#### Governor Orders March Runoff, Absentee Voting In Progress

Gov. Ann Richards has ordered a March 2 special election for the Texas state representative District 65 seat. The election was called because none of the 11 candidates vying for the seat got a majority in the Feb. 9 special election. Bob Turner, a Voss rancher, led with 2,265 votes and Ben Sudderth, a Comanche attorney whose home is Blanket, followed with 1,795. Both are Democrats.

Absentee voting began Wednesday, Feb. 20 and will continue through Tuesday, Feb. 26. In Coleman County voters will cast their absentee ballots at the Miller Library building on the courthouse square. Hours will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., weekdays only.

## Santa Anna Students Rank Above State Percentage

### TAAS Tests: 2 Win Special Recognition

In October, 1990, the students of Santa Anna ISD, along with the other students in Texas, took the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test. While the statewide testing is not new, this year the focus shifted from minimum skills to academic achievement. This is a test of higher-order thinking and problem-solving ability.

The test is broken into three parts: reading, writing and mathematics. In addition, this year all students tested, grades 3-11, were required to do a written composition. By testing in October, students are given the opportunity for remediation in the specific area of weakness during the same academic year.

Individual scores are confidential. However, composites by class, by campus, and by district are available to the public. The scores are reported in three ways: "non-mastery", "mastery", and "academic recognition". The last data reports that the student attains a more challenging level of achievement by mastering all the objectives of a portion of the test or receiving the highest score, a four, on the composition.

School District can be compared, both by class and by district to statewide scores. These, in addition to other reporting data are available in the office of the school counselor, Montie Guthrie, from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. Monday - Friday. By way of general comparison, the scores were reported by percentage of students passing each portion of the test:

Two SAISD students received academic recognition awards in all three subject areas: Rickie Runyan in fifth grade and Tommy Williford in eleventh grade. This is an exceptional achievement and worthy of special note.

## Council Hears Lone Star Rate Proposal

### Other Business Was Pretty Much Routine Matters

Mayor Brock called the meeting of Santa Anna City Council to order at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday evening, Feb. 12 with all council members present as well as Secretary Alys Pelton and Supt. of Operations Derriel Warnock. Scott Williams was present to represent Lone Star Gas.

As Police Chief Carlos was unable to attend the meeting, Mayor Brock presented some items on his behalf. She told the council that Torres had been using his personal pickup in emergencies when the police car was being repaired and that the vehicle could be put on the City's insurance as hired, unowned, when Torres does have to use it on the job. She also brought up the fact that the pickup was presently needing some repair. When Torres moved to his present residence, he had hauled some chat to repair a road as the City crew was unable to get to the job at that particular time. He felt this could have contributed to some of the breakdown of the vehicle and asked if the City

could share in the expense of the vehicle repairs. He also asked for a uniform allowance to be started which had already been agreed upon earlier. Councilman Daniel made the motion to begin the uniform allowance. Thomas Hays seconded the motion which carried unanimously. Council Jim Spillman made the motion to underwrite the cost of having Torres' pickup repaired and deduct it from his payroll check. Emmitt Simmons seconded the motion which also carried unanimously. Spillman then made a motion to pay 100% of the uniform allowance for the maintenance employees. They had been paying half of their own uniform costs. Daniel seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

