## Michael Hartman Texas Tech Law School Graduate

## Christie Wins The Silver

Santa Anna High School freshman, Christie Beal, brought home the Silver Medal after placing second in state in the 100m hurdles in Austin on Saturday. She finished 3 of a second behind the first place finisher, Monica Pfeifer of Nordheim, who ran a 15.4 ahead of Christie's 15.7.

Coach Dean Bass reminds us that the last time a Santa Anna High School girl track star won a medal in a running event in a State track meet was when Liz Morris set a

new state record in the 440 yard dash in 1976 and came home with the Gold during her senior year at SAHS. In fact, as records indicate Christie is the first Santa Anna girl to be entered at State in a running event since Liz's appearance there.

In recent years Santa Anna was represented in field events by Patricia Jackson in 1982, placing 4th in the triple jump and 5th in the long jump; and last year when Shannon Brown brought home the gold medal in the long jump event.

Christie also ran a leg on the 800 meter relay team which finished seventh in a fast field of sprinters. The Lady Mountaineers (Beal, Elisha Blanton, Amy Boyet, and Martha Frausto) sped the course in 1:50.6... their best effort of the year, but Austin is a very big place. Miles won the event in 1:45.6 while Vega was second (1:46.8), Moulton third (1:46.9), Munday fourth (1:47.0), Jonesboro fifth (1:49.2) and Avinger sixth (1:49.7). Coach Dean Bass has to be encouraged with his relayers' performance though.... Beal, Boyet, Blanton and alternate

## Veterans Memorial Park Near Ready For Dedication

According to a report received Monday, the Veterans Memorial Park is nearing completion and just about ready for the dedication services which will be held Monday, May 27.

A large number of volunteers has worked together to raise funds, build the fence, pour concrete sidewalks, set three flagpoles, plant flower boxes, and numerous other chores that the project has required. Flags, which are spot-lighted at nighttime, are already flying. They include the American Flag, The Texas Flag, and presently, the D.A.V. Flag. Organizers are searching for a Veterans' Flag to replace the D.A.V. flag and would appreciate any help in locating one. If you have any information on how to obtain one, please contact Gary Absher.

One planter box has been at the location for some time and planners hope to have four more built. The Presbyterian Church plans to build one, as does the SDA Pathfinders Club and the First Baptist Youth. Needed is one more group to build the fifth box. The brick is available.

Pat Smith and Lori Kernes are planning to paint some murals on the adjacent building.

The park is located on Wallis Avenue between B & B Convenience Store and the building which for many years housed Matthews Motor Company.

The memorial marker is expected to be set some time this week. The inscription will read as follows: "Dedicated to all United States Military Personnel Who Have Risked Their Lives For God and Country and to the Rebirth of Patriotism in this Great Nation."

Anyone wishing to donate to the project may do so at Santa Anna National Bank. The fund presently lacks about \$200 paying for the project.

State Representative Bob Turner will be the speaker for the dedication ceremony on May 27. Others on the program will include the SAHS Band, a Military Color Guard and American Legion firing battery. The Mayor will be master of ceremonies and other local people will perform ceremonial duties.

