LT. COL. W.C. (BILL) HORNE Santa Anna Graduate Leads Squadron In Middle East

Lt. Col. William J. Horne, U.S.M.C., a Marine pilot, leads an A-6 squadron of some 220 men and 8 women in the Middle East.

Bill, the son of Roy Horne, former resident of Santa Anna, and the late Mrs. Horne, is a 1964 graduate of Santa Anna High School. He graduated from the University of Arkansas in 1968 and immediately reported to NAS Pensacola, Florida for flight school. Bill has lived up and own the East Coast for years and had overseas tours in Viet Nam and Japan.

Bill has two children, Deidre and Terry. His wife, Dianne, is currently teaching in Japan for a year before retirement. Bill was scheduled to join Dianne in Japan this year, but with the trouble in the Middle East, was sent there instead.

Bill writes that they left Cherry Point, North Carolina at Midnight and flew a total of 23 hours with one layover. "The area here is desolate. It gets to 120 degrees during the day. During the sand storms, the visibility is about 1/2 mile. There are herds of camels outside the fence."

Bill had his 45th birthday after he arrived in the Middle East. He would welcome mail from his friends in Santa Anna. His address is:

Services Thursday For Students Killed In Car-Train Crash

Funeral services will be held at 4:00 p.m. Thursday at Mountaineer Stadium for two Santa Anna High School seniors who died Tuesday afternoon when the pickup they were in collided with a train on a county road near the Santa Anna landfill.

The popular young men, Byron Dowdy, 18, and Wesley Baugh, 17, were both stalwarts on the Mountaineer football team that this week is rated 10th in state by the AP polls. Dowdy was a running back and Baugh a tight end. Both did double duty by also playing on defense.

The accident happened at 1:55 p.m. The boys apparently did not see the train, according to DPS trooper Pat Salas. Nobody else was in the pickup, Salas said.

The conductor of the train, Scott Terry of Brownwood, applied emergency brakes but the train hit the truck and dragged it approximately 100 feet before coming to a stop. Both were thrown from the truck, according to Salas.

The two were pronounced dead at the scene by County Judge W.W. "Pete" Skelton.

Byron was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Dowdy and Wesley the son of Jerry Baugh, all of Santa Anna. Wesley's mother is a resident of Colorado.

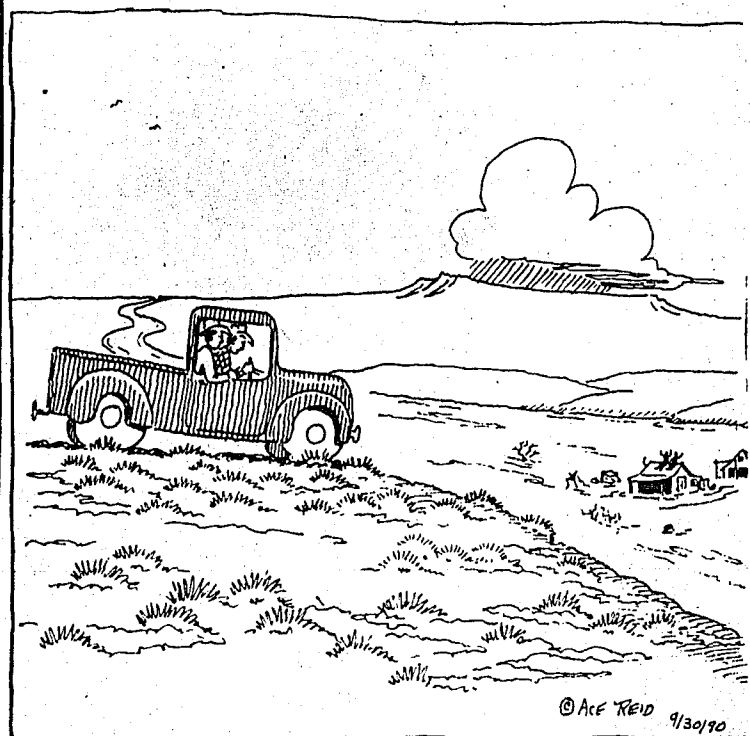

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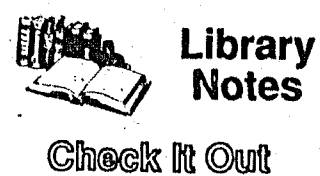

HAIL TO THEE, SAHS!

