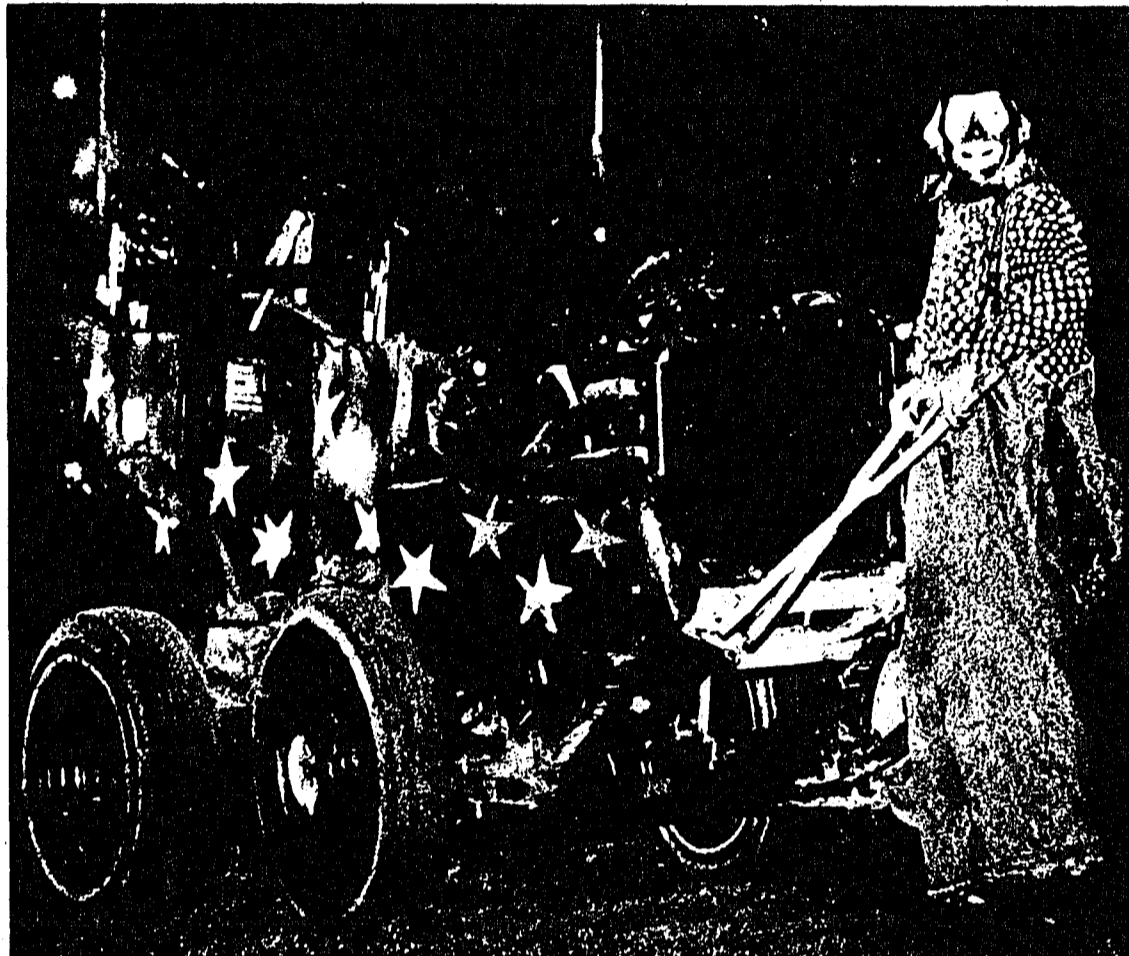


ROBERT DUUS

The dance band will be Lee Vick and "Rosewood" from Weatherford.

Dobbs is one of the most popular professionals to ever appear at the Coleman Rodeo. He will be featuring his famous car, his trained dogs and mule and his big smile. Quail like people and people like him. Other clowns will be David Burnham and J.W. Glover. Background music will be furnished by Cody Dove and the rodeo announcer will be Zoop Dove.

Michelle Eddington of Coleman is this year's rodeo Queen. A recent graduate of Coleman High School, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R.M. Eddington.

