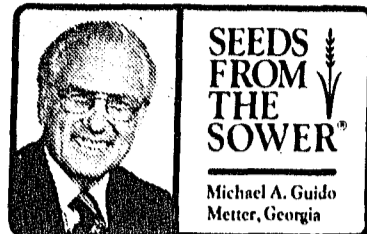

# Dedication Sat. At Lake Ivie

## But Work Goes On For Man Who Most Helped It Happen

Those attending the Saturday, May 19, celebration of completion of the state's newest reservoir will get to see a lake taking shape.

Although flooding rains, which recently engulfed much of central Texas area, largely missed the new watershed, Lake O.H. Ivie has gained 25 vertical feet since the closure of the outlet works April 24. While much of the 17,000 ac. tract is represented in filling the Colorado River channel and the borrow area at the foot of the dam on the upstream side, the main body of the fledgling lake is just beginning to spread.

Approximately two square miles of surface area are now inundated, according to John L. Taylor, president of the Colorado River Municipal Water District which built the project as a long-range regional water supply. This represents about 6 percent of the reservoir area at capacity, and about 3 percent of 554,000 ac. ft. capacity.

The reservoir has only 17 more vertical feet to go before the lake is opened to the public for recreational purposes.

Plans are taking shape for the 11:00 a.m. event which will give the public its first look at the lake and dam. U.S. Representative Charles Stenholm will be the dedicatory speaker, and Taylor said several state senators and representatives, other state officials, mayors of the member cities (Big Spring, Odessa, Snyder) and contract cities (San Angelo, Abilene and Midland) are planning to be on hand, along with county officials, for the historic occasion.

The dedication ceremony will

take place at the observation point overlooking the dam and spillway. In case rains make the roads impassable, as was the case three years ago for the groundbreaking ceremony, the event will be moved to the Ballinger High School campus, 25 miles northwest of the dam.

The dam is named for S.W. Freese, an engineer instrumental in the formation of the Colorado River Municipal Water District. O.H. Ivie, for whom the lake is named,

is the general manager of the water district. The naming of the reservoir was in recognition for his work that made the lake possible.

For Ivie, the project won't be finished until the water gets to the people of West Texas. He says, "one of the biggest challenges we still have is the supply line and pump stations from Ivie Reservoir to San Angelo, Midland and Odessa, which will cost upwards of

# Future Library Bldg Gets New Roof

Last week was the real beginning for our new library. Rain had delayed the roofing job that had been planned for some time, about a month and a half. Of course, the braces to raise the ceiling were already in place.

When the crew began removing part of the back wall in order to repair it, they found there had at one time been a fire in the coal bin. Some of the wood was in too bad a shape to keep and had to be replaced and the red brick proved to be too fragile to build onto. So the entire back wall is now new!

The back lot will now will be graded to level out the area where the coal bin once was. The brick and remaining roof trash will be removed soon.

the back area of the floor to meet the level of the back wall and to adjust for sewer and water lines to City sources in the back alley.

Proposed plans are now on paper. Copies are in the present library and on the window of the proposed new library location and also at the Santa Anna News office for those interested at looking at them. Remember that we are a long way from our final goal and will need to raise more funds in order to see it through. Suggestions for raising the money are welcome.

Present for the meeting were Susie Voss, Jim Spillman and Quinton Daniel, with Mayor Gale Brock presiding. Also present were Supt. of Operations, Derriel Warnock and City Secretary Alys Pelton. Newly elected council members Emmitt Simmons and Karen Morris were welcomed to the meeting although they were unable to take part in the business matters until certified and sworn in at a later date. Other visitors were thanked for their interest in being present.

Votes of the May 5 election were canvassed and results accepted. Mayor Brock brought the council

up to date on correspondence concerning insurance and legal matters.

Derriel Warnock gave his usual reports concerning the work of the utility crew. He reported that the closing of the old landfill, which was originally scheduled for May 6, had been postponed due to the heavy rains making it impossible to complete needed dirt work at the present time. He also reported that the crew was tending some assistance to those working on the new roof for the city library building. In reporting work on water leaks, Warnock advised the council that valves had been installed in various locations making it possible to turn

off the water in isolated areas rather than leaving a large number of customers without water while repairing lines. The work of removing trees and debris from the dams at the city lakes is almost completed and Farmers Home Administration work is still in progress. While coping with the regular problem of street repair the crew is now faced with added repairs due to recent

washing rains.