As we welcome returning Ex-Students of Santa Anna schools to our community for a weekend of getting reacquainted and reminiscing we can all look at our school with pride. Santa Anna schools are indeed example setters in the area. At the present time we are caught up in the excitement of an awesome football team. A team that will begin district play in this Friday night's homecoming game sporting a 5-0 record for the season and at the end of last week was rated 6th in state by Harris Rating System and 12th by AP. New ratings will have come out by the time you read this.

Mountaineer Herbert Jackson recently came close to an alltime state record in yards gained in a single game when he piled up 456 yards rushing in a recent game against Robert Lee. (Third in the state in Class A and 5th in the state overall). He totaled 561 when punt returns were added in. His total now for five games is 1164 yards rushing on 105 carries, an average of 11.09 yards per carry. He has eight punt returns for 258 yards, five pass receptions for 63 yards and two kick-off returns for 36 yards, to add to making his total yards 1521.

But Herbert has had lots of help from a bruising offensive line and a staunch defense that keeps handing the ball back to the Mountaineer offense. Of course, the other Santa Anna running backs are no slouches and could be the stars on anybody's team. The overall stats for the Mountaineer team is amazing. They have accumulated 112 first downs and have rushed 1994 yards. Coach Mike Permenter's infantry is clicking at 398.5 yards average per game! Defensively Santa Anna has yielded only 45 first downs and 552 yards rushing. They have outscored their opponents 234-34 in five games.

As one ex-student remarked last week, "I believe they may have the best team since the likes of Joe Bailey Cheaney and Albert Lowe wore the Black and Gold." Awsome Mountaineers Take On Eden After Slaming Gorman

What was supposed to have been a major test for Santa Anna at Gorman Saturday night turned out to be another romp for the awesome Mountaineers. Gorman was picked in pre-season polls to take their district and will probably do so, but Santa Anna proved to be too much for the Panthers as they raced to the endzone for a 34-7 win. The Mountaineers now boast a 5-0 record.

The outing spoiled Gorman's Homecoming just as Eden hopes to spoil the Santa Anna Homecoming this Friday night.

Herbert Jackson again led the Mountaineers in rushing by tacking on another 210 yards to his total bringing his yards gained for the season to 1173 in five games. He scored on runs of 15, 12, 53 and 52. His record so far has been two back to back TDS in the first half, of about 80 yards each. Last Saturday he cut that down to back to back at 53 and 52 yards.

Teammate Byron Dowdy scored on an eight yard run in the third quarter. Charles Dixon and Dowdy each added two-point conversions. Jackson and Dixon also had 2 interceptions each.

Gorman avoided a shutout by scoring on a one yard run in the second quarter.

The win was a defensive show for the Mountaineers with Paul Morris

leading the pack with 3 quarterback sacks, 8 tackles, 7 assists and he also caused a fumble. "The defense made turnovers happen, 6 turnovers for Gorman," said Coach Mike Permenter. "We stopped their option and for the most part, their passing game." He adds that Gorman is a good team and both teams played hard-hitting football.

Offensively the Mountaineers were able to score on the first drive as they have in every game this season. "And," says Permenter, "with the defense continually giving the ball back to us and doing a super job of blocking, we have had the talent to run inside and outside." "It sure feels good to be able to go into district play undefeated," he added.

The Homecoming game against will be the district opener and the Bulldogs were picked in pre-season to take the district crown. In fact, Santa Anna was chosen to finish third. So Permenter is cautioning his Mountaineers not to be over confident. Knowing Eden's reputation of being the spoiler, he wants the Mountaineers to be ready to play a tough ballgame.

The Bulldogs are "pretty much like Gorman as far as the plays they run and the formations they use," says Permenter. So the Moun-

taineers know something about what to expect from them. Eden's record is 2-3. However, says Permenter, they have played some tough AA teams and have had some hurt. He understands they are all healthy this week and will be ready for full go against the Mountaineers.

Permenter believes this game could actually decide the district championship, and we are counting on the Mountaineers to take that crown.

