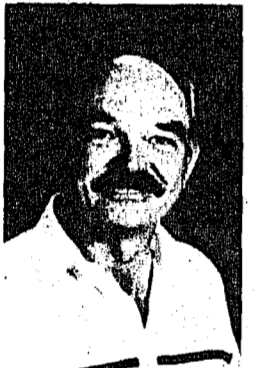

Davy Crockett's Birthday

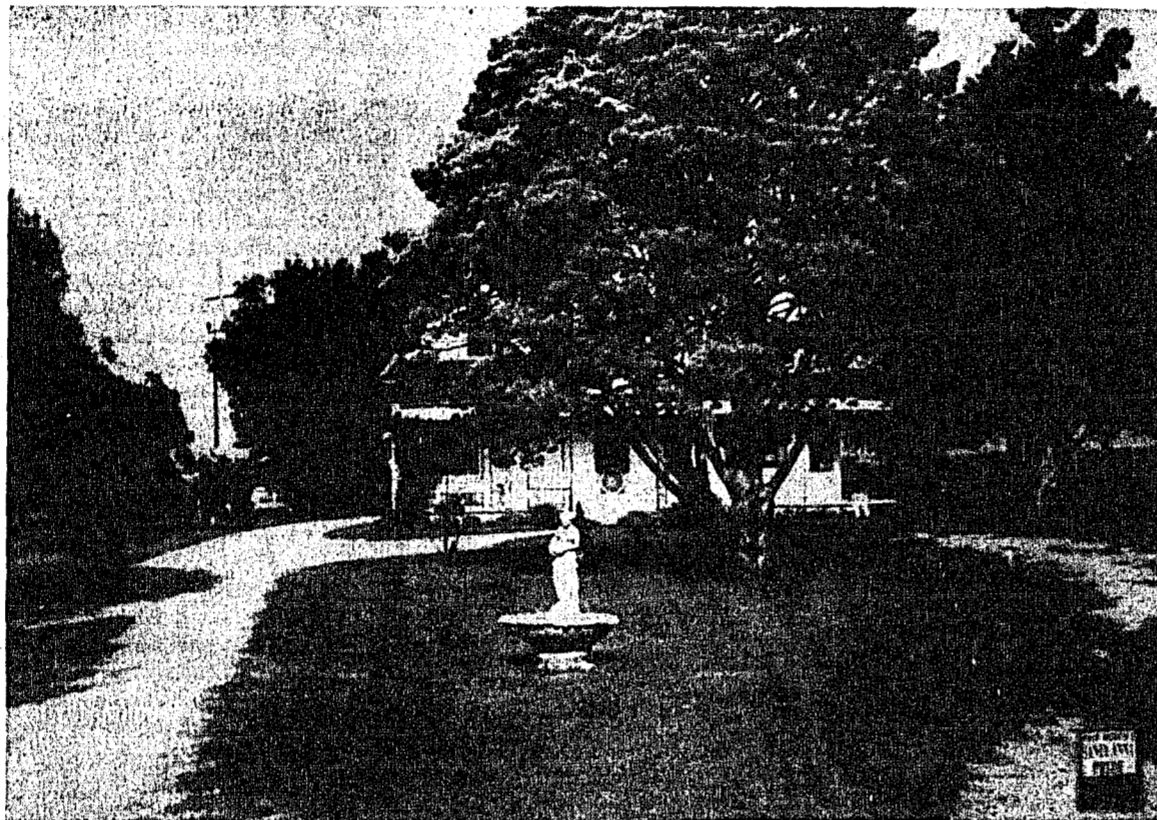
August 17 marks the birth anniversary of David Crockett, legendary American Frontiersman, politician and adventurer. Crockett was born in Hawkins County, Tenn., in 1786. He first made a name for himself fighting in the Creek War from 1813 to 1815, a U.S. Victory over Creek Indians in Tennessee who were actually British allies.

Crockett was elected to the Tennessee legislature in 1821 and served for two terms. He then was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1827 and served two consecutive terms. He lost the election in 1831 but was elected to serve a final term in 1833.

Crockett perhaps is best known for his last contribution to his country. He was part of the Texas forces that perished on March 6, 1836, defending the Alamo.