Alys Pelton was designated Record's Management Officer, a designation required by the State. Mayor Brock advised the council of other deadlines to be met concerning the adoption of a records management program by ordinance and deadlines for filing records control schedules.

A discussion was held concerning the sponsoring of graduation ads on KSTA Radio. It was decided to consult with Texas Municipal League about whether or not this would be appropriate since the city government is prohibited from making donations. If they find it can be done, the ad will state the City is a "Partner In Excellence".

Mayor Brock acknowledged the fact that this was the last meeting in which Susie Voss would serve as council person since she did not seek re-election. The Mayor thanked Mrs. Voss on behalf of the other City officials and the citizens of Santa Anna, for her service to the community.

# Pecan Nut Casebearer Spray Time Is Here

The Pecan nut casebearer, a serious pecan pest in this area will be with us early this year, according to information received this week from County Agent Kerry

Shropshire. The casebearer larve (small worms) damage pecans by eating the nutlets. One worm can destroy an entire cluster of pecans.

Present conditions indicate the optimum spraying time around

May 19-May 21. Accurate spraying is important. Spray applied too early is wasted and waiting too late to spray can result in serious

damage to the crop.

Monitoring your trees for casebearer eggs every couple of days starting before and continuing through the target spray period is the only way to assure that you make the right spray decision.

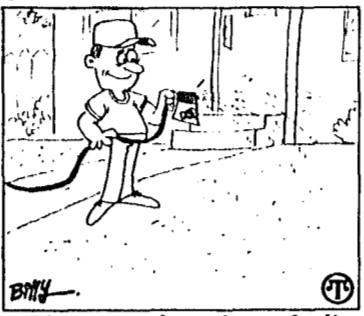

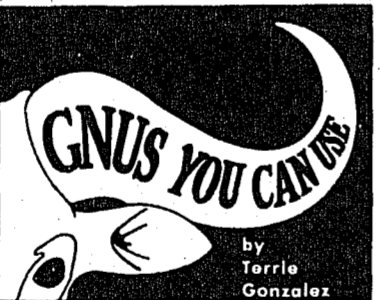

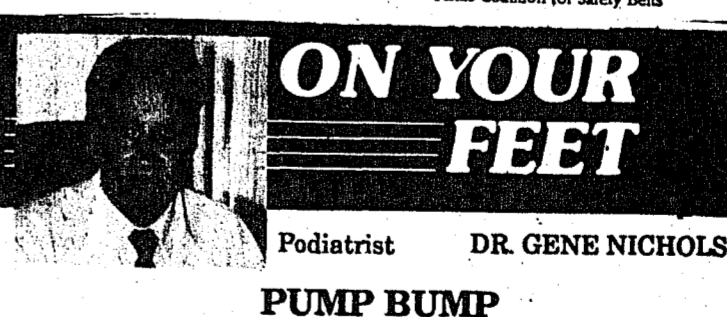

## Spring Cleaning Tips

100 million dollars. That's a big project."

He adds that the magnitude of the project is identified by the cost of it, but the challenge of building the pipeline, other than the financing, is nothing compared to building the reservoir and the obstacles confronted."

The challenge of building something lasting is what attracted Ivie to the engineering profession. He first became involved with the project in 1965 when he became General Manager of the water district.

"There was an effort to have the Corp of Engineers build the Stacy Project, which we opposed then", Ivie says. "We felt that if and when the project would be built, it should be built by those who needed the water from that source."

The district won the battle with the Corps of Engineers, but before the dam could be built it also had to settle the conflicts concerning water rights with the Lower Colorado River Authority and take steps to ensure the survival of the Concho River Water Snake, an endangered species.

The controversy surrounding the project since its inception hasn't ended. There are those still petitioning the water district to change the name of the reservoir back to Stacy or to Leaday, in memorial to a community that will be inundated with water once the reservoir fills.
