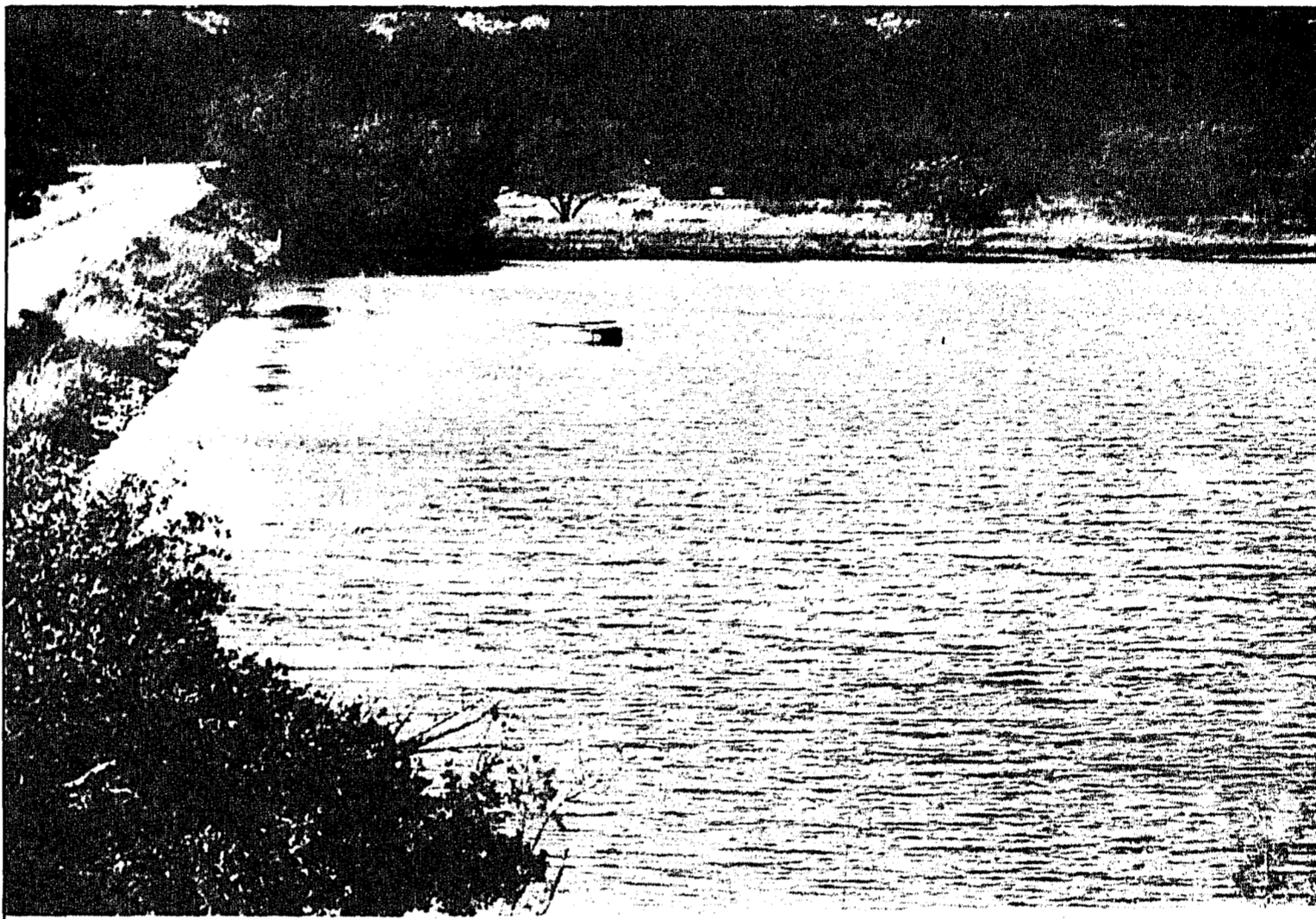
Local Crime Stopper Group Started

A group of local citizens has banded together to form a Crime Stopper group in Santa Anna. The group has decided the community has "had enough" of criminal mischief/vandalism and other seemingly youth related crimes such as periodic break-ins, and or vandalism at the school.

