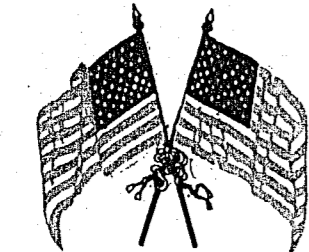

S'Anna Shows Support Of Troops

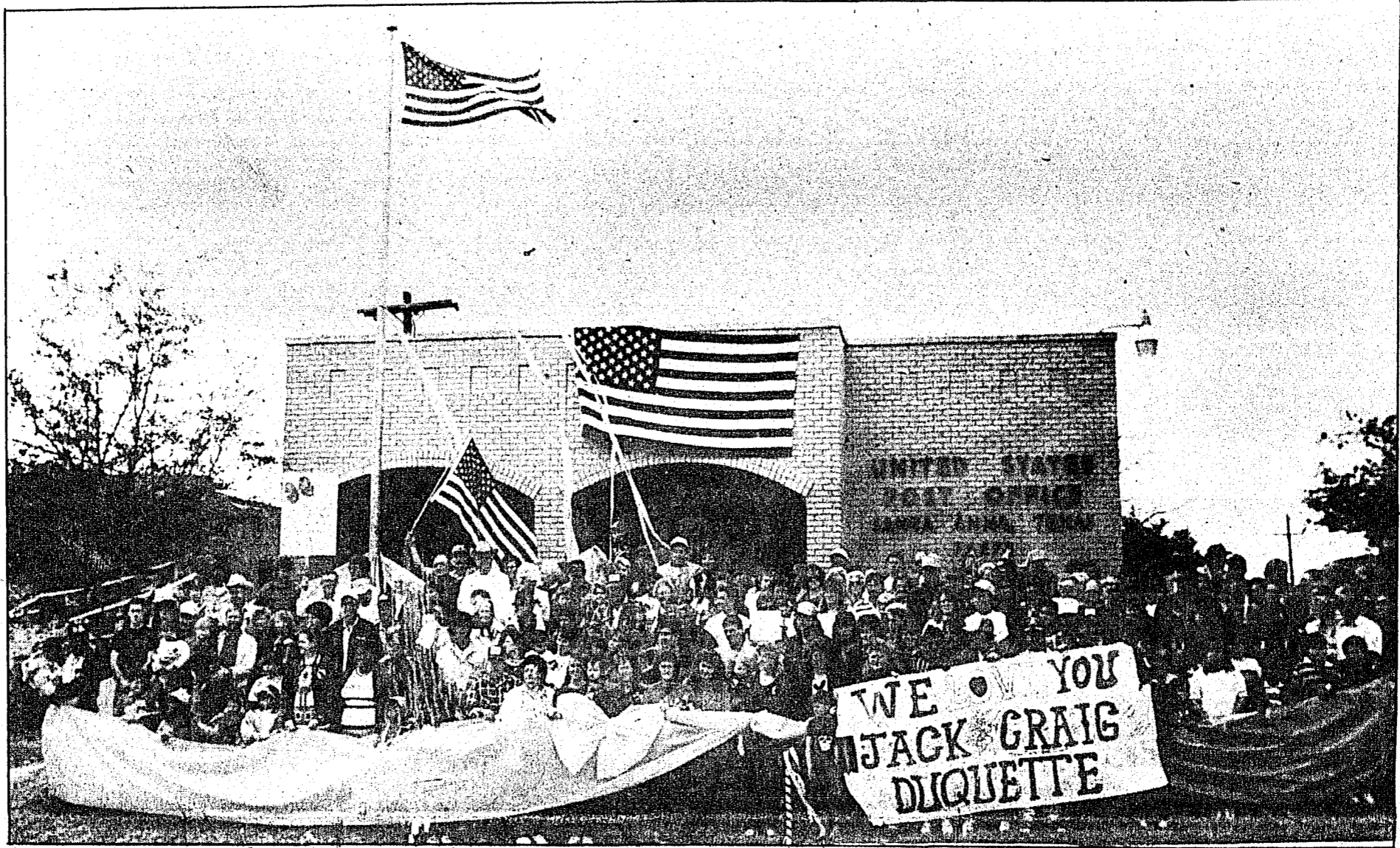

Residents of Santa Anna wrapped themselves in yellow ribbon last Saturday for a picture that will be sent to those representing Santa Anna in the Persian Gulf area and around the world, serving in the United States armed forces.

Approximately 200 local residents gathered at the Post Office Saturday to show their support of the U.S. troops involved in the Persian Gulf war and those stationed elsewhere in the world.

A big yellow ribbon which was

wrapped around the entire crowd indicated the desire that the conflict would soon be over and the armed forces men and women returning safely home. Banners, signs and flags also represented pride of nation and support for the men and

women involved in the war and others stationed around the world.

Although a sign constructed by friends and relatives of two Santa Anna brothers now stationed in Saudi was especially evident at the rally and picture taking session, there was no doubt but that the support shown was for each of the nine from Santa Anna who are now in the gulf area.

They are, PFC Jacky Duquette, Spec 4 Craig Duquette, Lt. Col. Bill Horne, Pvt. Johnnie Kirven, SPC William Scot Newton, Sgt. Jerry Malaer, Lance Corp. Vernon Valdez, Cpl. Gary Voss and Sgt. John Key Williams.