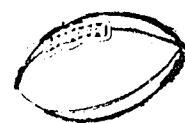

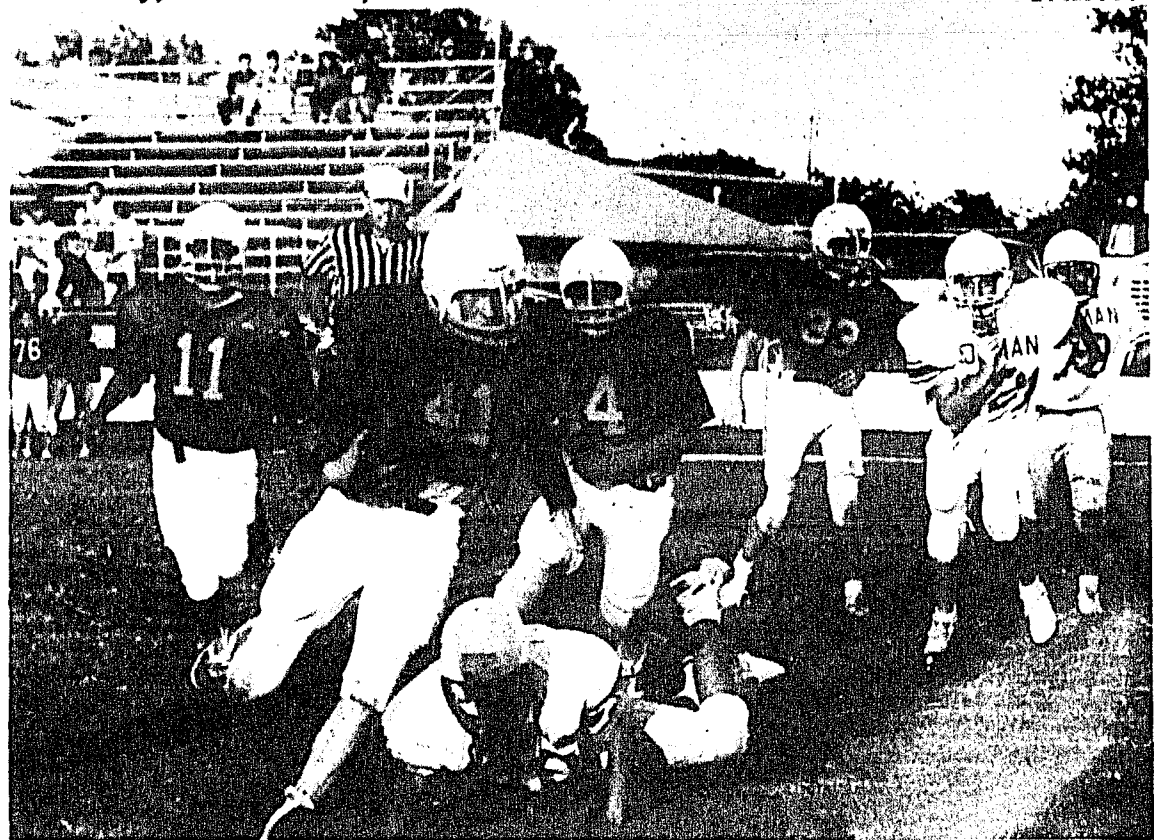

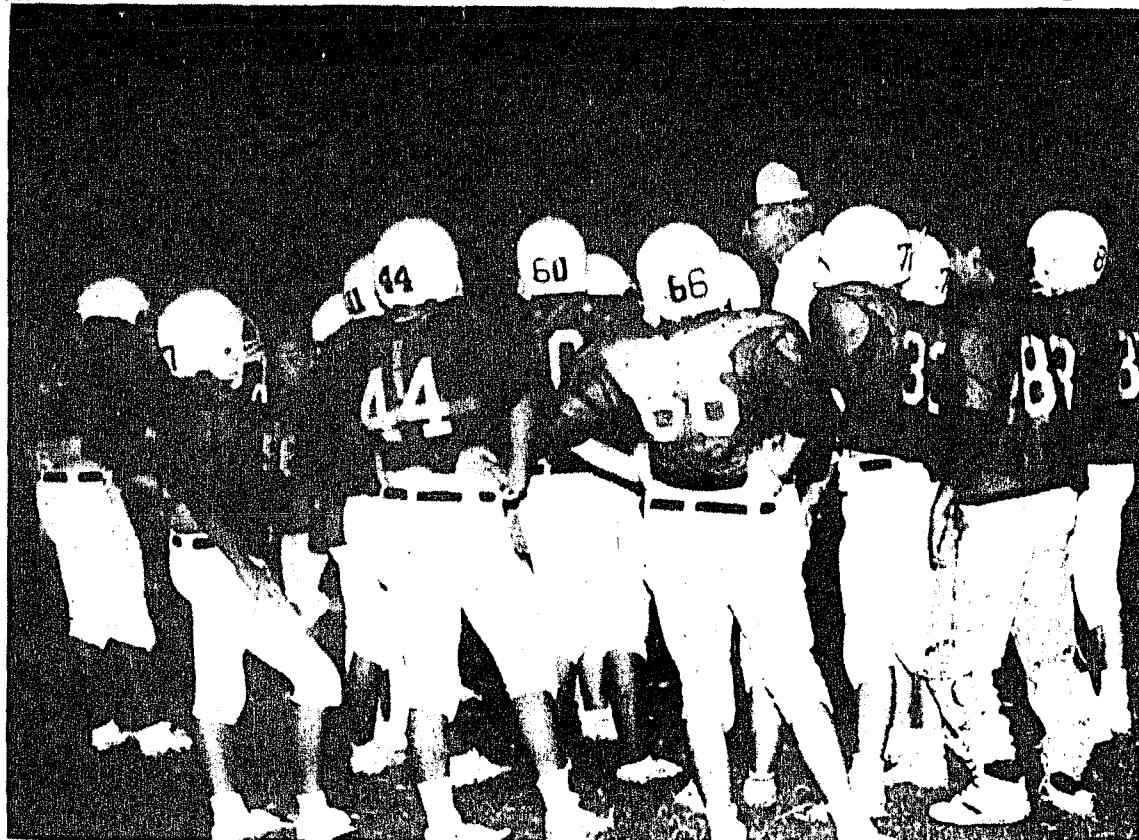

Charles had 124 yards rushing for the evening. Cecil carried the ball four times for 18 yards and Johnny Diaz carried it 10 times for 34 yards.

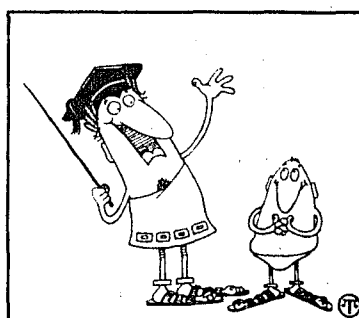

A Fast Lesson In Film Speed

Using the right tool for the job always makes sense. After all, you can use pliers to loosen a nut, but a wrench will do it better. It's the same with film. Choosing the right film for the right situation will help you take better pictures.



A lot of people are still confused about film, but you need to know just a few basics to make an intelligent choice. Films are usually differentiated by their "speeds." Measured in an ISO rating, a film's speed indicates how sensitive it is to light. The "faster" a film, the higher is its ISO number and the less light it needs to make a picture.

ISO 100 and 200 films are most useful in bright sunlight or when using a compact camera for flash subjects no farther away than about 10 feet.

But when you're shooting in dimmer light or want to freeze motion, it makes sense to move up to ISO 400. The extra speed extends the useful range of your flash. It also allows your camera to use a faster shutter speed, thus helping to stop a moving subject and minimizing the effects of camera movement as you take a picture.

For really dim light and in situations where a flash is either useless or not permitted, consider a very-high-speed film.

