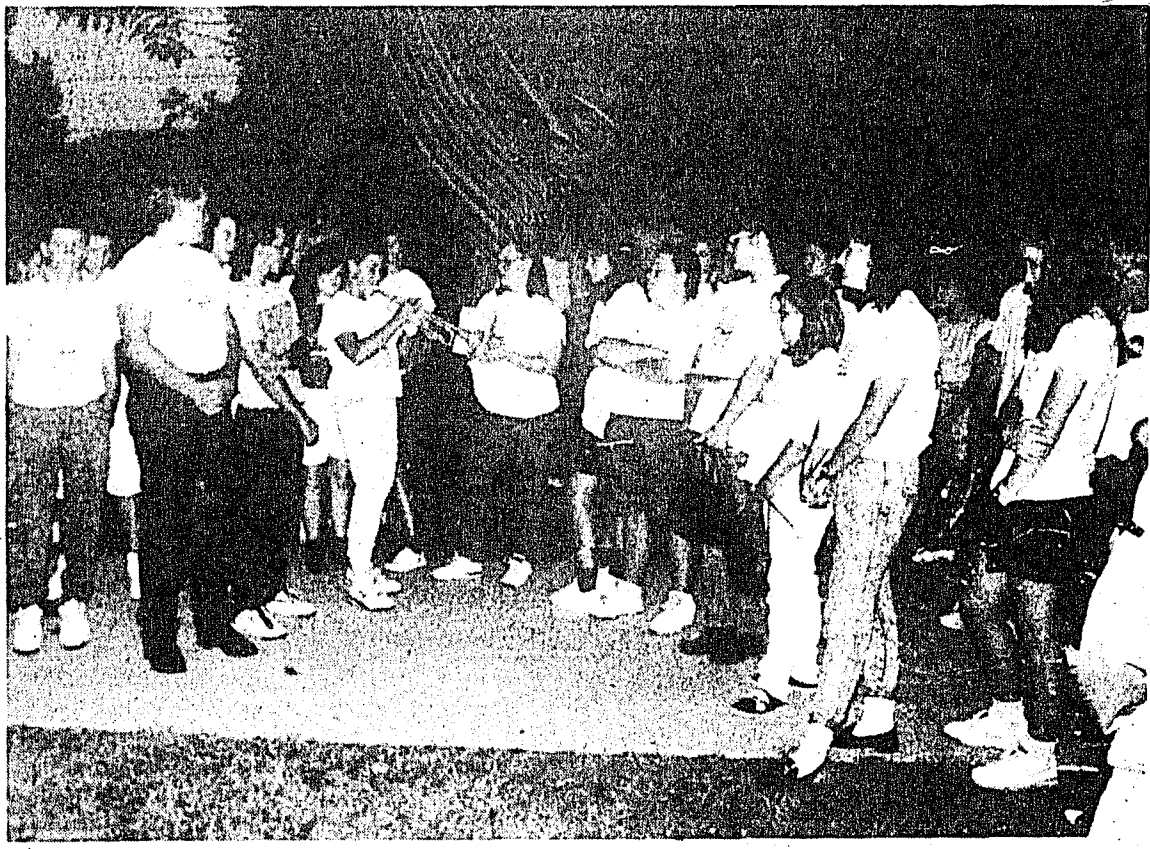

## Council Says Water Customers Responsible For Repair If They Break Meter Cut-off

Mayor Gale Brock called the city council meeting to order on Tuesday evening of last week with all members present except Quinton Daniel, who was out of town on business. Other city officials present were secretary Alys Pelton and Supt. of Operations Derriell Warnock.

Collier Watson presented the audit as of March 31, 1990. He reported that all-in-all, the City had a pretty good year. The General Fund made \$662.85, which is good considering the fact that the fund is supported by taxes and very little revenue from other sources, "but out on numerous expenses of departments designed not to make money, expected to only break even - such as the police department, street department, utility dept., etc." Councilman Hays made the motion to accept the audit as presented. A unanimous vote followed the second by Spillman.

Supt. of Operations Derriell Warnock made the council aware of some recent problems with meter cut-offs. Water customers have been using the City's cut-offs when they need to shut the water off for repairing leaks and such. Mr. Warnock

stated that it costs the City about \$55 in parts and labor and machinery use when the City has to repair or replace the cut-offs. He asked the council for recommendations on how to handle the situation. It turns out that the City has an ordinance concerning that matter, put into effect when the current water system was installed

in the late 70's. It stated that the consumer should have a water cut-off on his side of the meter. Councilman Hays made a motion to the effect that if the consumer did not have his own cutoff he should be responsible for the expenses incurred if he breaks the city's cutoff.

