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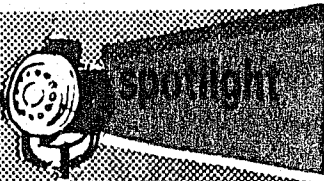

## Letter From Mid East

### "ANGEL IN OUR MIDST"

## Three County Employees Retire

Coleman County will lose three longtime employees officially as of January 1, 1991.

Jake McCreary, County Commissioner of Precinct 2 for the past twenty-four years, chose not to run again for his elected position during the 1990 election. Appointed to replace Thomas Wristen who resigned in April of 1967, Jake has

served as commissioner continuously since that time. He will still pursue his farming and ranching interests near Santa Anna. Jake's wife is Sammie McCreary, and they have two daughters, Mrs. Micky Davidson of Big Lake and Mrs. Bobby Lee of Clyde. They also enjoy their four grandchildren. Emory Rider has served as Cole-

man County Justice of Peace since November 12, 1980 when he was appointed to replace the deceased

Walter Holt. Rider also won re-election to his office in 1982 and in 1986, but chose not to run again in 1990. After coming to live in Coleman at age 14 from Brown County, Emory has lived in Coleman since that time, except for a 6 year stint he

## Landfill Control A Major Concern

You would think that with the weather we have had lately, City workers would have broken water meters and mains on their minds, and indeed they have had their share of reckoning with those problems.

However, there is another problem that remains with them constantly. With all the new regulations and guidelines to meet, City officials and City workers have found that control at the local landfill has become a major concern.

The old landfill, which was closed out recently, standing the test of state inspection, was once just an open pit where citizens were allowed to dump randomly. But that is now a thing of the past. Under new guidelines as set forth by the Environmental Protection Agency and enforced by the Texas Department of Health, there is no random dumping allowed. All materials dumped in the landfill must be dumped in specified areas. There is one area for household garbage, another for the dumping of old appliances, such as stoves, refrigerators, hot water heaters, etc. and any other items containing metal. Even old chairs and couches that have metal springs are required to be placed in that area. The city workers go through an involved procedure of covering the dumping areas which must meet rigid specifications.

According to these guidelines, no tires, batteries, motor oil, or chemicals of any kind can be dumped anywhere at the landfill. Therein lies the headaches for City officials and workers. Many in the community persist in attempting to dump these items, either not caring about the consequences or not thinking about them. If guidelines are not rigidly followed, the City of Santa Anna is subject to fine and/or closure of the landfill altogether. This would necessitate the hauling of trash and garbage to regional landfills for a contracted fee.

The illegal dumping can also lead to greater expense for the city as it may become necessary to hire a full time employee to guard the operation and see that proper dumping regulations are met.

Dumping items in the wrong area also creates an expense, as city workers must then dig out the items improperly dumped, and take them to the correct area as required by law. There really is no excuse for placing items in the wrong pit, as they are clearly marked with

signs as to what should be placed in the pits.

There are also signs at the gate as you enter the landfill area, advising you of the regulations and proper identification needed.

To give you an insight to the problems faced, a new pit recently covered, should have taken care of at least six months' garbage from the community. It lasted only three months. This is due in part to the closing of rural dump grounds and another part to illegal dumping by persons hauling garbage in from other areas trying to avert the charges placed on them by other facilities.

According to City of Santa Anna regulations, anyone dumping materials at the local landfill must be able to show a current paid water bill or a permit which may be obtained at City Hall. This is for your protection, to keep illegal dumping from taking place and filling up the facility.

At the current time, brush and yard clippings are being dumped in the pit with household garbage. In the future they will have to be put into another area. You will be notified by City officials when that time comes.

According to Supt. of City Operations Derrick Warnock, one problem that has plagued them recently has been the dumping of large amounts of debris from the wrecking of old buildings. It is not a problem if he or the City Hall is notified in advance of the hauling of that kind of material in large quantities to the landfill. If they know in advance they can prepare for it. He asks that anyone making plans to take large amounts of that kind of material to the landfill to please notify him or City Hall, in order to avert any problems that may arise.

You are reminded that the landfill is your facility, and you are responsible for making it work properly under all guidelines set forth for its operations. Your consideration in obeying the laws will be greatly appreciated by City officials and workers.

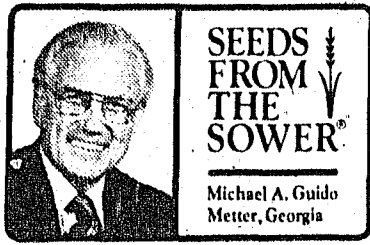

He still serves part time with the Comanche school system. He has been named Comanche Citizen of the year and is active in Civic clubs and the Baptist Church. He and his wife, the former Rosemary Spencer of Cross Plains, are the parents of three grown children.

Jefferies has taught political science parttime for the past several years at Ranger Junior College. He said he is familiar with the workings of the Texas Legislature and will attempt to represent the district's six counties in all legislation to their benefit.

Jefferies, a Democrat, describes himself as a conservative as far as spending is concerned and said he felt, after reading stories in the newspapers the past few weeks, it will be difficult to meet the state budget. However, he hopes and feels that new revenue other than taxes can make up the deficit. His feeling is that an overhaul of state and local taxes is needed. Jefferies had dealt with budgets of \$4 to \$5 million on the school level and has balanced it where other schools have spent more for the same number of students.

Although financing is an important part of state government, other problems Jefferies sees are the need for a code of ethics for elected officials and public school financing.

Jefferies says, "I am not naive enough to think I will make a great impact on state government during my first term, but I will not hesitate to vote on and introduce legislation that will impact the 65th District favorably."

Jefferies says he hopes to visit the various communities prior to the election and speak to as many

voter as possible. He is also planning to attend any political forums that communities may sponsor.

Ben Doyle Sudderth, 58, of Blanket has maintained law offices in Comanche for the past 35 years and is a former state representative of this area, having served two terms in the legislature in the late 1950s and did not run for re-election to a third term. He and his wife, Anne, are the parents of six grown children. One daughter is chief justice of Fort Worth Municipal Courts, another a Houston Banker and the other four are presently attending college.

"This is the most important session for this area of the state for many years," Sudderth said. "With redistricting, school finance, legislative ethics, and a need for relief from the continuous spiraling of property taxes at the top of the agenda, this district must have strong, effective representation. We will not have the luxury of a period for training a replacement."

He cites his close friendship with Lt. Gov. elect Bob Bullock as being beneficial to his serving in the legislature.

Richard Gist, 48, of Brownwood calls himself a conservative

Democrat. "I feel as a conservative Democrat, I can offer a common sense approach to solving the problems that face Texas today. I do not pretend to have all the answers, but will work with the people of this district to represent their Philosophy and viewpoint in Austin."

Gist cited insurance reform, the Texas economy, education, redistricting, state budget, and crime as major issues in his campaign. He said in traveling the district, he found voters in Brown, Comanche,

Eastland, Coleman, Runnels and McCullough Counties want a representative who is "not afraid to vote the traditional values."

Gist is retired, with disabilities, from the U.S. Army, having served in Vietnam. He has business interests in Brown County, including real estate investments. He is a graduate of Zephyr High School and Howard Payne University. He and his wife, Joan, live near Brownwood and are the parents of two grown children.

Richard Watson, a pharmacist in Gorman has indicated he is to be a candidate but has not sent this newspaper an announcement.