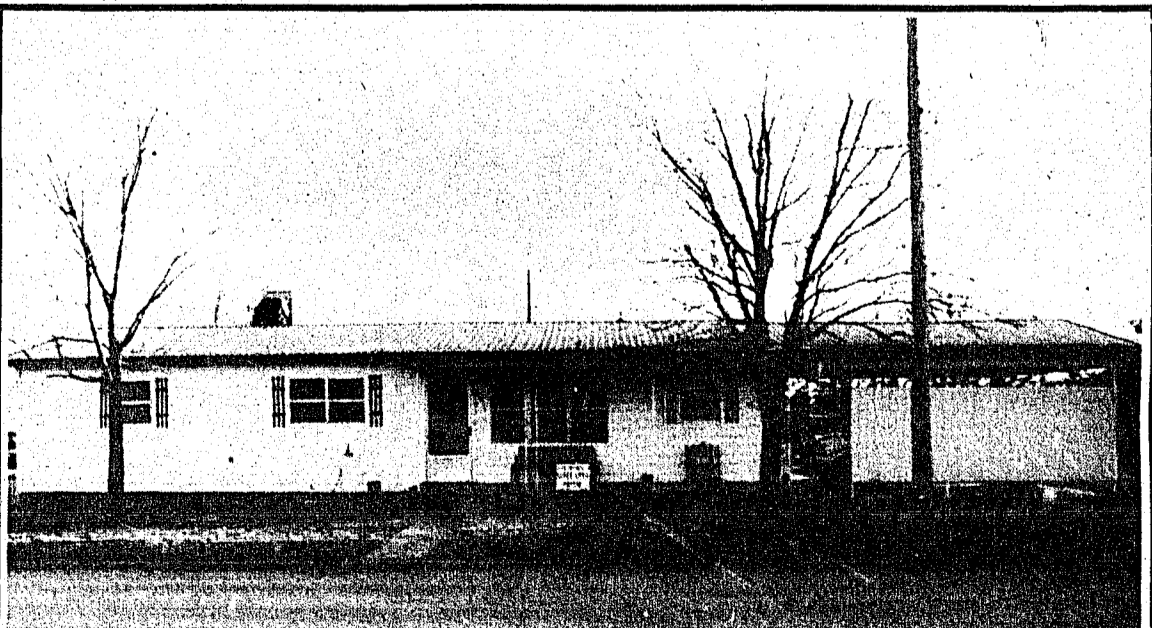
Scott Williams, representing Lone Star Gas, presented a rate increase proposal. The statement showed that the rate increase would increase an average residential bill by \$4.93 base less fuel cost ad-

justment of \$1.97, for a total increase of \$2.96. An average commercial customer's bill would increase by \$9.80 with a fuel cost adjustment of \$4.69, leaving the total increase at \$5.11. Effective date would be March 13, 1991. If the council denies the increase, it would then be taken to the Railroad Commission. If the Council doesn't take any action, the increase would automatically go into effect in 90 days. Spillman made the motion to table the request until further investigation. Karen Morris seconded. Passed unanimously.

Warnock reported that maintenance was pretty much routine during the past month. He also stated that negotiations on the sewer farm project were continuing at that time.

A matter of Green Thumb enrollees at the library was tabled until a later date.

Payments and accounts were reviewed and approved for payment in the normal manner.

### WEAPONS OF THE SPIRIT

A recently published book bears the title: "Weapons of the Spirit." This volume documents the outstanding courage and compassion of the inhabitants of a small European village who in the time of World War II sheltered and protected and passed on through the underground, Jewish refugees who were desperately trying to escape arrest by the Nazis.

Lauded by the free world in recent years, these people insist that they are not heroes but only did what they saw as the "right thing to do."

In the writings of the Apostle Paul, there is a passage that describes the individual believer as potentially a "weapon" and urges each member of the body of faith to surrender themselves to God to become a "weapon of righteousness."

In the original Greek, this word is *hopla* (transcribed in the King James Version as "instrument") and actually means "weapon" or "armor." (See Romans 6:13)

The translation is a good one since, for example, a knife may be an instrument, as a scalpel in the hand of a surgeon used for healing. A knife, or bayonet on the battlefield is of course a weapon used to kill the enemy.

The point of this scriptural admonition is this: Your life has great potential for good or evil, depending upon whose hand guides and uses that life! Put your life in God's hand and you will become a weapon for righteousness, an instrument of peace and blessing.

