DPS Predicts 15 Will Die On Highways Over July 4th

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 15 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in Texas during the brief July 4th holiday.

DPS Director Colonel Joe Milner reminded motorists that the traffic volume increases during holidays, raising chances for fatal collisions.

"Even though July 4th falls on Wednesday this year, we believe additional patrol hours are necessary,

This year's producer, Donnie Gay, will bring some of the county's finest rodeo stock which will assure that some of the Professional Rodeo's best cowboys and cowgirls will be here to compete. The 1990 rodeo will offer bareback bronc riding; single steer roping; calf roping; steer wrestling; saddle bronc riding; barrel racing; and bull riding. In addition to these standard events, there will be the "Kid's Goat Scramble" open to all children under the age of 12 and definitely worth the price of admission.

Throughout this year's performances, the crowd will be entertained by the acts and antics of Quail Dobbs, David Burnam and J.W. Glover who will serve as Rodeo clowns and bullfighters.

As usual, this rodeo will be taking place in one of the Southwest's finest outdoor facilities. Recent improvements include a new sound system, improved lighting and a special wheelchair section for the handicapped. As always, the performances will take place in the dust-free arena and FREE parking is available for everyone.

"Milner said. "All available Troopers will be on duty, closely watching for the most life-threatening violations... DWI and speeding over-the-limit."

Milner said that the DPS 30-hour fatality counting period will start at 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 3, and continue until midnight on July 4th.

Last Year, the Independence Day driving period ran 102 hours. Thirty-four traffic fatalities were reported during the extended counting time, far below the DPS estimate of 52.

"We're hoping for the same result this July 4th," Milner added. "And we're relying on the motorists who respect Texas officers and traffic laws to help us meet the challenge."

