BAPTISM OF THE HOLY GHOST

Many people have different ideas about the infilling of the Holy Ghost. Some say it was only for the apostles, others believe one receives this baptism when they are born again, others deny it altogether.

The reasons for not seeing the gift operate in the church are many. Some have allowed their love for God to grow cold and lost it completely. Others don't want anything they can't understand or control. We do not fully understand nor do we control it, but God makes it work in our lives as we pray and seek after Him. We must hunger and thirst after righteousness as Jesus said. The Apostles were commanded to tarry (fast and pray) in Jerusalem until they received power from on high. After Pentecost, most people fast and prayed before the spirit came. In Acts, chapter ten, the gentiles received this experience after much prayer and fasting.

We do not receive this experience as a result of salvation, though there is an operation of the spirit in its experience. The spirit (holy ghost) is the applier of the blood of Christ and regenerates our spirit. In the old testament age, hyssop, a type of the spirit was used to apply blood to the lentil and doorpost, at the passover.

There is and always has been a remarkable difference in people after receiving this experience. They are no longer satisfied with their tradition, but energized to go forth in the power of the spirit, as the apostle did.

The initial evidence of the experience is peaking in tongues, whether earthly or heavenly; as the spirit gives utterance. This is not something we learn how to do but is a result of the gift.

The spiritual baptism is in immersion in the spirit and was given to the church for its edification. Peter preaching on the day of Pentecost, Acts:2, said, "For this promise is unto you and your children, and all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord God shall call." It is not done away with as many believe but still is being received as in the past. The word said, "many would have a form of goodness but deny the grace thereof."

This experience is not limited to any church or sect, but comes as a result of longing for more of God. Many churches have experienced it thru the years as they begin to pray for something real.

It doesn't come to sinners but to the born again believers who want more. The Bible declares this spirit will not abide in the unclean temple (person).



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Council Meeting Pretty Much Routine

Mayor Brock called the meeting to order as the City Council met on Tuesday evening of last week. All members were present as well as City Secretary Alys Pelton and Supt. of Operations, Derriel Warnock.

After the routine reading and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, Eddie Dillard had an audience with the council to ask why his sewer rates had "doubled from one month to the next." Mayor Brock explained that the rate increases went into effect as of Sept. 1. She also stated that the increase was necessary to satisfy loan creditors and the Texas Dept. of Health. The additional funds were needed to satisfy loan agreements and to update the sewer farm according to state regulations.

Chief of Police Carlos Torres was unable to make the meeting, but his monthly report was reviewed by the council. It is published in its entirety elsewhere in the paper.

Derriel Warnock advised the council he had spent that morning meeting with West Texas Council of Governments in Abilene. He had made a presentation to WCTCOG concerning a community development grant, which if received, will be used for replacement of water lines and fire plugs. Concerning a grant and loan for the sewer farm through Farmers Home Administration, Warnock presented papers for the Mayor and Secretary to sign. Warnock had spent the afternoon with Joe Smith of First Southwest Company and stated that progress was being made on getting the grant/loan finalized and that work could be started on the project as early as February 1991. Councilman Spillman made the motion for the Mayor and secretary to execute the papers for the grant/loan. Daniel seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

After a motion by Daniel and second by Morris, the council gave unanimous approval to send Miss Pelton to an election school in Austin November 27-29. The Fire Department had asked to be on the agenda to make a request for funding for more fire hose, but a representative was not present and the council decided to table the matter until more information could be obtained regarding prices. Mayor Brock opened bids on the janitorial services for the armory. The group accepted a bid from Johnny Vasquez for \$5 per hour.

Mayor Brock suggested a limit should be set as to the maximum pay on routine maintenance and clean up. The maximum pay was set at \$25 per week or \$100 per month for routine work, with the idea that if Vasquez has to clean up after someone has used the building, the additional cleanup service will be deducted from the renter's deposit. Councilman Simmons made the motion to accept the bid with the maximum limit to apply. Daniel seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

The Senior Citizen group has two large fans for sale at \$200 each and they offered the City first choice. Since there are already two fans at the armory Morris made the motion to decline the offer at this time. Spillman seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Ordinances from the Texas Municipal Retirement System on updating services for employees were reviewed and the council decided to table any action until the November meeting.

