





However, he hopes and feels that new revenue other than taxes can make up the deficit. His feeling is that an overhaul of state and local taxes is needed. Jefferies had dealt with budgets of \$4 to \$5 million on the school level and has balanced it where other schools have spent more for the same number of students.


