Mountaineers Tame Bears

4-0 Mountaineers State Ranked 14th In Class A

The Mountaineers were determined that this was the year...to beat Baird once again and with a total team effort they accomplished their goal last Friday night at Mountaineer Field. The Bears had given Santa Anna a 54-0 licking last year and this year's

Mountaineers were hoping to return the favor, but ended up with a not too-far-off-the-mark score of 54-6 over the team that had plagued them for years.

"Feels good to have that monkey off our backs," was the comment from some of the team members and their Coach, Mike Permenter. Permenter was especially pleased with his defense that held Baird's explosive offense to six points.

As for the offense, it was the front seven that were the heroes of the offensive game, according to Permenter. "It was being able to be effective inside and out on our running game, that enabled us to take it to 'em," commented Permenter.

A surefooted Herbert Jackson once again led the Mountaineers in the scoring department and yards rushing. He had touchdown sprints of 51, 61, 15 and 6 yards. However, several other backs contributed

impressively to a ground game that produced 508 yards.

Byron Dowdy had TD runs of six and seven yards. Brady Rice hit paydirt from 40 yards out and Armanda Mata caught a 25-yard scoring pass from Charles Dixon. Dixon added a quarterback sneak for two points on a conversion play following one of Dowdy's TDs. Dowdy ran for two points after one

of Jackson TDs. Brady Rice added to the scoring with two extra points kicked.

Scott Valdez turned in a defensive show of eight unassisted tackles, seven assists and a recovered fumble. Also shining on defense was Paul Morris.

The Mountaineers, who have outscored their opponents by 200-27, pushed their record to 4-0 for the season and are now 14th state ranked.

Jackson now has 963 yards rushing in four games. He accumulated 225 of those yards Friday night in 22 carries. His first TD in last week's win over the Bears came on the second play from scrimmage after Santa Anna received the opening kickoff. Just

about the time that Baird thought they had seen enough of Herbert,

Dowdy and Rice began to turn the fire up a little higher in the plan to roast the Bears. (from the photographers viewpoint on the visitor's side could be heard Baird fans yelling "Get that number 28 (Herbert), he's all they got. Stop him and we've got it made!" Little did they know about Rice's shifty speed and Dowdy's power running. They were about to find out they "ain't seen nothin' yet."

Dowdy rushed for 134 yards in 18; Rice 96 yards in 14; Dixon 33 yards in 2 carries; and Phillip Hernandez 20 yards in 3 carries.

Santa Anna led 12-6 after one quarter of play; 32-6 at halftime and 40-6 at the end of the third period.

The Mountaineers will travel to Gorman for a Saturday game this week and the Panther's homecoming. Permenter says that Gorman is probably the strongest team that Santa Anna has yet met. In fact they are picked to win their district without much challenge from Rising Star, Tolar, Santo or Baird or Cross Plains. Gorman defeated Hico 34-7 last week and sport a 3-1 record. They have an exceptional 6-1, 190 lb. quarterback who is the key to their offense which is much

Lake Ivie Recreation Sites Are Now Open

People from all over the area were at the new Ivie Reservoir in southern Coleman County over the weekend as officials opened the lake for recreation following sufficient rainfall and runoff to produce enough water in the lake for recreational activities.

This writer and husband drove down on Sunday afternoon and can attest to a large number of boaters testing the waters of Texas' newest lake. Don't know how much, if any fishing, was being done, but many were taking their first boat trip over the lake. We also visited the site of what was once the Stacy low-water crossing. It is, of course, now covered with water, but at this time one can still get fairly close to the area by vehicle. At the end of last week the reservoir level was at 15 feet. The lake covers 4,300 acres or 7 square miles. Colorado River Municipal Water District officials are urging boaters to be cautious in the uncharted waters. Channels leading to the main body of water from the boat ramps are narrow and rocky. Flood waters have flushed considerable timber and debris into the lake, so skiing is discouraged.

Two recreation sites and an observation point were open for public use. Each of the recreation sites has boat ramps, a few picnic tables and restrooms. Concession stands are yet to be built.

Boat ramps are located at the Concho and Padgett recreation area.

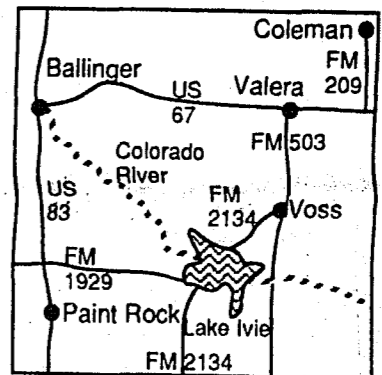
The Concho Recreation Area is about 30 miles from Ballinger. To

get there, take U.S. Highway 83 south from Ballinger to FM 1929 and turn east. After crossing the new bridge over the Concho River, turn northeast (left) at FM2134. A sign points to the recreation area off 2134 in about four miles.

The Padgett Recreational Area is closer to our "neck of the woods", about 30 miles from Coleman. To get there, take U.S. Highway 67 to Valera. At Valera turn south on FM 503. Just past Voss turn west on FM 2134. A sign at the old Leady townsites points the way to the recreation area.

To get to the observation area, where the dedication of the dam was held, follow directions to the Concho Recreation Area, except turn south on FM 2134. A few miles down the road is a sign marking a dirt road to the observation point.

