Carl Flint, Jr. Is Fatally Hurt In Oil Field Accident

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Burris were called to Big Spring Sunday night by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Flint, whose only child, Carl, Jr., their eight year old son, met with accidental death late Sunday evening.

Mr. Flint, an oil field worker, was employed on the Plymouth Oil Lease about 15 miles south of Big Spring. They were in the act of bringing in a well the young boy and others were near the tank when the crew made an effort to flush the oil through the flow pipe into the fan. The pipe broke off and fell, striking the boy and killing him instantly.

The remains were prepared by Fidelity Funeral Home at Big Spring and brought here Tuesday for burial. Hosh Brothers assisted the director in carrying out arrangements here.

The funeral was held at 2:30 p. m. in the U. S. A. Presbyterian church, the pastor, Rev. M. L. Womack in charge.

Carl is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl E. Flint of Big Spring; three aunts, Mrs. G. L. Parker and Mrs. M. L. Parker of Novice, and Mrs. Lovd Parks of Santa Anna. As We Sit and Think (Sometimes Just SIT)

Monday was a hard day for an editor to get an inspiration, having spent several days out of the office, attending the annual convention of the Texas Press Association held in Dallas last week and returning to our desk Monday morning to find it loaded with mail from most every direction and dealing with most every thing from the governors race to a small classified ad. But little was written for the paper Monday.

Tuesday morning, following a fine rest Monday night, the papers were all featuring big headlines, telling the world that the 73rd CONGRESS ADJOURNS MONDAY NIGHT. Other headlines were like the following:

CLAUDE POLLARD, FORMER ATTORNEY GENERAL INDICTED IN FAKE CIGARETTE STAMP CASE, JOHN NEWTON DRAWS FIFTEEN YEARS PRISON TERM AFTER PLEADING GUILTY TO ROBBERY OF THE COLEMAN NATIONAL BANK; ALFALFA BILL MURRAY WINS LAST ROUND IN NEW KISSER BRIDGE FIGHT; and others.

In a burlesque kind of way, Roosevelt has been offering the members of Congress fare home for some time if they would adjourn and leave Washington.

On plea guilty to robbery with firearms of the First Coleman National Bank February 2nd, and was given fifteen years penitentiary sentence. According to current reports, Mr. Newton made a statement, purported to be the truth of the entire affair, and implicated two other men in the robbery. M. for the purpose of determining whether or not a uniform fixed rate should be charged by both Coleman Gas & Oil Company and Santa Anna Gas Company and delivered to the inhabitants of Santa Anna, Texas, and, if a uniform fixed rate should be charged then at such hearing the Railroad Commission will determine, fix and establish a rate for domestic gas that is fair and reasonable to both the Coleman Gas & Oil Company and Santa Anna Gas Company as well as the inhabitants of the City of Santa Anna, Texas."

We have no comment to make on the above, but just furnish it for its news value to the reading public.

While out last week, mixing and mingling with people in all parts of Texas, we tried to investigate the political situation some, to find who might be the most favorable and likely prospects in the race for governor, attorney general, congress and such like, but all the information we collected left us about as dumb as before. You get just about as many opinions as you ask questions, and when all is weighed and balanced you find yourself right where you started, wondering which way to go.

The government of Texas, in our opinion, unless C. C. McDonald takes a lead by reason of his Ferguson support, the six high men in the governor's race will all run close together in the first primary, and we have no wagers to make on any of them. It seems that no one has gained very highly of the Santa Anna lead over the others to much extent yet.

We believe our own home candidates, Walter Woodward for Attorney General and C. L. South for Congress both have fine chances to win, however, it is some time yet till the first primary, and no one can tell until the votes are in and counted.

Senator Tom Connally will be home this week, and will begin his active campaign for re-election.

Light rains fell over a large portion of the state Saturday night and Sunday, but not enough to relieve the distressing situation. The drought in Texas is deplorable and very distressing. Texas farmers had prepared and planted a large feed crop, and it is cut short regardless of future rain, and unless considerable rain falls immediately the crop will not amount to much. The largest corn crop we have ever seen planted in the state was planted this year, and the crop will be almost a failure unless relief comes this week. It is too late in many places now. Coleman county has been more fortunate than many other counties, in fact, but few counties have had as much rain as has Coleman county this season. Rain is badly needed here now, probably worse than in places where there is no rain to speak of here. One man asked another if his part of the country was suffering for rain and got the following reply: "We are not suffering now, I think the crops suffered a little before they dried up." Our crops are suffering a little right now, but it may be over in a few more days.

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Santa Anna Woman Has Book of Poems Published Recently

Mrs. Leola Christie Barnes, well known Coleman county poet, has had another book of poems published.

The San Angelo Standard recently had the following to say about Mrs. Barnes:

"With PURPLE PETALS off the press, Leola Christie Barnes of Santa Anna has two volumes of poems bearing her name. The first, CRIMSON DAWNING, appeared in 1931.

