



# Local Crime Stopper Group Started

A group of local citizens has banded together to form a Crime Stopper group in Santa Anna. The group has decided the community has "had enough" of criminal mischief/vandalism and other seemingly youth related crimes such as periodic break-ins, and or vandalism at the school.

Most recent incident involved the vandalism of a 1966 Red Mustang belonging to Armando Mata Jr. The auto was vandalized Saturday night, September 15. 

Provided to us by Santa Anna Funeral Home EMS, it recommends the following would be available. But we also lowing steps for assisting snakebite victims:

\*Put the victim at rest and keep the person warm

\*Remove any rings or other constrictive items from the victim's

\*Lightly immobilize the injured part of the body in a functional position and keep it just below the heart level.

\*Give the person plenty of reas-

\*Transport the victim to a medi-DO NOT cut the wound and DO NOT apply a tourniquet.

The Many Behaviors of Stroke

Dealing with the realities of stroke is a difficult challenge faced by the nearly 350,000 stroke survivors and their families and friends each year. Most people are ready to face the physical changes associated with stroke, but not the behavioral, emotional and intellectual changes While it isn't always easy, with patience and understanding you can help a friend or relative cope with a new way of life.

It's important to understand that strokes affect the brain. A stroke occurs when blood flow to a part of the brain is hampered. When that happens, that part of the brain is permanently damaged.

When someone suffers a stroke, the physical damage usually ranges from minor to severe paralysis on the side of the body opposite to the side of the brain damaged. When the victim suffers left-brain damage, the physical disability will be on the right side of the body. This is called "right

But damage from a stroke is more than physical. It is likely that

will experience behavior changes. Right hemiplegics (left-brain when trying new tasks. Keep these

• Don't underestimate a patient's ability to learn and communicate even if they can't talk.

If someone can't talk, try other

- forms of communication. Pantomime and demonstration are often useful. Don't overestimate how well
- someone understands speech. Don't shout. Keep messages simple
- Don't use special voices like those you use when you talk to
- Divide tasks into simple steps. Give lots of feedback and indicate

progress often.

Left hemiplegics (right-brain damage) tend to have difficulties with self-care activities. They also suffer from spatial-perceptual deficits, or the ability to judge distance, size, position, rate of movement, form and how parts relate to wholes. Left hemiplegics also tend to oversell their abilities. They may be impulsive or carcless. When working with people with significant spatial-perceptual deficits, remember:

- Don't overestimate their abilities. Spatial-perceptual deficits are easy
- Use verbal cues if they have trouble with demonstration.



- · Break tasks into small steps and give lots of feedback.
- Watch to see what they can safely do rather than taking their word
- · Minimize clutter around them.
- Avoid rapid movements around
- · Highlight visual reference points.

Stroke victims often have short retention spans and have difficulty generalizing the new things they have learned from one setting to another. They can also suffer varying degrees of sight or hearing loss.

Not all stroke patients are alike. They act differently depending upon what part of the brain was injured, the severity and type of injury, how recently the stroke occurred and their previous personality and behavior.

Nearly 500,000 Americans suffer from a stroke each year. Almost 150,000 of them die, making it the third leading killer of Americans. Currently in the United States more than 2 million stroke victims are