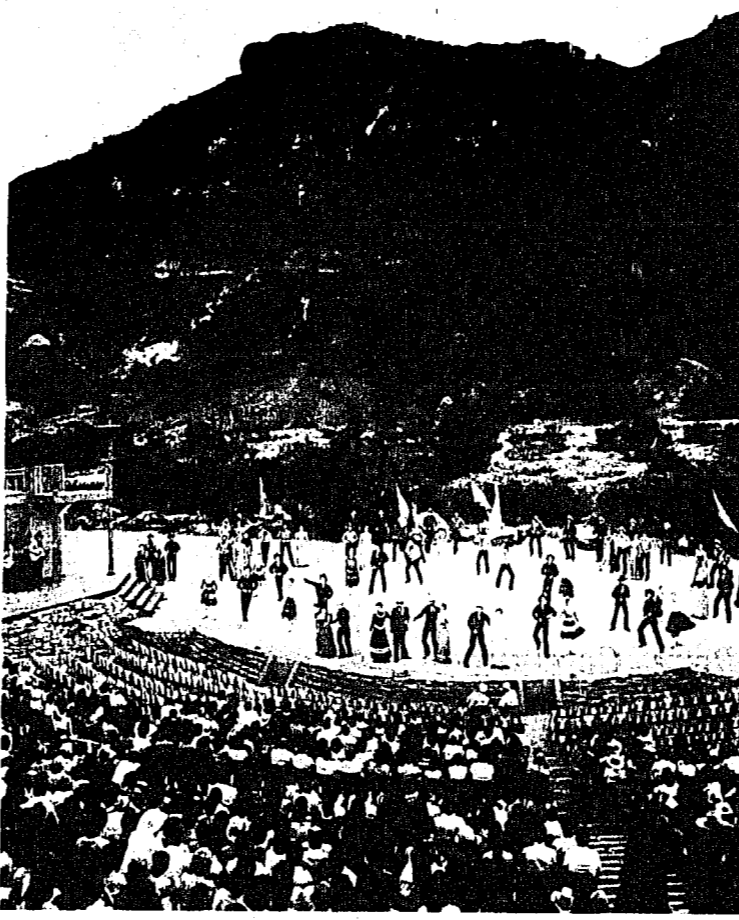

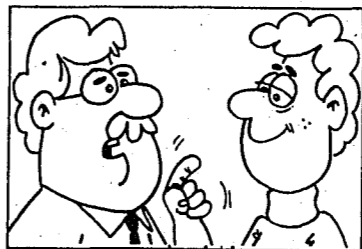

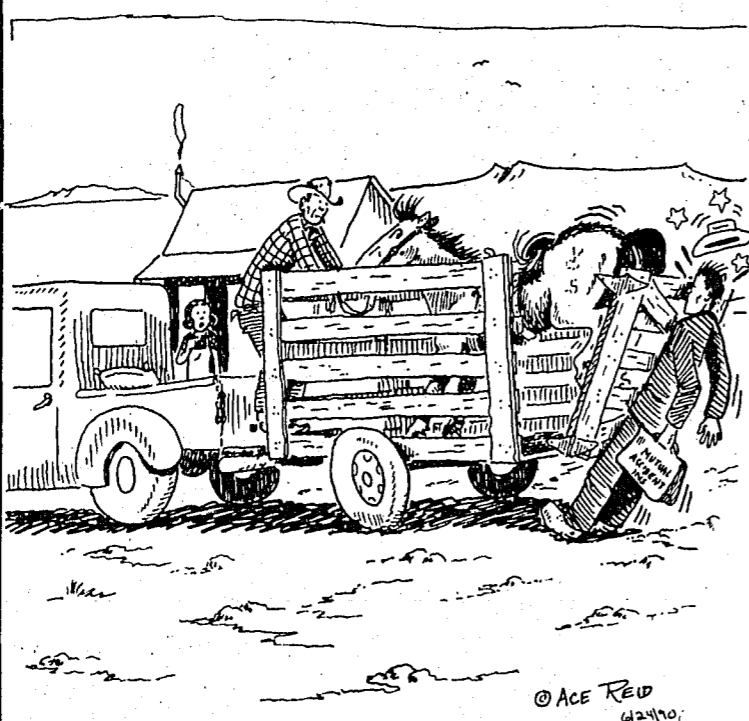

Along about this time of the year many of us get the wanderlust. Don't know if it's in search of a cooler spot, or just the fact that its summertime and it seems a good time to get out and do something different for a change of pace.

For those who may not want to make more than a day or two trip, here are some suggestions that have come across our desk in the past week or so.

The Winters Centennial Celebration has begun and runs through Saturday, 30th. The pageant with performances Wed. through Sat., is a 90-minute theatrical production of historical highlights of the Winters area, and begins at dusk each evening. A cast of 200 local citizens will be attired in colorful costumes and accompanied by professional sound and lighting. The pageant will take place at the Blizard football stadium. General admission is \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children with reserve seats available at \$6.00. Special pre-show entertainment will begin at 8:30 p.m. There will also be an antique tractor show Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

We have already missed the first weekend of the famed Fort Griffin Fandangle at Albany with final performances this Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. The gates at the Prairie Theater, just northwest of the Albany city limits, open at 7:00 p.m. and visitors are welcome to come early and enjoy the calliope concert preceding the show. The outdoor musical will begin at dusk, approx. 8:30 p.m. Ticket prices range from \$3 to \$10 depending on seat location. Phone orders may be placed by calling 915/762-3642. Tickets may be purchased at the gate, but better check ahead to be sure of a seat.

The Fandangle Parade is scheduled for Thursday evening (June 28) at 6:00 and will include Fandangle performers, covered wagons, antique cars, floats depicting scenes from the show, and replicas of the Butterfield Overland stagecoach and the Texas Central train as well as the steam powered calliope.

Those attending the Fandangle may want to go early enough to visit the city of Albany and the many historical attractions it has to offer.

A barbecue meal is served on the courthouse square from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. prior to each performance. Catered by Joe Allen's Bar-B-Q of Abilene, tickets are \$6.50 for adults and \$4.00 for children.

