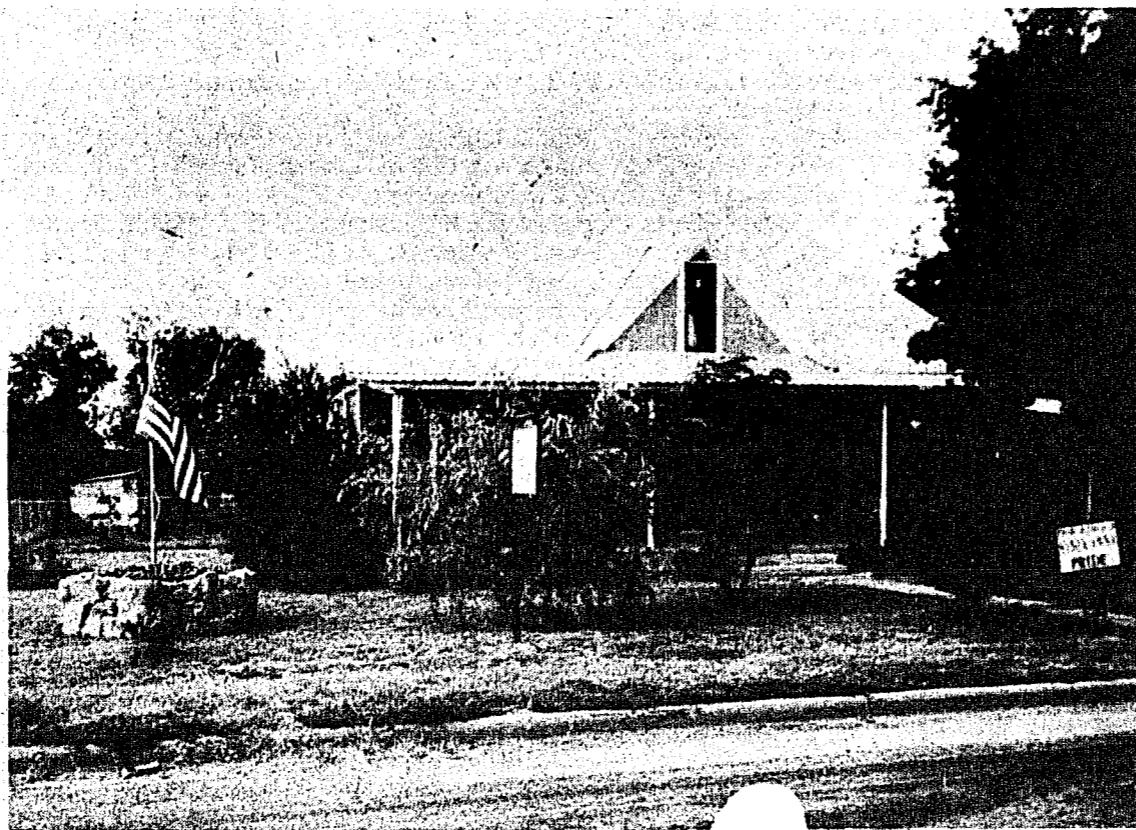

Dr. J. Ray Martin Dies

Director Of Santa Anna Bank

Dr. J. Ray Martin, a longtime Coleman County veterinarian and member of the board of directors of Santa Anna National Bank, died Tuesday, July 3 at his home in Coleman.

Born Jesse Ray Martin, June 1, 1925, in Rockwood to the late James R. and Millie Ray Martin, he was a 1942 graduate of Brownwood High School and a distinguished student graduate of Texas A & M Veterinary School.

He was a member and past president of the Coleman Chamber of Commerce, Coleman Rotary Club and the board of Trustees of Coleman County Independent School District. He was a member of A.V.M.A. and was on the board of directors of Santa Anna National Bank. He was a longtime supporter of the Coleman County Livestock Show, giving the grand champion lamb trophy since 1949.

