Council Candidates State Priorities

School Board Candidates Next Week

Absentee voting began in the ISD and City elections Monday, April 16 and will continue through Tuesday, May 1 at the respective offices of the two entities. As of Monday there had been seven absentee ballots cast in the City election and three in the school board election. Both elections will be held Saturday, May 5.

As is our custom, the Santa Anna News has invited the candidates to make a statement for a

published forum here in the newspaper.

This week we are focusing on candidates for city council. Three places on the council will be filled, those now held by Susie Voss, Alex DeLeon and Thomas Hays. Hays was appointed to an unexpired term last fall and has chosen to seek election to the spot. Susie Voss is

not seeking another term but Alex DeLeon has filed for re-election. The top three vote getters will be elected for two-year terms to the council.

We regret that no statement or picture was received from incumbent councilman Alex DeLeon.

Also a candidate is Mayor Gale Allen Brock, although she is

running unopposed.

The Santa Anna News recently contacted candidates seeking city spots in the May 5 election and asked for a statement concerning their candidacy. We asked all the candidates to state their name and occupation and tell us something about their education and about their families. We also asked the following questions of each: (1)

Why are you a candidate for this office. (2) If elected, what in particular would you like to see accomplished. (3) What do you see as the greatest need or concern for the City at this time, and how do you propose it be solved.

The following are their responses to our inquiries. Except for those statements that might be construed as outright asking for your votes, which by law must be paid advertising, we have not edited the content of the statements.



Gale Allen Brock
(Unopposed Candidate For Mayor)

Gale Allen Brock has served as Mayor of Santa Anna since appointed to that position at the resignation last summer of former Mayor Thelma Brooker. Mrs. Brock had just won a seat on the City Council before the mayoral change took place.

Mrs. Brock is a retired insurance broker and teacher. She is married to Byron Brock and has one son, Sam Allen, who with his wife Joy and two children, make their home in San Angelo. She is unopposed in the upcoming election.

Mrs. Brock states she feels an important issue facing the city is abandoned property. She suggests a way to deal with the problem would be to render the property tax producing through a tax sale procedure, thereby selling the property to responsible people willing to upgrade it and subsequently pay city tax as assessed.

Mrs. Brock would also like for long range goals to include upgrading of city streets, reworking existing streets and curbing, and possibly the paving of unpaved areas.



Karen Morris

Karen Morris is married to James Morris, former Santa Anna policeman, now employed with the Coleman PD. They are the parents of Shamey 13 and Devin, 11. Their niece, Deanne Simmons, also resides with the couple. All three are students in the Santa Anna schools.

Mrs. Morris is Executive Director for the Bangs Housing Authority. She is a graduate of Joshua, Texas High School. She adds that although she had no higher formal education, her current position as Executive Director of the Bangs Housing Authority has given her valuable experience in management

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Norman Asher

Norman Early Asher is a contract laborer. He and his wife are the parents of four children.

He states he has an eleventh grade education. His states his qualifications are that he is a heavy equipment operator.

He is a candidate to "try to help the town of Santa Anna where I live."

The particular goal he would like to see accomplished is for "the city streets to be fix's."

Asher sees the greatest need of the city at this time as, "getting the streets fix's by getting a government grant if the City can't afford to do it." And he concludes, "I believe I can get it done."



Emmitt Simmons

City Council candidate Emmitt Simmons is an 21-year employee of the 3M Co. in Brownwood. He and his wife, Margaret, are the parents of Shane, a SAHS graduate and Chanda a student in Santa Anna Junior High.

He is a high school graduate, a Vietnam veteran, and was a record clerk in the U.S. Army. He is a computer operator at 3M and is a 3M Club representative. He is a member of First United Methodist Church.

He is a candidate because he "wants to get involved in the problems of our town and help solve them." He goes on to say that "I will be your City Councilman every day, not just once a month at meeting time."

In particular, he would like to see more street repair and a general clean-up of the town.

