Commissioners Must Make Decisions Soon For Reducing Budget

The Coleman County Commissioners Court is closer to the time when decisions for reducing the budget for the fiscal year that begins in October must be made. Those cuts will probably be dealt with at the August 13 meeting, according to a statement from Judge Pete Skelton. If not it may be the September meeting before all the information needed is gathered for making such decisions.

Involved is the county tax rate and jobs of 10 people. Indications are that the tax rate may be increased by only three percent, which can be done without a public hearing. Of course, the rate can be raised as much as eight percent without prompting a rollback vote. The county has lost about \$3 million in property valuations.

Under consideration are a number of jobs, and Skelton stresses that although the money problem is talked at practically every meeting, no firm decisions have yet been made. There is consideration of eliminating six full-time jobs, four of these coming from the commis-

sioner precinct crews, one in not replacing an employee at the courthouse who will retire at the end of the year, and another in eliminating a trapper position. Another alternative is to reduce three full-time jobs at the courthouse to half-time and the elimination of a current half-time job. Again, Judge Skelton stresses that no decisions have been made but the Court knows that some cuts must be made to reduce the budget by \$25,000. The budget for 1989-90 is \$1.7 million.

The commissioners have agreed to move money from the road and bridge funds to make up any deficit in the general fund. Actually, the road and bridge fund owes the general fund about \$100,000 which was loaned in the 1980's.

The judge and commissioners do not feel good about moves that must be made to reduce the budget and they have talked about that problem for months. Now, either this month or in September, they must face the decision making ordeal.

Members of Coleman County Electric Cooperative held their 52nd Annual Membership Meeting Friday night, July 20, at the Ballinger High School Auditorium.

Over 700 members and guests attended the meeting and listened to reports from the Board and Management, during the business meeting. It was the largest crowd to attend an Annual Meeting in over 25 years. Every member attending received a nice gift as an incentive to be present.

The Echo Rambler Band entertained with good, oldtime Country and Western music. Runnels County 4-H Club members served everyone free homemade ice cream, homemade cookies and punch, courtesy of the Cooperative. The group also witnessed an impressive demonstration on the hazards of electricity, put on by the Texas Job Training and Safety Center and Coleman County Electric Cooperative linemen.

Members elected three directors to serve for three (3) years or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified to-wit: District 1- Roger Bryan, District 5- Johnnie Henderson and District 8- Helen Bragg.

The meeting ended with a drawing

for over fifty prizes donated by the cooperative and by business friends of the Cooperative from across the state. Each business was recognized individually for the gift it contributed.

A special thanks from the members, board, management, and employees were expressed to all who had a part in making the Cooperative's 52nd Annual Membership Meeting another success. Members are urged to make plans now to attend next year.

This week's meal will be a potluck affair and everyone is welcome to bring a dish and join the group for a good time at noon, Thursday, at the Mountain City Community Center.

