Summer comes to an end Sept. 23 at 2:55 a. m. EST.

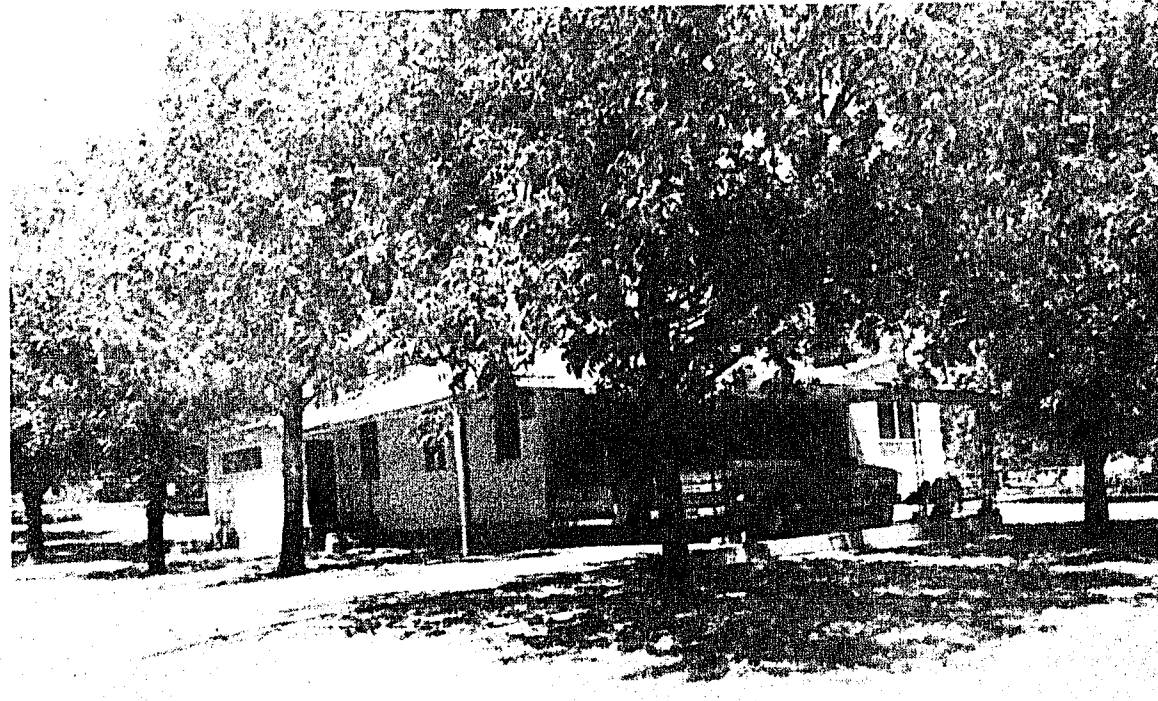
Congratulations To Larry Wardlow!

