## Tarleton Recreation Building to be Completed Soon

Stephenville, Texas, June 11.—Plans to complete and equip the Tarleton Recreation Building before the opening of school in September were announced today by Dean J. Thomas Davis of John Tarleton College.

A club room approximately 57 feet square will be equipped for games, reading, and study during the day, and for dances and other school entertainment in the evening. There will be a kitchen with equipment for the serving of simple meals, and adequate lounges and dressing rooms.

Native rock procured from the Tarleton College Farm is being used for the structure. The finishing inside will be of the natural stone slightly tinted, with exposed roof trusses. Lighting fixtures and furnishings will be in keeping with the general simplicity of design.

The building was begun last winter as a G. W. A. project, and was about 30 per cent complete when taken over by the college. Construction should be finished during the summer, according to announcement.

There is plenty to think about this morning, (Monday) as we start out on our duties of trying to assemble news for this week's paper.

The Knap-Coleman Glass Company has been in operation about three weeks, and shipments of milk bottles have already begun to roll. In fact, they have been rolling since the first ones were prepared that stood the test and measured up to the standard of quality required. Checks have already been coming in in payment of the first shipments and other shipments are going out almost daily. A full carload left last week-end for Louisiana, and full size truck loads are going out in most every direction. We still believe the glass industry is going to be the biggest industry in Coleman county, and will not be much longer about it.

Three local citizens have recently organized a company to be known as the Santa Anna Sand Company, and have procured several contracts to furnish Santa Anna sand to other glass plants over the country.

Prospects are fair for a fine business in the mining and shipping of the famous Santa Anna sand to other points, at profitable prices. Prospects are on the upgrade for Santa Anna, and what we need is some genuine, old-fashioned, town building co-operation. Give a word of encouragement instead of finding fault. Our natural resources are worth untold values if they are converted into the coin of reality, and it is possible for such to be done.

## DAVID ROBINSON MCCLELLAN

David Robinson McClellan was born September 26, 1896, in Santa Anna, Texas. It was here he grew to manhood and graduated from high school with the class of 1916. He later enlisted in the service of the U. S. Government during the World War and witnessed action in France. He was always actively engaged in something. He spent eight months in South America employed by Sinclair Oil Company.

In his early youth he united with the local U. S. A. Presbyterian Church. He was a member at the time of his death, never having moved his membership, and always contributing generously of his material possessions to the support of the church. When here, he always attended the services, which is one of the greatest tributes that can be paid to any person.

On December 29, 1929, he was married to Miss Era Oakes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Oakes.

David departed this life June 4, 1934 in a very sudden and tragic manner while he was employed by the Petty Geophysical Engineering Co. Nothing but the thought of the Allwise Father, who is in every event, can reconcile his loved ones to his absence.

He is survived by his wife, his father, four brothers, five sisters, three nieces, six nephews and a host of friends.

## Possibilities for A Government Cannery Good

One of the industries discussed at the Lions Club Tuesday was the possibilities of procuring a cannery for Santa Anna. Several other phases of government work can also be carried on in connection with the cannery.

According to our understanding, the Government will match the community dollar for dollar for material and furnish the labor to build a building in which to house the cannery, sewing room and other such work as is being carried on by the rehabilitation program, and then furnish the equipment to carry on the work.

In Santa Anna, the school owns three residences on the premises of the high school, and one iron clad building, the material from which can be used in the construction of the building, and one old frame building on the premises of the grammar school. These five buildings contain sufficient material to furnish Santa Anna's part of the material bill, and if the labor and one-half the material is furnished by the rehabilitation projects, why not get busy and put the building up at once and let the equipment come on. It will furnish several people employment who are now on the budget, and give a permanent building for such work in Santa Anna.

There is no time to lose on this project. Let's get busy now.

Gentlemen:

Pursuant to our agreement we have made a detailed audit of the records of the City for the period beginning May 22, 1929 and ending April 30, 1934.

**SCOPE OF THIS EXAMINATION**

1. Analysis of the accounts of officers whose duties include the handling of the City's cash or the keeping of the City records.
2. The reporting of any discrepancies in the officers' accounts.
3. Analysis of receipts and disbursements with Bank reconciliation.
4. Analysis of interest and sinking fund accounts with statement showing the status of each as to legal requirements.
5. Analysis of Bond accounts.

In accordance with the above we have divided this examination into three heads, viz:

1. Tax Division
2. Receipts and Disbursements
3. Pledged Indebtedness

and with reference thereto we offer the following comments:

**TAX DIVISION**

Under this head we have assembled all data pertaining to the operations affecting the office of the Tax Assessor and Collector.