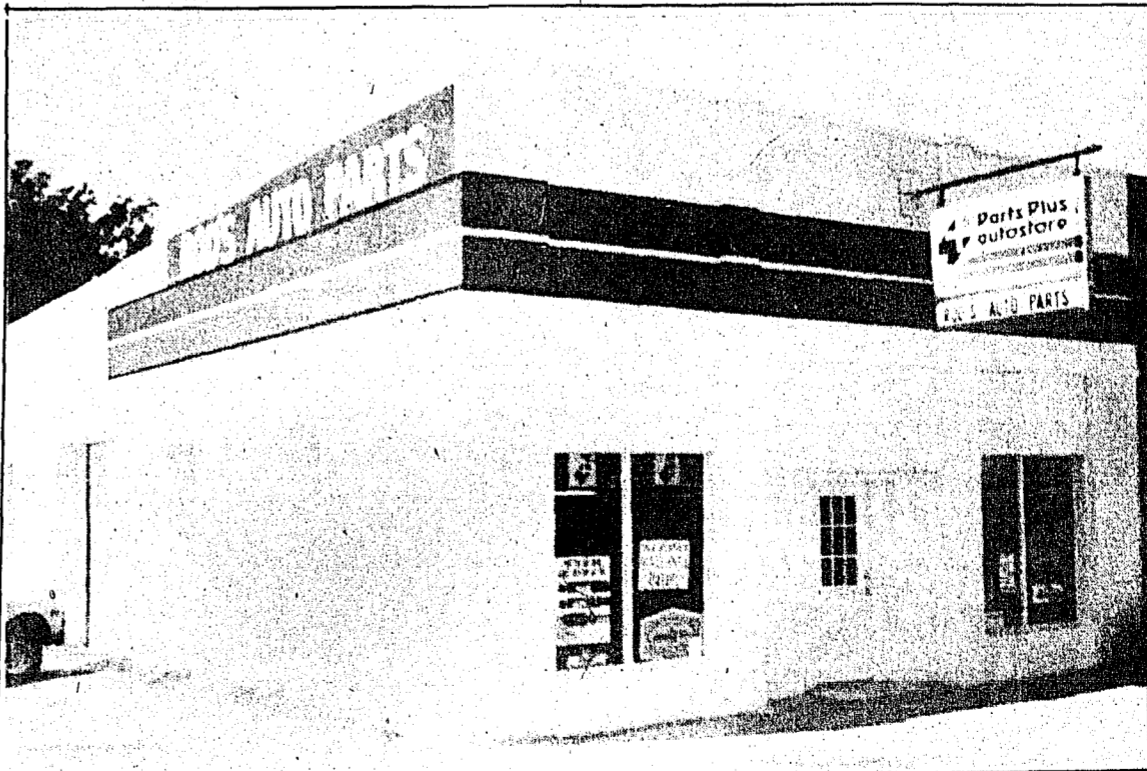

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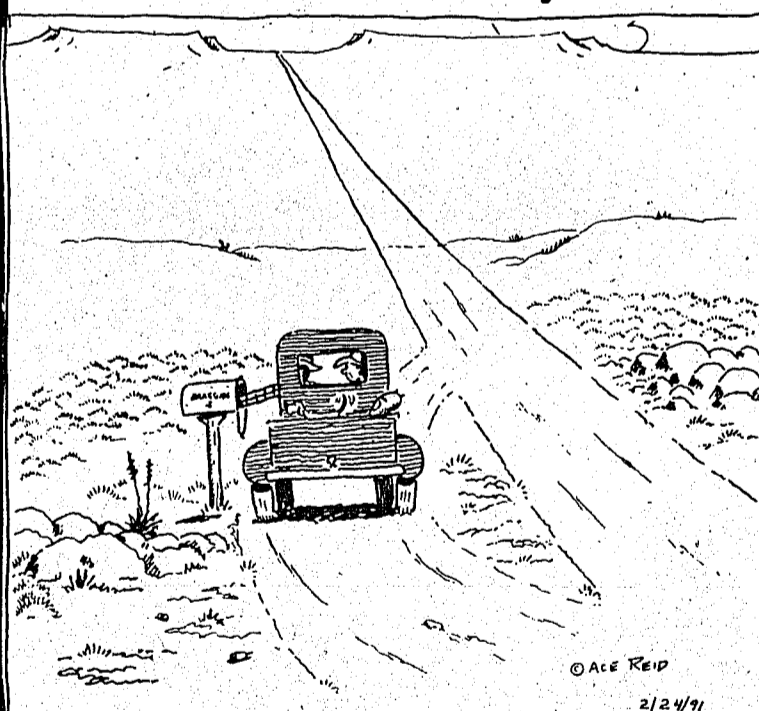

### CHOSE YE THIS DAY...

"How long halt ye between two opinions? If the Lord be God, follow him; but if Baal, then follow him." 1 Kings 18:21

Poor Elijah! He had been at high tension for days, and his physical exertion had been extreme. He had looked death in the face. For a few hours he had lived in supreme spiritual exultation and had won a mighty victory over the opposition of the idolatrous king, priests, and people. Now came the reaction.