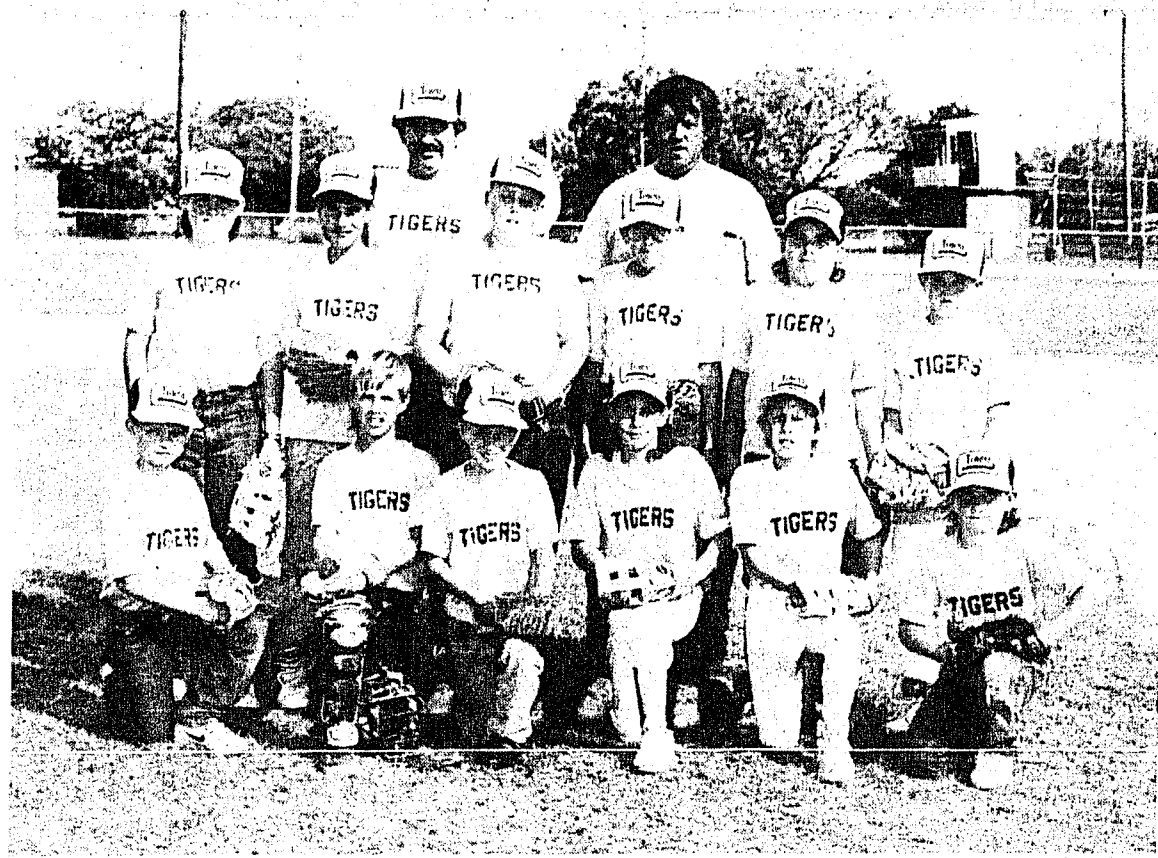

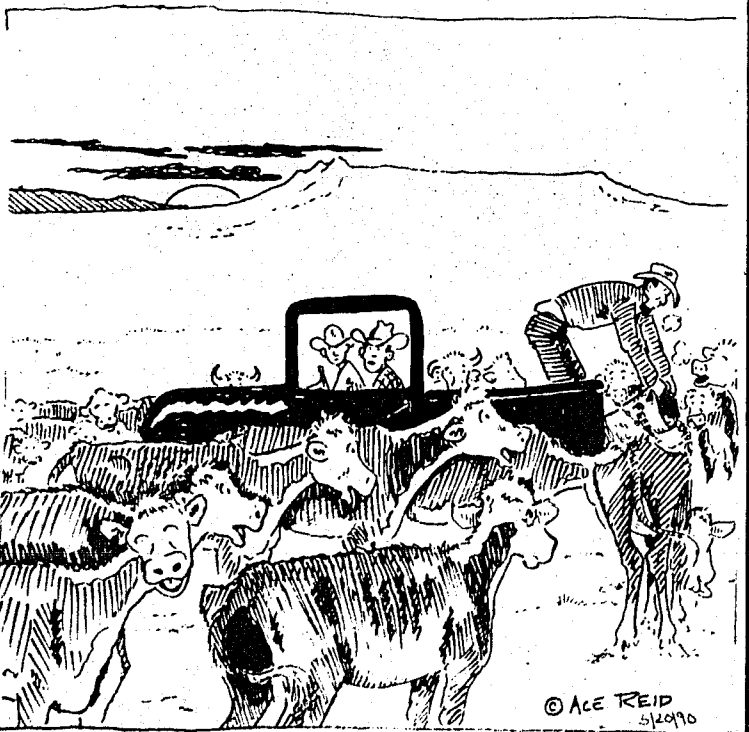

Local Students Help Fulfill Youngster's Wish

A 10-year-old English boy suffering from an incurable brain tumor has made the Guinness Book of World Records, thanks to the millions of get-well cards has received.

A number of those cards were received from children at Santa

Anna Elementary School as well as from several local organizations who took the card sending as

projects. Those include the Rockwood Home Demonstration Club, Nitia Daniell Circle of the Methodist Church, Delta Omicron

and some Sunday School classes of the churches of Santa Anna.

Craig Shergold's wish has been to make the Guinness Book for the most get-well cards received by anyone. According to the latest information from his mother Marion Shergold of Carshalton, Surrey, England, her son received more than 10,300,000 cards from around the world—more than enough to put him in the Guinness Book of World Records. The previous record was 1,000,265.

"He's so proud he is going to be in the Guinness book," his mother said. The English boy cannot attend school because of his condition and has to spend his days at home.

His mother said that her son has received so many cards that they are being kept in three different postoffices and a warehouse.