He practiced veterinary medicine for 40 years in Coleman County. He was appointed to the Texas Animal Health Commission by

Gov. John Connally serving from 1963 to 1969. He also served on the State brucellosis Committee from 1976 to 1986.

Low Income May Be Eligible For Payment Of Medicare Premiums

Low income Texans may be eligible for payment of Medicare premiums (both Parts A and B), and the coinsurance and deductibles for Medicare covered services. Individuals who qualify for the special benefits must meet the following criteria:

—Persons must be enrolled in Medicare Part A.
—Persons must be at least age 65 or declared disabled by the Social Security Administration.

—Countable resources, such as bank accounts, real property other than homestead, etc., valued at not more than \$4,000 for an individual and \$6,000 for a couple.

—Gross monthly income cannot exceed \$491 for a single person or \$652 for a couple.

—Texas residents who meet this criteria should contact their local Texas Department of Human Services office to explore eligibility as a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary.

Price of the meal will be \$4.00 per plate. Seconds will be available.

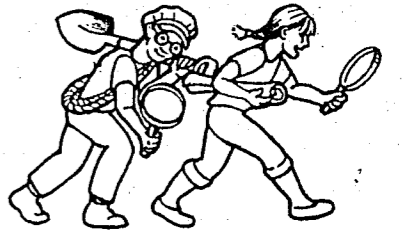

Thoughts From Our Pastors

CAN A SAVED PERSON EVER BE LOST?

Everywhere I find people troubled because they do not know but that any time, because of their sins, their negligence, the sudden besetting of temptation which they might not understand, they may lose the salvation which they have and so become the children of the Devil. Such Christians know that their own hearts are deceitful, they know that they do not deserve the mercies of God; and fear haunts them that they might lose their salvation and so, perchance die, to be forever lost. For such as these I write this message.

Many outstanding men of the Bible fell into grievous sin. Were these men saved? If so, did they become lost? Judas Iscariot is most often mentioned in this connection. He betrayed the Savior and I believe Judas went to Hell as a lost soul. Acts 1:25 says: "that he may take part of this ministry and apostleship, from which Judas by transgression fell, that he might go to his own place." On John 6:64-71 the Savior plainly tells us that Judas never believed and was never saved. Jesus knew from the beginning that Judas would betray Him, and He knew that Judas was a devil. READ WITH YOUR OWN EYES WHAT JESUS SAID ABOUT JUDAS IN THESE VERSES.

Judas was never saved, and so never lost his salvation. He never did believe in Christ, but was a devil; so when he died, he went to his own place. How can Judas be an example of a Christian losing salvation. Another thing to note is that Acts 1:17, & 25, is not talking about salvation or grace. Judas fell from or abandoned the ministry and apostleship, not salvation or grace.

Because of the lack of space, let me also share one Bible verse found in John 10:28. Speaking of His sheep, Jesus said, "And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall NEVER perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand." Notice a triple promise here concerning the security of God's sheep. First, Christ gives them "eternal" life. Second, they shall "never" perish, and third, neither shall any pluck them out of Christ's hand.

Friend, are you one of Christ's sheep? If so, you have eternal life; you will never perish and cannot be taken from His hand. The last promise is all the stronger when you notice in your Bible that the word "man" in this verse is in italics which shows it was not in the original manuscript of the Bible. Check all versions of the Bible, even the New King James version and you will find the words "no one" written. No one...either man or Devil...can take one of Christ's sheep from His hands. Notice our eternal life is in HIS HANDS not our hands. And for some more verses that show how powerful God's hands are read 2 Timothy 1:12 and Romans 8:38-39. The salvation of the true Christian is secure for time and eternity. Eternal security is not payment for human achievement. It is a gift of God's election to give salvation through Jesus Christ to those who accept it. It's through Jesus Christ, not human works or good deeds. The place of good works is after the salvation experience. They are the results of this experience and not the requirements for it.

Yes, there are other scriptures which some interpret as teaching one may lose salvation. And in the future I will review those scriptures and show you, by the Bible, why they don't teach that a person can not lose his salvation. Space does not allow me to do so at this time.