Most recent incident involved the vandalism of a 1966 Red Mustang belonging to Armando Mata Jr. The auto was vandalized Saturday night, September 15. The destruction was done while the auto was parked at the Mata residence on Ave. B, or possibly driven away for the deed to be done and then returned.

The Crime Stopper group has offered a \$500 reward for information leading to the disposition of the case. Calls will remain confidential and callers may contact Police Chief Carlos Torres or the Coleman County Sheriff's office. Jackson Nears State Record In Romp Over Robert Lee

The rain certainly didn't dampen Herbert Jackson's spirits last Friday night at Robert Lee. The rains poured down on the fans as they traveled to Robert Lee to watch the Mountaineers pour it on the Steers 66-12 while only a light drizzle fell now and again during the game. The Black and Gold attack was led by the speedy Jackson who raced for six touchdowns for the Mountaineers; two of those were for eighty yards each. He piled up a whopping 456 yards rushing and 561 total all-purpose yards,

bringing his total in three games to 1036 all-purpose yards, over 700 rushing yards. He certainly has a shot at reaching over 2000 yards before the season is over.

However, Coach Mike Permenter was quick to comment that Jackson was given the go ahead by the strong play of his offensive line, including Rusty Fleeman, Jason Dean, Zane Keeney, Charlie Morris, Scott Valdez, Wesley Baugh and Tommy Williford. "In

A breast cancer detection unit will be in Santa Anna, Friday, September 28, to offer screening mammograms to local and area women. The unit will be parked at the City Hall on North 2nd. Those wishing to take advantage of the service will need to call City Hall, 348-3403, for an appointment. Cost will be \$60 plus \$4.50 e&h.

According to the American Cancer Society one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Accredited by the American College of Radiology, the unit is equipped to help in early detection and thus provide a greater chance for survival from this dread disease. A mammogram can detect the cancer before it can be felt.

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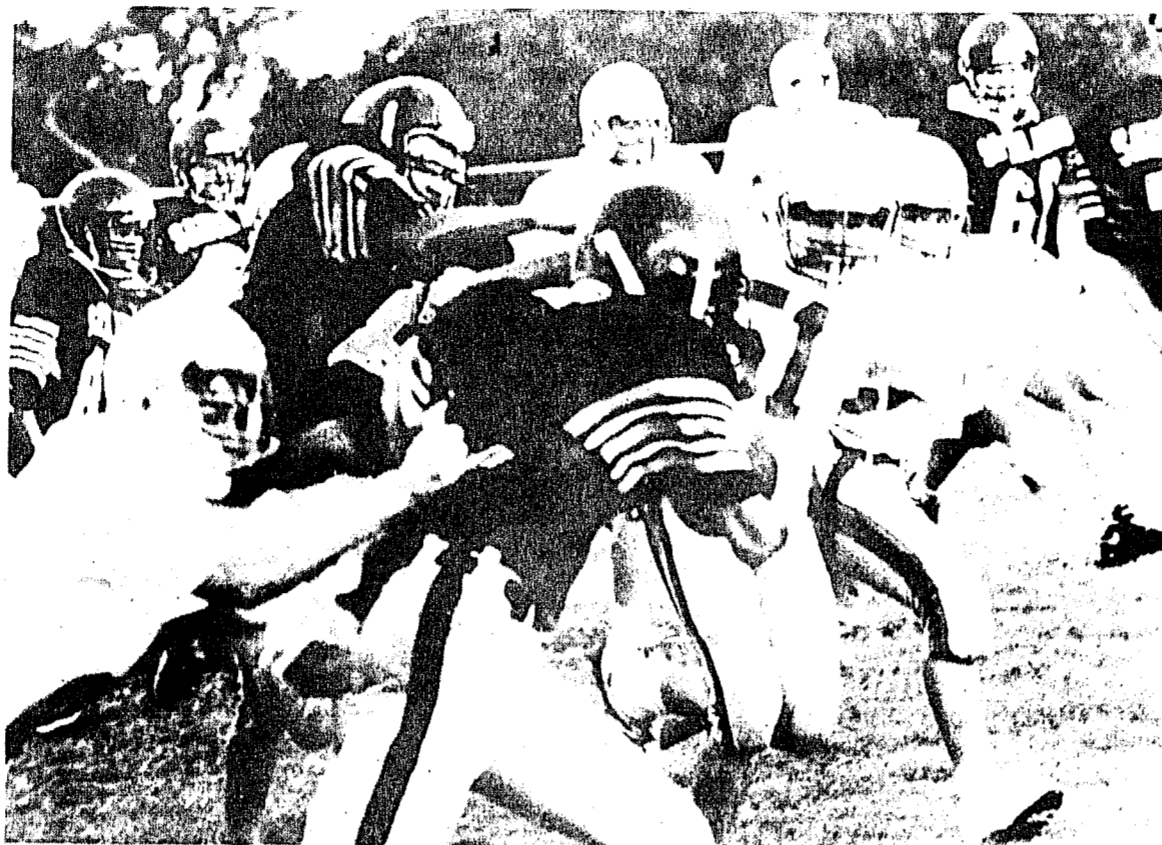