County Commissioners Approve Proposed Budget With Deficit

COLEMAN — County Commissioners gave initial approval Monday to a \$1.7 million budget that includes a \$20,000 deficit and a 3 percent tax hike.

To make up the estimated \$20,000 shortfall, the commissioners budgeted a loan into the books.

The budget, based on a 44.79-cent tax rate per \$100 property valuation, also includes cutting six county positions and making three full-time slots into part-time positions.

"If worse comes to worst, we're not talking about borrowing over \$20,000 this next year," said County Judge Pete Skelton.

But Precinct 3 Commissioner

Vernon Slate voted against the 3 percent increase, saying he believes the county's operating costs will continue to climb next year and an 8 percent hike will be needed.

After the meeting, Slate said he believes the commissioners are putting off the inevitable by declining to raise the tax rate by 8 percent, which is the maximum amount allowed without spurring a possible rollback vote.

"That 8 percent would have given us just a little bit of leeway to take care of expenses as they rise," Slate said.

He said he thinks commissioners will have to approve an 8 percent hike next year, after failing to do

so this year. Last year, the commissioners also figured a loan into their budget and raised the rate 3 percent for the 1989-90 tax of 42.29 cents per \$100 valuation.

This year's effective rate is 43.50 cents, with the county losing about \$3 million in property valuations. The effective rate is the rate needed to raise the same amount of money from one year to the next.

If the county commissioners had approved of an 8 percent increase — which they considered after an initial motion made by Precinct 2 Commissioner Jake McCreary — about \$28,000 extra would have

Bob Burleson Appointed Coleman Chief Of Police

The Coleman City Council Monday accepted the resignation of Police Chief Billy Don Faries and appointed Sgt. Bob Burleson as interim chief until Jan. 1.

After about two hours of discussion, Mayor Woodrow Maddox broke the 2-2 tie vote to appoint Burleson chief instead of Sgt. Mark Phillips, who had been serving as interim chief since Faries an-

nounced his resignation and plea bargain on an official misconduct charge a week ago.

Maddox explained his choice of Burleson was because of seniority and a lengthy amount of police service.

Burleson is running unopposed in the November General Election for the countywide office of Justice Of

We Salute Our Volunteer Fire Dept

This is the third in a series of articles saluting members of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department and its Ladies Auxiliary. Both perform a valuable service to our community and we take this opportunity to salute them for a job well done.

Our spotlight this week is on Roddy Dean.

Roddy has been a Santa Anna volunteer fireman for over 15 years. He is employed in Brownwood and owns a farm northeast of Santa Anna and is well aware of the importance of the fire department to the rural folks of the area. Roddy also serves on the Santa Anna ISD board of trustees.

He and his wife, Debbie, school nurse for Santa Anna ISD, are the parents of Julie and Jason, both students at SAHS.

Although he does not presently hold an office in the SAVFD, he has in the past served as captain. His mother, Sybil Eubank, is currently serving as Fireman's Mother of the Year, and he says, "It is an honor for me to have her as a mother and for her to serve in that capacity."

Dean says about being a fireman, "Although there is some excitement and a certain amount of risk involved, I think the main reason I have for being a fireman

is to have the chance to help people, our friends and neighbors - just being there when someone needs you."

He tells of a very memorable incident that happened several years ago right after the department had built their first foam truck and were all still pretty green on the best ways to fight an oil fire. It occurred when a thunderstorm came roaring through town and lightning caused a tank battery fire on the Day place east of Santa Anna.

The fire fighters arrived at the location and got set up (while sending someone back to town for a few parts for the foam truck). They began discussing what might be the best way to go

about putting out the tank battery flame and decided to place a ladder on an adjoining battery and spray the flame with foam. "Wrong answer!" says Dean, "Just as David Huggins and I were about to step to the top of the tank from the ladder, the whole top blew off the

thing!" He adds that everyone went scrambling for cover. Dean remembers his first thought was for David's safety, but soon found his friend was safe and sound as were he the others on the scene. "We were all real lucky and needless to say, we learned the hard way (and real quick) that this wasn't the proper way to fight a tank battery fire. If I live to be 100 year old, I will never forget that day!"

Several other firemen have mentioned that same incident and have expressed how it brought a special closeness to the group of men who shared the experience.