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## Didn't It Rain!

The rains came to town Saturday evening late and in a period of about two hours about four inches of hard rain had fallen in the city. The official report from Raymond Balke gives 3.4 inches for that period. Others reported anywhere between 3 inches and 4 1/2, and rural areas apparently received very little if any rainfall. All we know for sure is that the water sure came down!

The official amount recorded for Sunday and Monday was 1.70 inches. There again others reported up to slightly over two inches for that period of time. Most immediate rural areas around Santa Anna reported anywhere from one to two



inches, for that Sunday and Monday period. Official rainfall total in Santa Anna the year to date is 30.46. Average yearly rainfall for this area is 26 to 27 inches so we are well above that mark at this point.

## School Goes To Half-Day Kindergarten Classes

Due to an oversized class, the school board had to decide last week whether or not to hire another teacher or to change the 25 member Kindergarten class to half-day sessions, dividing it into two groups. The State allows for classes to be no more than 24 students. The board determined that it was financially expedient in this day in time when our school along with all others in the state are facing financial struggles, to change to half-day classes rather than hire a second teacher. There is no state policy that kindergarten has to be a full day class. That decision can be made by each local district.

Upon return to open session following an executive session, the motion was made by board member Marty Donham, seconded by Ruth Ann Wise to go to half-day for the Kindergarten. The vote was unanimous. The class was to be divided at the discretion of administrators, with one group attending class in the mornings and the other in the afternoon. The half-day session began Monday of this week. Comments were heard from parents and

teachers in attendance at the meeting before the board went into the executive session which is approved and required by Open Meetings Act, Article 6252-17, Texas Revised Civil Statutes. The financial status of the school had also been discussed before the board went into the executive session.

In the case of the second grade class, which is also oversized with 30 students enrolled, the board found itself having no other choice but to hire a second teacher as soon as possible and divide that class into two groups. All grades above kindergarten must attend full days. The motion to take that action concerning the second grade came from Donham and was seconded by Wise, passing unanimously.

In other action taken at the Tuesday night, September 11, meeting, the board decided to table the project of re-roofing Perry Gym. Superintendent Brister told the board that he has been informed by TASB (Texas Association of School Boards) that any building projects over \$8,000 must have drawings

## Thoughts From Our Pastors

Jesus used two great symbols for Christian commitment. The first is quite familiar to us; the second is virtually unknown. The first is a cross. The second is a yoke. Some people wear crosses as ornaments around their necks, and crosses are commonly found on the steeples of churches everywhere. The cross more than anything else is a symbol of Christianity.

The yoke, however, is almost unknown among Christians. I have never seen a yoke worn as an ornament around a person's neck or placed on the steeple of a church. Yet it, as much as the cross, is a symbol of commitment to Jesus Christ.

Jesus spoke of the cross when He said, "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34). He spoke of the yoke when He said, "Take my yoke upon me and learn of me" (Matt. 11:29).

The cross is an instrument of death; the yoke is an implement of toil. The cross is a symbol of sacrifice; the yoke is a symbol of service. The cross suggests blood; the yoke suggests sweat. Put them both together and you have an idea of what Christian commitment is all about.

To be committed to Jesus Christ means that we are ready for either the yoke or the cross. We are ready to bleed for Him or we are ready to sweat for Him. We are ready to sacrifice or we are ready to serve.

Jesus called us to a yoke when he said, "Come unto me, all ye who are heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly of heart; and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (Matt. 11:28-30).

This is one of the clearest calls to personal commitment to be found in all the Scriptures. These words were addressed to people who were weary and defeated by life, and their religion was of no help to them. Instead of helping to lift their burdens, it added to them. Their ceremonial, legalistic religion was like weights, not wings.

Jesus gave this great invitation to us all, as well as to those people. Many today do not know God the Father, and so they are restless, searching, and unfulfilled. They are not committed to any great cause and so their lives lack purpose and meaning. You might be like that yourself. If you are longing for rest from terror, power, and drudgery of sin, there is good news for you. Jesus invites you to come to Him. If you do, He will enable you to live abundantly, joyfully and triumphantly.

