to the top of the tank from the ladder, the whole top blew off the
thing!" He adds that everyone went scrambling for cover. Dean remembers his first thought was
for David's safety, but soon foumd his friend was safe and sound as were he the others on the scene. We were all real lucky and needless to say, we learned the
hard way (and real quick) that this wasn't the proper way to fight a tank battery fire. If I live to be
100 year old, I will never forget that day!"