The manuscript crossed the Atlantic as a simple American citizen but came back a sophisticated cosmopolitan, writes M. S. Barnes in explaining the months it traveled about before it was put into book form by The Channing Press of London.

E. M. Channing-Renton, who had personal charge of the volume's designing, resides in Paris. He wrote the author that the delay in publication was caused by the depreciation of the dollar but finally released the book to meet an almost universal demand.

Almost English Subject

"I scarcely recognized it as my own—except for the poems of course, since it had been designed in Paris and had lived in London until it barely escaped becoming a subject of King George."

Mrs. Barnes will be remembered by many here as having been the guest poet for the annual Woman's Club poetry program in 1933. Last year and again for the 1934 contest, Mrs. Barnes awarded a copy of CRIMSON DAWNING to the person writing the best poem on historical events connected with this section of the country.

Writes Of Texas

In private life, the author is Mrs. Ford Barnes. With her family cares and house duties, she is quite a busy woman. This time of year is canning time for her as well as for any other woman, but preparing meals, canning, making preserves or doing the dishes, her mind isn't idle. Her duties have become such routine affairs that little concentration is necessary and she can let her thoughts flitter, flitter, thither and yon as they will.

The range of subjects and themes is indicative of Mrs. Barnes' wide interests. Commendable, too, is the fact that the poet writes of life around her, or her native state, and her home town. Beauty and truth are to be found in the lines of her poems. A worshipfulness of spirit and a love of nature is felt in all her works, included in PURPLE PETALS."

McKinzie Descendants Meet in 5th Annual Reunion

The descendants of the late J. E. and Nancy McKinzie met in the City Park at Coleman, Sunday, June 10th, in their fifth annual family reunion. There were 233 present, representing the largest number ever to attend the meetings.

According to a paper furnished this office, there were 106 present at the first meeting held in Cross Plains, 55 present at the second gathering, 69 present at the third, 143 at the fourth, and this year 233 relatives assembled to celebrate the occasion.

The reunion was formally opened at noon, with a prayer offered by C. M. McKinzie. A luncheon was served in picnic style, and was greatly enjoyed. Several songs and an informal program followed.

The lives of J. E. and Nancy McKinzie were filled with interesting and historical events. It is said of Mr. McKinzie that he never had a fight with a white man, but encountered several bouts with Indians.

Mr. McKinzie was born September 8, 1823 in Sevee county, Tennessee. He moved to the state of Georgia, was married there in 1850 or 1851. He and his companion came to Texas in 1852, and settled first in Bell county. March 5, 1853 they settled in Comanche county, where they lived to see the country develop from a frontier settlement to a well settled community of happy and industrious people. Mr. McKinzie helped to lay off the county site of Comanche. He was a member of the first Missionary Baptist church organized in Comanche county, his membership in the church lasting over a period of seventy years. He never was in court, not even as a witness.

Mr. McKinzie was wounded in a battle with the Indians in February 1861, his father and one brother being killed in the same fight. Others mentioned in the battle with the Indians on that memorial occasion were Andy Stuart, Bob Neal, Jim Willson, and John Floyd.

J. E. McKinzie passed on in September 1906, at the age of 83 years. His son, J. E. McKinzie, Jr. left a note among his other possessions, dated August 30, 1905, in which he outlines a description of the fight with the Indians, as related by his father, who, at that time was still among the living.

The McKinzie reunion will meet on the second Sunday in June in 1935 for the sixth annual reunion, at Lake Brownwood. Leonard McKinzie is president, R. L. McKinzie, vice president and Albert Tunnell is secretary.

Mr. Espy is well known in ranching circles and has many friends in central Texas. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Espy of Brady.

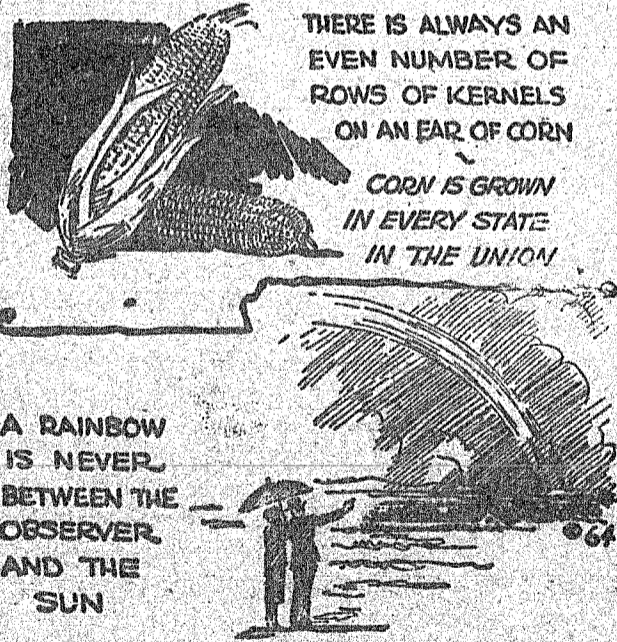

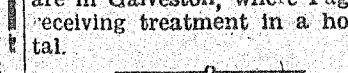