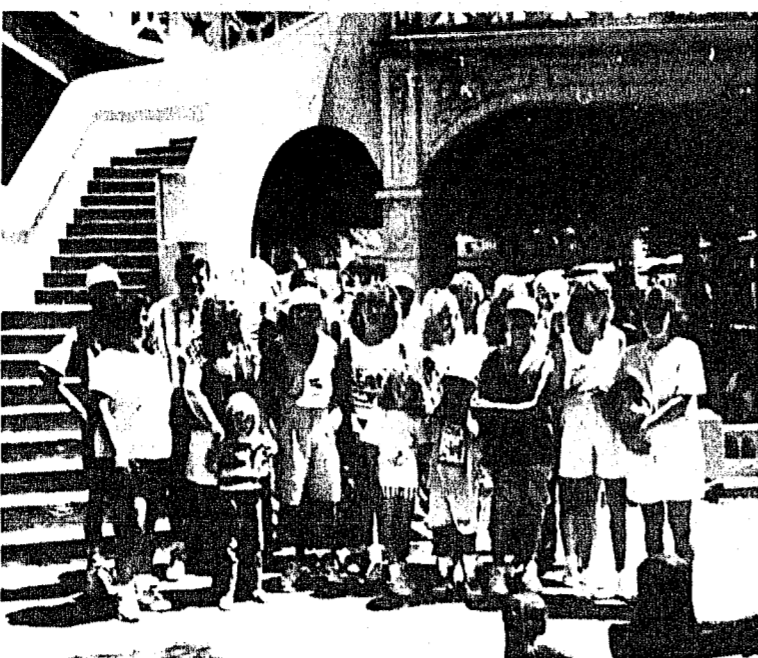

One Of Area's Greatest Assets

Editor's note: The following, written by Hugh Stemple of Coleman, appeared recently in The Chronicle-Democrat Voice and echoes what so many feel about CAP school.

Recently, I had the experience of my lifetime. An experience which will never be repeated. I was asked - honored - to be the keynote speaker for the graduation ceremonies of the First Graduating Class of Coleman Independent School District's CAP program. CAP - Cooperative Alternative Program, so everyone can know what we are dealing.

It is one event to speak to young people starting the second of many phases of their lives. But, it is something else to talk with young people who have accomplished what these young people have accomplished!

Graduation from high school to most of us was a very tender, tearful, exciting time of our young lives. To some of us "older" war horses, it was a time of excitement and dread as we were soon to enter the service and so off to the "wars". To those later, it was goodbye to our friends and off to school to new friends and experiences. And yet, to others, it was off to work and marriage to start our lives. And, of course, to our parents it was the sad realization that we were not "babies" any more. (Not that they were not going to try to keep treating us like small children the rest of our lives!) So it is with graduation - the thrills of accomplishment, the sadness of goodbyes and the empty place in the pits of our stomachs in anticipation of the unknown.

You see, WE - most all of us - hadn't found out WHO we were yet by graduation time!

My friends, this is not so in the CAP program. These students are young men and women who through no fault of their own struck out at too tender of an age to find out WHO

they were. As a result, they were totally unprepared for the answers. That world out there, they found, is a jungle. It gives no quarter to the weak and unprepared. Some, got married bringing children into this world whom they loved, but could not support. They had no skills for good employment. Some couldn't even read or write.

What did they do? They went back to school through our CAP program while they still had a chance. They learned to read and write. They learned to care for, to cook for, and to feed, their families, and they all learned a trade where they could become gainfully employed. The program also includes a mechanism where these students may be identified before they make the mistake of dropping out. While this started out in the CISD, it has expanded to include six additional schools - Novice, Santa Anna, Panther Creek, Bangs, Ballinger and Winters, making a total of seven. The funding is from each district, the State of Texas - and Federal Government through the PIC (Private Industry Council) out of COG, Abilene. To my knowledge it is a pilot program or the first in the state.

I would like to add another ingredient which makes this program successful. This is the love of all the educators involved, from the Official Board of CAP, led by Mr. McSwain, and his entire staff. Without their dedication and love, it would not work.

As I watched the people-parents and families who attended, I was moved. The love and tears that were in their eyes as their child was called out to be presented a diploma was so very tender that it brought tears to my eyes.

I felt that here we have saved many lives and inspired them to make something of themselves. The great part of it all was that they DID IT ON THEIR OWN. They were better off than all of the others. They had crossed over that first big hurdle - their first big failure in life - turning it into a success.



