



Henry Ford's Birthday

July 30 marks the birth date of the man who "put America on wheels" - Henry Ford. Born in Dearborn Township, Michigan in 1863, Ford is probably best known for his contribution not only to the automobile industry, but to mass production. He revolutionized American industry with the assembly line and introduced a then unheard of \$5-aday wage for automobile workers.

But of course, one always links Ford's name to his famous black Model T, the first car designed for the mass market. The Model T first appeared in 1908, and Ford had sold more than 15 million by 1927, when production ceased. Ford died April 7, 1947, in Dearbom.

Freshmen Boys Need To Pick Up Football Physical Forms

Coach Mike Permenter has asked the NEWS to announce that all young men who are to be freshmen at SAHS and are planning to play football this fall, should pick up a physical form at the school administration building as soon as possible. The players need to have their physicals and the form returned to his office by August 10.

Any others not having played before but planning to do so this year are also required to follow the same procedure.

Two-a-day football workouts will begin the 13th of August.



men think there's nothing wrong with wearing brown shoes with a blue suit.


• 69 percent of Americans think they're better looking than they really are.

On Monday, July 30, 1990, a developmental screening will be held for vour children ages zero to six (0-6). This screening will be conducted at the First United Methodist Church, 500 W. Live Oak, Coleman, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon,

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas: personalsocial skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.) If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.