Routine Business For Council

Due to the absence of Mayor Brock because of illness, City Secretary Alys Pelton called the meeting of City Council to order last Tuesday night, June 12. All council members were present as well as other city officials, Supt. of Operations Derriel Warnock and Chief of Police Carlos Torres. Several interested citizens were on hand for the meeting.

After a motion by Councilman Jim Spillman and a second by Thomas Hays, Councilman Quinton Daniels was unanimously elected temporary Mayor Pro-Tem for this meeting.

Thelma Brooker asked for permission for the Park Board to plan a fund raiser for the weekend following the 4th of July. Since the Park Board is an agency of the City, the council's approval was needed for the activities. According to plans submitted, the activities will include a dance, brisket cook-off, and water sports activities such as water polo. The event was approved unanimously after a motion

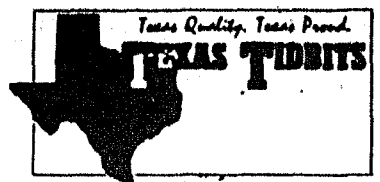
from Spillman and a second by Hays.

Chief of Police Carlos Torres advised the council now that summer is upon us, he would be needing to put in more working hours and would need either a raise in pay or another officer to assist him. He offered no other report for the month. He was told the council would take his request under advisement and possible action would be taken at the next regular meeting in July, if not before.

Supt. of Operations Derriel Warnock reported it had been a pretty much routine month for the Utilities Department. The crew had spent some time helping with work at the new library building which is owned by the City. The crew has also been busier than usual patching and improving streets. Those patched a month or so ago as a matter of routine had been washed out again when the heavy rains came, and in fact, were in worse condition when patching began again. The crew has also spent some time trying to alleviate a problem that arose when the rains filled the drainage ditch at the base of the mountain with dirt and sand from the mountain. He also discussed the fact that the dyke at the top of the mountain has been washed out. He will be trying to talk with property owners to see if something can be worked out in getting the dyke repaired. The report showed some damage from the storms to the sewer farm, although most of the damage was to equipment owned by Coleman County Electric Coop. Water leaks for the month were minor with one 6" line break and a couple of 2" line repairs made.

A couple of citizens approached the council about buying some property owned by the City. They were told the council would take the matter up with their attorney concerning the legalities of selling the property.

Miss Pelton reported she had checked into computer software for a General Ledger program and that it would be possible for the City to go ahead with the program before the audit was completed as long as there were account balances for the beginning of the fiscal year, and the accountant could bring the program up to date when the audit is completed. Councilman Spillman made the motion to obtain the program software at a cost of \$595, which includes training and set up. Councilwoman Karen Morris seconded the motion before a unanimous vote.

Posthumous Honor To S'Anna Man

Elgin Fred Talley was, on June 2, 1990, posthumously awarded the Cross of Military Service by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Albert Sidney Johnston Chapter # 2060 of San Antonio. Talley, a lineal descendant of Cecil Eugene Talley who served as a 1st Lt. in Bass' Greys Texas 6th Brigade in the War Between the States, was a member of the U.S. Army during World War I. The award was presented to a daughter, Mydena Brown, at a ceremony taking place at Oak Hills Country Club in San Antonio. Talley was nominated for the honor by a member of the Alamo Camp 1325 Sons of Confederate Veterans.

Elgin Fred and Lena McGary Talley raised three children in this area, all attending Santa Anna schools. The children are Mydena Talley Burleson/Brown of San Antonio; Cecil Eugene Talley of Austin; and Veda Talley Wallace of Beebee, Ark. Mr. and Mrs. Talley are both buried in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mrs. Brown writes, "During the War Between the States, the Confederate States did not award medals to its soldiers, due to lack of money and material to do so. So we now honor the memory of those men who gave their all for an ideal, States rights. The man who received the honor must have served his country and flag during a war or insurrection. And be a direct descendant of a Confederate Soldier. The medal can be worn on the uniform of any active duty American serviceman."

How Hot Is It? Thermometer May Not Tell It All

The late spring of 1990 may well be remembered in some parts of the state as the time when torrential rains, flooding, high winds and lightning repeatedly brought death and property destruction. The Trinity River flood in May, for example, killed as many as 12 Texans. The extent of damage along the river's course through East Texas is still uncalculated.

But as if the ravages of violent weather were not enough, an early heat wave has combined with high humidity to pose a less obvious, but also deadly, threat to humans.