In the Assessors department we used as a basis the renditions as approved by the Board of Equalization.

In the Collector's department we used as a basis the Assessors rolls having been approved by the City Commission which were charged to the Collector, crediting her with the uncollected taxes. The difference has been accounted for, as set out in this report.

**ANALYSIS OF TAX ROLLS**

The total valuation upon which your taxes was based is as follows:

You will notice there has been a decrease since 1930. The analysis of this decrease shows the following:

On the real estate, the valuation has held about the same through this time, the reduction coming on the personal property.

**SUPPLEMENTAL ROLL**  
We find that your assessments were all made; consequently your Collector made no supplemental roll.

**ADJUSTMENTS**  
In comparing the tax assessed on the roll with the result of calculating the total assessed valuation with the total tax rate, we find no adjustment necessary to balance the roll with the levy.

**DELIQUENT TAX**  
The amount of uncollected City tax is as follows:

As set out above the total uncollected tax for this period of examination is \$39,049.97; however the schedules show that during this period the following redemptions were collected:

By deducting this amount from total delinquent you have a net balance uncollected of \$35,827.26. We realize that a part of the balance delinquent is on personal property and is probably uncollectible, however an effort should be put forth before it is too old.

**PENALTY AND INTEREST**  
In accordance with an act passed by the 42nd Legislature, to remit all penalty and interest, the City Commission authorized the Collector to remit all penalty and interest on collections made since the Act, however this examination reveals that \$107.12 was collected subsequent to this Act.

**COLLECTIONS**  
Our analysis shows there was collected in:

Proper prorations have been made, based on your tax levy for the year and is set out in our Exhibit of "Apportionment to Various Funds," and have been properly credited in each account as kept by the City Secretary.

**TAX ASSESSMENTS**  
As set out in "Adjustment" paragraph herein, we find no adjustment necessary to balance the tax roll with the tax levy. This indicates that care has been exercised in the preparation of the roll as to renditions as well as to calculation of the tax.

**TAX COLLECTOR**  
Each item of money received by the Collector was traced to its original source, using the assessment roll as a basis. The amount uncollected at the end of the year was obtained from the tax roll after deducting the taxes collected, as per tax receipts issued. The deposits for the money received was traced by the deposit slips of the Depository and into the various funds as carried in the ledger by the City Secretary. Reference is made to Collectors account with City.

We are pleased to say the accounts and records in this department are complete in detail and well kept.

**UTILITIES**  
Under this division we have placed other sources of revenue to the City, which are Waterworks, Sewer and Fishing permits, as they affect the income and expenditures of the City.

**WATERWORKS FUND**  
By reference to statement of receipts and disbursements it will be seen that the total receipts for this period of examination are \$48,505.53. The disbursements during the same time are \$42,252.06 including the payment of warrants amounting to \$2,076.87, which leaves a balance of \$4,253.47 cash, in addition, the financial statement schedule shows \$938.25 delinquent water accounts. In this connection analysis of disbursements shows that this was used in the administration of your City government, which indicates that your water system is making a gross profit, we use the term gross profit in the sense that we have not set up any replacement reserve.

**SEWER FUND**  
Reference is also made to Sewer fund statement of receipts and disbursements which reveals that your total receipts are \$13,574.06, revenues from sewer and dry toilets, and the disbursements \$7,562.09, leaving a net balance of \$6,011.97 cash collected together with \$750.00 delinquent accounts. In addition to paying the requirements as to principal and interest you have earned a splendid profit, however, as said in Waterworks, paragraph, we have not set up any replacement reserve. Allow us to call your attention to the amount of delinquent accounts in both water and sewer accounts.

**RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS**  
All receipts and disbursements were verified, each item of money received was traced to its original source. That of the Collector from the assessment rolls, occupation and franchise receipts, that of the water department as well as sewer from the duplicate receipts and ledger entry. It appears that all money collected for the City has been credited to the various funds entitled to receive it.

Our analysis of the receipts are listed under the fund affected. As a starting balance, we used the balance set up by the last audit. In proving these items, we checked the receipts against the ledger, after verifying the various entries of the accounts in the ledger, we checked them against the Depository accounts. In checking the disbursements of each account for the year, we examined all vouchers issued by the Secretary and returned by the Bank, checking them against the stub in the Secretary's office.

**DEPOSITORY INTEREST**  
We find that you have been credited with the depository interest paid by the Depository, but we call your attention to the fact that the Depository has not paid any interest since 1931.

