Landfill Control A Major Concern

lem that remains with them constantly. With all the new regulations and guidelines to meet, City officials and City workers have
found that control at the local landfound that control at the local landfill has become a major concern. The old landfill, which was
closed out recently, standing the lest of state inspection, was once just an open pit where citizens were allowed to dump randomly. But that is now a thing of the past. Under new guidelines as set forth by the
Environmental Protection Agency and enforced by the Texas Depart ment of Health, there is no random dumping allowed. All materials dumped in the landfill must be
dumped in specified arcas. There is one area for household garbage, an other for the dumping of old appliances, such as stoves, refrigerabors hot water heaters, etc. and any other items containing metal. Even old
chairs and couches that have meta springs are required to be placed in

icals of any kind can be dumped anywhere at the landfill. Therein

the consequences or not thinking about them. If guidelines are not rigidly followed, the City of Santa Anna is subject to fine and/or clo-