However, a word of caution is in order. You must first trust Him. Then you must take His yoke upon you. You must become his disciple. A yoke is a harness made of wood by which two animals are tied together to pull a load. The yoke suggests submission, obedience, and service. To take the yoke of Christ upon us means that we submit to His Lordship. It means that we surrender our lives to His Will. So Christ's call to commitment is a call to the yoke. It is a call to surrender, to submit, to yield to Him. This is God's great invitation to you. Come to Him - take His yoke upon you - learn of Him - and you will find abundant life (John 10:10).

Will you commit yourself to Him now?  
God Bless You - In The Name Of Jesus Christ.

## Around & About

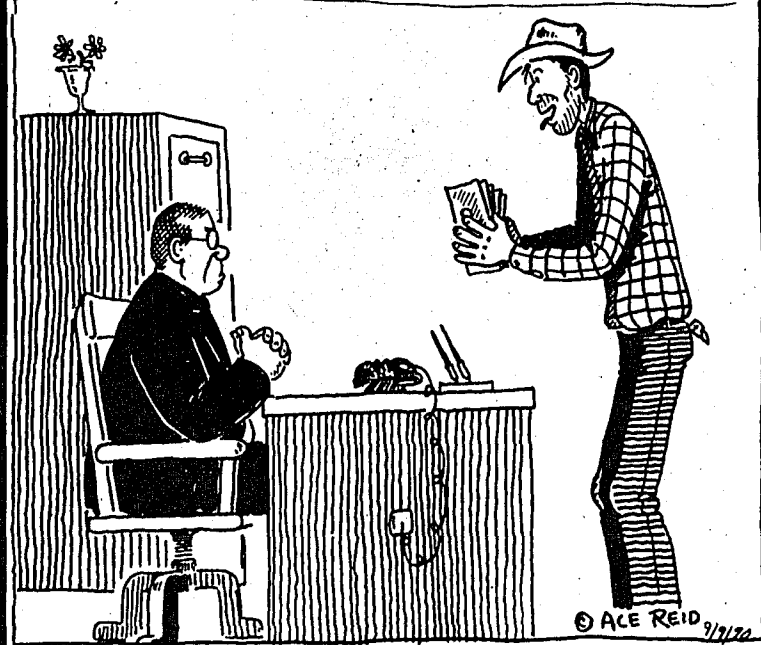

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$60.00 ± \$4.50 S&H. A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

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Mountainside Viewpoint

YOUR VOTE DOES COUNT!

When my husband and I had been married a little less than a year, my father-in-law was seeking re-election as county commissioner in Brown County, a post he held for many years until his death. We were living in Brown County and were registered to vote. At the time of the primary election, we were temporarily out of the county and almost decided not to return in time to cast our votes. However, in the end we decided to make the trip to do our duty. As it turned out our favorite candidate avoided a runoff by two votes. That incident impressed on me forever, the importance of my vote.

Through the years there have been more than a few elections decided by only a small margin of votes. Don't let your vote be the one that was not cast because you were not registered or because you did not take this privilege seriously enough.

Every Texan's life will be affected by the decisions made in Austin over the next few years. If you have not already registered to vote in the November 6 general election, do it now so you can have a part in helping to see that your opinions are heard by voting for the person you feel best represents you.

You may not be all that enthused about the type of campaigns now being conducted by candidates in our state, but that is no reason not to vote. Sooner or later, there will be an issue that you feel could have been handled better by one or the other, and you will regret not having done your part at the polls. Even though you may at this time have lost faith in the candidates or even in the political system in general, it will one day make a difference who is elected in November.

In 1986 - the last time Texans elected a governor - only 47% of those who were registered turned out at the polls in the general election. Each of us, as concerned citizens of our community, state and country, should be involved in helping to get dropout voters back to the polls.

Voting is the most important thing we as citizens can do.