**BUDGET FORMS**  
We have prepared and filed with the City Secretary necessary forms, giving the receipts and disbursements in detail, required to make up the 1934 budget.

**PLEGGED INDEBTEDNESS**  
A bond and warrant schedule setting out in detail the issues, date of issuance, maturity date, interest rate, amount outstanding at this date, and cash on hand as well as other information bearing on the tax levy is included.

Your total pledged indebtedness at this time outstanding is \$90,305.01 with a reserve on hand of \$7,765.56, making your net debt \$82,539.45. Analysis reveals that you paid on the principal \$44,130.49 as well as all interest. Reference is made to bond and warrant schedule. Bonds paid subsequent to this examination were not checked by us but those paid during this period of examination were checked.

**FLOATING INDEBTEDNESS**  
We find no notes or warrants outstanding except those mentioned in the bond and warrant schedule and exhibit of bills payable.

**FISCAL AGENTS**  
We find that your local bank acts as your agent in the payment of all bonds and warrants as well as interest thereon; and that it has no money of the Cities' except as shown in the various accounts.

**CURRENT ASSETS**  
The Cities' cash was verified by reconciliation of the balances in each fund, as shown on record of accounts, with the statement of the Depository. All disbursements were verified by an examination of the cancelled checks.

By reference to Book and Bank reconciliation it appears that in 1929 Paving No. 1 Fund, the Bank account is over twenty cents, also, in Tax account the Bank is over thirteen cents, making a total of thirty-three cents the bank has over the Secretary's record. The Secretary will make the necessary adjustments to reconcile these accounts.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENT**  
Assets are divided into three divisions, Fixed and Invested, Movable and Current. Fixed and Invested, are those items represented by bond and warrant issues, except the real estate, which value is estimated. Movable, consists of machinery, trucks, equipment, furniture, etc., based on invoice prices less depreciation. Current, cash was verified by reconciliation of the amounts shown on the ledger with the statement of the Depository. Bills receivable and delinquent taxes were verified by the books of original entry.

**LIABILITIES**  
All items are supported by schedules herein, except meter deposits, which were taken from the book of original entry of the Secretary's. Extensive checks of the accuracy of the entries failed to disclose any irregularities. The delinquent accounts were not verified by correspondence with the consumers.

**IN GENERAL**  
Your attention is called to the "Comparative Statements" of receipts and disbursements, pages 64 and 65, which show that your net receipts in 1931 decreased \$2,076.87 from the receipts in 1930, the principal items of this decrease being taxes and water rentals. Your disbursements for 1931 decreased \$8,359.29 from the disbursements in 1930. The schedule reveals that you paid in 1930, bonds, warrants and interest \$14,063.29, while in 1931 you only paid \$11,073.23, making a decrease in these items of \$2,024.06, leaving a net decrease in your operating expenditures of \$4,335.23.

The receipts in 1932 decreased \$7,248.93 from the receipts in 1931. The decrease coming on taxes and service receipts. Your disbursements in 1932 decreased \$4,992.99 from those in 1931. It is seen that you paid, bonds, warrants and interest in 1931 of \$11,073.23, while in 1932 you paid \$10,998.52, which shows a decrease of \$35.31, leaving a net decrease in operating expenditures of \$4,992.99.

The receipts in 1933 decreased \$1,934.26 from receipts in 1932, the principal part of this decrease was on taxes. Your disbursements for 1933 decreased \$5,024.93 from those in 1932. You paid in 1932, bonds, warrants, interest of \$10,998.52 while in 1933 you paid \$9,367.35, showing the entire decrease in disbursements in 1933 to be on pledged indebtedness. Deducting the net decrease in receipts of \$1,934.26 from the net decrease in disbursements of \$5,024.93 shows you were \$3,090.67 better off at December 31, 1933 as of December 31, 1932. We did not make comparison of receipts and disbursements for years 1929 and 1934 as we do not show the full years business.

Had you had a normal collection together with the reduction in expenditures your financial affairs would have been in splendid condition. However considering the depressed conditions and the numerous demands for added expense, the people of Santa Anna are to be congratulated for the manner in which the Council has handled these matters.

These comparative statements have been set up of all receipts and disbursements for the years to enable you to determine whether or not your income is sufficient to meet your expenses. A close study of this schedule will aid you in determining your budget for another year.

After checking the various entries the bank reconciliation shows that in every instance the book balances reconcile with the bank, except as set out in previous paragraph, and that the City has received all due it. In this connection we call your attention to excess of thirty cents in the tax account. This accrued by over payment by the taxpayer of odd cents.