As to the greatest need and how to solve it, his statement is, "In my opinion, one of the greatest needs of our community at the present time is pride and togetherness. I would like to see more people take pride in our town, help on some

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J.T. Avants

City Council candidate J.T. Avants is manager of the Santa Anna Co-op Gin and a farmer. He and his wife, Lois, are the parents of two sons. They are also the proud grandparents of five and brag of two great-grandchildren.

He is a high school graduate and has been with the gin for 30 years in all. He has previously served two years as a city councilman.

As for qualifications, Avants states he feels that as long as he has lived here, people know him and know that he will work with the City officials and citizens to help clean up the town and to make Santa Anna a better place to live.

The particular things he would like to see accomplished are improvement on the waste water treatment plant and the upgrading of streets.

On the question of what seems to be the greatest need or concern for the City at this time, he stated, "The improvement on the waste water treatment plant; applying for grants and loans. It will take all the citizens working together with the City officials. It can be accomplished with a lot of hard work by all."

"I would be a councilman with experience and for progress."



Mark Turney

Mark Turney is an electronic technician, owner and operator of Turney Electronics. He and his wife, Marsha, are the parents of a preschool-age son, Jon. Turney's parents are Rex and Tincy Turney.

Turney is a 1976 graduate of Santa Anna High School and is an Eagle Scout. He states he has 9 years experience with heavy equipment in the oil patch. He graduated TSTI in 1987, with a 3.9 grade point average.

He is a candidate because, "I wish to represent all the citizens of Santa Anna." If elected, the particular thing he would like to see accom-



Joe Baker

Joe Baker is a truck driver and self employed. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M.D. Baker. He states, "I received a G.E.D. in Waxahatchee, Tx. I have previous experience in working for the cities of Santa Anna and Galana Park, Texas. My experience consists of sanitation and maintenance. In the mid-80's I held the position of regional maintenance supervisor for a major business."

Baker states he is a candidate for a city council seat because, "I have worked with and for the public most of my life. I believe that as a member of the city council, I could serve the public effectively and actively."

"If I am elected I would like to accomplish the following goals: I would like to see more active business established within the city. I would like to see city business licenses established. These goals are a beginning in establishing more income for the city. I also believe that we could plan the city budget to be more effective in repairs to roads, sewer and water system."

"I believe the greatest concern for the City of Santa Anna at this time is to do some budget trimming, and to attempt to stay within the budget. I also believe we should be preparing for compliance with the new federal EPA laws concerning the city dump grounds."

He feels that the greatest need or concern for the City at this times is "to see that the City uses equal opportunity employment policy." He adds that his proposal for accomplishing that goal is to review all City employees and their job positions.

All interested citizens are encouraged to attend. There will be a public rally on Tuesday evening beginning at 6:30 at the Lions Club building for City Council candidates. The candidates will be introduced and give a short speech. All interested citizens are encouraged to be present to visit the candidates and ask questions on their views concerning city government and issues the City faces at this time.

Thomas M. Hays

Council Candidate Thomas M. Hays is in the ranching business and is a retired from the U.S. Navy.

He and his wife, Ruby, are the parents of five and have 9 grandchildren.

Hays attended Buffalo School and graduated Santa Anna High School. He is also attended U.T. at Arlington, Hardin Simmons University, University of Texas, University of Houston, Georgia Tech. and received two years of Navy flight training. He reached the equivalent of manager or CEO of a major air lines, while serving in the Navy. He was a member of Naval Intelligence while serving the U.S. Navy for 31 years before retirement.

He states he is a candidate because of the needs of the City.

In particular, he "would like to see the town cleaned up - old buildings, old vehicles, and trash." He says to look at towns around the U.S. and then ask yourself the question, "If I were a stranger, would I want to settle here?"

Hays sees as the greatest need or concern is "for the citizens themselves to be concerned and try helping themselves." He goes on to add, "Just complaining about the situation is not enough. Each person needs to make suggestions to help and needs to be willing to help. Just simply complaining about the situation won't help. No additional revenue other than grants can be expected. There may be a possibility of obtaining a street repair grant."