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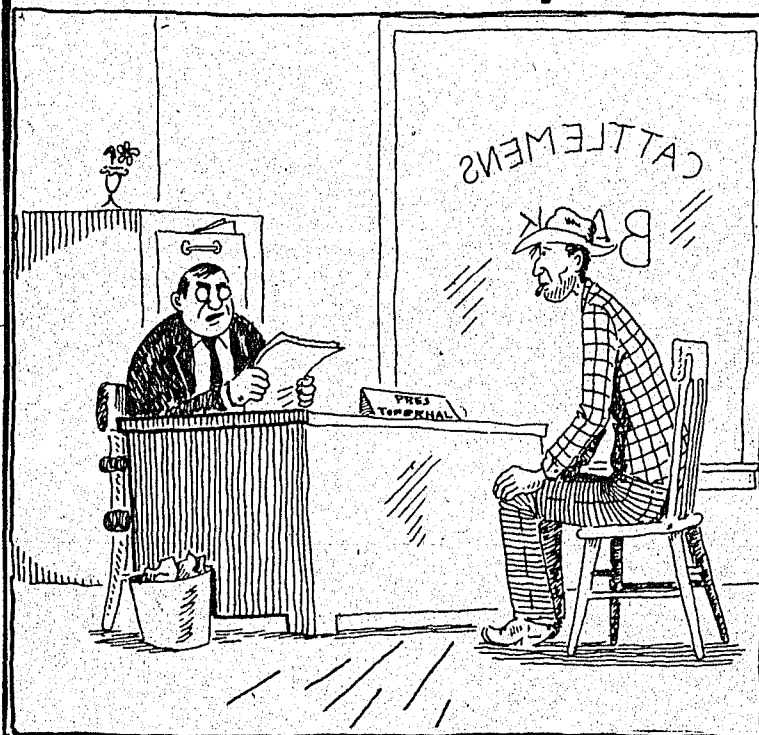

blood transfusions given in the past. Now all blood given is checked for the HIV virus. The virus can also be passed from an infected mother to her child either before birth or through breast feeding. It is possible for a person to have the virus and pass it on to

others for ten years or more before the symptoms of AIDS develop. AIDS is a disease for which there is no cure, no treatment, and no vaccine. Prevention is our only defense against this disease. Besides

## Appraisal District Collections Highest In Months

January tax collections at the Coleman County Appraisal District were the highest in months, with over \$800,000 added to the 1990 total. The collections had been slow during the past two months but the total since October is almost three million dollars, representing 83 percent of the taxes on the roll.

29-A frontrunner, Panther Creek will also head for the Regional tournament after a 60-61 overtime win over Lometa Tuesday night.

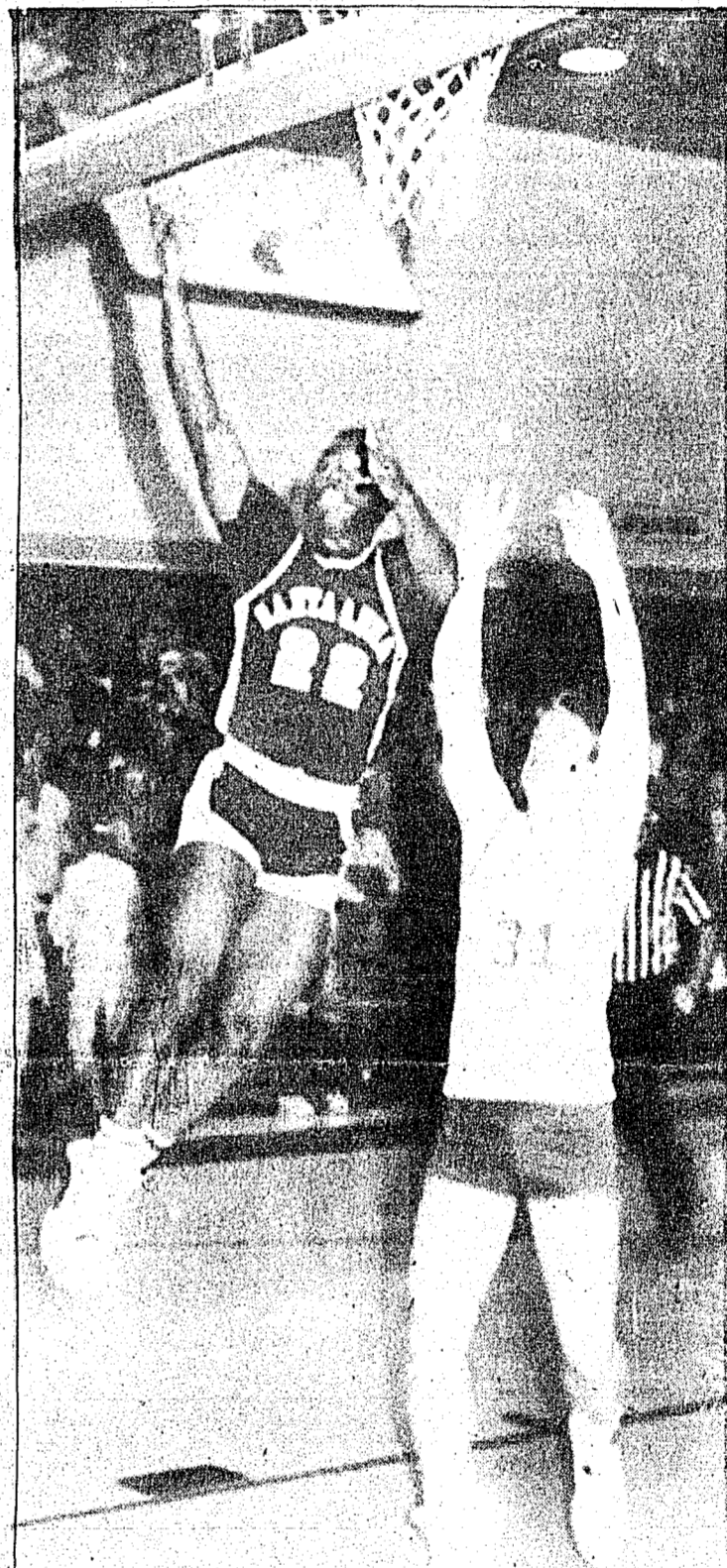
Santa Anna beat Lohn 54-47 in the bi-district basketball game played last Friday night in Brownwood.