This story emphasizes that being a volunteer fireman is much more than leading the Christmas parade, selling hamburgers on Funtier Day and perhaps dousing a few grass fires here and there in dry weather, although they too can at times become harrowing experiences.

Our hats off to Roddy and all his fellow firemen.

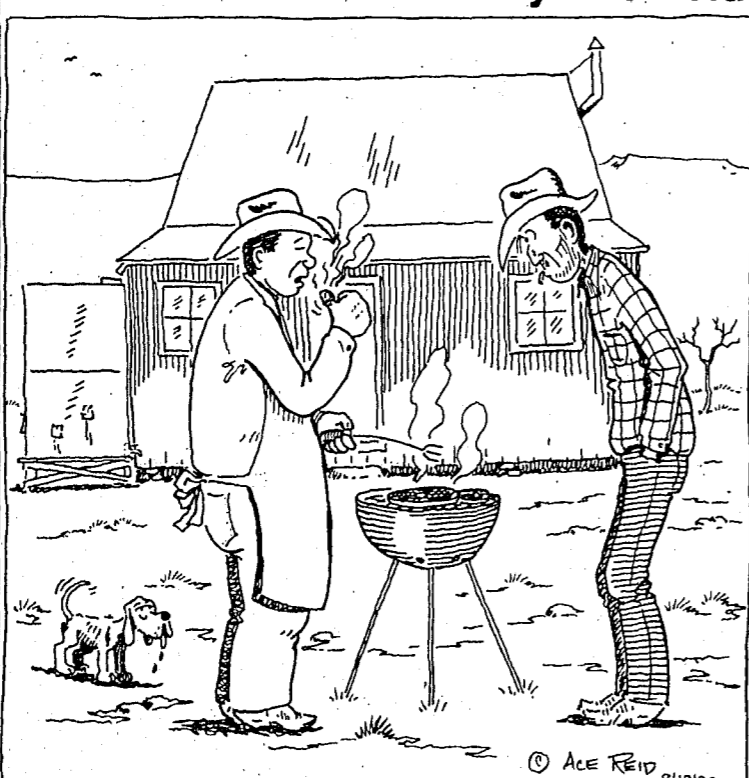

You see, we did not have any insurance, it was two days before payday, the car was out of gas, the brakes on the van were locked up, and we were accustomed to dealing with hospitals and doctors in larger cities and we knew we had no way of getting treatment because of finances, but we knew it was something that needed immediate attention. Thanks to those wonderful loving Christian people of our community, we were able to get immediate attention.

A special praise to Brownwood Regional Hospital for their caring and compassionate attitude. The doctors, nurses and staff were excellent. It has a well run, clean, well trained staff and they are to be highly praised. A happy note to our dilemma, the business office did not say we had to pay X number of dollars before G.W. could be treated. They treated him without worry of finance, and are working with us on paying our bill.

When I did not know what to do, where to go, or how to go about anything, the wonderful people of Amstar Ambulance Service came through in an emergency. You see, they are not only EMTs, but they have true love and compassion for the people of the community of Santa Anna. I praise them and others like them. May our community support them in their very special work here.

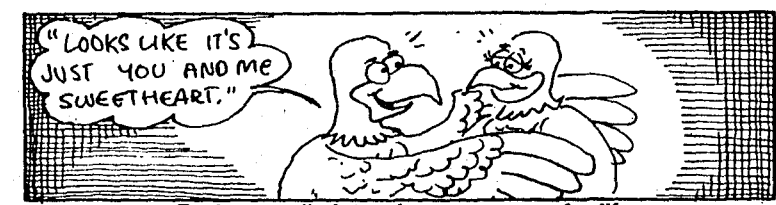

Time To Think About Those Flu Shots

The group at high risk from influenza includes people over 65 and adults or children with chronic illnesses, including heart, lung, kidney or metabolic disorders such as diabetes or cystic fibrosis, chronic anemia, or an impaired immune defense system. An annual flu shot is recommended for people in that high-risk group.

According to Dr. Charles Hall of Bangs, the reason why people must get revaccinated each year is because the strains (types) of flu usually change from year to year.