"At the present time, apathy is our greatest problem."

Follow-up On Easter Sunrise Service

Easter 1990, as a particular day, has come and gone. Resurrection Day, almost 2000 years ago, has come and gone. The POWER of the resurrection has come, is coming, and will continue to come. The Bible declares, "This same power that raised Jesus from the dead is ALIVE and at work NOW in you who believe." And that is indeed GLAD news.

I was privileged to preach at the Easter sunrise service at the lighted cross at the east end of the mountain. In that message, I told of the GLAD news and the SAD news around Easter time. The resurrection and all its power and glory is GLAD news for all who hear and believe. The SAD news is that during this Easter season, Ryan White died, a victim of the dreaded AIDS disease. A victim, not a patient, because he contracted the disease through contaminated blood received during a necessary transfusion. He did not get AIDS through deviate and sinful sexual behavior as the majority do.

Most people who had heard the report of Ryan's death had talked about it at work, at home, at school, over coffee, etc.

Then I mentioned it was GLAD news indeed that in the same week that Ryan died, a cure for AIDS had been announced. Those who heard the news of that announcement had talked about it at work, at school, at home, over coffee, etc. It was mentioned that a medical researcher had discovered this cure some three years ago and had applied it to himself, an AIDS carrier, and had been cured.

The question was raised, "How do you feel about the researcher who kept such tremendously good GLAD news to himself for three years?" "Was he cruel and inhuman to do so?" "Was he selfish in keeping such GLAD news to himself?"

The TRUTH was then expounded that Ryan had in fact died, but no, there was NO CURE FOR THE DREADED DISEASE. The story had merely been fabricated to make a point.

The cure for the world's everlasting fatal sin is none other than the resurrection of JESUS CHRIST, our living Lord.

Library Notes

Check It Out

April 22-28 is National Library Week. With that in mind, we will take a look at the history of libraries. Thousands of these tablets are still around, but we don't know what some of them mean.

About 3000 B.C. ancient man first started libraries with clay tablets. Thousands of these tablets are still around, but we don't know what some of them mean. About 2500 B.C. to A.D. 300 the Egyptians were the first to use papyrus. Their libraries held thousands of scrolls made from the papyrus plant.

For many centuries man wrote on animal skins. Later, people wrote on parchment, or specially treated layers of thin animal skins. The first books were made when several pieces of parchment were sewn together.

The Chinese did a lot for libraries by inventing paper about A.D. 105. The art of papermaking spread to Europe hundreds of years later, sometime in the 1100s.

From about A.D. 476 to 1400, called the Middle Ages, books were copied and kept by monks in monasteries. Hand copying took skill and lots of time. In the mid 1400s came the invention of the printing press by German Johannes Gutenberg. This was a great milestone in the development of libraries. There now would be movable type that could be used over and over.

What has been called the golden years of the library took place during the 200 years between 1600 and 1800. This was a time period when the number of private and public libraries grew tremendously.

The first library was started in the U.S. in 1638 when John Harvard gave a gift of 400 books to a University. Harvard University was later named for John H. Harvard, a clergyman.

Benjamin Franklin founded the Library Company of Philadelphia in 1731. Members had to pay dues but could borrow books for free. It was the first successful library in the U.S. Many important men of that time built up vast personal libraries. In 1833, one of the first public libraries was founded in Peterborough, N.H. It was supported by taxes, and the idea soon spread to other cities.

Melvil Dewey invented the Dewey Decimal System, in 1876, which made the keeping up with books much simpler. He also helped start the American Library Association.

Today the number of libraries and the services they offer have greatly increased from those first attempts. Many public libraries have become media centers, offering the use of computers, microfilm readers, etc. They allow for unlimited research on any given subject. And they are their for the using by all citizens.

