## Brock Re-Elected Mayor Spillman, Kellar Take Council Seats Simmons & Guthrie To School Board

Mayor Gale Brock was given a vote of confidence when she was handed another term during Saturday's City election as was Councilman Jim Spillman. Danny Kellar was elected to take the seat formally held by Quinton Daniel, who chose not to seek re-election. Each will serve two-year terms.

Voting in the City Election went like this:

MAYOR: Gale Brock 112; Susie Voss 62.

COUNCIL: Jim Spillman 158; Danny Kellar 130; John Morris 31; Craig Terry 19; and Norman Asher 15.

There were a total of 181 votes cast in the light voter turnout.

The School Board election drew the interest of 193 voters who gave the nod to Barbara Simmons and Sharon Guthrie to fill the places formally held by Danny Kellar and Danny Cook, neither of whom chose to seek re-election to the board. Simmons garnered 163 votes; Guthrie pulled in 148; and the third candidate, Eddie Jones, received 55 votes.

The new school board members will serve three-year terms.

## Pearce: "Good To Be Home"

It feels good to be back home once again. Last year I was involved with Operation Just Cause/Promote Liberty down in Panama. This year I have spent the past four months on active duty with Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm.

While in Saudi Arabia I lived out in the desert approximately 30 miles south of the Iraqi border and west of the town of Hafr al Batin. This area is flat with very little vegetation other than grass that comes up whenever it rains.

As soon as the war was over I

went to work in one of the many prisoner of war camps. The one I was in had approximately 16,000 prisoners. The camp turned over several thousand prisoners to the Saudis busy as the British pulled out they turned over their prisoners to us and kept the number around the previous figure. I worked as a medic in the camp clinic and was responsible for treating war injuries, dehydration, and the everyday problems that effect a large population such as the one in the camp.

The Saudis were in the process of buying the camp facilities and taking over the operation of the camp as I and the unit I was with was in

the process of pulling out of the country. Also as we were pulling out, the army evacuation hospitals were filling up with Iraqi civilians who were coming from the civil war that was going on in Iraq.

I really appreciated the picture I received from everybody here in Santa Anna. All of the troops in the war zone appreciated the support from here at home. Being welcomed home has also been a rewarding experience for the soldiers as well as myself.

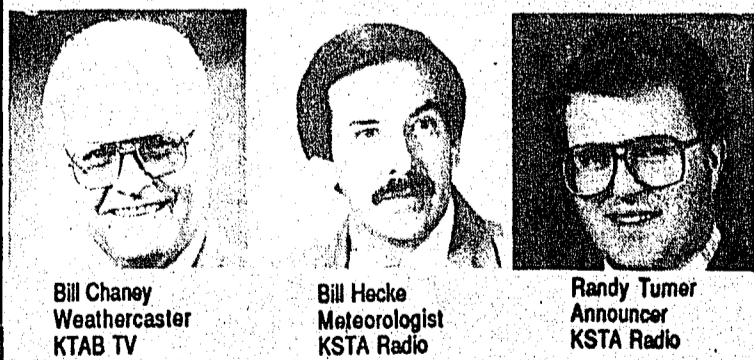

This past week - in observance of Annual Earth Day - it was especially so - with a large group of concerned citizens gathered inside and outside the building. Also, this week was highlighted by the opportunity I was given to sit in on a session with Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro, during which he presented us with an update on the current status of the Veteran's Land programs.

Last Tuesday, April 23rd, the Texas Farm Bureau were here for their annual leaders legislative day, presenting us with their agenda of rural and agricultural concerns. On Wednesday, the 24th it was Annual Speaker's Day - a day when both past and present House members were honored. I was so pleased to have five former State Representatives from our area present - Mr. A. J. Bishop from Winters, County Judge Scott Bailey from Eastland County, Ben Barnes, Lynn Nabors, and Jim Parker. One piece of legislation that is of great interest in the 65th District is House Bill 7 concerning teacher retirement issues. The bill is scheduled for a first hearing on the House floor this week. I have signed on as a co-sponsor of the bill and feel that it has a very good probability of passage.

House Bill 2443 was approved in the House the past week, further deregulating the trucking industry. The bill will exempt producers of livestock, feed lots, and slaughter operations from having to hire Railroad Commission licensed haulers. This will provide competition, and should reduce livestock hauling costs substantially.