If you have never registered to vote, you have until October 7 to do so. If you do not have the current voter registration card which is salmon and white in color and are not sure if your registration is up to date, you may call the Tax Assessor's office, 625-2153, and find out. 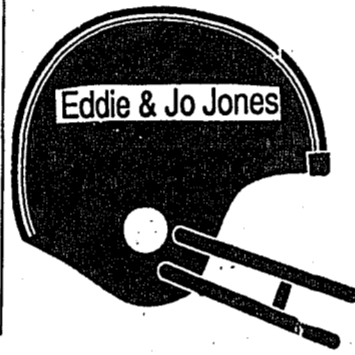
## Mountaineers Climb Second Rung Of Ladder To The Top

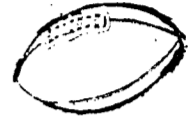

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1990

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**  
Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

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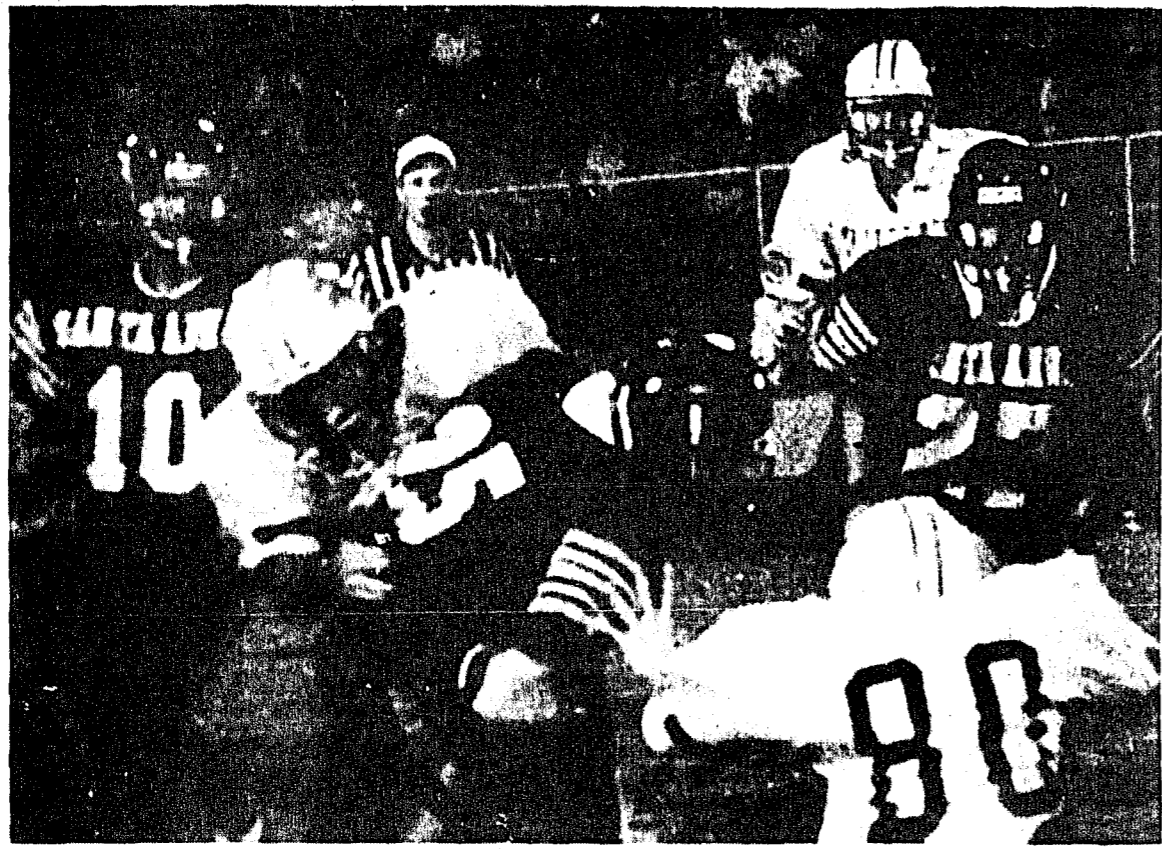

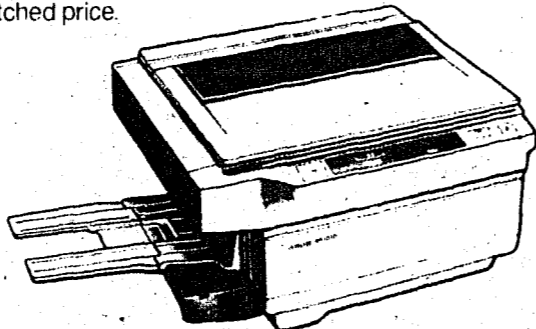

7. The building will be open to the public from 11:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

8. Entries will not be released before 3:00 p.m., but should be picked up by 3:30 p.m.

9. Only one entry will be accepted from any individual in each class, except for grandparents brag department.

10. Exhibitors are responsible for completing an entry form for each

item exhibited. Items left without a completed entry form will be disqualified.