Although recreational fees are posted at the recreation areas, there will be no fees charged until Jan. 1

Violent stray cats

Watch those stray cats, particularly the females. One of four times an animal bites or scratches a human, the animal is a cat, reports John Wright, an associate professor of psychology at Mercer University in Macon, Ga. And health departments report cat bites and scratches are rising with the popularity of cats as pets. The typical violent cat is a stray female, says Wright, based on a study of 2,494 Dallas animal bites and scratches in 1985. The typical bitten human is a woman, between 21 and 35, who stretched out her hand to feed or pet a cat. That may not sound serious, but 80 percent of the cats' victims sought treatment for their wounds, Wright found.

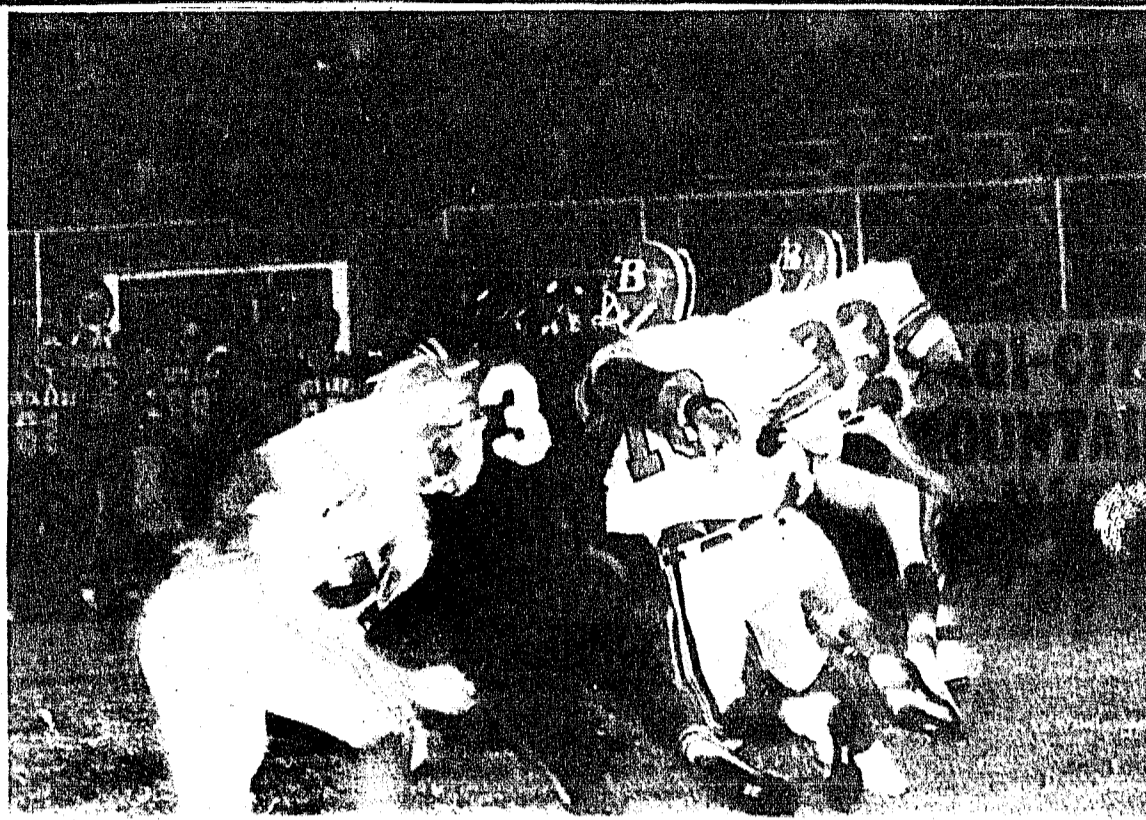

The Santa Anna Junior Mountaineers and the Baird Bear Cubs provided a lot of exciting football last Thursday night, September 27, at Baird. The final score was Santa Anna 16, Baird 12.

Prior to the 6:00 p.m. game, the 6th grade "Dynamite Team" had a 30 minute scrimmage with a larger 7th grade team from Baird. The Santa Anna boys played extremely well, but lost the scrimmage 2-0. Chris Lewis and Mark Yancy were standouts on the offensive team. Leading tacklers on the defense were Bobby Malaer, Chris Lewis and Ben Diaz.

The regular 6:00 p.m. game began with a 30-yard kickoff return by Santa Anna's Charles Williford. The Junior Mountaineers maintained control of the ball and drove down the field 50 yards for the initial score with a 23-yard reverse by Charles Williford. Williford also added the 2-point conversion behind excellent blocking by Johnny Diaz, Cecil Rameriz, Tim Perry, Danny DeLeon and Tom Guthrie.

For the remainder of the first half, both teams advanced the ball

but hard hitting defensive plays caused fumbles which prevented further scoring.

At the beginning of the second half, Baird took the kickoff but lost the ball three plays later on a fumble recovered by Johnny Diaz. Following the Baird score, the Mountaineers used the remainder of the third period and much of the fourth period moving the ball from the 50-yard line to the one-yard line. Johnny Diaz powered his way into the end zone and Charles Williford ran the two-point conversion with 2:29 left in the game.

The Cubs, never giving up, drove the ball 73 yards for another TD. A pass play was good for the extra points. The Cubs made five of their eight first down on this final drive against new players in the Santa Anna defense.

Charles Williford was the leading rusher of the game with 142 yards. Johnny Diaz added 48 yards rushing and provided much of the blocking that helped Charles.

The entire team played extremely well defensively. Williford had ten tackles. Tom Guthrie, Johnny Diaz and Danny DeLeon were in on seven tackles, and Cecil Rameriz had four hard-hitting tackles.

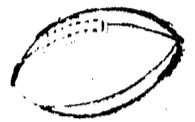