After an executive session, the council returned to regular session.

Bills and accounts were approved for payment in the usual manner before the group adjourned.

Police Report

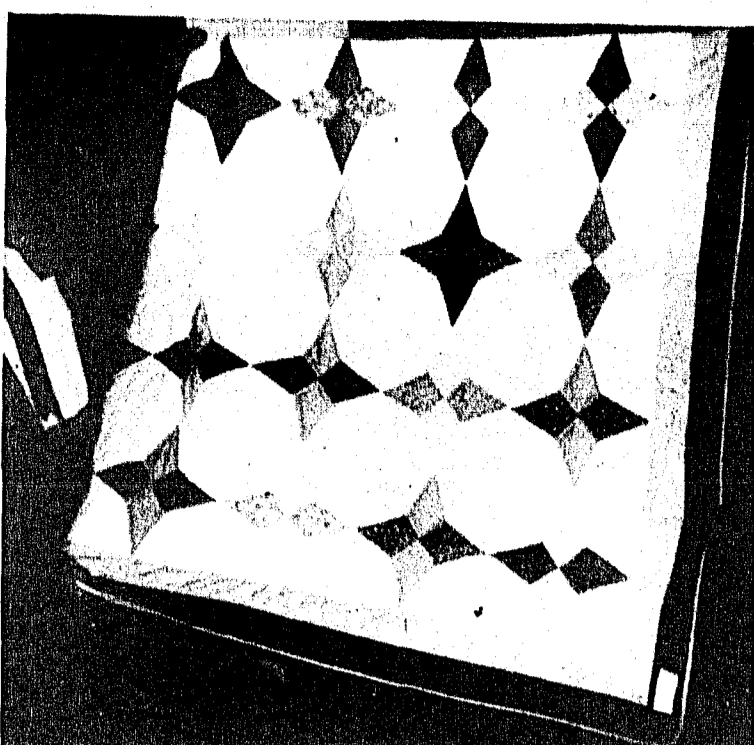
The following police report has been filed by Police Chief Carlos Torres as part of next week's report to the city council and pertains to activity on the police blotter for the month of September.

There were 43 calls answered. Total arrests were 2; ticket written 1; written warnings 4; accidents worked, 5; thefts, 5; criminal mischief, 3; and harassment, 1.

No cases were filed in municipal court for the month of September. One arrest was for public intoxication and one for DWI. Of the three thefts, one is being investigated; on the remaining two, one victim is satisfied that the property was returned, and restitution is being made for the other.

Other incidents reflect the following police activity:

- Assist motorists, 5; loud music, 3; juvenile problems, 1; animal violations, 2; livestock on highway, 3; gas drive-offs, 4; prowlers, 1; hot-rodding, 4; welfare concerns, 2; rattlesnake bites, 1.