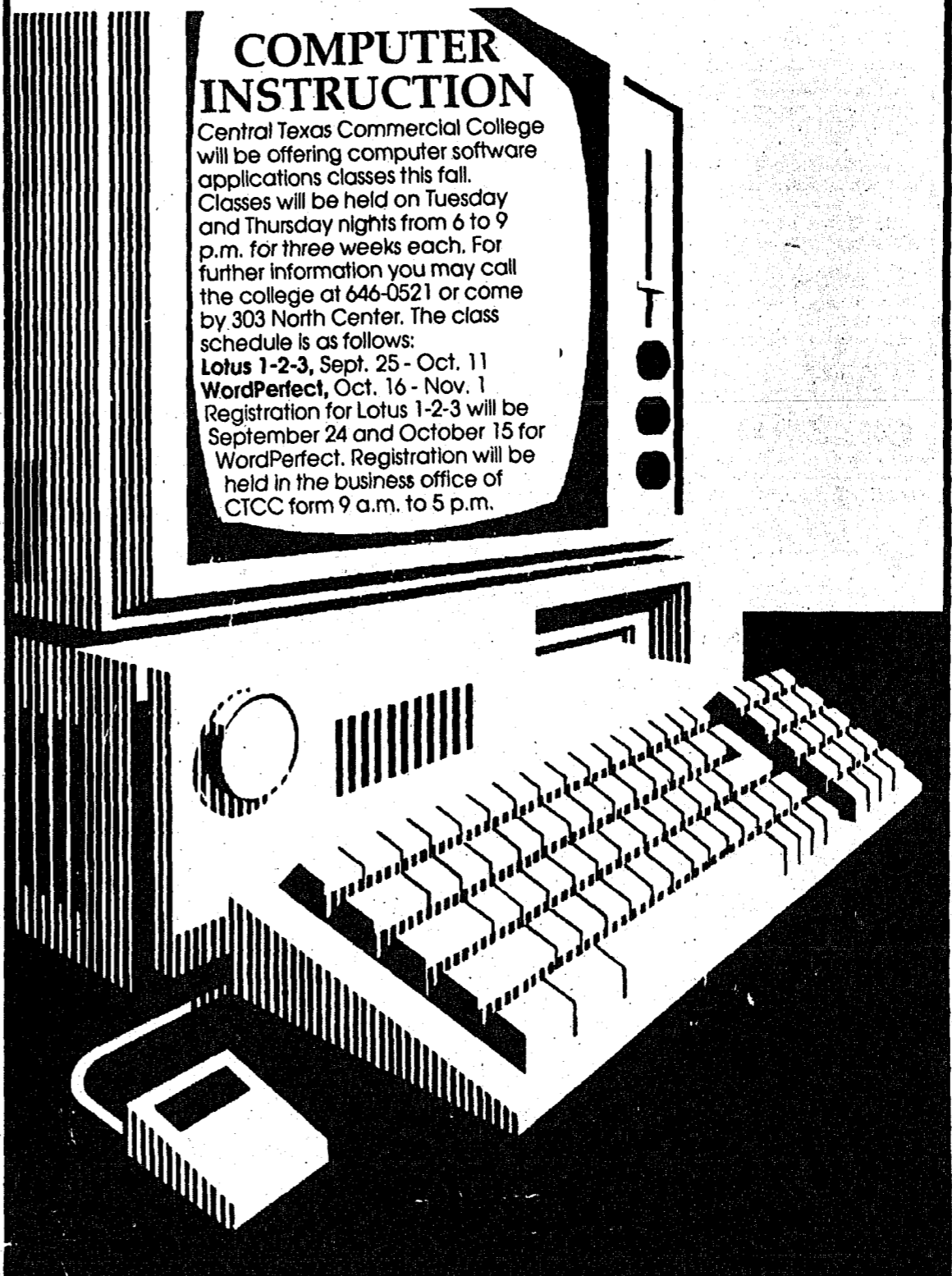

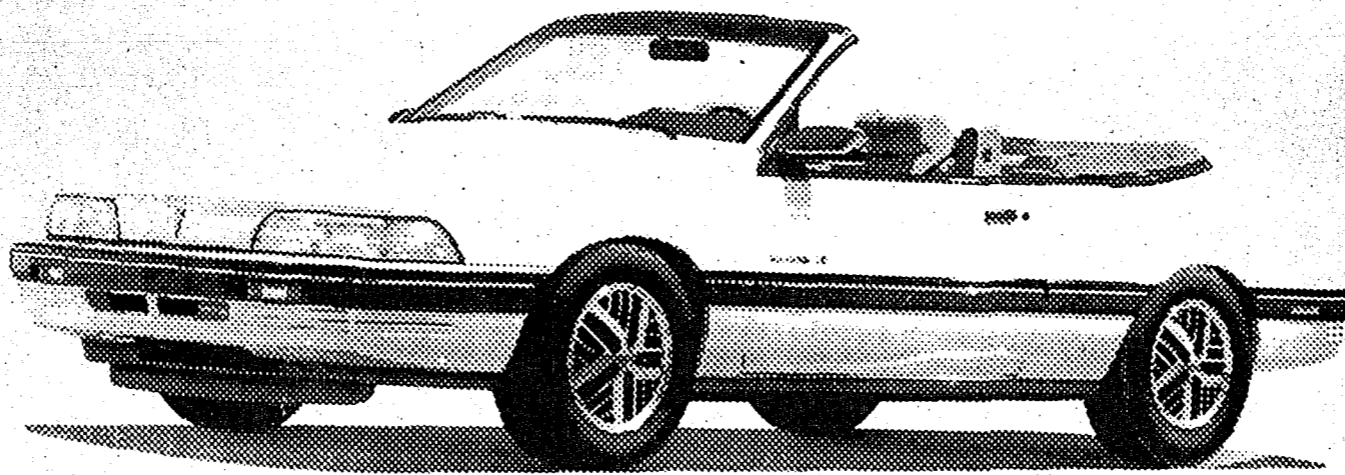

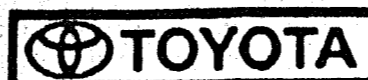

ended by Simmons, unanimously carried.

Citizen John Morris came before the council to ask if something could be done concerning a drainage ditch. He gave each member of the council a letter saying that the letter contained what he wanted to say. Mayor Brock informed Mr. Morris and the council that the matter was already under advisement and that the City's insurance carrier had also been informed on the matter.

Councilman Emmitt Simmons brought several citizen concerns to the attention of the council. Two from the Fire Department were that a fire plug on the Brady Highway that had been hit by a vehicle in 1988 and had not as yet been replaced although there was a fire plug at the City yard; and the question of whose responsibility is it for flushing out the hydrants.

Council Simmons was informed that the fire plug in question is operable and that the fireplug stored in the City yard is for emergencies only. Concerning the flushing of fireplugs, the City crew has been taking care of that job and will continue until all have been flushed out.

Simmons also expressed a citizen concern about a stop sign placed "30 to 40 ft." back from the intersection near Pelton's Service Station. Could the sign be used somewhere else to be more effective? He was informed that the sign had to be put that far back from the intersection due to the fact that the station's drive through area was on the corner and if placed there would be run over. Simmons' last citizen

concern was that of the sidewalk on the north side of Wallis between 1st and 2nd Streets. He was informed that if the property deeds were checked, it would probably be found that the property owner also owned the sidewalk and is therefore responsible for repairs. The matter was to be looked into.

Miss Pelton informed the council that the general ledger program for the computer has been installed and that Mr. Watson will be assisting her with processing data from April 1990 to the present in order to make the changeover from Mr. Watson's system. The change will not be immediate, as it will take some time to bring it up to date.

A speed limit ordinance from Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Safety was brought before the council. The ordinance will affect the speed limit on Wallis Ave. The speed limit will be changed from 30 miles per hour to 35 as required by the state ordinance. A motion by Simmons and second by Morris cleared the way for a unanimous vote in favor of adopting the ordinance with the Mayor's signature. Councilman Spillman stated that he reluctantly approved this ordinance.

The janitorial service for the armory will be put up for bids.

Questions regarding the new sewer rate were discussed. Mayor Brock stated that the sewer rate based on the amount of water consumed was legal and was being done around the state in many other cities. She had received a letter of opinion from the City's Attorney that stated the charges were legal as long as they were "reasonable rates" according to state statute.



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


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