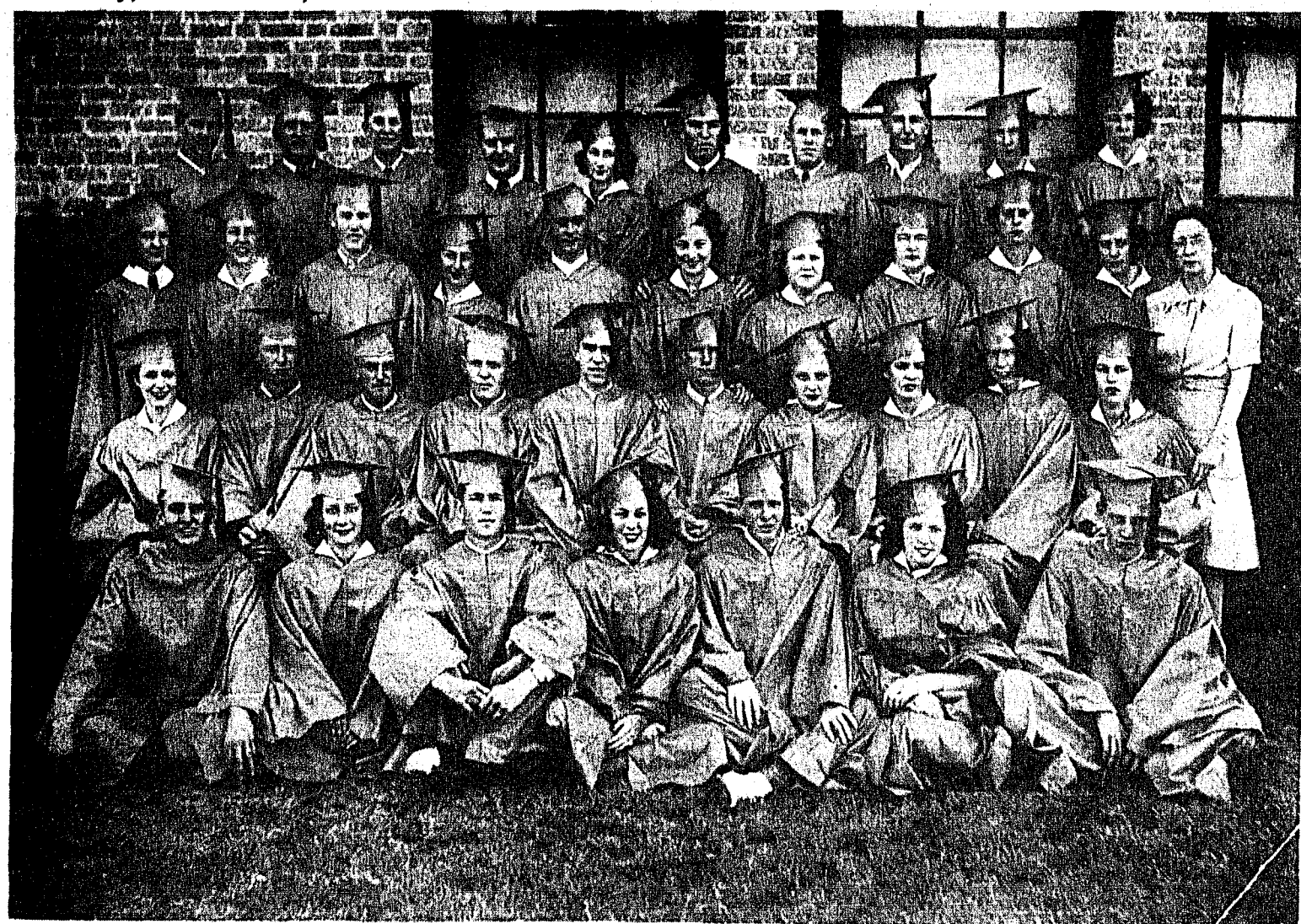

Class History Copied From Pages Of Santa Anna News, May 17, 1940

In the dim and distant past some little boys and girls sat on the hard seats watching the graduation exercises of the Santa Anna High School. Questioningly they sought their parents: "What are seniors? Are they really as important as everyone present at commencement night thought they were? When assured that seniors were important people, and that they were important because they had gone long days and years to school, and that all boys and girls dreamed of the day when they, too, could be seniors, the little boys and girls resolved that some day they, too, would be seniors.

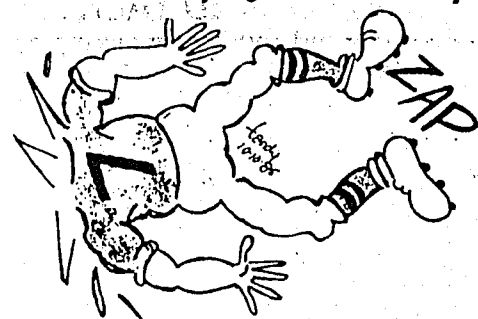
And so in 1929 this group of 30 little boys and girls, started off to school with Miss Marshall as their teacher to study hard and long. They dreamed of the day when grade school would come to a close and they would march through the seven arches of progress. They longed for the day when Miss McCreary would be their freshman sponsor in high school. They kept ever before them the image of their dreams. They dreamed of the day when they would parade in cap and gown with envious glances of other students following them wherever they went. They meditated about how they would and what they would do on that fall morning when they would enter the portals of the Santa Anna High School as seniors.

They thought about all of the hard work ahead of them through the years and when they thought about the work they would console themselves by thinking: "Well, some day, if you don't weaken, you will be a senior. Seniors are important. They are important because they have worked hard and long to do the things that are asked of them all through school and so, then, back to work the boys and girls would go studying hard and diligently. Their teachers would compliment them on their ability and willingness to work. With this encouragement it was not long until these little boys and girls now not so little, found themselves freshmen.