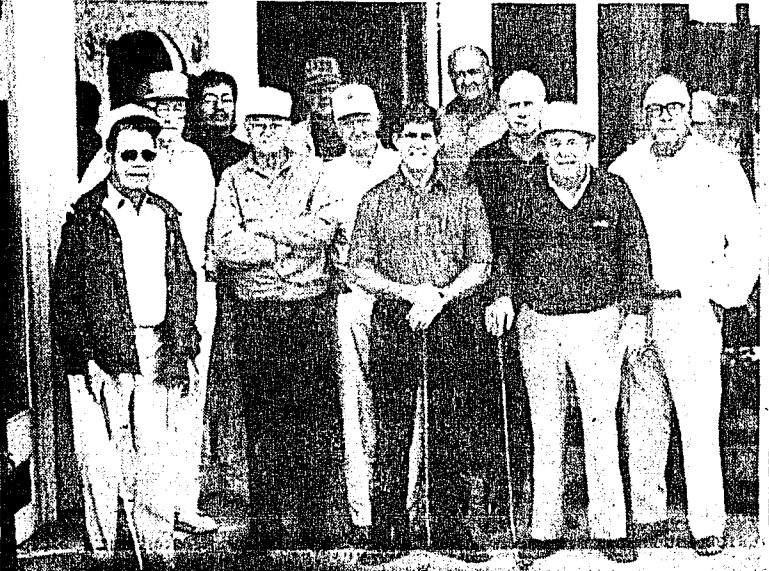

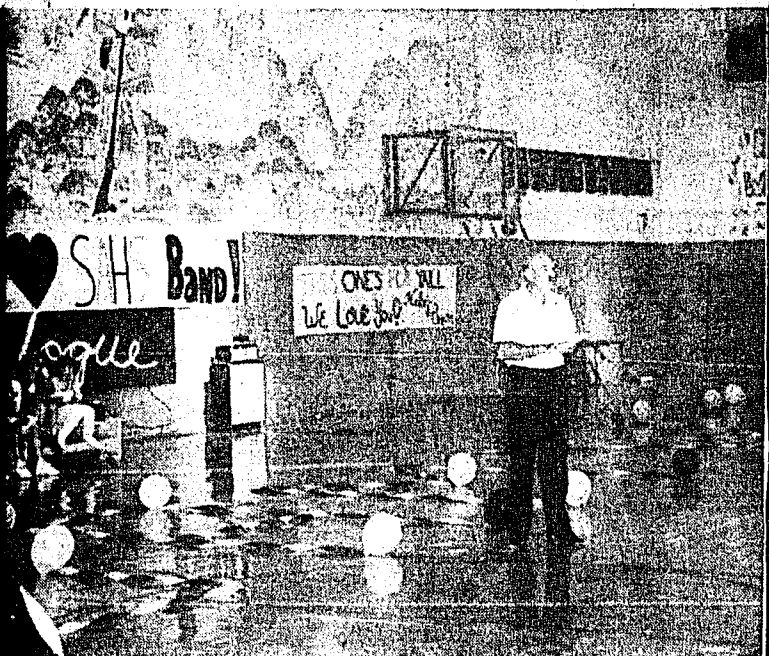

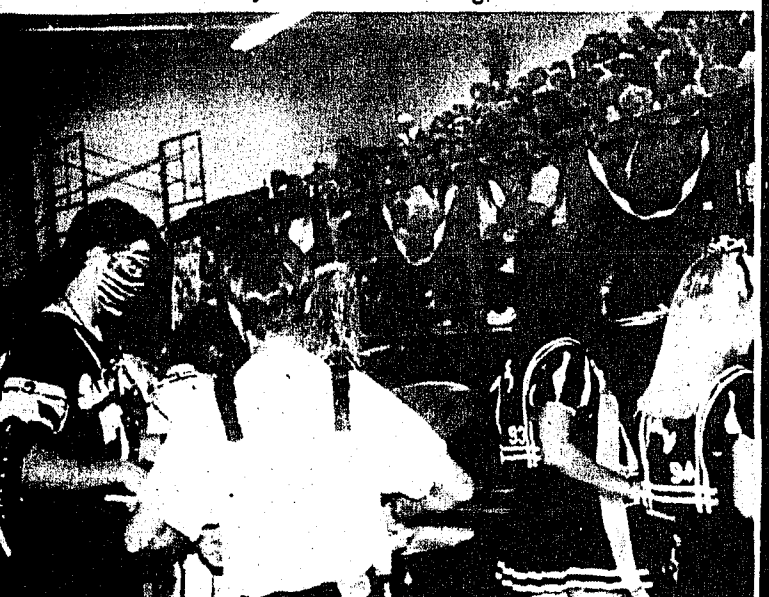
