The Chinese did a lot for librarics by inventing paper about A.D. 105.
The art of papermaking spreal Europe hundreds of ycars later, sometime in the 1100s.
From about A.D. 476 to 1400 , called the Middle Ages, books were copied and kept by monks in
monasterics. Hand copying took skill and lots of time. In the mid 1400s came the invention of the
printing press by German Johannes printing press by German Johannes
Gutenberg. This was a great milestone in the development of li-
brarics. There now would be movable type that could be used over and over.
What has been called the golden ycars of the library took place dur
ing the 200 years between 1600 and 1800. This was a time period when he number of private and
