## Views On School Finance Plan

### Brister Feels We May Be Back To Square One

Most everyone feels that equity is a key goal in financing our schools, but there is much question as to whether the new school finance bill signed last week by Governor Ann Richards is yet the answer.

Even as this is being written some of the wealthier school districts are considering filing suit to take it back to court. And as local school superintendent Gerald Brister commented Tuesday, "I can't say that I blame them." "Of course, we would like to share in their wealth, but if I were in their shoes, I wouldn't want to give it away either," he said, "I feel they have a legitimate argument." He added, "I'm just not sure that it is constitutional and we will be finding that out before its all over with."

"Looks to me like we are headed back to square one," he said.

Brister says he has read the full bill and on the surface it looks good for our school district until you start looking at all the strings attached. "It will," he says, "end up making us raise our taxes in order

to get maximum funding." He says its anybody's guess right now as to how much the probable tax increase would have to be, and neither does TEA know. (Texas Educational Agency). If you, the taxpayer, feel a little bit lost at this point, take heart, so does everybody else. TEA doesn't even understand the bill in its entirety and "neither does anyone else," says Brister.

When asked about the class for three-year-olds included in the bill, Brister said that the local school would not be able to identify enough students to qualify for the program. So far Santa Anna ISD has not even had to hold the age 4

program that has been in effect the past few years due to the fact that not enough students could be identified for the class to be held. He did remark that the 3-year old class would be an awfully expensive baby sitting program, "and that is just what it would be," he said.

Brister says that he believed the

legislature probably passed the present bill just to keep school financing from going back to the court. He feels, as many others have also expressed, that if the judge handled the situation, there would have been massive school consolidation. "However," he adds, "There may still be many small schools to go by the wayside, simply because they will be unable to afford the mandates of the next few years."

The legislature also set the school year at 180 days and Brister says it looks like right now that Santa Anna schools will probably open August 20. The five more days will not change that much for the local school as three teacher in-service days had already been scheduled "and now we will just go to school on those days." He did add that even though schools would not see a difference in payroll because of those added days, the cost of running school facilities for five more days across the state would be a terrific addition in cost to the state and the school districts.

## Family Outreach Gets Organized

Family Outreach of Coleman County was organized last week when members of the Steering Committee met to write by-laws and plan for the incorporation and charter of the group.

In two sessions, the group of local people met with Linda Ledger of Copperas Cove, a leader of the Family Outreach of America, Inc., to discuss plans and prepare guidelines for starting the volunteer group.

Kathy Dudley was elected presi-

dent of the group, and Jo Tyson is secretary. Some Committee appointments were made, and others will be named at the next meeting on Monday, April 29.

Family Outreach, which has over 30 groups in Texas, works with the Department of Human Services to provide aid to families who are at risk of child abuse or neglect. A professional caseworker will be assigned to the organization to assist volunteers with their work.

Sixteen people are currently tak-

ing part in the volunteer training with the Department of Human Services in Brownwood. They are equipped to provide help in parenting skills, referral services, counseling or other assistance the families may seek. The services are provided only for those who request help, but referrals may be made from schools, law enforcement agencies or individuals. It is estimated about 50 families in Coleman County could presently be helped by the

## Recycling Center To Open Here

If you are like the rest of us, you have often thought someone should do something about establishing a recycling collection center here in Santa Anna. Two young ladies have taken it upon themselves to spearhead a collection center that will be opening on a back section at Bradley Lumber Company.

Lori Kernes and Maribee Pritchard are the two who have been concerned enough to attempt to do something about our situation of filling our landfill with things that can be recycled and be useful once again instead of lying beneath the ground and taking up space for years to come.

Texas Recyclers of Brownwood will place containers inside the east gates at the south side of Bradley Lumber. Each container will be marked with the items that should be dumped there. There will be a container for aluminum cans (rinsed if possible), food cans (labels can be left on), milk jugs (rinsed out and caps off), plastic pop bottles, glass (which can include green, brown and clear glass, rinsed out. Labels and lids can be left on). There will be a container for newspapers which can include the colored inserts that often times arrive in your newspaper.

For right now the collection will be taken on Saturdays. If someone can not make it on the dropoff days, the ladies can arrange to have your items picked up, however these plans may change.

Money collected from the project will be put into a fund and used in

some way for improvement in the community.

The project is in the process of being established as a non-profit organization and will be given a name at a later date.

But for now we are happy to see the much needed project get off the ground. The ladies have received much favorable comment and hope all citizens of the community will take advantage of the recycling center.

It might interest you to know that a recent report from Derriel Warnock, Supt. Of Operations for the City Of Santa Anna, states that in the approximately one year that the new landfill has been in operation, it has taken what amounts to an estimated five years of garbage. For a facility that was projected to last for thirty years and takes one 6th of its fill in one year, you can see where we might be in trouble again in a few years. Santa Anna is not alone. Every community, large and small has the same problem. We are fortunate in the fact that as yet we are not having to contract hauling of our garbage to other far away centers as some communities are faced with.

If every citizen of Santa Anna would make a concentrated effort, the recycling center would help the community and our general environment in a great way.