Surety bonds on the officials as well as the insurance policies, both fire and tornado, on the City properties were properly checked. We also note that the City is carrying liability insurance on the firemen.

We wish to state that we believe your City affairs to be in as good condition as could be expected under the depressed times, and that your administrative officers are competent.

It is our purpose to co-operate with you in securing the best possible results from this report and if we can assist you in any other way, advise us.

In conclusion we wish to thank all officers and their assistants for the courtesies extended us while we were in Santa Anna and at any time that we may serve you further in regard to this report, we are entirely at your service.

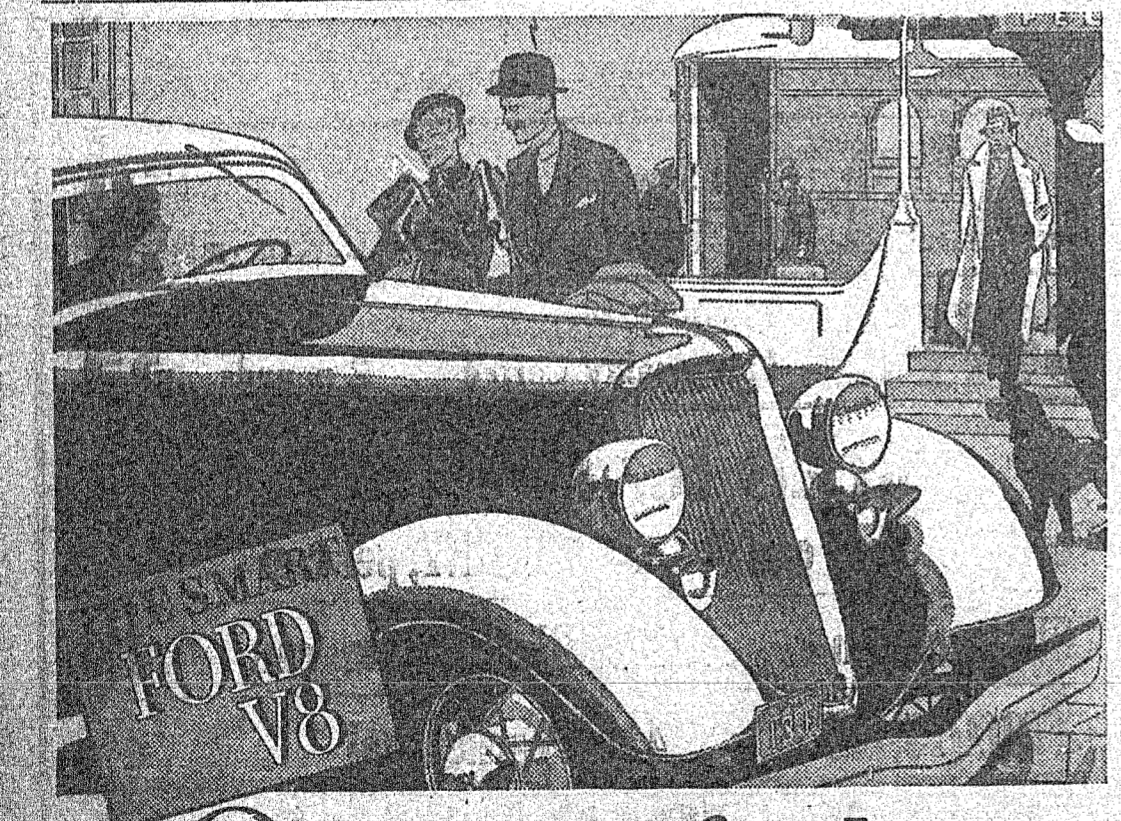

He also was sent to Washington last year to represent West Texas landowners and oil producers' interests in the drafting of the code for the oil industry, and was successful in having inserted a "fair price clause" for West Texans.

During the past two years he has devoted much time to the relief of the unemployed, assisting in providing worthwhile work projects for their employment, and serving for many months on the Relief Board of his county.

For years Deal has been a good roads advocate, and has been a director of the Texas Good Roads Society since its organization. Particularly

has he worked for the road program in this district.

In submitting his candidacy to the voters of this district he says:

"A firm believer in a government of the people, by the people and for the people, I shall at all times, if elected, seek the council and advice of the citizens of the district without respect to class, and be ever alert to protect and work for their varied interests in matters concerning their welfare, and for the good of the district as a whole.