I am happy to report that a number of visitors from the district have been in the office this week - including classes of school children. This is thoroughly enjoyable and I look forward to all visits. Again, let me express my pleasure in representing you in state government, and encourage you to feel free to call on my staff or I at any time. 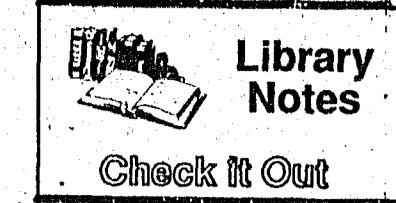

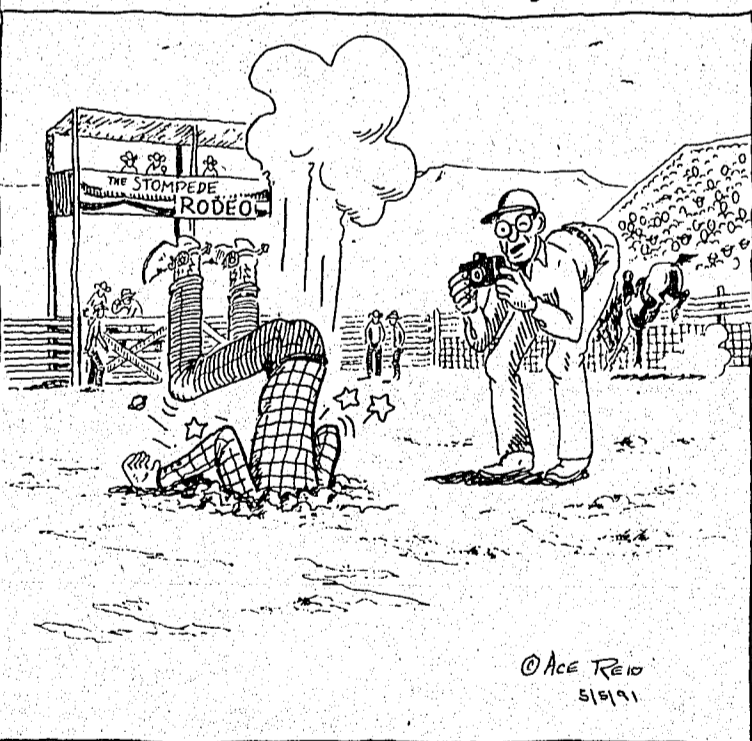
## Self Culture Club Funtier Bake Sale To Benefit Library

## Mountainside Viewpoint

Seems I spend half of my time "puttin' my foot in my mouth" and the other half trying to disentangle it!

Normally I wouldn't give an unsigned letter a second thought as it would go immediately to the trash. However, I received one Monday morning that I felt required a response.

Last week, my Viewpoint column concerned the fact that more and more out-of-town subscribers are complaining of not receiving their papers thru the mail in what they feel should be a reasonable length of time and sometimes not at all.

The letter received Monday went like this:

"While apologizing for the U.S. Postal Service, why don't you include an apology for your paper, also. As the price has doubled to 50 cents a copy, we notice you still make mistakes, spellings, etc. Therefore you are not perfect either."

Now folks, let me assure you, the price of the paper has no bearing on the mistakes I make....I would make them at any price! Anybody who reads "my" paper regularly knows how many times I find myself apologizing for errors. The same errors found in any newspaper regardless of size. Anyone who knows me knows I have never claimed to be perfect, far from it. In fact, I am often the brunt of my own jokes about mistakes on the printed pages of the Santa Anna News.

I am, though, truly sorry about the price of "my" paper going up. However that was a decision made in the corporate office, one that I had no choice in. (Oops, there goes another mistake... ending a sentence with a preposition). I didn't like the price hike any more than you did, but it just wasn't my decision to make. You see, this is not "my" paper. It is owned by a quite large corporation. I would like to clarify that subscribers receive their Santa Anna News at 29 cents per copy. It is only at the news stand that the cost is 50 cents. The raise in rates from 25 cents across the board was due in part to the recent postal rate increase and in part to other costs that continue to climb.

As I stated in my column last week, and thought I made quite clear, the problems we are having with mail delivery have absolutely nothing to do with our local Post Office. In fact, as I said in last week's Viewpoint, our local postal employees have always been most helpful in every way possible, often going out of their way of duty to be of help. They are a very professional bunch who do a very fine job. Our local Postmaster has helped us in solving many of our out-of-town and out-of-state delivery problems by contacting postal officials in specific problem areas. I received a notice only this week of a delivery watch he requested for me which proved to be successful and that person in Burleson will probably be receiving

her paper regularly now that the problem spot is identified.

