The regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees was held Thursday, May 10, with members Danny Kellar, Ruth Ann Wise, Danny Cook, Marty Donham, Roy Joe Harvey and newly elected member Roddy Dean who was sworn into office by Judy Hartman, Notary Public.

Also present for the meeting were Supt. Gerald Brister, Business Manager, Judy Hartman, Principals Frank Gray and Jack Burns, and Teachers, Dean Bass, Janet Neff, Sharon Cheaney and Sandra Guthrie.

The election of board officers was as follows: Ruth Ann Wise was elected as secretary; Roy Joe Harvey, vice-president; Roddy Dean, president who assumed duties for the remaining of the meeting.

Accounts payable were reviewed and approved for payment.

A unanimous vote approved media services from Region IV Education Service Center for 1990-91. The board selected Gerald Brister to serve on the Region IV Advisory Committee.

### Clarinda Menges Day Saturday At Ranger Park Inn; Will Mark Her 102nd Birthday

Saturday has been declared Clarinda Menges Day at Ranger Park Inn. Mrs. Menges will be observing her 102nd birthday and well-wishers are encouraged to come by throughout the day for a visit with the honoree.

Clarinda Taylor was born near Harper, Texas, May 26, 1888 to James and Samantha Taylor. There were twelve children in the family and Mrs. Menges is the only one still living. Although born blind, she began to see at about the age of six. She remembers having a good childhood. When she started to school, her brothers took her on a horse.

Clarinda became Mrs. Edmund Menges, March 7, 1907. She remembers there were about two hundred people gathered for the wedding ceremony which took place at the Taylor home near Harper. Edmund passed away in 1970. The couple raised two sons, Charlie who was adopted, and Earl. Both are now deceased. Charlie, known in Santa Anna as "Dude" Menges, died in 1982.

Mrs. Menges, still very alert, and spry enough to maneuver her wheelchair around the Inn, has been a resident there since 1985.

### Mountainside Viewpoint

(Editor's note: The following is taken from an editorial appearing in the May 18 edition of Texas Methodist Reporter. It so closely reflected my feelings recently while trying to tune into something worth watching on TV that I felt it worth passing along to our readers).

Take a bow, Nora Dunn!

As a regular cast member of TV's "Saturday Night Live" comedy show, Mrs. Dunn deserves applause for a recent off-stage performance.

She publicly refused to perform on a recent broadcast in protest of the gutter-level act of the show's guest host for that week.

Ms. Dunn labeled the act by "comedian," Andrew Dice Clay, as degrading, repulsive, and hateful.

"Time" magazine's May 7 cover supports Ms. Dunn's assessment. Titled "Dirty Words: America's Foul-mouthed Pop Culture," it described Mr. Clay's humor as "designed to singe a churchgoer's soul and to turn a feminist's stomach."

In addition, the article shows what Ms. Dunn as an entertainer surely knows: Mr. Clay is not alone.

From rock music to movies, radio and MTV (a cable television music video channel), his brand of unbridled raunch is widespread and growing in popularity, particularly among young people.

We consider Ms. Dunn's personal protest both a fitting and courageous response to such degenerate forms of entertainment.

And her action challenges us all to ponder the moral and spiritual implications of the language we hear from the entertainment world, and perhaps also in our places of work.

Contrary to a familiar adage, words are neither cheap nor hollow—that is, without real effects. As a gift of God, our human capacity to express ourselves via words and images is a powerful shaper of day-to-day reality.

It should be readily apparent that the reality being promoted by the epidemic of vulgarity—loose perverted sex, racial and ethnic prejudice, glorification of violence, etc.—is poisonous at odds with our Creator's intention for human life.

The reality-shaping capacity of the words that confront us—and assault us—is inseparable from our concern for wholeness. All of life is interrelated. Each part touches and/or influences all others.

Thus regarded, media entertainment that drips with debased language and images of human life does far more than influence attitudes and conduct about, say, sex and violence.

Such entertainment pollutes our entire moral, spiritual and cultural climate. As it infects the outlook of young people, it has a debilitating

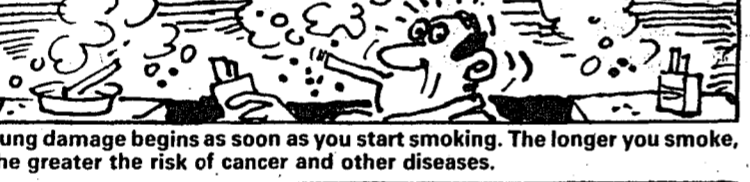

### Balanced Diet

Q. How can I guarantee that my 11-month old daughter gets a balanced diet?

A. Variety in food selection is important for a balanced diet. Feeding baby a wide selection of baby food helps to establish good eating habits and insures adequate nutrition. Children with strong food preferences should be encouraged to eat foods from all food groups. For example, if your child refuses to drink milk, offer cottage cheese or yogurt. Food group substitutes will provide adequate nourishment.

Your child's weight and activity level affects the amount of food she eats. Snacks are an important part of children's daily meals. Small meals and nutritious snacks should be offered during the day since children's stomach capacity is small and their calorie requirements are high.

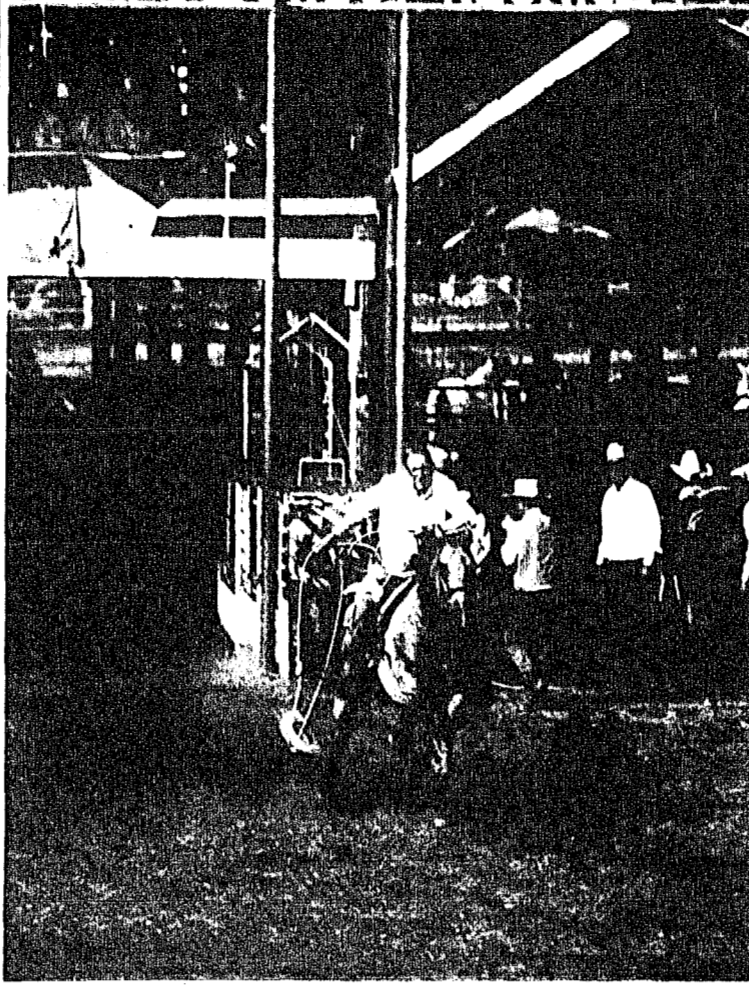