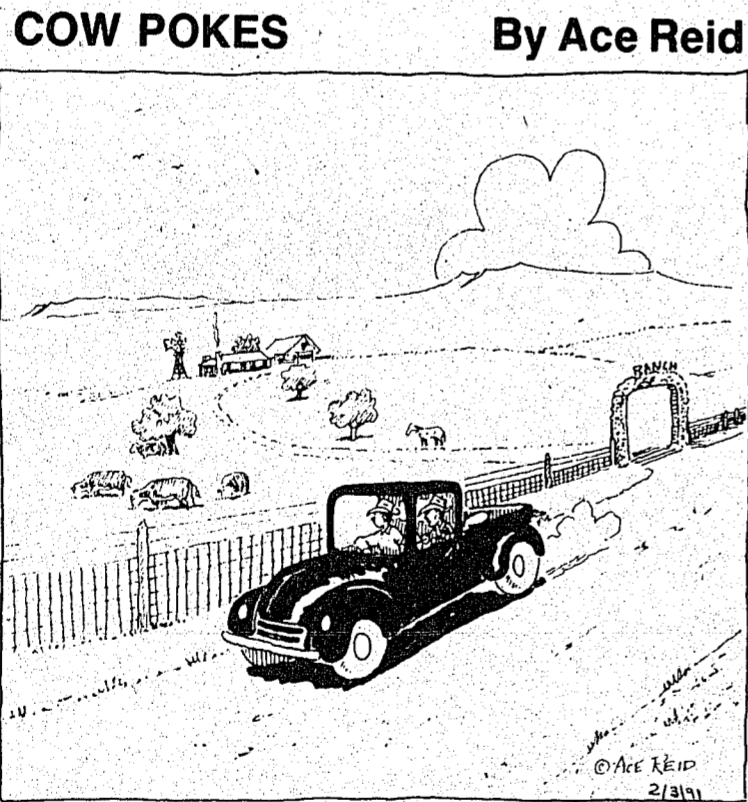

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Library Notes  
Check It Out

If you can read, you can further your education free of charge at the public library. All you have to do is take advantage of the books available to you there. The following article from a recent issue of *Guidposts* magazine illustrates how one person read her way to an education and a career as a writer of books for teens and young adults:

### THE LITTLE RED LIBRARY

Growing up back in the Arkansas hills, Robbie Tilley loved to read, but she was frustrated because she could not get enough books. She read and re-read everything in the little one-room school she attended while living with her grandparents on their sharecropper farm in Searcy County. Her father died when Robbie was quite young, and her mother left to find work cleaning houses in town.