Seen directly behind the bow of the yellow ribbon are wives, parents and other family members of those men.

Colored copies of the photos taken Saturday will be sent to those in the military who are representing

Santa Anna around the world, so they can indeed see that Santa Anna people do support them.

The sentiments of local residents was stated by Gary Absher who helped put the event together with the help of Vietnam veterans and service organizations. He said, "We want them to know we back them. On the back of each photo we send will be the message, 'We support you and we feel your fears and pray daily for your safe return.'"

Absher added, "We did this as a community project with everyone sharing in the idea. We hope when our troops involved in Desert Storm receive the photos they will share it with others in their units."

Those organizers of the event who had served in the Vietnam era, expressed a desire to encourage everyone to show their support of the troops Absher spoke at a special assembly of junior high and high

school students last week, to explain to them the adverse effects of negative feelings toward soldiers of the Vietnam era. He explained this was the reason we felt the need to send a show of support to the troops.

He reported that the audience of students were captivated by his program and showed openly their loving concern for all our military personnel.

WTU Seeks Rate Change

West Texas Utilities has filed a request this week with the Public Utilities Commission to reconcile historical fuel costs and increase fixed fuel factors to reflect expected increases in the cost of fuel.

The new factors are not expected to affect customer's bills until later this year or early in 1992. The actual date will be determined by the time it takes to complete the regulatory process.

Charles Moore, WTU local manager, said the new factors will increase the average customer's bill by \$1.44 a month, or 2.5 percent, based on consumption of 660 kilowatt-hours per month.

"Our cost to residential customers is essentially divided into two major parts, the base rate and the fuel

factor," said Mr. Moore. Fuel factors make up about forty percent of the total cost to customers.

The company is requesting the increase now primarily for three reasons. First, it has under-recovered retail fuel and purchased power costs through December 1990.

Second, the PUC has recently expressed the opinion that fuel costs should be reconciled at least every three years through either a rate case or a fuel reconciliation case such as WTU is now filing. WTU's fuel costs were last reconciled in a rate case which covered a period ending with March 31, 1987.

Third, while WTU may be over-recovering during some of this year, they expect that will change to some extent during 1992.

Lone Star Files For Rate Change

Lone Star Gas Company, Manager, Scott Williams, filed Tuesday, February 5, for a rate change that will raise the average monthly residential gas bill by \$3.72.

"This rate change is necessary to continue the high performance levels our customers are accustomed to receiving," says Williams. "It will cover necessary operating expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, all vital to dependable service."

The last time Lone Star filed for a rate change in Santa Anna was in January of 1988.

"Lone Star will continue to work for reductions in the cost of the gas purchased for our customers, and any savings achieved are passed on to the customers each month through the gas cost adjustment," says Williams. "General increases in the cost of doing business make this request necessary" he said.

Based on Lone Star's application, a residential customer using an average of six thousand cubic feet of gas a month would see a change in

the monthly bill from \$41.95 to \$45.67.

"On one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to cover costs of service. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has the lowest average operating cost per customer compared to the other five major gas utilities serving Texas. We will always strive to provide the best possible service to our customers," Williams said.

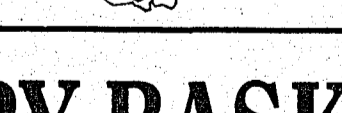

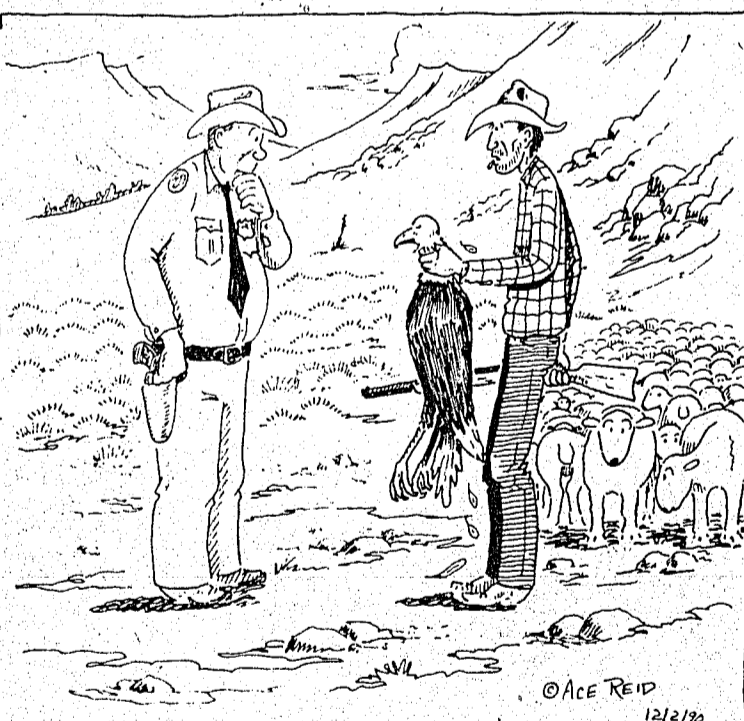

He was in no way surprised Home had moved up in rank to his present status.

Wednesday morning as I was putting the finishing touches to this edition of the News, Faye Mobley called to say she had just seen Bill Home being interviewed on CBS's morning news show, but it caught her by such surprise she didn't catch what was being said.
