Pled Piper Anniversary

Sunday, July 22, is the anniversary of the famed "Pied Piper" incident. According to 16th century accounts, on July 22, 1376, citizens in the rat-infested. German town of Hamelin bargained with a pied piper to lure the rodents out of town with his music.

Sewer & Sanitation Will Go Up

City Forced To Raise Rates

When the Santa Anna City Council met in regular session on Tuesday night of last week, Mayor Brock called the meeting to order with all council members present. Also present were City Secretary Alys Pelton, Sup. of Operations, Derriel Warnock and Police Chief Carlos Torres.

An unpleasant task rested with the council, that of raising the sewer and sanitation rates in Santa Anna. According to Derriel Warnock, Supt. of Operations, much deliberation and weeks of research went before the action the council was forced to take in order to keep the sewer and water system in operation under the control of the City of Santa Anna.

The dilemma the city officials faced was due to the fact that the

rates charged in the past few years had not kept the system self sufficient as is required by General Electric Credit Corporation, who purchased 1966 and 1979 City of Santa Anna bond notes from Farm-

ers Home Administration.

A rate covenant agreement with GECC requires "sufficient revenues be generated each year to cover CONTINUED PAGE 3

A fire that destroyed a 100-yearold building in downtown Coleman early last Friday morning was still under investigation Monday by Coleman Fire Marshall Joe Watson and the State Fire Marshall. The fire toll took three buildings. All three, located on Commercial Ave., were entirely gutted.

Watson said that the State Fire Marshall's office had sent representatives to the burned out buildings Friday and they were expected to return on Monday.

Flames discovered around mid-

The City of Santa Anna will be







The sanitation rate will jump from \$6.00 plus tax to \$8.50 plus tax.

(Sanitation service fees are taxable under the state sales tax law). Commercial accounts will be raised 40% on sewer and approximately \$42% on sanitation depending on the current rate charged.

New Joan Of Arc Theory

Joan of Arc may have received her celebrated angelic visions not from heaven but from a mild case of epilepsy, according to a new theory by two California re-

searchers. Dr. Lydia Bayne, assistant professor of neurology at the University of California-San Francisco, told a recent scientific meeting that the transcript of the saint's 1431 trial points to a type of epilepsy marked by "complex partial seizures.'

Joan reported she was enveloped in an "aura" and listened in ecstasy to the voices of angels whenever she heard church bells clang. A small proportion of mild epileptic seizures, roughly matching Joan's description, are sparked by specific sounds, Dr. Bayne said.

The trial transcript, in which French church inquisitors condemned Joan for heresy, was examined in detail by Berkeley writer Elizabeth Foote-Smith. The two researchers jointly devised the epilepsy theory.

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