The fact remains that out-of-town, especially out-of-state, mail delivery problems for the Santa Anna News are on the increase. If we can determine that information on our mailing labels is correct, and the paper is directed to the correct distribution point, we can only assume that slow delivery or non-delivery is a problem "somewhere out there" within the U.S. Postal Service, although certainly not within our local Post Office. You know as well as I that any agency as large as the U.S. Postal Service is bound to have problems now and then. I merely stated a fact in hope that out-of-town subscribers would realize the problems occur after the newspapers leave Santa Anna, absolving our local postal employees of any guilt in the

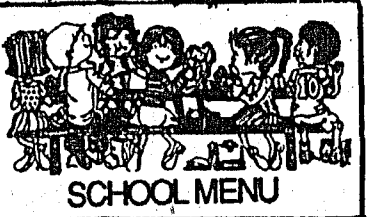

## Pointers For Parents

### Putting Kids First

Children are the future of our society and of our world. Children do not exist in order to satisfy their parents' needs or fancies—but the self-absorbed value system that has grown up in America since the 1960s teaches us otherwise. The self-declared arbiters of value tell us that what we want is instant gratification—and we want our children to stay out of our way while we take care of our own desires.

What sort of adults will grow from these children without childhoods, these children we hurry to keep up and grow up so they won't interfere with our wants? A pretty good guess would be adults even more self-absorbed, more selfish, more insistent on instant gratification than their parents—and the world those adults would inhabit would be even less safe and less humane than the one we live in now.

So what can we do? We can rebuild the sense of community that existed in this country before our selfishness and its symptoms—especially drug abuse—tore it apart. We must not forget that the most important people in our communities are our children. Children need a nurturing, value-affirming environment to build the confidence and self-esteem it takes to grow into productive adults.

In the 1960s and '70s, the prevailing wisdom had it that government programs should take the place of traditional social institutions. That was not true then, and it isn't true now—government cannot replace family and community.

Government can, however, shore up the traditional institutions. The best example of a federally-funded program that does that is Head Start, which provides year-round early education, health care, nutrition and social services to poor children and their families. It also strengthens family structure by drawing parents into the Centers' programs and management, building among them a sense of citizenship, social obligation and community membership.

All parents should ask themselves what's really more important—being able to buy children the latest video game, or being able to spend time with them as a family. Children don't need material things nearly as much as they need their parents' love and time, as well as a sense of belonging to the society in which they live. It's time we put kids first; it's time to work toward a new way of building and sustaining communities of concern for our children so that they, in turn, can build a better future for our society.

## Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc. Excerpts from the Cooperative's bylaws

### ARTICLE III

#### Directors

**SECTION 1. GENERAL POWERS.** The business and affairs of the Cooperative shall be managed by a board of nine (9) directors who shall exercise all of the powers of the Cooperative except such as are by law or by the articles of incorporation of the Cooperative or by these bylaws conferred upon or reserved to the members.

**SECTION 2. QUALIFICATIONS & TENURE.** At the annual meeting of the members in 1960, three (3) directors shall be elected by and from the members to serve for a period of three (3) years from the date of their election, or until their successors shall have been elected and shall have qualified. Thereafter at each annual meeting of the members of the Cooperative, three (3) directors shall be elected by and from the members to serve for a period of three (3) years from the date of their election, or until their successors shall have been elected and shall have qualified, subject to the provisions of these bylaws with respect to the removal of directors. No member shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold any position of trust in the Cooperative who is not a bona fide resident in the area served by the Cooperative, or who is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the Cooperative, and no person shall take or hold office as a director who is the incumbent or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid. When a membership is held jointly by a husband and wife, either one, but not both, may be elected a director, provided, however, that neither one, but not both, may be elected a director, provided however, that neither one shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold a position of trust in the Cooperative unless both shall meet the qualifications hereinabove set forth. Nothing in this section contained shall, or shall be construed to, affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the board of directors.