## Capitol Comments

A school finance equity bill — Compromise Conference SB 351 — hopefully satisfied the perceived inequity in availability for public school financing. The bill passed the House and Senate and was signed into law by Governor Richards early last week. Judge McGowan ruled that unless contested and proven unconstitutional, the Finance Equity Plan met the courts requirements. A September 1, 1991 date is established as a review date for the final ruling on the plan's acceptability.

A number of important items have been introduced during the past week. These include:

\* Second reading approval on HB 330 which justifies an individual's use of deadly force in protection of themselves, their family or home, and protects the individual from liability for such an act.

\* HB 885 was approved on second reading limiting to once per year the frequency with which a person may serve on a grand jury.

\* HB 173 (sponsored by MADD) providing limited availability of an occupational driver's license to certain persons who have been convicted of DWI.

The session has become extremely fast paced, and the legislation load is increasing daily, it seems. At this time a special session, or more likely special sessions, seem inevitable, probably in July and August.

This past week we had school groups visiting from Panther Creek, Brownwood and Brooksmith. Let us know if you are bringing a school group because we can introduce them in the House of representatives, get pictures and arrange for Capitol tours. We welcome your visits.

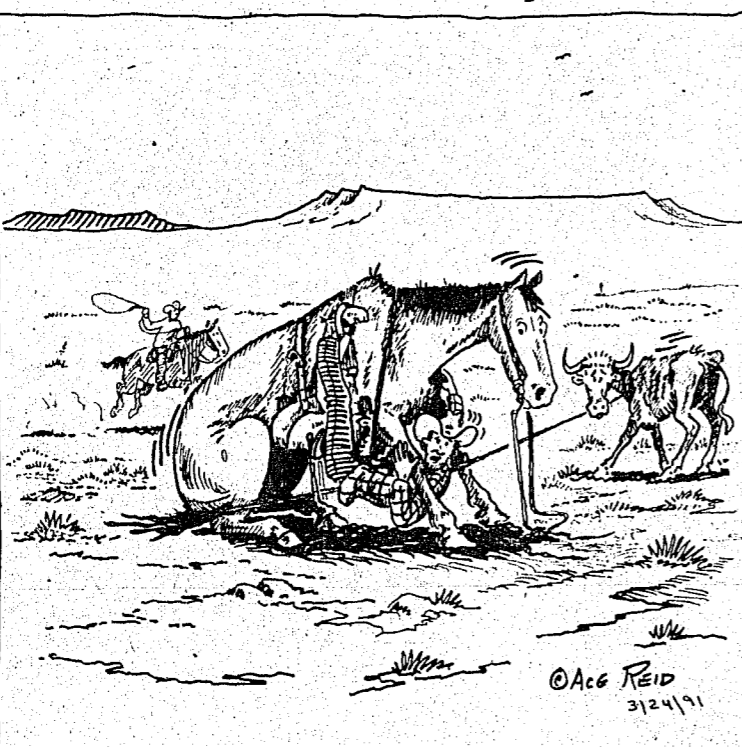

**Work To Begin On City Sewer Farm Project In June**

A letter to the editor in this week's edition of the NEWS prompted this editor to find out what professional relationship the letter writer had with the local city council, since he was commending some of their recent achievements. I checked with Mayor Gale Brock who informs me the letter writer, Fred Teagarden, is the City's consulting engineer and is the one who drew up the plans for the new sewer farm project, and the firm he is associated with, SK Engineering, also provided assistance in obtaining grants and loans for the necessary sewer farm project.

Mr. Teagarden had knowledge of the on-going negotiations in that matter with state agencies and land owners. Those negotiations with

And at less cost than had been expected by the council. Mr. Warnock was appointed by the council about three months ago to bring the negotiations to a favorable conclusion.

Those negotiations were completed this past week and a target date for work to begin on the sewer farm project is set for June of this year.