Pneumococcal pneumonia affects more than half a million Americans each year, causing at least 25,000 deaths. Incidence of the disease—and its fatality rate—increases progressively after the age of 40. A single, one-time injection is advised for older adults, especially those over 65.

It is also recommended for patients of any age with certain chronic illnesses. These include chronic heart or lung disease, diabetes, alcoholism, Cirrhosis of the liver, Hodgkin's disease, disorders of the spleen, kidney disease, multiple myeloma, cerebrospinal-fluid leaks, sickle-cell anemia and impaired immune defenses.

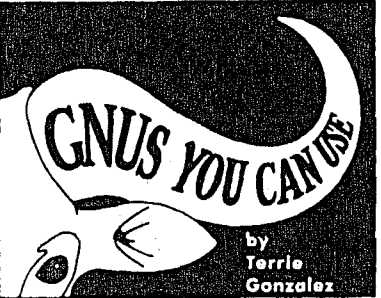

Poisonous Mammals Can Harm Humans

Q. I know there are poisonous snakes, fish and the like. Are there any poisonous mammals?

A few mammals fall into this category. One group is the egg-laying Monotremes of Australia, Tasmania and New Guinea. Perhaps you are familiar with the duck-billed platypus.

The other group of venomous mammals includes Soricids, also known as shrews.

"A more specific example of a venomous mammal is the short-tailed shrew of North America," said Ray Sutton, wildlife manager of the International Wildlife Park in Grand Prairie, Tex. "Near the base of the animal's incisors, a pair of ducts lead to modified salivary glands, which produce venom."

The poison is strong enough to kill small mice, and partially paralyze larger mammals.

"Shrews, by nature, are aggressive animals with temperaments which border on rage," he continued. "Fortunately, they do not get very big."

"If they grew as large as dogs, given their mean dispositions, shrews would easily be one of the most dangerous animals on earth," he said.

The ABC's of Back-to-School

The lazy days of summer are over and the back-to-school race is here.

Running to school in the morning or from school in the afternoon, children run the risk of injury.

"Head injury is among the most dangerous of injuries, especially for children," according to Dr. James Wasco, medical director for the New Medico Head Injury System. "Any injury to the brain can significantly impair a child's ability to learn, concentrate or remember information and this can have a damaging effect on a child's development."

Before you send your children back to school, outfit them with a few safety reminders.

Walking to School

Most pedestrian accidents are the fault of the walker, not the driver, according to the National Safety Council, so:

- Be sure to allow enough time for your child to get to school without rushing.
- Plan your child's walking route to minimize the number of street crossings.
- Teach your child always to use sidewalks and to cross at crosswalks. Where there are no sidewalks, have your child walk

facing traffic, so the child can see oncoming cars.

Riding the School Bus

Although school buses are much safer than family cars, statistics indicate that 40 students die and 7,000 are injured each year in school bus accidents. The majority of these accidents occur outside the bus, when students are boarding or exiting.

- Have your child wait for the bus to stop completely, then board carefully, using the handrail.
- Tell your children to take their seat quickly and stay in that seat for the entire ride — never putting head, arms or hands out the window.
- Teach your children to cross at least 10 feet in front of the bus so the driver can see them.

"Going to school without parents is a sign of a child's independence," said Dr. Wasco, "but children must learn that practicing safety is a prerequisite for independence."

The Santa Anna School District takes part in the National School Lunch/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for 90¢ and \$1.10 and breakfast for 60¢. Meals are also available free for a reduced price.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children carefully complete the application available at the school.

3136, P.O. Box 99, Santa Anna, TX 76878.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility. You may apply for free or reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, and increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps from AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.

In the same respect, if your children are eligible for and receive the free or reduced-price meals, you must report any later changes to the school, such as income increases, household decreases, etc.

*If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.

*If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the income chart, your children can get free or reduced-price meals for 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

*If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

• Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked for information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

• If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of the verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing school superintendent Gerald Brister, 348-

been generated, said Auditor Shirley Sansing.

However, after discussion McCree's motion was rescinded, and the 3 percent rate hike was proposed and approved on a 3-1 vote.

After the meeting, Skelton said he hoped next year's expenses for indigent health care, supplies and equipment buys would come in under the budgeted amounts and not make it necessary for the county to take out a \$20,000 loan to cover the deficit.