Community Service—A Well-Established Tradition

Community service has been part of our national life since the days of the first colonists, when goods and help were frequently exchanged as a way of pooling resources for the common good. Barn raisings were a famous form of community activity among settlers of the American west.

Beginning in the early 1920's, The Salvation Army Service Unit has followed and expanded this tradition, with local men and women ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of those who live where no full-time Salvation Army post is established.

Knowledgeable volunteers are the flexible backbone of the services provided. Appropriate assistance is available quickly, in the absence of cumbersome "red tape." Services are entirely supported by financial contributions made at the local level.

Service Unit volunteers typically offer emergency disaster assistance, welfare and health care, referrals, education and recreation opportunities, and spiritual encouragement. If a needy family or individual requires a wheelchair, hearing aid, glasses, counseling, auto repair, or clothing and shelter, The Salvation Army's local Service Unit is standing by.


Training is at annual seminars or by field representatives. Programs are publicized in the local press and media, by ministerial associations, schools, and county agencies.

There are now more than 6,700 Service Extension Units in the United States, with more than 31,000 participating volunteers. Although the local Corps Community Center is the Army's key means of evangelism and service, many communities are not large enough to support one. The Service Extension Unit—or "invisible battalion"—is the well-established alternative.

Veterans Given First Chance To Bid On Forfeited Land

AUSTIN: Detailed information of 283 tracts of forfeited state land included in an August high bid sale is now available through the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB).

Located in 110 Texas counties, these tracts are being offered exclusively to eligible Texas veterans and can be purchased with no down payment.

The VLB will finance the entire loan amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans

are limited to one land purchase in the sale.

"I want to encourage all eligible Texas veterans who have been looking for quality land to take advantage of this sale," said Jack Giberson, Executive Secretary of the VLB. "Since these tracts have never been offered for sale by the Board, this sale gives Texas veterans an excellent opportunity to buy good land with 100 percent financing."

Giberson noted that these tracts of land are being offered exclusively to Texas veterans because the VLB has

always given Texas veterans the first chance to buy forfeited tracts.

If any of the tracts do not sell in the August sale, they will be offered for sale to the general public through real estate agents.

Eligible Texas veterans will receive an 8.75 percent interest rate with a 30 year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable bid fee for each bid submitted is required.

The sale will be by sealed bid only, with the minimum bid set by the Texas Veterans Land Board. All bids must be received by August 21 at 1 p.m. Any and all bids received after that time will be rejected.

Bidders need not be present at the bid opening.

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ON YOUR FEET

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SOFT CORNS

Corns between the toes are often referred to as soft corns (or heloma molle). Actually, they are no different from any other corn except for the fact that there is more perspiration between the toes than elsewhere and this perspiration acts to soften the corns.

Very often they're misdiagnosed by patients as athlete's foot, especially when they happen way down in the web of the toes. The difference is that there is no itching and scaling as with athlete's foot, only a painful bump of tissue. However, this can sometimes become infected and cause additional problems.

DON'T use corn drops, and

NEVER try to cut a corn between the toes with a razor blade. A pad, and wide-comfortable shoes can relieve the discomfort. However, for immediate treatment of painful corns, removal by your podiatrist is recommended.

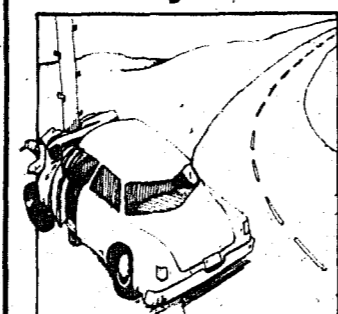

- 2½ cups milk
- Grated peel of 1 Sunkist orange
- 1½ cups fresh squeezed orange juice
- 1 cup mashed papaya, bananas, kiwis, or strawberries*
- 1 cup sugar

In bowl combine all ingredients; stir until sugar dissolves. Pour into ice cream freezer container. Following manufacturer's directions freeze in electric or hand-cranked ice cream freezer.