**SECTION 2-A. RESIDENCE OF DIRECTORS.** Not more than one director may be elected from the same detail area of the territory served by Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Incorporated, as such territory and detail area are defined and shown on the current map of the Cooperative as established by the board of directors; such detail areas being drawn off by red pencil. If, after his or her election a director of the Cooperative shall, for the purpose of residing therein, move into a detail area wherein on other director of said Cooperative is then residing, the office of the director so moving into such detail area shall automatically become vacant without further action on the part of the Cooperative or its board of directors, shall at its first regular or special meeting thereafter name and appoint a qualified member of the Cooperative as director to fill the unexpired term of the director so moving into such detail area so disqualifying himself or herself.

**SECTION 3. NOMINATIONS.** It shall be the duty of the board of directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one hundred and twenty (120) days before the date of a meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a committee on nominations consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members who shall be selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee to the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. No officer or member of the board of directors shall be appointed a member of such committee. The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days before the meeting a list of nominations for directors; but any fifteen (15) or more members may make other nominations in writing over their signatures not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting and the secretary shall post the same at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. The secretary shall mail with the notice of the meeting a statement of the number of directors to be elected and showing separately the nominations made by the committee on nominations and the nominations made by petition, if any. The members may, at any meeting at which a director or directors shall be removed, as hereinabove provided, elect a successor or successors thereto without compliance with the foregoing provisions with respect to nominations. Notwithstanding anything in this section contained, failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any election of directors.

County Auditor Shirley Sansing reported that Precincts 2 and 3 each need funds to pay their bills. She also presented a summary of fund transfers to the several precincts since Jan. 1. The commissioners then voted to transfer \$10,000 from the General Road and Bridge Fund to each of the 4 precincts.

Henry Turner, commander of the local Texas State Guard unit, informed the commissioners about the history and current functions of that group. Currently there are nine volunteers in the local unit. He described their mission as being non-confrontational, and that they are ready to serve either the state, the county, or the city in a time of crisis.

He asked for information about how to go about getting medical insurance and liability coverage for the members while performing

duties requested by the sheriff or chief of police. If called up by the governor, he said the members have such protection. The informa-

tion he got was that if it costs money, the county financial situation is such that no more expenses can be approved.

No action was requested by Turner and none was taken. Turner will try to learn how such problems are handled by other counties and citizens of the state and he will inform the commissioners.

A letter has been received that the geologist's inspection of the abandoned Talpa dump ground indicates no post closure maintenance is needed at this time. Inspections will continue through 1994.

County Attorney Joe Dan LeMay reported he had no information about legislative progress in Austin on the bill seeking to set up the office of District Attorney for Coleman.

The provisions of Article IX of the Texas Constitution were discussed. These relate to the process of setting up an election to determine whether or not voters want to establish a hospital tax district. A petition is currently being circulated asking the Commissioners Court to call such an election.

## Stenholm Supports Community Fellowship Meets

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) announced plans to support H.R. 7, the Brady Bill, when it comes to the floor of the House of Representatives for a vote.

"The time is long overdue that we begin to get tough on crime," said Stenholm. "While this bill is admittedly only a small step toward this goal, it is a step in the right direction."

"I have studied the issue thoroughly and it does not infringe on the Second Amendment of the Constitution because it does not deny law-abiding citizens the right to bear arms. It is just good common sense."

The Brady Bill allows local law enforcement officers to conduct a background check on all buyers before they may purchase a handgun. Law officials are given up to seven days to complete the background check. If they fail to complete the work in that time frame, the weapon can be legally sold without verification. The idea is to cut down on the number of convicted criminals and mentally ill individuals who are able to purchase a handgun.

Stenholm pointed out that while the National Rifle Association (NRA) is currently fighting against the Brady Bill, claiming it violates a person's right to bear arms, the group's philosophy was

the opposite in the mid-1970's. An earlier NRA pamphlet stated, "A waiting period could help in reducing crimes of passion and in preventing people with criminal records or dangerous mental illness from acquiring guns. A waiting period should be clearly specified, fixed, and reasonable in time after which the firearm should be delivered unless the purchaser is disqualified by the police."

Stenholm, who is a gun owner and sportsman, said the Brady Bill should be a part of a strong omnibus crime bill.

"The law-abiding people of this country have a right to be protected," Stenholm explained. "This can be achieved by our courts getting tougher on the criminal!"

The Congressman is in favor of increasing the number of crimes punishable by death, reforming and limiting the number of appeals for death row inmates, denying parole to convicted murderers, mandatory sentencing and allowing the use of evidence discovered by police during searches conducted in "good faith". He also supports rehabilitation programs and the construction of additional prisons to cut down on the early release of convicts because of overcrowding.