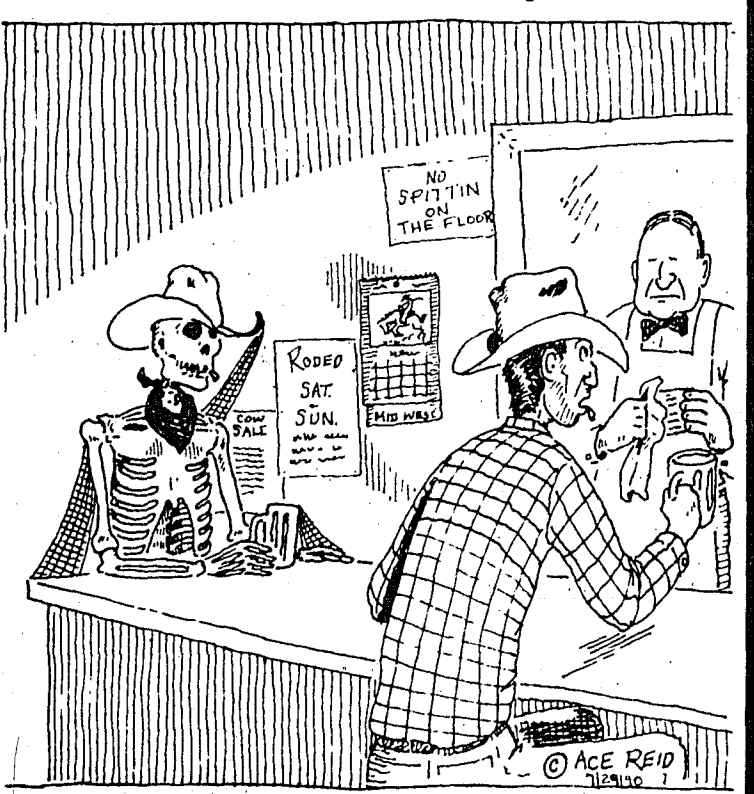
Methodist Circle Studies Love

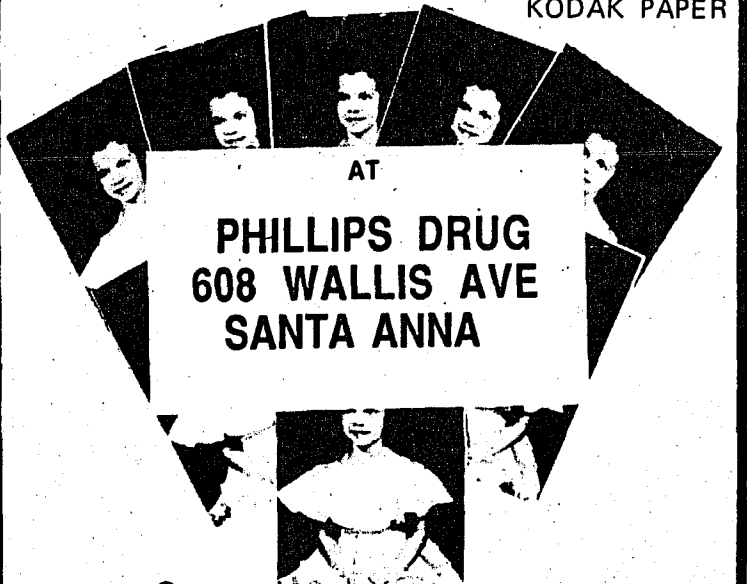

During the recent Funtier Day celebration, we were presented with a copy of a cookbook compiled by Bill and Geneva Garrett, and Rita and Clint Day. Copies of book were included in a complimentary gift bag to exhibitors in the Funtier Day tractor show.

Along with some truly "old time recipes" are some home remedies for taking care of all kinds of ailments from Rheumatism to worms, for complexion problems, etc.

For instance, the next time you have swollen feet you may want to try soaking them in skunk oil and kerosene until you can see the swelling go down.

Many in our community have been fighting with bouts of pneumonia. According to this little book, a fine treatment would be to slice onions and bind them to the hands and feet with a cloth to draw out the fever. Also, you can eat garlic to kill germs, for an antibiotic and for high blood pressure.

A remedy for bleeding is to take nine drops of the person's blood, drop it onto a rock and then bury it.

To cure worms, eat sardines in oil...or take 1/2 oz. pumpkin seed, pounded fine and mix with 1 oz. sugar. Take one teaspoon of this mixture every two hours until you have taken it all. Then take a dose of castor oil and spirits of turpentine. Stay close to home for a while. The last instruction, sounds like good advice!

For Rheumatism, take one tablespoon of lemon juice, two table-
spoons of cold water and a little sugar, every hour. Or just eat a lot of celery.