School Board At Odds Over Proposed Calendar

The school board split their vote right down the middle on the proposed calendar for next school year; this at the recent meeting of the group. They left the discussion after the vote, and the matter will presumably be brought up again at a later time. The recommended calendar included holidays on ten Fridays and the Monday following Easter. Vote on the motion was three for (Danny Cook, Marty Donham and Eddie Jones) and three against (Ruth Wise, Billy Joe Harvey and Terry McIver). According to one school official, one or more of those against the proposed calendar seemed to be more in favor of five Fridays off and a week of spring break. The Fridays off are put into the calendar to accommodate the large number of students involved in U.I.L. academic and athletic events during the spring. The purpose of the Fridays off are to help teachers and students work around the limit of absences from the classroom placed on them by

Charlotte Flynn; and the group, Citizens Against Pesticide Misuse. The awards are to recognize Texans who have worked effectively on consumer issues during the past year. There were elected by a committee of consumer group representatives for their ability to effectively articulate, advocate and implement consumer concerns.

PUMP BUMP

If you have a bump on the back of your heel, it is most likely something you were born with. In other cases, it develops as the result of pressure or friction. It is called a "pump bump" or Haglund's deformity. Usually, it will not bother you unless your shoes continue to rub against it. The bump becomes irritated and may even develop a bursal sac — a cushion filled with liquid. After that, the bursal sac can get inflamed. Avoid such complications by visiting your podiatrist when if the pump bump first becomes irritated. Depending on the underlying source of the friction, your podiatrist can help relieve it. In some cases, certain shoes should simply not be worn. In other instances, where the foot is at fault, a properly designed orthotic device with a high padded back can do the trick.

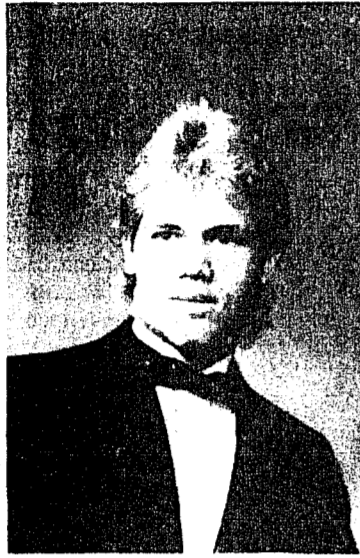

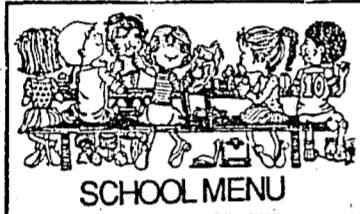

ANNUAL MEETING BYLAWS EXCERPTS

For our membership's information, the following are excerpts from the Coleman County Electric Cooperative bylaws pertaining to the Meeting of Members and Election of Directors.

ARTICLE II

SECTION 1. ANNUAL MEETING The annual meeting of members shall be held at such time, during the month of July as the Board of Directors may direct and such meeting shall be held at such place in the Cooperative service area, as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports covering the previous fiscal year and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as conveniently may be. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution of the cooperative.

SECTION 2. SPECIAL MEETINGS Special meetings of the members may be called by the President, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority thereof or upon a written request signed by at least 10 percent of all members and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Secretary to cause notice of such meeting to be given as hereinafter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within the County of Coleman in the State of Texas specified in the notice of the special meeting, or elsewhere within the area served by the cooperative as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3. NOTICE OF MEMBERS' MEETING Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than 10 days nor more than 20 days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or by the persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than 10 days nor more than 14 days before the date of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate an action which may be taken by the members of any such meeting.

SECTION 4. QUORUM As long as the total number of members does not exceed one 1,000 at least 15 percent of the total number present in person shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. In case the total number of members shall exceed 1,000 then at least 150 of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

SECTION 5. VOTING Each member shall be entitled to one vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. At all meetings of the members at which a quorum is present all questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by mail, except as otherwise provided by law, the articles of incorporation of the cooperative, or these bylaws. If a husband and wife hold a joint membership they shall jointly be entitled to one vote and no more upon each matter to vote at a meeting of the members.