In three years, if they learned their lessons well, and believed

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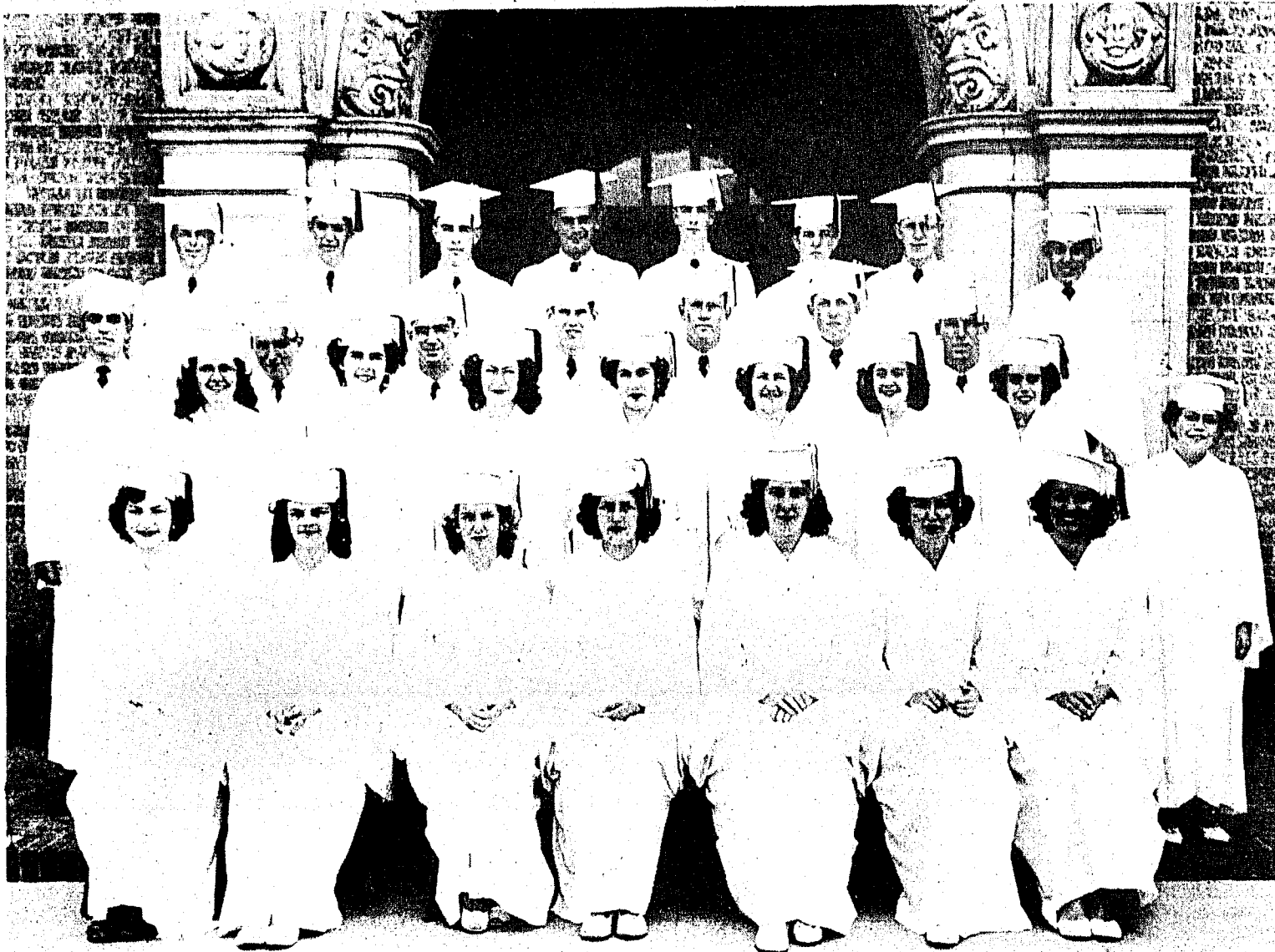

1950 Senior Class History

On their return they stopped for a visit at the San Jacinto Monument, near Houston.

