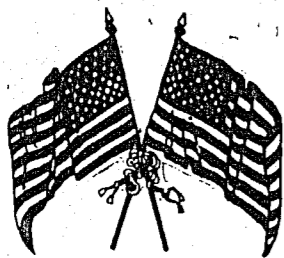

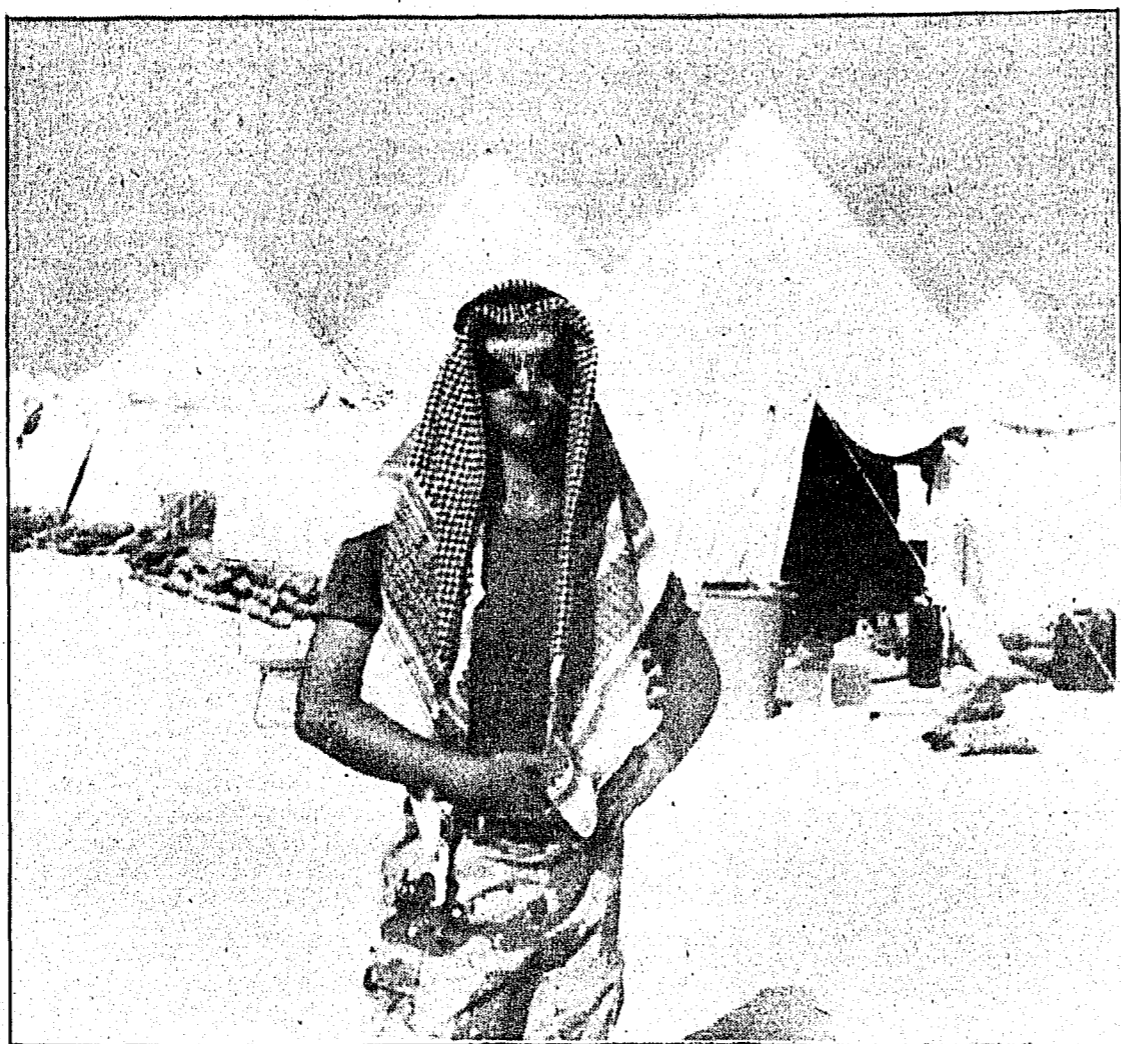

Come On, Get In The Picture

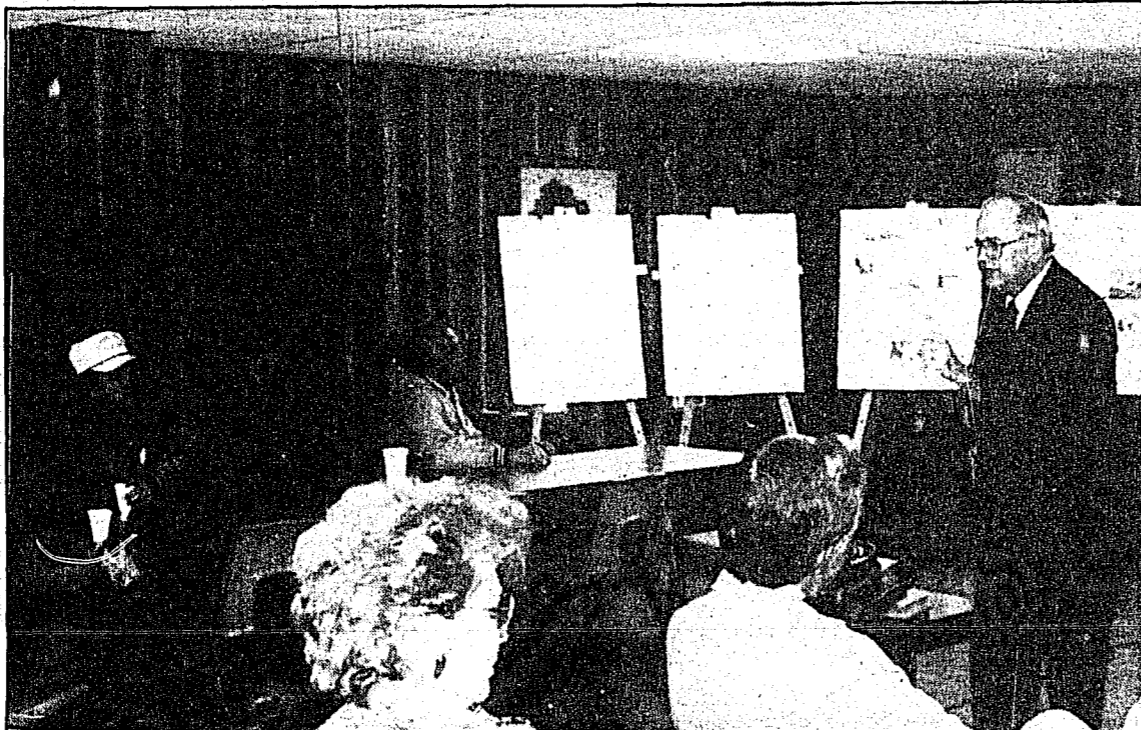

And Now, Time To Get Started

Approximately 30 to 35 people got involved in the two sessions of

an economic development program conducted last week by Dr. Don Stebbins, an economist with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The sessions, held at Christian Life Center of First Baptist Church, were to develop ideas for

economic improvement projects that the people of Santa Anna could get involved in, in order to help themselves.

Participants were divided into groups in the first session, for coming up with ideas that could be

suggested for development projects. These groups took their ideas before the total attendance on the second night and then were divided into six

more groups according to the area in which they wanted to work after six ideas were selected from those suggested.

Each group chose a chairman. Work area groups and chairmen are as follows: (1) Downtown Restoration, Scot Patterson; (2) Flea Market and Farmers Market, Eddie Voss; (3) Community Improve-

ment, Karen Morris; (4) Medical (this group will be involved in trying to obtain at least parttime medical services here in Santa Anna);

(5) Pride, Promotion, and Cooperation, Eddie Hartman; and (6) Consumer Concerns, Mike Simmons.

The groups have until February 10 to discuss and begin a plan of action which is to be reported to the Chamber of Commerce president,

Mike Simmons. That report should include realistic goals, expectations and realistic deadlines for those goals to be met.

As the projects unfold, there will be further meetings and an annual meeting will be held to analyze progress and to set new goals and possibly more projects.

Mike Simmons, Chamber of Commerce president, expressed his appreciation to all who participated and those who helped make the meetings a success—the members of the Park Board who furnished refreshments both evenings; the Baptist Church for the meeting facilities; and those who took places of leadership and others who offered themselves in the work area of the projects.