SECTION 6. VOTING BY MAIL In addition to the method of voting for directors of the Cooperative as provided by the existing bylaws and by a member being present and voting in person, each member shall be and is hereby permitted to vote by mail for directors of this association. At the time notices of member's meetings are given as provided by Article II of these bylaws, and with a notice of member's annual meeting, or any postponement thereof, there shall be sent to each member either personally or by mail a ballot which shall contain the names of all members who have been nominated as candidates for directors with a statement of the number to be elected and with appropriate instructions to the member to vote for such members; Each member shall be instructed after voting for the required number to sign said ballot and return the ballot to the cooperative at its office prior to the date of said meeting. Said ballots when so received shall be retained and placed in a locked ballot box until the date of the members' meeting at which time shall be delivered to the inspectors of Election and counted together with the votes cast in person at such member's meeting.

SECTION 7. ORDER OF BUSINESS The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows:

1. Report the existence of a quorum.
2. Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the due publication of mailing thereof, or the waiver of waivers of notice of the meeting, as the case may be.
3. Reading of unapproved minutes of previous meetings of the members and the taking of necessary action thereon.
4. Presentation and consideration of, and acting upon, reports of officers, directors and committees.
5. Election of directors.
6. Unfinished business.
7. New business.
8. Adjournments.

ARTICLE III

Directors

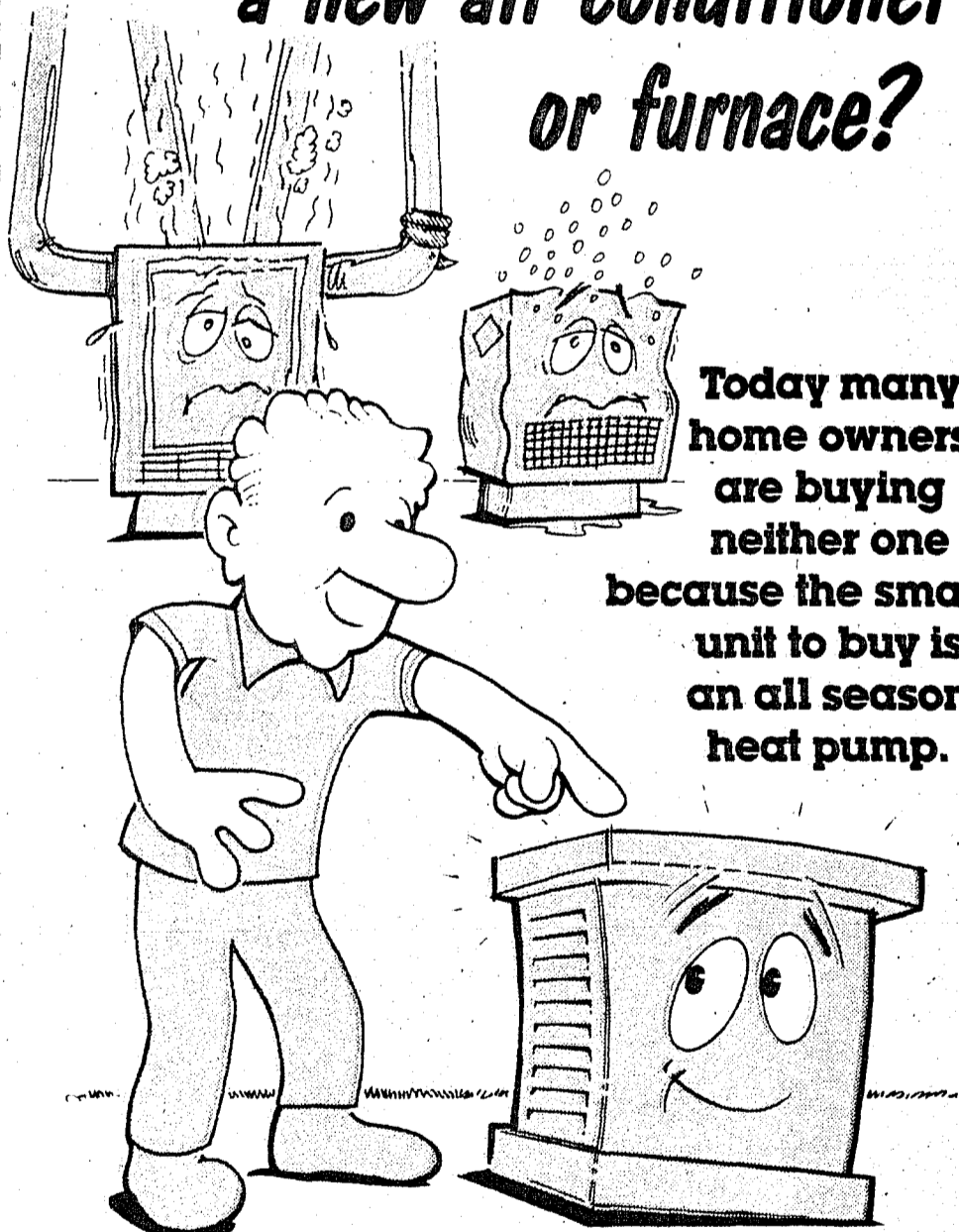
SECTION 1. GENERAL POWERS The business and affairs of the cooperative shall be managed by a board of nine directors which shall exercise all of the powers of the cooperative except such as are by law or by the articles of incorporation of the cooperative or by these bylaws conferred upon or reserved to the members.