Until the next time, just remember, if you are a believer you already have everlasting life. I believe these scriptures teach the minute one believes in Christ he has everlasting life. These verses show it in the present tense. That means right now. John 3:36; John 6:47; John 5:24.

Police Report

Police Chief Carlos Torres has filed the following report of police activity in Santa Anna during the month of June.

Of the three arrests, two were on warrants, one from Parks and Wildlife and another on an assault which happened in May. The other arrest was for DWI and DWIs.

A subject was apprehended on the attempted auto theft but the victim did not wish to file charges.

The stolen auto was recovered in Brownwood shortly after receiving report from Santa Anna.

Torres reports one arrest is due very shortly on one theft case and the two other cases are still being investigated.

Burglary At Western Auto
Western Auto in Santa Anna was burglarized sometime during the night of Sunday, July 1. Missing were four tires, two car stereos, set of speakers and some cash. The burglary was discovered when the owners, Clint and Rita Day, arrived at the store on Monday morning. According to a check with the Sheriff's office Tuesday morning, the incident is still under investigation.

There was a rash of break-ins in the county on that night and the sheriff's office, which is investigating all the incidents, thinks it is possible they may be related.

A 1988 GMC pickup was stolen from the back lot at Taylor Motor company. It was recovered about noon Monday. It had been damaged. Two pickups belonging to Ken Baker of Burkett were burglarized. Cassette tapes and money were taken from both vehicles.

Coleman Butane Company had also been burglarized, the sheriff's office also receiving that call when the business opened for business Monday morning. Some cash was taken in that incident.

Sheriff Turner reported early this week that the theft of the pickup from Taylor Motor and a burglary at McCorkle Monument had been cleared up with charges filed against a 14-year-old Coleman youth.

Commissioners Keep County Going By Shifting Funds

The Coleman County Commissioners were able to dodge their financial woes one more time by shifting some funds during last week's meeting. All members of the court were present as they once again had to deal with the county's shortage of funds.

The "bail out" this time took place when they were able to transfer money from the Road and Bridge account to the General Fund. The \$10,000 transfer is a partial return of loans made several years ago by the General Fund to the Road and Bridge account. The amount of those earlier loans is thought to be in the neighborhood of around \$100,000. Some would place the amount at half that much.

The group also discussed some bridges as Linwood E. Howell Jr., a structural engineer with the State High Department, and Gene Christian of the local Highway Department staff reported results of a survey of conditions of bridges on Coleman County roads. Considerable repairs have been made on some of the bridges since the last inspection and the results were pleasing to the engineer.

Howell was concerned about the Waltrip Bridge, however, and advised that it be closed. He says the bridge is too high, too weak and too large a risk. He intends to make the same recommendation to the McCulloch County Commissioners. He recommended that the bridge be replaced with a lowered span since it would flood only on rare occasions now that the Freese Dam is in operation. The two counties will have to get together to plan and pay for the new structure, if Howell's recommendations are accepted.

A number of other bridges and their needed repairs were also discussed.

Three persons were selected to

serve three year terms on the County Child Welfare Board. They are Sidney Jewell who will serve a second term on the board, and Rena Croft and Nena Wilson who will begin their first terms on the board.

The members of the court discussed and approved an inter-local cooperative agreement that the 911

emergency number service for the county will be administered by West Texas Council of Governments.

The commission will hold a workshop July 11 for planning of next year's budget.

Postal Service Sets Entrance Exam

It has been announced that the Santa Anna Post Office will accept application from qualified persons interested in participating in an entrance examination to establish a hiring register for future appointments to Rural Carrier and Rural Carrier Associate positions at the following Post Offices: Ballinger, Bangs, Santa Anna, Coleman, Brady, Brownwood, Goldthwaite, Gouldbusk, Lometa, Milcs, Mullin, Richland Springs, Rochelle, Rowena, San Saba, Talpa and Zephyr.