The overall endeavor has been dubbed "Let's Get Started."

The Sectional Center Manager then selects and recommends to the Division Manager for the appointment, the candidate who best meets the position requirements.

11 Seeking Legislative Office

Absentee voting began Monday and will continue through Tuesday, February 5. In Coleman County voters are casting absentee ballots at the Mrs. J.A.B. Miller Library building on the northwest corner of the courthouse square. The Election is set for Saturday, February 9.

Postage Rates Go Up Sunday

The U.S. Postal Service reminds you that Sunday, Feb. 3, is the day for the new postal rates to go into effect. First class mail up to one ounce will go up to 29¢ and each additional ounce will cost you 23¢ more. Postal cards will be 19¢ each. The cost of mailing a letter to Mexico will rise to 35¢ for a letter weighing no more than 1/2 ounce and up to one ounce will go for 45¢.

"Make-up" stamps will be available to add to your left-over 25¢ postage stamps and to postcards you may have on hand. The "Make-up" stamps are not to be used on international mail, including mail to Mexico or Canada. International mail requires stamps with a printed numeric value.

New rates will also go into effect for package services and other postal services.

Return To Germany In Search Of Roots

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a reprint of last week's conclusion of this article which was jumbled during the layout procedure. We regret that and hope you will find this more enjoyable reading.

The next day, we spent sightseeing in Kassel. Sunday was probably the biggest day in David and Martha's life. And of course, it was very exciting for Margaret, too. At nine o'clock we arrived at the church in Hessler that was welcomed not only by Henrich Steglitz but the minister and the rest of the townsfolk. We were ushered to a front pew and made to feel right at home. At the opening of the service the minister told the congregation who we were and what we were doing there. It was a funny feeling to know that you were being talked about and not know exactly what was being said. Martha was able to follow most of the sermon which was in German and David and Margaret hoped they stood up and sat down at the right time. One of the highlights of the church service was Communion. Being placed on the front row made us get up with the front group. We were not able to learn from watching others, only Martha knew what was going on, so we watched her. The bread was a very large wafer and they used silver wine glasses for the homemade wine. It was truly a high experience to stand where our ancestors had stood, taking communion in the Lutheran church.

After church, everyone waited outside to greet us. After everyone left, Henrich took us to David's great-grandmother's house which had been converted into a museum. Henrich had a key so could let us in for a private tour. As we hurriedly looked

through the museum, we became aware that the clock was rapidly approaching eleven o'clock. Not wanting to offend Henrich, we excused ourselves and promised to return to his home the next day.

The hour to traverse the fifteen miles now became fifteen minutes. We barely made it to Volkershain

by eleven. Fortunately, everyone but the minister, walked to church so we had no problem finding a parking place. Finding a seat was not much problem either as there were only three places left, and

again we were on the front row. This church was decorated very much like the one in Hessler. The fruits of the harvest were displayed around the altar. There were approximately twenty people in attendance. The Phaff family was a good example of the attendees. Grandparents, parents, and children were there together. The Hessler church was about twice the size of the Volkershain church. Pfarrer Hohaus evidently preached a good sermon because the congregation was very attentive.

It soon became time for communion again. When Herr Phaff's granddaughter passes around the basket of small squares of rye bread, we had to check with Martha to see if we understood that they were passing the bread representing the body of Jesus. When it came time for the cup, Pfarrer Hohaus passed around a basket of large green grapes. This was the cup. Very different but very appropriate for the Erntedankfest service. After church, the neighbors we had met in front of David's grandfather's house, the minister and other members of the congregation gathered outside the church and visited for a long time. It was with great reluctance that we left them but with great excitement as we headed to the manse for lunch.

As we arrived at the Hohaus residence, we were greeted by Pfarrer Hohaus's wife, Sylvia. Pfarrer Hohaus introduced their children, Axel and Anna to us. We had a fine Hessian meal consisting of roast pork, dumplings, potatoes and red cabbage. We had a wonderful time visiting over dinner, talking about Erntedankfest, genealogy, and current affairs. We really felt like we were part of the church family. It was a day that if it couldn't last forever, you hope that it would be repeated often. It truly was an emotional high for the Karthaus family and will live in our memories forever.

