Third Time Charm

The old cliche, "Third Time's a Charm," turned out to be true for Shannon Brown who was representing SAHS at the state track meet last Friday in Austin.

Shannon turned in a gold medal performance as she won the girl's Class A long jump event on her third attempt in the finals. It also happened to be her third trip to the state meet as a participant.

It was sweet revenge for Shannon whose 18'-2 1/2" bested Mary Dessivia of Rule, who had beaten Shannon at the recent regional meet. Dessivia was second in the state event with a leap of 18'-1 1/2". In the regional competition, Dessivia had jumped 18'-6 and Shannon 18'-2 3/4" for her best of the year.

The SAHS track star had jumped 16-7 for a fourth place finish as a freshman and the next year she went 17-3 for third place. Dedication Sat. At Lake Ivie

But Work Goes On For Man Who Most Helped It Happen

May 19, celebration of completion overlooking the dam and spillway. of the state's newest reservoir will get to see a lake taking shape.

Although flooding rains, which recently engulfed much of central Texas area, largely missed the new watershed, Lake O.H. Ivie has gained 25 vertical feet since the closure of the outlet works April 24. While much of the 17,000 ac. feet is represented in filling the Colorado River channel and the borrow area at the foot of the dam on the upstream side, the main body of the fledging lake is just beginning to spread.

Approximately two square miles . of surface area are now inundated, 5 according to John L. Taylor, president of the Colorado River Municipal Water District which built the project as a long-rang regional water supply. This represents about 6 percent of the reservoir area at capacity, and about 3 percent of 554,00 ac. ft. capacity.

The reservoir has only 17 more vertical feet to go before the lake is opened to the public for recreational purposes.

Plans are taking shape for the 11:00 a.m. event which will give the public its first look at the lake and dam. U.S. Representative Charles Stenholm will be the dedicatory speaker, and Taylor said several state senators and representatives, other state officials, mayors of the member cities (Big Spring, Odessa, Snyder) and contract cities (San Angelo, Abilene and Midland) are planning to be on hand, along with county officials, for the historic occasion.







PUMP BUMP

If you have a bump on the back of your heel, it is most likely something you were born with. In other cases, it develops as the result of pressure or friction. It is called a "pump bump" or Haglund's deformity.

Usually, it will not bother you unless your shooes continue to rub against it. The bump becomes irritated and may even develop a bursal sac — a cushion filled with liquid. After that, the bursal

sac can get inflamed. Avoid such complications by visiting your podiatrist when if the pump bump first becomes irritated. De-

pending on the underlying source of the friction, your podiatrist can help relieve it. In some cases, certain shoes should simply not be worn. In other instances, where the foot is at fault, a properly designed orthotic device with a high padded back can do the trick.