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
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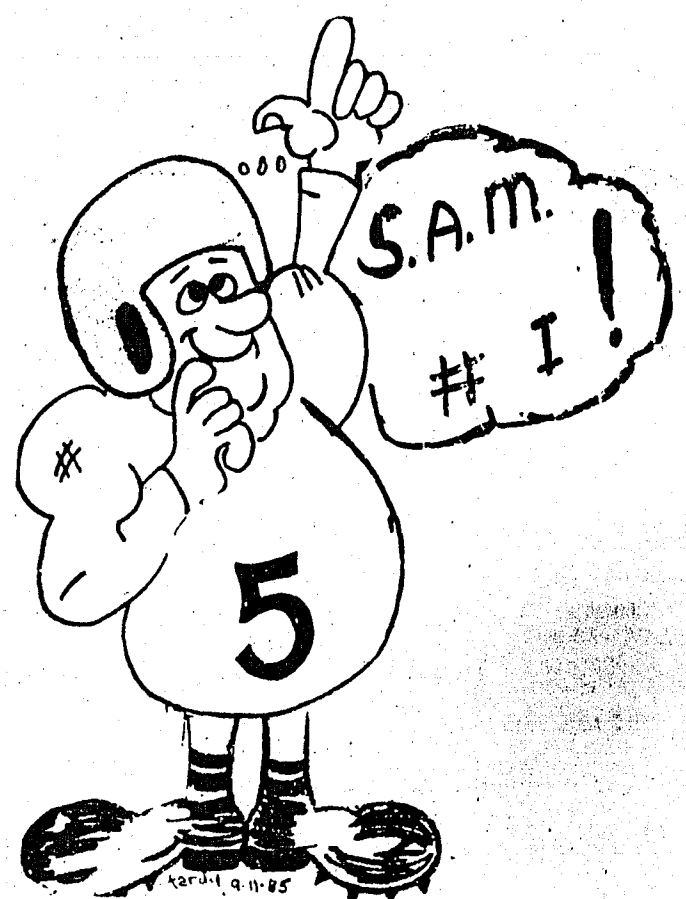

Products can damage fabric color

Consumers use a wide array of products in and around their homes every day. Many of these products contain ingredients that will cause color change or color loss if spilled on fabrics. Several products that are known to affect fabric color are commonly used.

Pesticides used to fight fleas and ticks contain organophosphate. Plant food and fertilizers also contain organophosphate. Red dyes are especially sensitive to this ingredient.

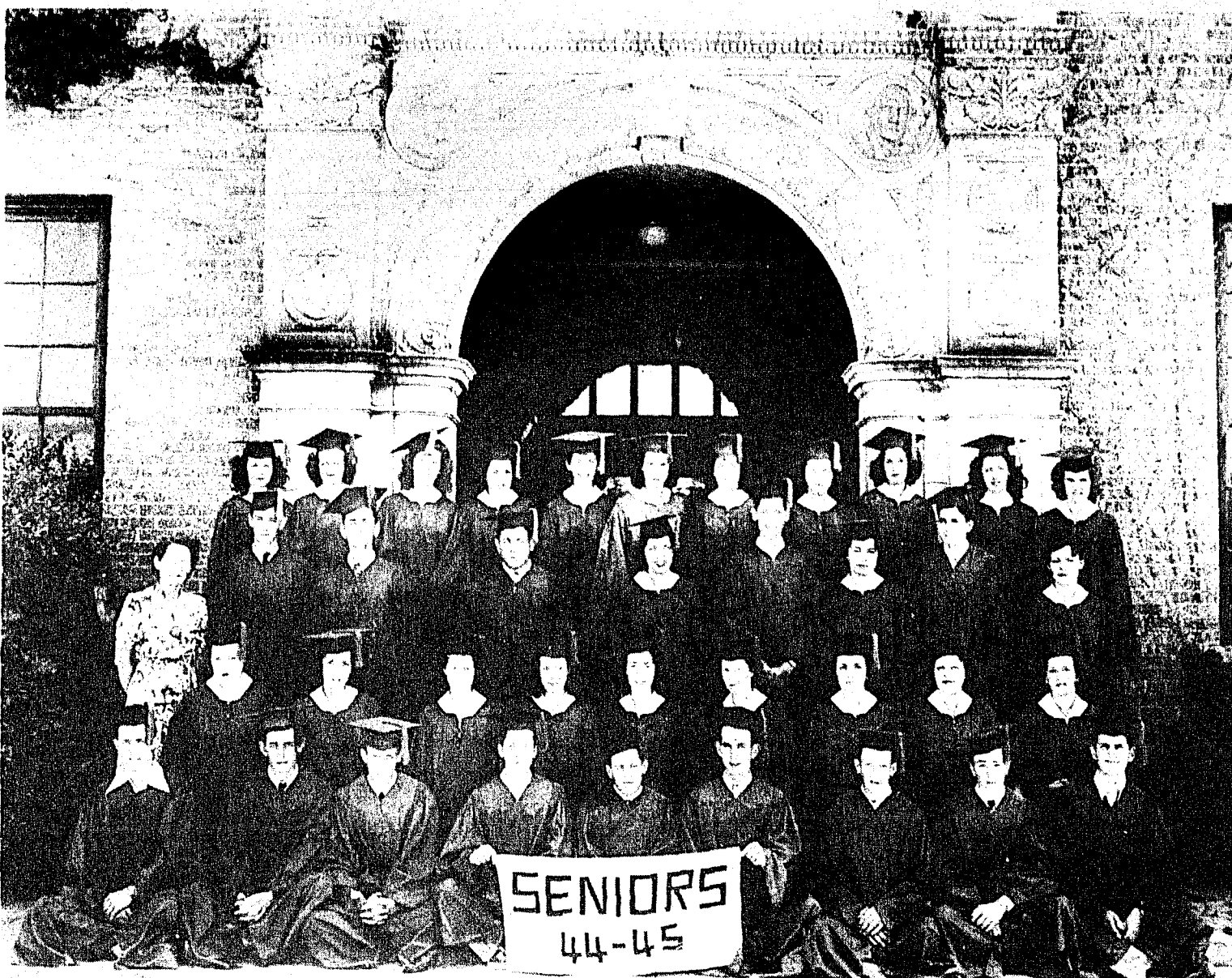
Tile cleaners and mildew removers contain strong acids or bases and often contain chlorine. Acids and bases alone may remove color and, when combined with chlorine, the color loss is permanent.