If the county is faced with a large, unexpected cost, the money will have to be borrowed, Skelton said.

The \$28,000 extra generated by an 8 percent hike would not be worth the increase and the required public hearings, Skelton said.

"It would be such a little bit of a cushion," he said.

The budget will be considered for final approval at a Sept. 10 hearing, and the cuts become effective Oct. 1.

Before the commissioners adopted the tax rate and budget, Deputy District Clerk Jo Chapman asked the group to reconsider cutting her position to part time.

"I need a full-time job," Chapman said. "If you offer Louise (Thompson, district clerk) a part-time deputy, she'll have to get someone else."

Along with Chapman's position, Tax Collector-Assessor Billie Baker will have to make one full-time employee part time, and so will Justice of Peace Emory Rider.

Skelton's part-time secretary position will be eliminated. And each commissioner will reduce his four-man precinct staff to three. Also, County Clerk Glenn Thomas will lose a staff member after an employee retires after Dec. 31.

Also, the county will stop paying about \$10,000 a year toward the salary of one of two coyote trappers. A county predator control committee will raise money to make up the shortfall and con-

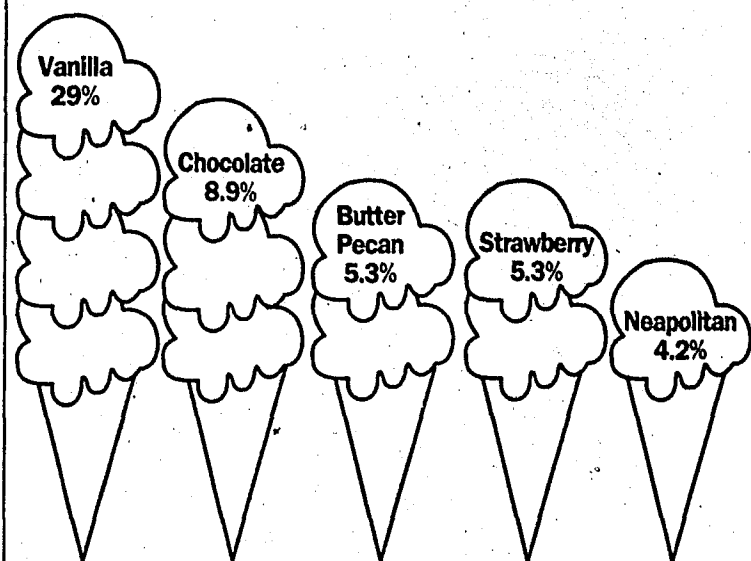

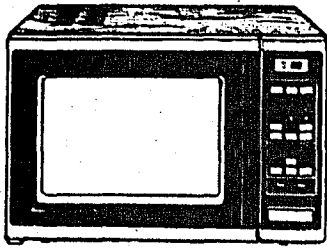

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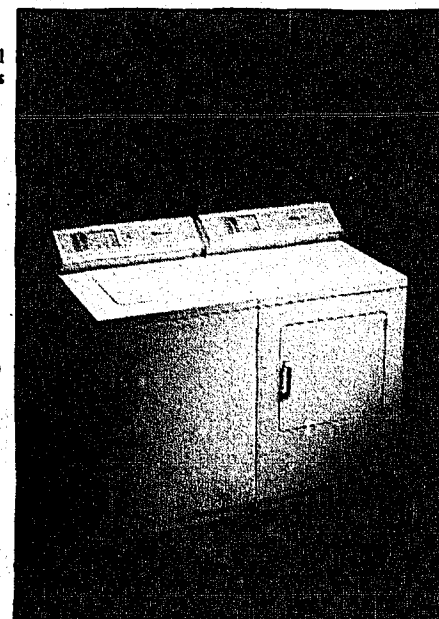

OUTDOORS

Attacked by a Rogue Phrase (or, When Your Participle Dangles)

As the Scottish poet Robert Burns so aptly observed, "The best laid schemes o' mice an' men ... Gang aft agley." This is also true of the stirring outdoor prose that graces our hunting and fishing magazines and columns.

Often these are mere glitches such as typos, word transpositions or benign redundancies. Most of us who essay to picture verbally the great outdoors have been guilty of such phrasing as, "... as the sun was setting in the west,"—forgetting in our attempt at eloquence that the sun hardly ever sets elsewhere.

