

# Thoughts From Our Pastors

Linwood E. Bishop Northside Church Of Christ

EZEKIEL'S DISMAL PICTURE

It is doubtful that many people today know much about the preaching of Ezekiel, even though he was one of those Old Testament prophets who demonstrated the ability to draw very vivid word pictures and graphic Home, illustrations, driving home his messages with clarity and force. As an example of this I suggest that the reader carefully study Ezekiel 14:12-20. Here the prophet addresses a condition so extremely dark and gloomy that even though three of the most outstanding characters in the Old Testament history were present in the land at that time, they should not be able to deliver but their own souls. In verse 14, he says, "Though these three men, Noah, Daniel, and Job, were in it, they should deliver but their own souls by their righteousness, saith the Lord God." This or similar language is repeated in verses 16, 18, and 20. Surely we do not need to labor the point that these three were outstanding characters in Old Testament history. But let us ask — for what particular trait was each of them famous?

NOAH'S PREACHING. The apostle Paul calls Noah a "preacher of righteousness" (II Peter 2:5), "Noah was a just man and perfect in his generations, and Noah walked with God" (Genesis 6:9). Noah was not only a preacher of righteousness, but he exemplified his preaching by a faithful, obedient life (See Hebrews 11:7). Every day that Noah worked on that ark, over a period of 120 years, was a practical demonstration of the message he was preaching, and an application of his faith in the Word of God. Surely he was an outstanding preacher of his day. Yet as practical and timely as it was, Ezekiel says it would be ineffective in turning those of his day away from their wickedness and idolatry. His influence, as great as it was, would not be able to turn the tide. Do you wonder about our

DANIEL'S PRAYERS. Daniel was strong in many areas of his life, but he was an especially strong man of prayer. He would not allow any one or any thing to interfere with his prayer life. He not only prayed, but his prayers were effective. His prayers actually altered the course of some events during his day. His faithful devotion to prayer exalted the name of Jehovah in the kingdoms of the world in his day. His refusal to honor the decree of Darius, the king of Medio-Persia and allowing himself to be cast into the lion's den, not only changed the immediate course of events, but also the attitude of the king and the course of the nation. But Ezekiel said that even Daniel, as powerful and influential as he was, could not change and save the people of his day. How about many in our day?

JOB'S PATIENCE. One cannot read the Bible story of the life of Job without being deeply impressed with his patience. Under every imaginable type and kind of sorrow and suffering which Satan could devise, Job was able to maintain his integrity and his patience. In Job one sees a man who is very human, and is therefore subject to human temptations and weaknesses, yet he refuses to falter. He will not let go of his faith in God. In spite of Satan's determination to break him, he will not bend. Such a man as Job could certainly be an asset and a great influence in any church of any community today, however, Ezekiel said his influence would not be enough to change and deliver the people of his day. What about those

#### Tax preparation a tax-free service

With the April 15 federal income tax deadline looming, many Texans have hired accountants or bookkeepers to prepare their tax returns.


But if any tax is due, it will only be to Uncle Sam. Income tax preparation is not subject to state taxes.

Even though the preparation isn't taxable, filing the return electronically with the IRS is a taxable telecommunications service. The tax should be paid by the bookkeeper or accountant if the electronic filing fee is included in your total bill. But if you're billed separately for the electronic transmission, you'll also be billed for the tax.

While income tax preparation is not taxable, other services in Texas such as credit reporting and cable television services are taxable. If you're not sure whether the service you're providing or buying is subject to sales tax, call the Comptroller's toll-free tax assistance hotline at 1-800-252-5555.