Then when Robbie was 13, her mother remarried and came to take her to Colorado. That was the end of schooling for Robbie who worked in a theater selling tickets and popcorn.

In Colorado their house was next to a red-brick building that fascinated Robbie. She used to peer in the windows at the large room where a woman sat among shelves of books, and she thought, *It's not fair, one lady having all those books!* Finally the woman came out and invited her in. Robbie had never heard of a public library before!

That began a life of reading book after book, beginning with the works of Zane Grey "because he wrote about Colorado, and that's where I was," Robbie says. She went on to greater tomes: Dickens, Shakespeare, *War and Peace*.

After marrying and moving to California, Robbie Branscum began to write. Her first byline was in a Southern Baptist newspaper in Fresno, which took her on as a regular contributor, although there was no pay.

Since 1971 Mrs. Branscum has had 20 books released by such major publishing houses as Harper & Row, Doubleday, Viking Penguin and Macmillan. She is working on a new book, which she has entitled "Never Pa's Girl," a story of teenage pregnancy scheduled to be published by Viking Penguin in England. One of her books, *The Murder of Hound Dog Bates*, is scheduled to be produced soon as a motion picture by Harry Belafonte.

Now living in California, she likes to fish and go camping in her spare time. Bust she has never forgotten her debt to public libraries and makes herself available to speak at and on behalf of libraries, encouraging other to continue their education through reading.

