## Views On School Finance Plan Brister Feels We May Be Back To Square One

Most everyone feels that equity is a key goal in financing our schools, but there is much question as to whether the new school finance bill signed last week by Governor Ann Richards is yet the answer.

Even as this is being written some of the wealthier school districts are considering filing suit to take it back to court. And as local school superintendent Gerald Brister commented Tuesday, "I can't say that I blame them." "Of course, we would like to share in their wealth, but if I were in their shoes, I wouldn't want to give it away either," he said, "I feel they have a legitimate argument." He added, "I'm just not sure that it is constitutional and we will be finding that out before its all over with. "Looks to me like we are headed back to square one," he said.

Brister says he has read the full bill and on the surface it looks good for our school district until you start looking at all the strings attached. 'It will," he says, "end up making us raise our taxes in order

The five more days will not change that much for the local school as three teacher inservice days had already been scheduled "and now we will just go to school on those days," He did add that even though schools would not see a difference in payroll because of those added days, the cost of running school facilities for five more days across the state would be a terrific addition in cost to the state and the school districts.

# **Recycling Center** To Open Here

do something about establishing a recycling collection center here in Santa Anna. Two young ladies have taken it upon themselves to spearhead a collection center that will be opening on a back section at Bradley Lumber Company.

Lori Kernes and Maribee Pritchard are the two who have been concerned enough to attempt to do something about our situation of filling our landfill with things that can be recycled and be useful once again instead of lying beneath the ground and taking up space for years to come.

Texas Recyclers of Brownwood will place containers inside the east gates at the south side of Bradley Lumber. Each container will be marked with the items that should be dumped there. There will be a container for aluminum cans (rinsed if possible), food cans (labels can be left on), milk jugs (rinsed out and caps off), plastic pop bottles, glass (which can include green, brown and clear glass, rinsed out. (labels and lids can be left on). There will be a container for newspapers which can include the colored inserts that often times arrive in your newspaper.

If every citizen of Santa Anna would make a concentrated effort, the recycling center would help the environment in a great way.



## **City Council Approves Budget Agrees To Name For Park**

Mayor Brock called the regular monthly meeting of the City Council to order last Tuesday evening, April 16 with all council members present. Also in attendance were City Secretary Alys Pelton, and Supt. of Operations Derriel Warnock as well as Jan Brixey who had requested audience with the council.

Mrs. Brixey spoke on behalf of the Yellow Ribbon Support Group, the Lions Club and others in the community who are involved with the veteran's memorial project. The park where the memorial is to be located, so the project group had been advised, is commonly known as the Kate Mathews Memorial Park and Mrs. Brixey requested that the group be allowed to put up a sign stating that it is also a veteran's memorial park. Mayor Brock advised the council that a copy of the deed shows that the City obtained the property on which the park is located through a tax sale in 1957. As far as City officials can

determine, the park has never officially been given a name although a garden club had taken care of the property for some time until recent years.

After some discussion, Councilwoman Karen Morris made the motion to designate the city-owned park on Wallis Ave as "Veteran's Memorial Park". Councilman Emmitt Simmons seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The 1991-1992 budget was presented to the council. The proposed budget for the Utility Fund consisted of expected revenues at \$368,250 and expected expenses at \$338,770 leaving a net income of \$29,480. The proposed General Fund budget called for revenues of \$143,500 and expenses of \$140,260 leaving a surplus of \$2,240.

Councilman Jim Spillman made the motion to approve the budget as presented. Quinton Daniel seconded and the motion which passed unanimously.

I immediately began to feel their arxiety, see the pain and fear in their eyes and wished I could bear some of the burden for them. It certainly wasn't like remarking that "its only a game and they'll be okay." This was no game and there was no guarantee they were going to be okay. Especially not when the mother knew in her heart of hearts that her Marine was involved in the battle of Ryhad and another that her sons were probably also doing ground battle in that desert.

And those sitting on the sidelines were, this time, also heros. You can't tell me that a mother trying to hold back the tears of fear is not a hero. You can't make me believe me that a father (some of whom had "been there" in earlier wars) trying to be brave for the rest of the family is not a hero. You can't tell me a young wife at home with a small child to care for is not a hero while waiting for her husband to return from the perils of war. You can not convince me that a child watching the newscasts night after night to try and determine that daddy or mommy, (as the case might have been in this war) is alright, is not a hero.

Many of those heros here in our small town have in recents weeks and days had their worst fears relieved as their loved ones began to come back home. I am elated to be able to report the happy news that they are arriving in numbers, safe and sound. What a joyous report to be able to make!

We can report that the brothers Duquette, Craig and Jacky, have both returned to the states and have been visiting their families and friends in the area (doing a little fishing) and will be reporting soon to an Army base in Kentucky.

Jerry Malaer, who happens to be my nephew, was perhaps the first of those we claimed as ours to come back to the States. He had been among the first to deploy when the troop movement began in August. He is safely back with his wife and child at Ft. Bliss in El Paso.

Lt. Col. Bill Horne, after many successful flights in the air war has returned to his home Marine base in North Carolina.

We received a report that Johnny Kirven's mom was to have driven to the Army's Fort Hood at Killeen this past Sunday to welcome her soldier son back home. As you read this he is probably visitng here in Santa Anna with relatives and old

Q. As parents of two elementary school-age children, we are concerned about saving for their college education. We are aware of U.S. Savings Bonds, but our question is, does the State of Texas offer any similar type of college savings bonds that might help us?

A: I understand your concern and applaud you for planning ahead for your children's college education. Yes, Texas does offer state issued college saving bonds. As a matter of fact, several state agencies are authorized to issue college savings bonds. Before they are issued, nowever, these savings bonds must



be approved by the College Opportunity Act Committee of which I, as State Treasurer, am a member.

These bonds are tax-exempt, which means interest earned on them is exempt from federal income tax, regardless of their use. This allows the Purchaser to retain his or her tax-exempt yield on the investment, even if the purchaser's child should decide not to attend college.

These college savings bonds are sold in denominations ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000 -- with maturities ranging from five to 20 years. 





3) Virtually eliminate fat for greasing or sauteing.