SECTION 2. QUALIFICATIONS AND TENURE At the Annual Meeting of the Members in 1960, three directors shall be elected by and from the members to serve for a period of three years from the date of their election, or until their successors shall have been elected and shall have qualified. Thereafter at each Annual Meeting of the Members of the Cooperative, three directors shall be elected by and from the members to serve for a period of three years from the date of their election, or until their successors shall have been elected and shall have qualified, subject to the provisions of these bylaws with respect to the removal of directors. No member shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold any position of trust in the cooperative who is not a bona fide resident in the area served by the cooperative, or who is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the cooperative, and no person shall take or hold office as a director who is the incumbent or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid. When a membership is held jointly by a husband and wife, either one, but not both, may be elected a director, provided, however, that neither one shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold a position of trust in the cooperative unless both shall meet the qualification hereinabove set forth. Nothing in this section contained shall, or shall be construed to, affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2-A. RESIDENCE OF DIRECTORS Not more than one director may be elected from the same Detail Area of the territory served by Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Incorporated, as such territory and Detail Area are defined and shown on the current map of the cooperative as established by the Board of Directors; such detail areas being drawn off by red pencil if, after his or her election a director of the cooperative shall, for the purpose of residing therein, move into a Detail Area wherein one other director of said Cooperative is then residing, the office of the director so moving into such Detail Area shall automatically become vacant without further action on the part of the cooperative or its Board of Directors; and such Board of Directors shall at its first regular, or special meeting thereafter name and appoint a qualified member of the Cooperative as director to fill the unexpired term of the director so disqualifying himself or herself.

SECTION 3. NOMINATIONS It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than 30 days nor more than 120 days before the date of a meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a committee on nominations consisting of not less than five nor more than 11 members who shall be selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee to the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. No officer or member of the Board of Directors shall be appointed a member of such committee. The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least 20 days before the meeting, a list of nominations for directors; but any 15 days prior to the meeting and the Secretary shall post the same at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail with the notice of the meeting a statement of the number of directors to be elected and showing separately the nominations made by the committee on nominations and the nominations made by petition, if any. The members may, at any meeting at which a director or directors shall be removed, as hereinbefore provided, elect a successor or successors thereto without compliance with the foregoing provisions with respect to nominations. Notwithstanding anything in this section contained, failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any election of directors.

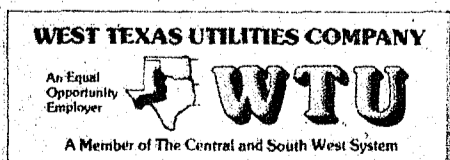
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