Don Gay, seven times champion bull rider, is producer for this year's rodeo. ## Changes In Reading Program Requirements Lots Of Mysteries In Store As Program Gets Underway Today

Organizers of the Library Summer Reading Program for children of the community have made some changes in the requirements. Ribbons will not be given this year. Certificates will be given if the child has read the required number of books. The children are encouraged to select books on their own reading level. Parents are asked to please see that the child's reading log is completed/ Everyone should enjoy their reading.

PRE-SCHOOL AGE children should have someone read to them, ten books over the month's time.

MIDLERS (1-3rd grade) may have help reading 10 books. These should be more advanced than the pre-school, mostly picture books.

SENIORS (4th grade and above) are encouraged to read 4 books, but these should be advanced in material and in length.

Children are encouraged to read as

many books as they enjoy and keep records of their reading. Recognition will be given to those who have read more than the required number.

The theme of all Texas Library Reading Programs this summer will be MYSTERIES. Encourage those boys and girls you know to seek these books out. Adults are encouraged to buy a child a new mystery book!

Thursday, July 5 will find the program participants searching for clues to a mystery. The group will meet at 9:30 a.m. at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative meeting room. The children may be picked up there when the session is over.

The next sessions will be held Thursday, July 19, 26th and August 2. Don't let your child miss any of the fun!

## Energy Assistance Available For Low-Income Families

AUSTIN—Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Ron Lindsey.

Lindsey said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance have been mailed to households that receive food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Supplemental Income. If those households have at least one member who will be 60 or older in 1990 or a member with a medical condition that is aggra-

vated by heat, they may qualify for assistance. Other low-income individuals may request and application by calling 1-800-252-8060 before July 31.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$598.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$802.49 for households of two persons, \$1,006.49 for three, \$1,210.49 for four, \$1,414.49 for five, and \$1,618.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment, or if the household

## U.S. 84 Through Santa Anna & Coleman Included In Proposed Trunk System

U.S. Highway 84 is included in the proposed Texas Highway Trunk System, with Coleman County on the route between Abilene and Brownwood. The route will pass through Santa Anna and Coleman.

Ross Jones, who heads the Coleman Chamber Transportation Committee, was in Austin at the recent hearing at a session of the Texas Highways and Public Transportation Commission. Some 75 people, including some from Ballinger and Brownwood, who were interested in Highway 67 being included in the system, were in attendance at the hearing.

Jones explains that plans for the trunk system call for four-lane divided highways. The system would

be developed as funds are available. Priorities will be established by traffic count.

Jones had the opportunity to visit with Commissioner Ray Stoker of Odessa while at the hearing. Stoker represents the West Texas area on the commission.

It is understood that the route has been approved for the Port to Plains Highway, on to Abilene, Austin and Houston. This, of course, is U.S. Highway 84 in this area.

It appears that much highway construction is in line for Coleman County in the years ahead, with U.S. 84 already included in the plans, and a good indication that U.S. 67 may be added to the trunk system.

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## Thoughts From Our Pastors

### FAITH: WHAT IS IT AND HOW DOES IT COME?

First of all, let us examine the question, "What is faith." Faith is more, much more than a physical, emotional, or psychological feeling. Faith is not intuition, supposition nor superstition. It is not an opinion nor a guess. Actually, we do not have to depend on a human definition: because we have an inspired one in Hebrews 11:1 "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." In Romans 8:24-25 the divinely inspired Paul explains, "For we are saved by hope; but hope that is seen is not hope; for what a man seeth, why doth he yet hope for? But if we hope for that which we see not, then we do with patience wait for it."

Every true Christian, based upon the evidence revealed in the holy scriptures, believes in heaven and the joys and blessings of eternal life with God. None of us have ever actually seen heaven or experienced eternal life. However, we have sufficient evidence in the Bible to thoroughly convince us there is a heaven awaiting the faithful, and remembering Paul's council, because of our hope, "We with patience wait for it."

Now let's move to the second part of our question, "How does one get faith?" By what means does it come? We have an inspired answer for this. "So faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." (Romans 10:17). Faith does not come as a miraculous gift of God today. Faith is the human part of salvation. It would be as unscriptural and useless to pray today as it would be to pray for repentance or confession or baptism. These are the acts of obedience required of us.