To get rid of warts, mix one tea-

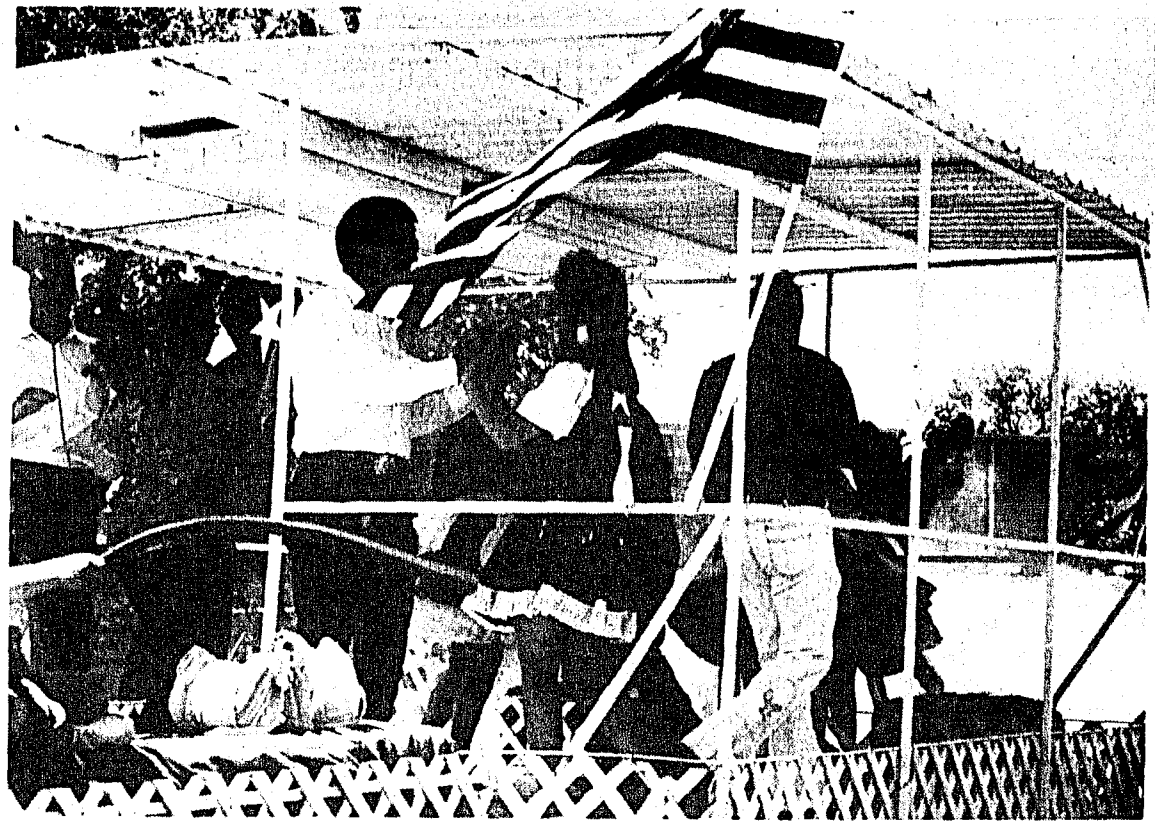

Income Tax Anniversary

August 5 marks the anniversary of the federal income tax. Signed into law by Abraham Lincoln in 1862, the tax was levied as an emergency wartime measure only. Persons with incomes over \$600 paid a 3 percent income tax, and those with yearly incomes over \$5,000 paid 5 percent. The first tax went into effect Jan. 1, 1862, and was repealed in 1872.

An income tax again was enacted in 1894 by President Grover Cleveland. However, the Supreme Court declared it unconstitutional because it was a direct tax, levying a 2 percent income tax on all persons with yearly incomes over \$4,000. This forced income tax supporters to seek a constitutional amendment that would give Congress the right to impose income taxes without apportionment among the states. In 1913, the Sixteenth amendment was ratified by the states, and a new

The Allen brothers, land speculators who founded Houston, encouraged Sam Houston to establish the capitol of the new republic in their own town. Houston "was, predictably, enchanted with the idea of a capitol city named after himself." The Allen brothers even promised to build the capitol at their own expense, so Houston City was named capitol of Texas in late 1836.

The first boatload of goods headed for Houston was brought up Buffalo Bayou in January 1837 by New Orleans merchant Frank Lubbock. He missed the site entirely and continued upstream until he ran out of bayou. He backtracked until he found the landing, which turned out to be a narrow path leading up the bank. When the first legislature convened in May, 1837, the capitol was still unfinished and carpenters lashed tree branches to the roof for shade.

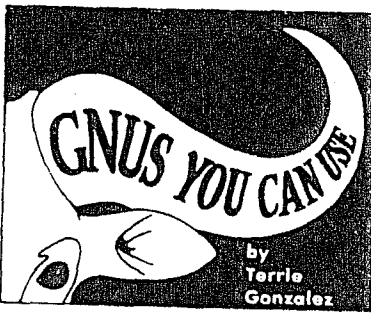