Dandruff shampoo that contains sulfur compounds can change colors if spilled on fabrics. It gradually turns blue or green and the spot will darken with age.

Benzoyl peroxide is used in acne medication. It is not easily washed off the skin and wherever the skin touches fabric — pillow cases, upholstery, carpet and garments — it leaves a residue of chemicals. Even very low concentrations of benzoyl peroxide will remove color.

Other household products that may be sources of color removal or change are furniture polishes, oven cleaners and pool chemicals. Often, spills from household products go unnoticed until age, heat or moisture triggers a color change. By then it is too late.

So remember to use household products carefully and remove any spills as soon as they occur. If necessary, get a professional to clean the fabric before permanent damage is done.

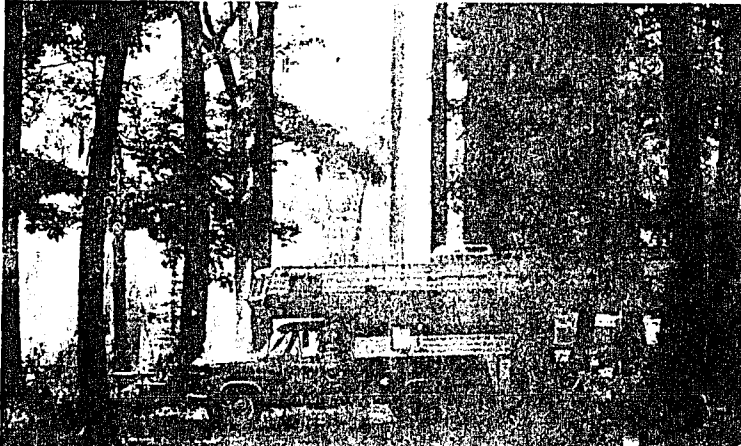

County Ends Fiscal Year Without Borrowing Funds

According to reports from the recent Commissioners Court meeting, the County will be able to end the fiscal year without having to borrow funds as had earlier been expected. County Auditor, Shirley Sansung, told the court that when all bills were paid, the ending balance would be just under \$3,000. Funds do remain in other County accounts and will be carried over into the new accounting year.
Precinct 4 Commissioner Max Horner reported that the 110 ft. long span on the Bowen Bridge had been severely damaged when a concrete truck loaded with 10 1/2 yards of cement had driven over the bridge and warped the steel beams, even though the load limit was clearly posted.

Eyewitnesses had reported the illegal crossing and Home has been in touch with the company officials. Home is asking that the company pay for repairs of the bridge. It hadn't been long ago that the state bridge inspector had praised the County on the condition of the bridge.