Health officials warn that heat stress, or hyperthermia, causes about 200 deaths and thousands of illnesses each year in the U.S. The victims usually are the elderly, the very young, of people weakened by other illnesses, although prolonged heat stress can be fatal to anyone. Last year, as many as nine Texans may have died from excessive heat, although weather records for the state show that the hot months of 1989 were generally cooler than average.

Dr. Patti Patterson, Acting Asso-

ciate Commissioner for Personal Health Services at the Texas Department of Health, said that high temperature alone is physically tolerable to most people. Combined with high humidity, though, heat can cause a person's natural cooling system, perspiration, to work overtime. "If a person fails to replace fluids and salts they lose during perspiration," Dr. Patterson said, "dehydration can follow."

The symptoms of dehydration include muscle cramps, dizziness, nausea, low blood pressure and headaches. "These are serious warning signs," Patterson said. "Anyone with these symptoms should immediately find shade, ventilation and fluids-- preferably water-- to drink until the symptoms subside." She explained that if fluids are not soon replaced, heat stroke can follow, causing sudden weakness, severe headache, disorientation leading to loss of consciousness, brain damage and death.

To avoid overheating, Dr. Patterson said, people should wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and

drink more than their normal intake of water. Those with heart or respiratory conditions or people taking medications should be especially aware of early signs of physical problems.

"one of the best ways to know whether to take special precautions on a given day is to follow a local weather forecast. Although forecasts cannot be exact all the time, meteorologists are usually accurate enough to predict approximate temperatures and humidity," she added.

Forecasters often refer to a "heat stress index," a numeric table which reflects how hot the air will feel to humans. A heat stress reading of 105 degrees is considered very dangerous, yet it can occur while thermometer readings are still in the mid 80s.

The following is the official National Weather Service heat index table. To calculate heat stress, find the index number in the column under current humidity (top line) that is directly to the right of the current thermometer reading (left column)

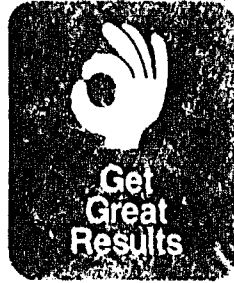

ON YOUR FEET

WHEN SHOES INDICATE PROBLEMS
 If your shoes show normal wear and good foot function, you will note worn areas at the heel and along the outer border of the sole. That's where your foot should be making contact with the ground, first at the heel, and then along the outer border and across the ball of the foot to the great toe. If your feet are functioning normally, they will tend to point fairly straight ahead. But if they point away from the body a la Charlie Chaplin, the feet will roll over toward the midline of the body. This will cause a bulge in the inner border of the upper part of the shoe. This is one of the signs of a foot problem called pronation. Symptoms such as corns and calluses that result from poor foot function are only one sign that something may be wrong. The effects can be much more far-reaching, causing increased fatigue, lower back pain, and cramps in feet and legs, often during the night. If you think you may have a foot problem, have your feet examined by your podiatrist so he can give you the treatment you need to correct it.

Clothing Choices For People With Arthritis

Putting on a pair of button-down jeans can be aggravating, if not downright impossible to some people — at least it can be to those with arthritis.

In the United States, one out of seven people (more than 38 million), from infants to the elderly, have arthritis — a painful disease that affects joints, muscles and tendons throughout the body. With arthritis, even minor tasks like pulling on snug jeans and closing metal buttons are difficult.

Therefore, design, material, fit and other factors that go into clothing become important for a different reason. Clothing for people with limited mobility should be easy to put on, comfortable and attractive. We emphasize selecting and adapting clothing so people can become more self-reliant. People feel — totally independent because they don't have to ask anyone to help them with something like dressing that's considered so simple. People with arthritis or other disabilities need not forsake fashion when selecting clothes.

One of the biggest fashion hits right now is the wrap-around sarong skirt. Also popular are dresses with elastic waistbands and draw strings. Both are fashionable and ideal for people with disabilities.

Jogging suits also are popular, easy to put on and comfortable. Some garment features are better choices than others because they allow more freedom of movement and are easier to handle. Examples are pullover styles with large neck openings, front opening garments, pre-tied bows, ribbons and ties, flared skirts, beltless styles or belts attached to garments and slip-on shoes.

Shortsleeves are easier to get on than long sleeves, also wide sleeves like those of a kimono, raglan and dolman allow freedom of movement.

Easy changes also can be made in garments for people with limited use of their hands. A tassel or a bit leather button placed on the end of a zipper can make it easier to pull up or use a zipper puller.