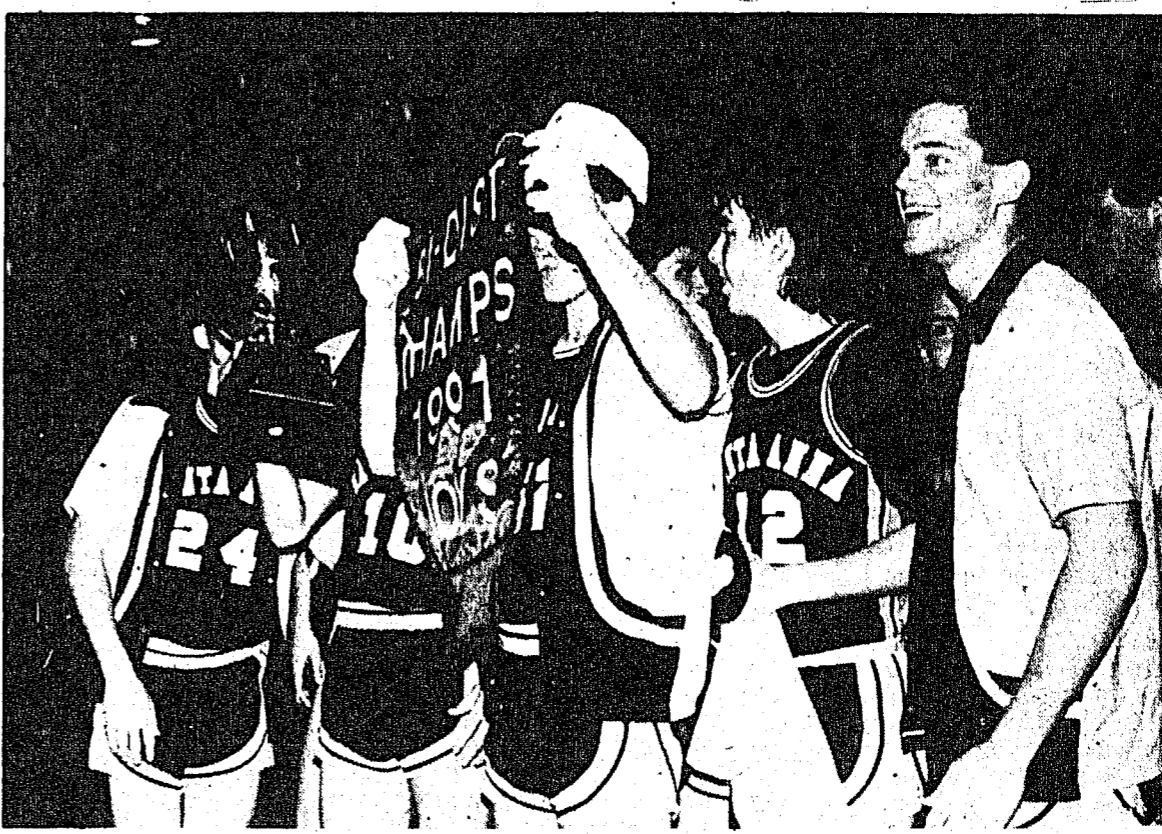

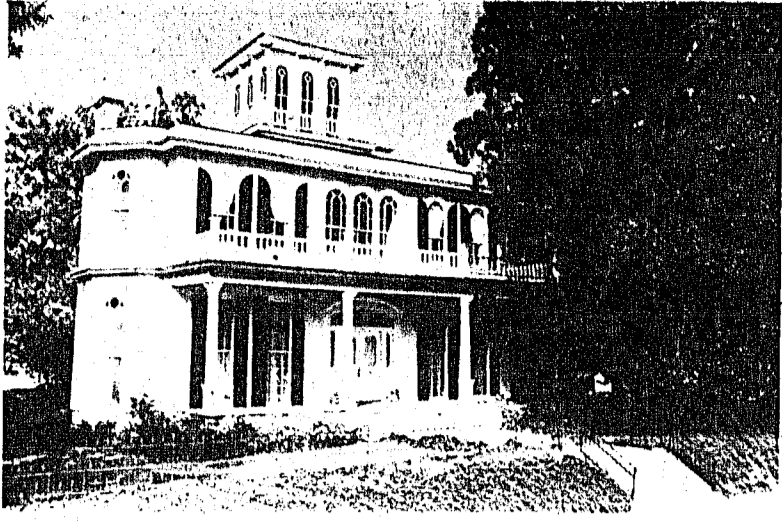

Reserve, and a former Coleman businessman. He is president of the Board of trustees of Panther Creek School District, is a State Director

of the Texas Farm Bureau, past president of the Coleman County Chamber of Commerce and was voted Coleman County Outstanding Rural Citizen for 1990. He states he is against personal income tax and that having served on the board of Farm Bureau is well qualified to deal with insurance problems that face the state.

His campaign motto has been, "A vote for Bob Turner is a vote for honesty in the State Legislature." He says, "I believe integrity cannot be legislated."

He feels he can best deal with the problems of economy, prison reform, re-districting, lobbyist influence and "other vital issues" that are facing our state.

to the song that would become the United States' national anthem. He wrote the words to the song when he and a lawyer John S. Skinner saw the American flag still flying over Fort McHenry after a battle with the British during the war of 1812.

That same year, actor Ferdinand Durang sang the melody of a song Americans knew as "Adams and Liberty." This marked the first time the anthem was sung in public. Although it became popular immediately, it was 117 years before Congress gave it its official status.

The Iraqis, however, had been adapting to such tactics, Horne's pilots, for example, report that Iraqi supply columns increasingly have broken up into small groups of perhaps five trucks or cars to avoid presenting concentrated targets. Horne says the pilots flying against Iraqi targets have entered a new phase in the war, 'trolling' the highways of Kuwait looking for 'movers.'

"It's very similar to if you're fishing with your line out and hoping to find something. We just patrol hoping to find the enemy movers at night and attack them," says Lt. Col Horne.

Horne reported that Saddam's soldiers also have become ever more expert at decoy practices. They put aluminum sheets under camouflage netting to confuse U.S. Radar, build small fires under metal plates that infrared sensors aboard a smart bomb might read as engine heat from a tank, and set off smoke pots to tempt aviators into reporting bomb hits that never happened.

Horne said that when the ground offensive begins, (which we now know it has), those air strikes will intensify, in an effort to force dug-in Iraqi troops to choose between coming out and being pummed and staying out and being cut off.

Lt. Col. Horne called his sister, Jane Wyatt of Abilene over the weekend and assured her that even though things were certainly stepping up in the war zone, he "felt safe" considering the equipment he had to work with. He also made the statement that after this "Desert Storm thing" is over, he hopes to head back to Texas to live!
