Training Course


Pvt. Ruben Frausto has graduated from the combat signaler course at Ft. Gordon, Augusta, Georgia.







Rochelle Man Joins Local News Briefs-Legislative Race

ROCHELLE—Rochelle School Superintendent Kenneth "Tootsie" Mitchell, 60, has announced he will run for the 65th District representative seat being vacated by Jim

Mitchell joins the race with at least eight other hopefuls who are now seeking the office. Parker has taken a position as Gov. Ann Richard's liaison officer.

Mitchell is married to Ila Miller Mitchell, a retired school teacher. He has three children: Donna Gartman, a speech therapist and teacher in Brady; Kim Godwin, a business teacher in the Kaufman ISD; and Mary Rose, a physical education teacher in the Sugarland ISD. He holds a bachelor of science degree from Howard Payne University and a master's degree from Southwest Texas State University.

Mitchell served in the Air Force from 1950-54 then coached for 11 years at Rochelle, Junction and Robert Lee. He has been superintendent at Rochelle for 22 years.

Mitchell lists among his qualifications the fact that he is a landowner, taxpayer and a Democrat.

Mitchell said that he is heavily opposed to a state income tax. He says that he in favor of increased

sales tax and less ad valorem taxes, both to be aimed at taking the burden. off the home and land owner.

Bald eagles probably reside here from mid-November through March. Eagle sightings are not guaranteed, but the best time to see them is on cold or cloudy days, which keeps the eagles in the trees.

Ivie Reservoir water levels were Dec. 1, 1511.4 elevation, Dec. 15, 15ll.6 and Dec. 31, 1511.8 which averages to a 0.1 (tenth of a foot) rise per week. Water depth at Leaday Crossing is 42,8 feet. For the month of December, a total of 94,443 acre-feet had been impounded with a total surface area of 4,529 acres. The cooler temperatures of winter decrease the evaporation of water and the minimal flows of the various tributaries of the Concho and Colorado rivers are gradually increasing the elevation of the reservoir. On Jan. 5th, the water elevation reached 1512.0 representing the impoundment of 95,468 acre feet covering 5,140 surface acres.