The Brady Bill is expected to be voted on in the House of Representatives by mid-May.

Members of the community can help by visiting or volunteering at a nursing home and participating in its activities. In the process, the visitors can get to know the people who live in long-term care facilities and see the quality of care provided by the staff. At the same time, residents of the community can learn about the facilities that they may someday need for themselves or their loved ones.

Encouraging community-nursing home contact are members of the American College of Health Care Administrators (ACHCA), a non-profit professional society of administrators in long-term health care facilities, agencies and programs. 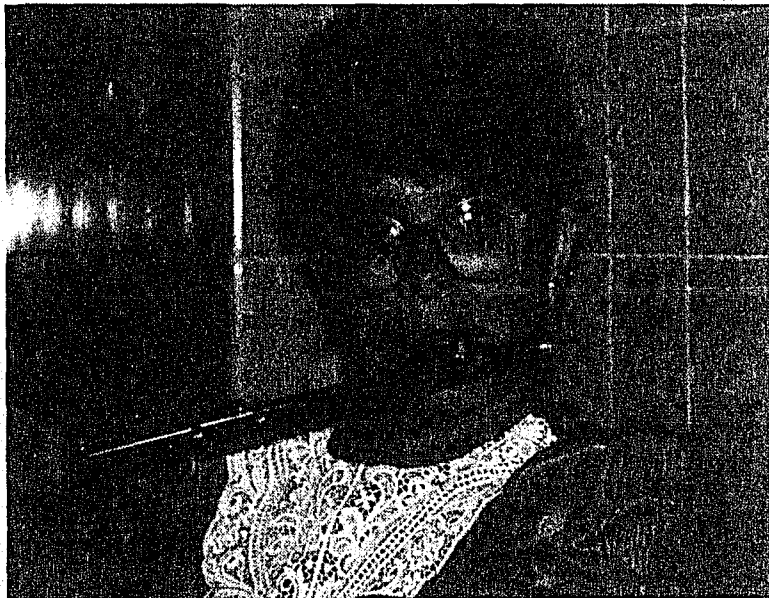

tell you of Pearce's involvement in the war until his return home. We here in Santa Anna are proud of his service to our country as we are of all our troops who showed themselves to be so capable during the recent war. The following article written by Anthony Wilson appeared in the Abilene Reporter-News as Pearce returned home a couple of weeks ago.

Sgt. John Pearce said he felt a little like a small boy playing toy soldiers going into the Persian Gulf war.

But after 2½ months as a medic's assistant in an allied-run prisoner of war camp, Pearce emerged a crusty, war-torn veteran.

"It's fun to think about war", Pearce conceded. "But once you get into it, it's not pretty. Any soldier worth his salt will tell you war isn't pretty. There's nothing good about it. I'll go when I'm needed, but I don't want my children to go. That's why I went."

Pearce was the first of the 14 members of the 490th Civil Affairs Company deployed to Saudi Arabia to return to Abilene Sunday morning. At his home in Santa Anna later that night, he told tales of his contact with the 16,000-plus Iraqi warriors in the POW camp.

"They were like you and I", Pearce said. "They were people from all walks of life who were caught up in the war. There was a handful of soldiers from the Republican Guard, but most were uneducated, everyday people."

"They would fire a few token shots, raise their white flags, and be glad to surrender. They were glad to be taken care of. I never feared for my life. They were that docile".

Pearce added that American soldiers almost literally killed their enemies with kindness, giving the dehydrated prisoners too much to eat after capturing them in the Kuwaiti and Iraqi deserts.

"I told the soldiers they were being too good to them because the GIs let them gorge themselves on MREs (meals ready to eat) and they had stomach problems", he said. "We were being so good to them, we were hurting their health. It was like the kid getting into the apple pie."

Pearce admitted that at times, he and Saudi officials felt compassion toward their "Arab brothers", many of whom suffered from skin disease, diabetes, stomach ailments and wounds from Iraq's war with Iran. A few hypochondriacs regularly visited the camp's hospital to garner better care and eyeball American women," he said.

"I'm afraid I did feel sorry for them even after what I saw they did to Kuwait", he said. "When you see someone suffering, it's hard not to feel sorry for them. It's hard to explain why one minute, you're ready to kill, and the next, you feel sorry for them."