Santa Anna put the first score on the board when Tony DeLeon passed to Mark Frauso for a 38 yard TD play with 59 seconds left in the first quarter. The try for a two point conversion failed and left the score at that point 6-0.

Early came right back with only 39 seconds on the first quarter clock with a 53 yard TD run to tie it up 6-6. CARLOS GARZA picked up the ball when Santa Anna blocked the Early extra point attempt and raced for two more the distance for two more Mountaineer points.

The third quarter saw Tony DeLeon once again find paydirt with a 17-yard run with 5:14 remaining in the quarter. Garza

tacked on a two point conversion run to bring Santa Anna to 16-6 over Early. Early countered with a 2-yd TD run with 1:27 remaining on the quarter clock.

The point after failed leaving the score at SA 16 Early 12.

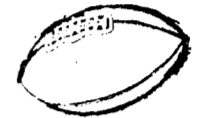

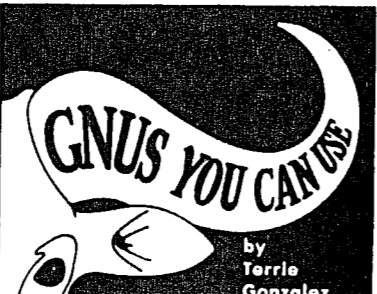

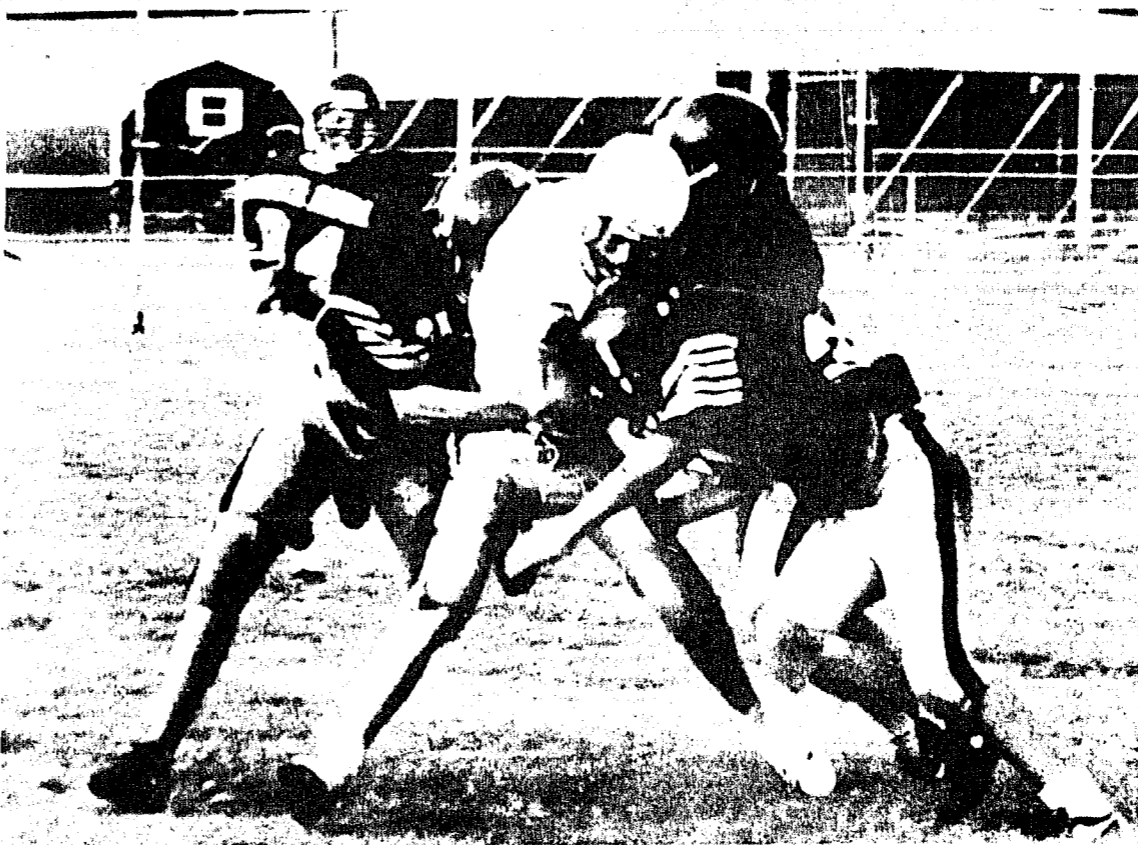


Gnu Trivia Quiz Tackles Giraffes

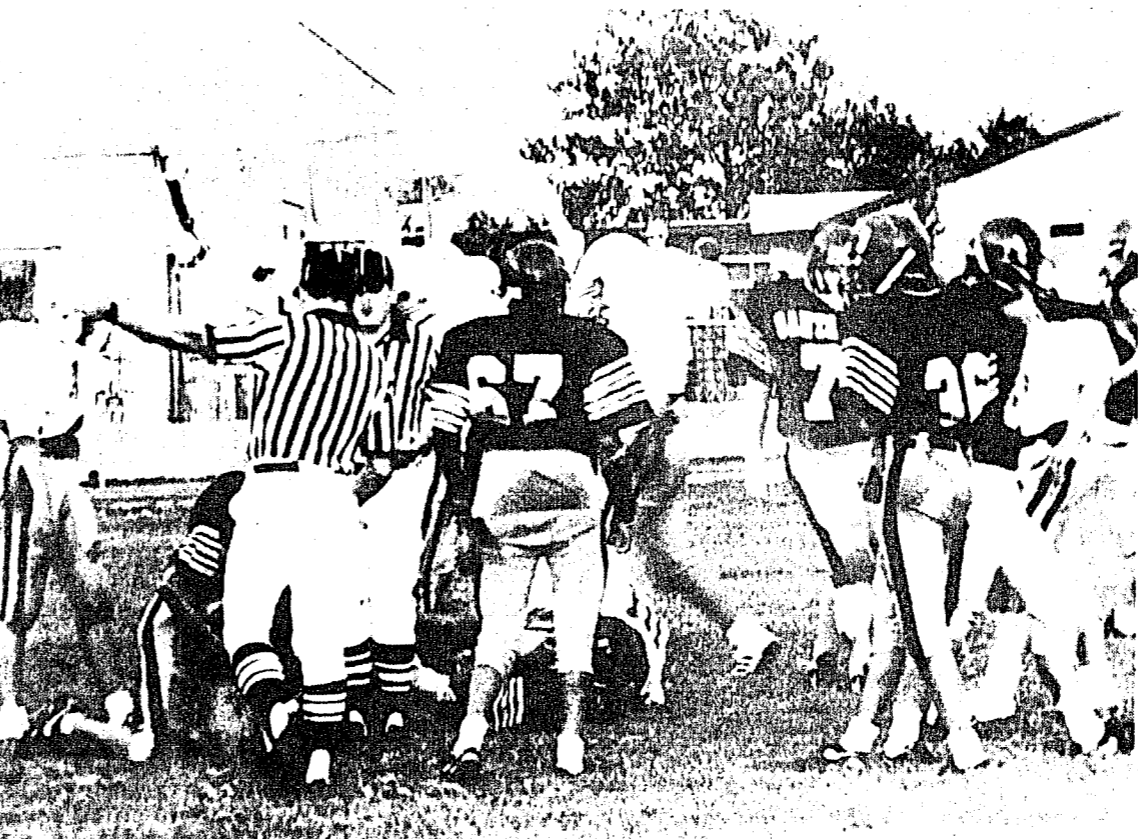
