County Considers Unified Law Agency

The feasibility of combining the Coleman County Sheriff's department and the City of Coleman Police Department is being considered by the Coleman City Council, which last week appointed a threemember committee to study the proposal.

According to Sheriff Wade Turner, if the consolidation occurs, the Coleman County Sheriff's Department would be the agency to over see law enforcement in both the county and the city.

Currently, the sheriff's department consists of three deputies. The Coleman Police Department has nine officers including the Chief of Police.

Turner explained that the Coleman City Council first approached him about such a merger when he tool office two years ago.

He went on to explain that "It wasn't the council as a whole that approached him at that time, but various council members." Now it seems that the whole of the Coleman City Council is interested in pursuing the possibility of a com-

Anna?" was the question posed to Sheriff Turner Monday morning by this writer. Turner answered that depending on what steps the Coleman Council takes, he is interested in meeting and talking with the Santa Anna City Council concerning the proposal. "I feel, as I have always felt, that what the folks in Santa Anna want and need is also very important to me and my department," Sheriff Turner said.

"My thoughts about the proposal are that this combined law enforcement agency would be an economic savings to the people of the county and to Coleman and Santa Anna, explaining that Coleman County would be supporting only one law enforcement agency.

Turner said that if and when this combined agency is formed, the Coleman County Sheriff's Department would require more than the three deputies now on the payroll and that the plan being considered would include all the police officers on the payroll of the cities. Santa Anna at this time has only one pobined city-county law enforcement lice officer, Carlos Torres, who, says Turner, is already working If the proposal becomes a reality, very closely with the sheriff's department and has been a big help to them in many instances.

Dear Editor

I believe the people of your community need to be alerted to a potential danger that is not adequately addressed by Texas law.

Last month my mother suffered a life threatening blood infection while on the highway near Santa Anna. It was very late at night, and she appeared to be dying. My father and I called for an ambulance. We waited twenty horrifying minutes and none came even though an ambulance service located only two blocks away was summoned by a police dispatcher. Although neither my father nor I has any medical training we had to tend to her ourselves as best we could and rush her to the nearest hospital that we knew of, where upon arrival she had no discernable blood pressure and was totally unstable.

Since that time I have communicated with the Texas Health Department about this. I was told, incredibly, that in Texas ambulance services are not required to respond to emergency calls. This is a situation that should....must....be changed, whether by law or by policy. My mother survived. The next person in need may not be so fortu-

Mountainside Viewpoint By Polly Warnock

Ours was certainly a mountainside viewpoint during the past week as we wandered over, around and even through (via tunnels) the mountains of "Colorful Colorado".

Yes, for those who have been asking if I ever got to make that sentimental journey back to the place of my childhood, we made it last week. And it was all I had anticipated it to be.

Leadville, nestled in a little valley encircled by some of Colorado's tallest peaks, is a breathtaking city of about 4,000 population and pride's itself as being "On Top Of It All", with an elevation of about 11,000 ft. It is one of Colorado's special places, a well-kept secret of avid outdoors seekers, history buffs and just plain sightseers. It is where I spent my early childhood while my father was employed at Climax molybdenum mine(at that time the largest in the world) a few miles to the north of Leadville. The area is also known for its number of silver and gold mines, as well as iron ore and coal. Leadville was once a booming town of 30,000, but as the minerals have declined, so has the population and it is now almost entirely a tourist site.

We took the tourist train through the mountains over the same tracks that once carried the work train to Climax. We camped at Turquoise Lake, a favorite fishing spot for my family in those bygone years. We awoke one morning to a 35 degree temperature and found sleet and light snow falling. Even so the fishermen were already in the lake, insulated by overall waders, after those prize fish. It was there where my father loved to fish for trout and Kokanee salmon. We never found Frving Pan Creek, another favorite spot I can remember, but we felt it better to not try some of the mountain passes we would have to take to get there over unimproved roads, especially in a motor home. And after some of the roads we travelled later which were improved highways, we certainly felt we made a wise choice not to tackle those particular trails.

In Leadville we were able to locate my childhood home and take a picture of the house. It had not changed much, even though it had undergone some remodeling. We also took pictures of the old St. Vincent's Hospital where my two sisters came into this world. Although a new hospital has since been built, the old building was still recognizable and was being restored for use as a museum as was the old Vendome Hotel where my aunt used to take me for the best ice cream cone in the world, found at the soda fountain in the lobby of

TREATING NAIL FUNGUS

If you have a fungus growth in one or more of your toenails, don't make the mistake of trying to find an over-the-counter prescription to cure it. A fungus condition of the nail is know as onychomycosis, and it frequently coexists with a similar condition between the toes or on the soles of the feet. It can also be a source of infection for other parts of the body. It is best left to the care of your podiatrist, who will determine the exact nature of the fungus and how it should be treated.

Only a few years ago, it used to be very difficult to treat a fungus growth under the toenail. Now it can usually be treated effectively over a period of time. Your podiatrist will probably want to take a

specimen of shavings from the nails of the affected toes and the debris that has been collecting under the nails. He'll use this material to grow a culture so he can verify his diagnosis. This will give the information he needs to select the best medication and treatment to solve the problem.