Rural carriers starting salaries range from \$6,595 to \$28,579 per year. Rural Associate salary is \$10.91 per hour. The majority of vacancies filled through this register are for rural carrier associates which are relief positions only - working from 8-24 hours per week and/or relieving the regular rural carrier for vacation or illness only.

An announcement listing full details is posted in the lobbies of the above offices. Applications will be available from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon, Monday, July 16, 1990 through Friday, July 27, 1990.

Applicants may apply only one time, at only one of the offices listed, as this is for an area hiring register.

Applicants will be required to

take a written examination on a date to be announced. Applicants must have a valid state driver's license and a safe driving record. All rural carriers must furnish and maintain, at their own expense, vehicle equipment necessary for mail delivery. Rural carriers are given an equipment maintenance allowance based on the route evaluation.

Don't Bug Some Insects

Among all the animals in the world, about seven out of ten are insects. Most humans who find they share space with bugs, however, are moved to go on a killing rampage. That's not a good idea, says an insect researcher with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"I don't kill them," says Dr. Horace Burke. "Well, maybe if it's a flea." Except for the flea, Burke looks for the good in bugs...and finds lots of it. In fact, he would argue that humans could not exist without insects pollinating food crops, eating pesky bugs feeding larger animals or devouring carrion.

Burke explains humankind's ultimate need for insects, "When you take one group of organisms out, it changes another. Either we couldn't live without them or if we did, it would be a different world."

Local Republicans Attend State Party Convention

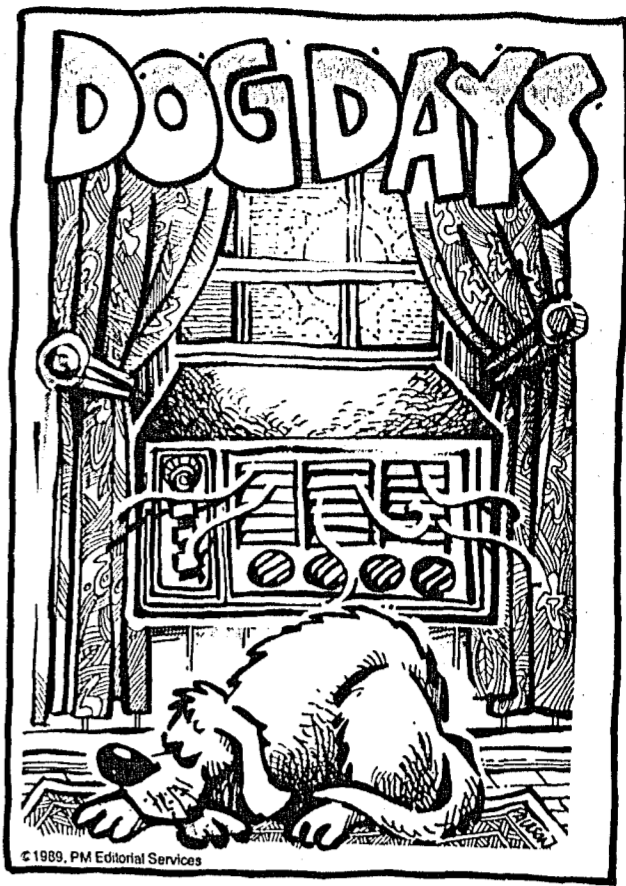

FUNGUS NAIL

If you have a thick, discolored, and crumbled nail it is probably the result of a fungus. The nail becomes abnormally thickened - as with onychogryphosis - but it also changes color, usually a mottled yellow and white.

There is a cautious, long-term treatment which can be tried and is sometimes successful. The doctor can remove as much of the nail as possible and then a fungicide can be applied. After that, the nail must be roughed with an emery board a few times a week and treated each time with the fungicide. Eventually,

ly, say after a year, the fungus infection may have disappeared.

It is also possible to treat fungus nail surgically. It is a simple procedure which is extremely effective. The nail doesn't grow back, and the skin toughens to protect the toe.