Early Monday morning, we drove to Felsberg to pick up the genealogy work done by Adolf Herwig. Even though we thought we were early, Adolf and Harold were waiting for us. They took us to a rooftop and sat us down around a table. Adolf started reviewing a typewritten page. The page contained births, marriages, and death dates of many

of David's ancestors. We had truly found Anna Martha Freudenstein! We even found out her brother and sisters names, her parents, grandparents, and aunts and uncles. All of them had been born or died while a member of the church at Hessler. We also found out other towns that we must go to, to find out more information. Could this mean another trip to Germany? Harold gave us a book concerning the 700 year old town of Felsberg and the surrounding area. He also offered to continue looking for more data and promised to send us any other information he found. Needless to say, we were overwhelmed by many things, the hospitality, the eagerness to help as well as the history of David's grandmother's family. It was almost too much

to comprehend. We bade Harold and Adolf good-bye and said we hoped to be able to visit with them again.

We then drove to Hessler to visit with Henrich Steglitz as we had promised the day before. We found his lovely home near the edge of town, knocked on the door and were invited in by his wife. We were invited into the family room and offered refreshments. We sat and talked for a long while before Frau Steglitz got up and called their daughter, Ursula, asking her to come over and visit with us. Ursula spoke very good English so we communicated even better after she arrived. Henrich gave David four gifts, the first was a postcard which displayed the inside of the church at Hessler, the second one was a book describing the ruins of the Karhause monastery which was near by, the third was a copy of the plat map of Hessler which showed the location and size of the Freudenstein farm. The fourth was a book on the history of Hessler. Martha received a beautiful hand painted Easter egg that was painted by Henrich as a memento of the trip. His wife scur-

ried around and cut up an egg carton to help protect the egg. With that and some careful packing by Martha, the egg made it back to Texas in one piece. We also received many pictures and other mementoes.

After a lunch of homemade liverwurst, bratwurst, and cheeses, we bade our new found friends good-bye with a promise that we would return. It was with some reluctance that we left and headed back to our bed and breakfast in Remsfeld to pack and plan to leave Remsfeld and call an end to the genealogical research for this trip.

Back at the motel we went over all our records that we had received and made notes of several new towns that would have to be visited to extend our family tree. Hopefully this will be another story. Can you imagine how much time it will take to follow all these new leads, visit all the new towns and revisit

all our old friends? We are already looking forward to the next trip. As we packed up to go, it was still with a feeling of disbelief as we really did not think it was possible to find Anna Martha Freudenstein's home town while she was in Germany.

The next morning was October 2, 1990, the last day of a divided Germany and we wanted to drive to Berlin to help celebrate the reunification. But that is another story that may appear in another article.

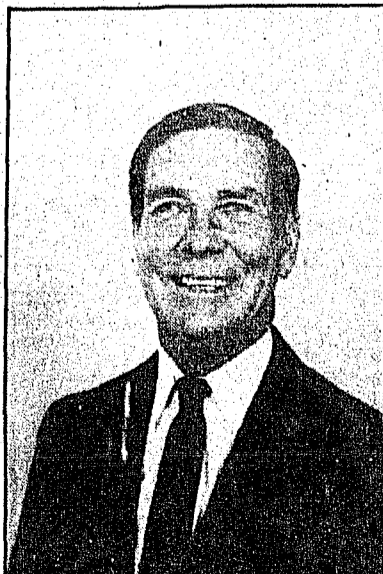

Coleman County Gains In Final Census Count; But Down Since 1980

In the final census figures, just released by the Census Bureau, both Coleman and Coleman County gained over the preliminary figures, but both were still under the 1980 table.

Coleman County moved up to 9,474 in the final tally. In 1980, the population was 10,439.

Santa Anna gained from the 1,245 preliminary figure to 1,249 in the final count. This compared to 1,535 in 1980.

Coleman moved from the 5,183 in the preliminary count to 5,410 in the final tally. This compares to 5,960 in the 1980 census.

Novice, the only other incorporated town in the county remained the same, at 183 in both the preliminary

and final figures. In 1980, Novice had 201 residents.

Final figures for other area towns include: Brownwood, 18,387; Early, 2,380; Cross Plains, 1,063; Comanche, 4,087; DeLeon, 2,190; Cisco, 3,813; Eastland, 3,690; Ballinger, 3,975; Winters, 2,905.