Faith is not a blind leap in the dark. God has always given man more than enough information and evidence to fully justify in Him and His promises. For instance, we are told that, "By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous. God testifying of his gifts; and by it he being dead yet speaketh." Now since "Faith cometh by....the word of God." God must have, in fact did, instruct him concerning his sacrifices. Otherwise, he could not have offered them by faith (Hebrews 11:4).

Noah was a man of faith...."By faith Noah, being warned of God of things not seen as yet, moved with fear, prepared an ark to the saving of his house; by the which he condemned the world, and became heir of the righteousness which is by Faith" (Hebrews). God warned Noah of the flood and instructed him to build the ark. Noah believed God and did what God had told him to do. He is said to have done this by faith (see Genesis 6, 7, 8). Noah's faith came to him by his hearing the word of God.

Take the case of Abraham, "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive as an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went" (Hebrews 11:8).

In this context, (Verses 9-19) we have a very brief enlightening history of the faithful life of this great Godly man. Briefly stated, for more than one hundred years Abraham heard, believed and obeyed God's instructions. This he did by faith. The same is true of all those faithful ones mentioned in this eleventh chapter of Hebrews, along with a great host of others who are mentioned in other scriptures. Faith, as taught in the Bible, is "The substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen, and it comes by hearing God's word."

pays a portion of the home energy costs. Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy company. Persons receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy company business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy company. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. Is the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for the difference.

# Dear Editor

On June 21, I cast the toughest vote of my 12 years as the elected representative for the 17th District of Texas. In response to the Supreme Court's ruling that burning the American flag is protected by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, the U.S. House of Representatives decisively voted to respect the court's decision and did not amend the Bill of Rights. I voted for the Bill of Rights and against the constitutional amendment, and would like to take this opportunity to discuss my vote.

The reason this vote was so tough is because it makes me very angry when I see anyone, especially an American, exhibiting disrespect for our great nation. No adjectives are adequate to capture the temperance-raising, blood-pounding rage I feel when I think of the flag being burned.

Regardless of my emotions toward those who would defile the flag, I believe that the U.S. Constitution protects those few individuals who in their demented way must express their contempt for the government that gives them those rights. Conservative Justice Anthony Kennedy stated it best when he wrote, "It is poignant but fundamental that the flag protects those who hold it in contempt."

I know that some people do not agree with the position I have taken on this issue, and that some will call my position un-American or un-patriotic. I disagree, but I respect their right to that opinion, and to disagree with their elected representative. That is the right which is uniquely American because of the Bill of Rights.

I deeply respect and am indebted to the thousands of men and women who have sacrificed their lives defending America's gleaming shores from oppression, intolerance and ignorance. Did they die protecting the flag? If they did, was it a piece of cloth or for what that cloth symbolized to them? Did they not die to ensure that their children and their children's children would live in a free land protected by the Bill of Rights?

This is not an attempt to apologize or to make an excuse for my vote against amending the constitution for the flag. I believe that the position I have taken is the correct one, and I believe it is the position the majority of my constituents have taken after reflecting on what the flag and, even more importantly, the Bill of Rights means to us all.

minutes out of their busy schedules to donate regularly during July and August to help maintain a safe and adequate supply of blood and blood products."

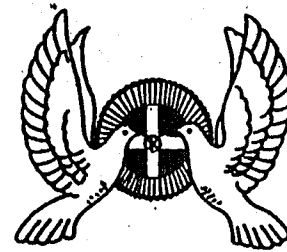
United Blood Services is this area's non-profit blood provider. The organization collects blood from volunteer donors, then tests, processes and distributes it to 23 area hospitals.

**CRACKS ON HEELS**

In the winter, people often have raw, red hands with cracks on the knuckles that get so bad they can bleed. The application of a softening, moistening agent can often be used to prevent the condition.

A similar thing can happen on the feet, especially in the winter when the skin is drier. However, this kind of cracking rarely occurs unless there's a callus on the heel. In this case, it might be necessary to visit the podiatrist to have the callus removed. First, he debrides the edges of the callus with a scalpel. Then he treats it with medication. A bandage may be applied to keep the edges closed and promote more rapid healing, but there is not bleeding involved and the treatment is entirely painless. To keep the condition from recurring, it would be recommended to use a cream similar to that used on the hands.