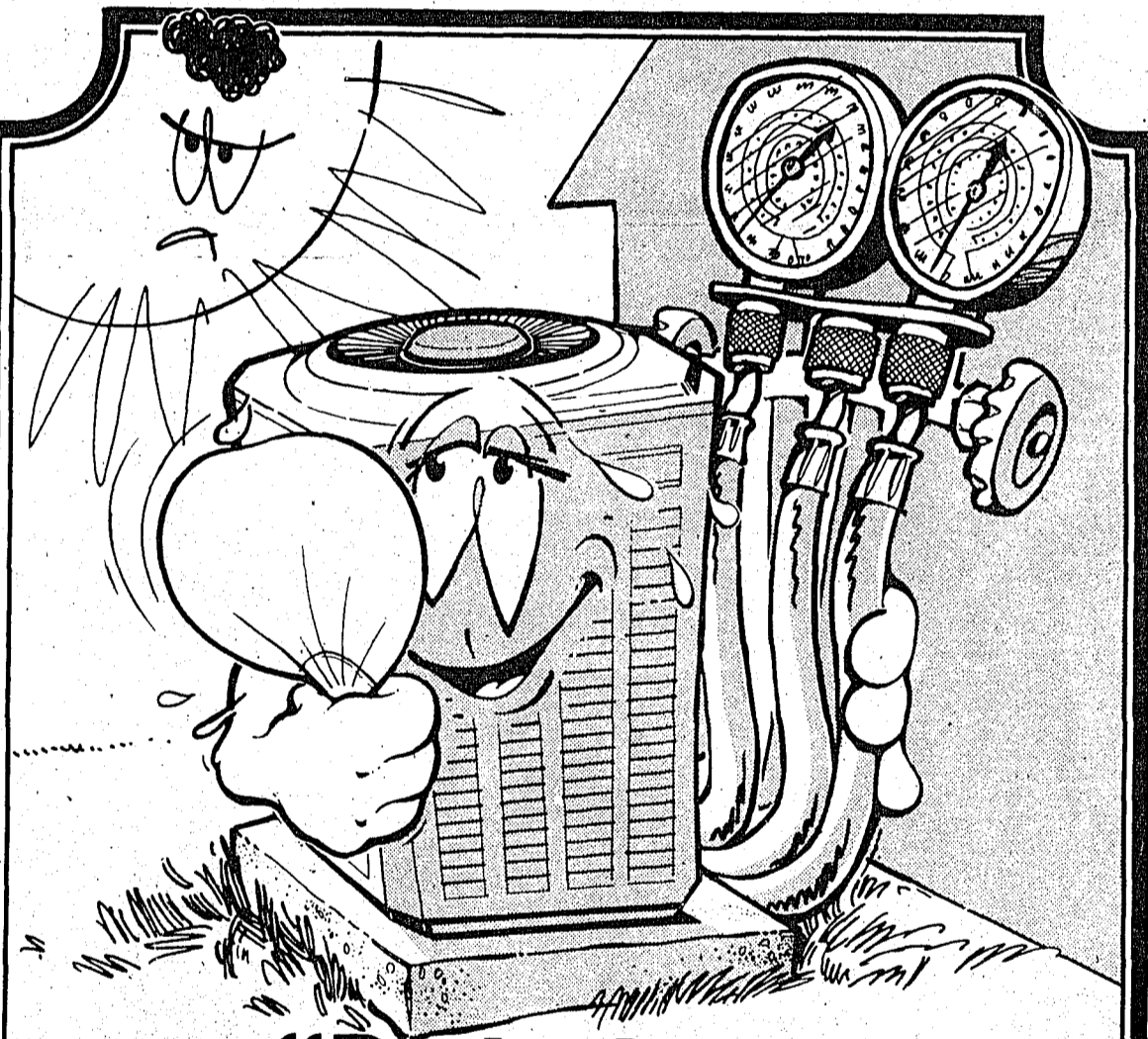

I immediately began to feel their anxiety, see the pain and fear in their eyes and wished I could bear some of the burden for them. It certainly wasn't like remarking that "it's only a game and they'll be okay." This was no game and there was no guarantee they were going to be okay. Especially not when the mother knew in her heart of hearts that her Marine was involved in the battle of Ryhad and another that her sons were probably also doing ground battle in that desert.

And those sitting on the sidelines were, this time, also heroes. You can't tell me that a mother trying to hold back the tears of fear is not a hero. You can't make me believe me that a father (some of whom had "been there" in earlier wars) trying to be brave for the rest of the family is not a hero. You can't tell me a young wife at home with a small child to care for is not a hero while waiting for her husband to return from the perils of war. You can not convince me that a child watching the newscasts night after night to try and determine that daddy or mommy, (as the case might have been in this war) is alright, is not a hero.

Many of those heroes here in our small town have in recent weeks and days had their worst fears relieved as their loved ones began to come back home. I am elated to be able to report the happy news that they are arriving in numbers, safe and sound. What a joyous report to be able to make!

We can report that the brothers Duquette, Craig and Jacky, have both returned to the states and have been visiting their families and friends in the area (doing a little fishing) and will be reporting soon to an Army base in Kentucky.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Texas State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison answers questions about personal finance and state government. These questions are compiled from various letters to the State Treasury. Answers are not intended to replace the advice of reputable financial advisers or other professional counselors.

**Q:** As parents of two elementary school-age children, we are concerned about saving for their college education. We are aware of U.S. Savings Bonds, but our question is, does the State of Texas offer any similar type of college savings bonds that might help us?

**A:** I understand your concern and I applaud you for planning ahead for your children's college education. Yes, Texas does offer state issued college saving bonds. As a matter of fact, several state agencies are authorized to issue college savings bonds. Before they are issued, however, these savings bonds must

be approved by the College Opportunity Act Committee of which I, as State Treasurer, am a member.

These bonds are tax-exempt, which means interest earned on them is exempt from federal income tax, regardless of their use. This allows the Purchaser to retain his or her tax-exempt yield on the investment, even if the purchaser's child should decide not to attend college.

These college savings bonds are sold in denominations ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000 -- with maturities ranging from five to 20 years. For information on which state agencies offer these bonds and how they can be purchased, call the Texas State Treasury's Office of Public Information at (512) 463-6000, or write P.O.
