

Even before the courts granted the legislature more time to solve the funding woes for our Texas schools, the local school board and administrators had agreed to keep Santa Anna schools operating thru

Stating, "we are in the business of providing an education for our children," the Santa Anna school board in their last meeting resolved to keep the doors open at the local schools through May by using reserve funds if necessary. 

The last couple of weeks I have had te opportunity to read and study books about the famous 36th Division. Thomas and Idella Wristen and Billy Joe HArvey trusted me with these collectors books. The National Hurad Yearbook of 1940 is full of pictures and history of the unit from World War I. The Texas Army A History of the 36th Dicision in the Italian Campaign by Robert L. Wagner is a detailed account from World War II. The division went into the North Africa fighting, then into Italy. There is controversy about the Rapido River Crossing. This author gives a good study of the battle. T-Patch to Victory. The 36th Division France-Germany-Austria Col. Vincent M Lockhart provides personal stories of some men in these battles, including 8 who were awarded the Medal of Honor. These heroes made great sacrifices that the Eruopean people could be free-that

Investigation has failed to turn up recognition by this community for its veterans-of any war. There did exist, for many years, an orginzation of the Daughters of the Confederacy. Records no longer exist of these men. You will find many resting in our cemetery. There are also Texas Rangers, Worlld War I, Spanish American War, Korean War and Vietnam War Veterans.







PUMP BUMP

Podiatrist

If you have a bump on the back of your heel, it is most likely something you were born with. In other cases, it develops as the result of pressure or friction. It is called a "pump bump" or Haglund's deformity.

Usually, it will not bother you unless your shooes continue to rub against it. The bump becomes irritated and may even develop a bursal sac — a cushion filled with liquid. After that, the bursal sac can get inflamed.

Avoid such complications by visiting your podiatrist when if the pump bump first becomes irritated. De-

podiatrist can help relieve it. In some cases, certain shoes should simply not be worn. In other instances. where the foot is at fault, a properly designed orthotic device with a high padded back can do the trick.

He says he has "not enough education to keep from making mistakes, but enough education and experience to learn from the mistakes.

He states he is a candidate because the past school board election reflected the voters' displeasure of the way the school was being managed. I have spent the past year talking to parents in an attempt to determine the greatest problem. You have told me that you feel communication was completely lost between the parents, the school board, and the administration, and that you want your school trustees to take more active part in running the school. I am a candidate to offer my best: enough education to learn from past mistakes."

"In order to improve conditions, I would like to see the administration and the board invite representatives from the teachers' association. ATPE, to be present at board meetings to serve in an advisory capacity. The closer the trustees can get to the classroom environment, the more sound the decisions can be made which affect the quality of education."

He adds, "Teachers are faced with two surmounting problems. (1) An increasing number of students in whose home English is not spoken. (2) An increasing number of students in whose home self esteem is not a priority. These problems cause failure rates to rise and also challenge teachers as never before. Much about teaching is simply not enjoyable anymore. Teachers are having to become child psychologists, second parents, and above all--Super Motivators. Teachers can only maintain a learning environment under these conditions if they are motivated and encouraged by Super Motivators at the administrative and trustee level. Having the Teachers' Association present at board meetings would set the tone for support and encouragement, and bridge a communication gap. (The intent of this idea is not to surpass the normal chain of principal and administrator.)"

Harry S. Truman Birth Anniversary

May 8 marks the birthday of the 33rd president of the United States, Harry S. Truman. Nicknamed "Give 'em hell Harry" by admirers, Truman was born in 1884 in Lamar,

Truman began his political career as a county judge in 1922 and was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1935. He then served as vice president under Franklin D. Roosevelt and became president after Roosevelt's death in 1945. In 1948 he won re-election against his Republican opponent, Thomas Dewey. However, election-day predictions of a Dewey victory caused several newspapers to erroneously announce Truman's defeat.

While president, Truman established organizations such as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). But he probably was best known for his authorization to deploy atomic bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Japan, which precipitated the end of World War II. Truman died on Dec. 26, 1972, in Kansas City, Mo. lil

The Man Who Named America

Although America was discovered by the envoy of a Spanish queen, it was named by a German cartographer for an Italian explorer. In honor of that lesser-known mapmaker, called the "godfather of America," April 25th has been designated Martin Waldseemuller Remembrance Day.

Waldseemuller believed that Italian navigator and merchant Amerigo Vespucci had discovered the new continent. In a 1507 book entitled "Cosmographiae Introductio," he wrote: "Inasmuch as both Europe and Asia received their names from women, I see no reason why any one should justly object to calling this part Amergie, i.e., the land of Amerigo, or America, after Amerigo, its discoverer, a man of great ability." He honored Vespucci by placing his name on the world map published in 1507, and