Sometimes the errors are more factual. One writer redundantly advised that, "Wetlands are always damp." Another was no mathematician: "America's four species of catfish—the blue, the channel and the flathead—may be caught. ..." And one was a bit hazy on geography, reporting that when the crappie are biting on a certain lake, "the word spreads up the East Coast as far as Ohio."

However, sometimes the words take a weird turn so that the error itself makes a strange kind of sense. Here is a sampler of rogue phraseology that conjures up mental images wholly unintended by the writer.

Apparently looking for cheap thrills as well as a trophy, a deer hunter wrote that he waited for two hours for "the big buck to come into a clearing and expose himself." Another claimed that he "shot a buck out of my tree stand." He did not report how the buck got up there.

Reporting on what may well be the worst case of flinching we've ever heard of, a writer related, "When Joe took a quick shot at the big buck, he swapped ends in midair and bolted into the brush." Deer hunters are not the only victims of transposed thought. Consider this case of grand larceny—auto. "Going back to camp for lunch, I saw a turkey driving my truck down the road."

Occasionally a writer will hybridize two different words, giving the editor a vexing choice. One writer advised that, "The key to success is versatility." We weren't sure if he meant *versatility* or *virility*, as either way he makes a good point. The same person in the same story also said that while stalking a deer, he had "violated a carnal rule." Perhaps he had been in the woods too long.

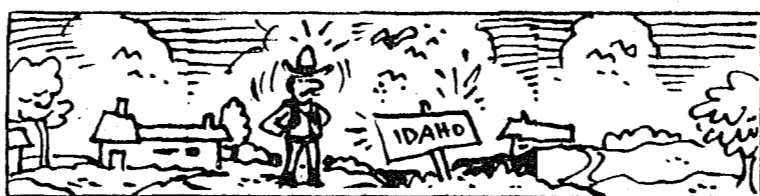
But above all else, the unclear pronoun antecedent leads to the most interesting mental images such as, "The ducks were headed straight for the blind where the hunters waited with their wings cupped and their feet outstretched."

To give fishermen their fair due in the world of poor word choice, we present the angling expert who wrote, "When you catch a trout at a given depth, it is seldom a fluke." Quite so, but conversely, when you catch a fluke at any depth, it is almost never a trout.

And fittingly, it is another angler who takes top honors for stretching his syntax into quite a fish story. The writer reports that a record crappie was "caught on a live minnow weighing 5 pounds, 1 ounce." Not only would I be happy to catch fish the size of that guy's bait, I would love to see the crappie that bit a 5-pound minnow. **tl**

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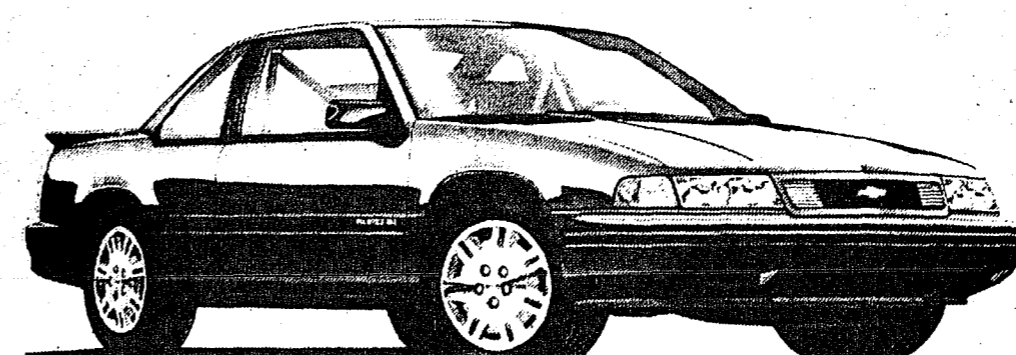

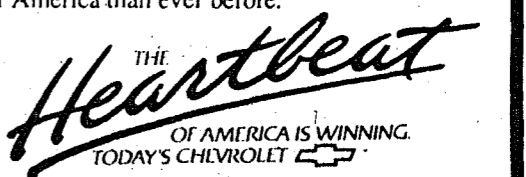