Small buttons like those on men's shirts are hard to fasten. To adjust the shirt, sew the button holes up and sew the buttons on top, then use snaps, hooks or touch-closure tabs. The shirt will appear to be fastened by the buttons. For cuffs, use elastic thread on buttons to allow the hands to slide through the cuffs easily.

What we're focusing on is how to make dressing easier without changing the appearance of the garment.

The best types of fabrics are blends of synthetic and natural fibers such as cotton and polyester. Lightweight cotton knits may be a little more difficult to get on, but are much more comfortable.

Fabric characteristics to consider when selecting clothing for use by those with limited mobility include:

Rabies—Tips From Animal Control Officer

A boy and his dog. What could be more beautiful? But, is the child safe? Rabies, once the disease is acquired, is incurable, but easily prevented in your pets and livestock. This is achieved by vaccinating against the rabies virus before exposure.

Coleman County is in the southern tip of region 5. During the 1989 year there were 106 confirmed

cases of rabies in region 5. There were 6 cases in dogs; 4 in cats; 10 cases in horses; 5 cases in cows, 68 cases in skunks; and 13 cases in bats. All cases confirmed in domestic animals were caused by the skunk rabies virus.

In some cases in domestic animals, the owner is unaware the animal has been attacked by a rabid animal, probably a skunk, fox, raccoon, bat, dog or cat.

Many people do not think about cats getting rabies, but they cer-

tainly can, because cats are allowed to roam among the wild life they are more likely to be exposed to rabies than a dog which has the protection of a fenced yard.

When an animal bites a person, who is in charge? All cities and towns must designate a Local Health Authority (L.H.A.) That person can be an animal control officer. The duties of the L.H.A. are to enforce the Rabies Control Act, including the rules of the Texas Board of Health, and to enforce the local ordinances and/or rules pertaining to animal control. The L.H.A. is responsible for investigating animal bites and for investigating animal bites for the proper management of the biting animal.

What happens to the biting animal? Domestic dogs or cats, regardless of vaccination status must be quarantined for 10 days or humanely destroyed without damage to the brain, which must be submitted to a rabies lab for testing. The owner of the pet is required by law to bear the cost of the quarantine and veterinarian service associated with the animal. The state bears the cost of the actual testing.

HIGH RISK ANIMALS: Skunks, bats, foxes, raccoons must be humanely destroyed and their heads submitted for testing.

LOW RISK ANIMALS: Opos-

sums, schrews, moles, squirrels, gophers, mice, rabbits, rats, and armadillos do not need to be quarantined or tested unless the Local Health Authority has reason to believe the animal is rabid.

Other biting animals not listed must be humanely destroyed and tested. However a 30-day quarantine is currently allowed as an alternative to testing.

Texas law requires owners of dogs and cats to have them vaccinated for rabies by four (4) months of age and to have annual vaccinations thereafter.

Rural pet owners should be aware that some times a rabid skunk will attack a litter of puppies or kittens killing some of them and exposing others to rabies although no visible wound is found. It is safest to assume that the whole litter has been exposed and take appropriate measures.

Rabies manifests itself two different ways. One way is the mad dog that runs a mile or more biting everything in its path, drooling saliva from its mouth. They do this because the throat is paralyzed and the animal cannot swallow. The other manifestation is the animal which has blind staggers and acts as though it has a bone stuck in its throat. Some times the owner is exposed, trying to aid the animal.

Remember if you are bitten or otherwise think you have been exposed to rabies, you should let your doctor and your Animal Control Officer know immediately. This terrible disease can be prevented from developing.

County Tax Collections Less Than This Time Last Year

Routine business was on the Monday, June 11, agenda for the Tax Appraisal Board meeting held in Coleman at the district office.

Barbara Kingsbery, chairman, led the session, attended by D.G. Allen and Dwight Nanny. Max Home and Jack Knox were absent.

Minutes of the May meeting were read and approved, and Chief Appraiser Bill Jones reviewed the bills and accounts and gave the monthly financial report.

Mr. Jones reported the tax collections for the Month of May totaled \$53,000, with collections from October 1, 1989 to date being over three million dollars which is less than at this time the previous year. More delinquent taxes were collected last year, making collections greater than usual. The 1989

taxes total 81 percent, the same as last year at the beginning of June.

Mr. Jones reported on Tax sale of properties and several that will be offered for sale for delinquent taxes.

It was announced that the Appraisal Review Board met to review the tax roll and make plans for the hearings to be held June 25 and 16.