The weary prophet lay down under a desert juniper tree and wanted to die—he even prayed to die. It is good that God does not always give us what we ask. Elijah thought that his work was done and there was nothing more to live for. He wanted to die. But God knew that what he needed was rest, sleep, and food. And there under the Juniper tree Elijah found them at an angel's hand. Rockwood Homecoming Scheduled For Sunday, May 26

According to an announcement from Rockwood correspondent to the Santa Anna News, Gladys Hunter, the Rockwood Community Homecoming has been set for Sunday, May 26. Everyone is invited to attend, especially those with ties to the Rockwood community. Meat and drinks for the noon meal will be furnished. Those attending may bring other foods.

Commissioners Set Hospital Election

County Judge W. W. "Pete" Skelton was busy elsewhere in the courthouse and so was unable to preside at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court on Monday, May 13. In his absence, Commissioner Max Horne presided. All commissioners were present as were four visitors and two media representatives.

The lengthy agenda was efficiently handled.

The hospital district election petition which has been circulating was checked by the Assessor-Collector to verify that a sufficient number of the signers are registered voters. Billie Baker and her staff confirmed the validity of the petition while the commissioners court meeting was going on.

Upon receipt of that certification, the members of the court discussed details for setting up an election. They chose the date of June 29th. Absentee balloting will begin 20 days before that, and will be held at the Miller Library. The special election on the 29th will be held at regular voting places throughout the county.

Mary Griffis, speaking for the

Chamber of Commerce, requested and received approval for placing decorative lights in front of and beside the courthouse. The commissioners agreed that the county would maintain the installed fixtures, replacing the bulbs as necessary at county expense. Ross Jones also spoke to the group about the project. The Chamber of Commerce will ask citizens to purchase the individual poles as gifts to the community. The city has agreed to do the installation work.

All of the counties along the former Orient Railroad route west through Coleman to the Mexican border have approved the establishment of a railroad district which hopes to continue operating the line after the Santa Fe abandons it. The request was received for Coleman County to elect a member of the board of directors of the group. The first meeting is scheduled in Fort Stockton next week. The commissioners elected Judge Skelton as county representative.

Will Parks, of the Texas Highway Department, asked for county assistance in seeking federal re-designation for FM 1929 in south

Coleman County. Since there is no additional cost to the county, the commissioners approved the request to designate that road in the Ivie Reservoir area as part of a "federal aid secondary road system."

Eddie Lewis of Geoffroy Gas Systems made an informal request for approval of an easement to be bored under the county road east of Talpa Cemetery. The topic was not on the agenda, and so no formal action was taken. Lewis, however, was given instructions about easement request processes. He had in hand a certificate of insurance liability, and left the meeting certain that approval is assured upon completion of the paper work.

In other actions and discussions the commissioners:

-Received thanks from the Concho Food Bank for the help the county gives in distributing surplus food.

-Transferred \$200 a month from Precinct 2 to Precinct 1 for the salary of the operator of the shredder which is now clearing right of way on roads in Precinct 1.

-Adopted a policy that each

elected county official is to be the "Designated Records Management Officer" for their office.

-Treasurer Barbara Freeman reported receipts for the first seven months of the fiscal year as \$1,883,323.30 and disbursements as \$1,675,406.44.

-Approved for payment bills prepared by Auditor Shirley Sansing as follows:

General Fund - \$31,716.00  
Gen. Road & Bridge - \$658.28  
Precinct No. 1 - \$1,999.09  
Precinct No. 2 - \$1,738.50  
Precinct No. 3 - \$3,406.20  
Precinct No. 4 - 2,388.13  
Workers Compensation Fund - \$220.00

-Rains seem to always mean leaks in the roofs of county structures - this time both the courthouse and the jail. The Sheriff had asked to be present to discuss leaks in the jail roof. He was not present, and so no action was taken. Commissioners wanted to permit some drying time before attempting to discuss solutions to leaks in the courthouse roof.

Rep. Bob Turner Concerned About House Redistricting

Back home over the weekend, Representative Bob Turner expressed concern over the preliminary house redistricting plan as announced last week. Further, he advised that he is already working to see if he cannot get a more acceptable plan in the final redistricting.

The plan would have Turner losing Runnels, McCulloch, Brown, Comanche and Eastland, and he

does not want to lose these counties. Voters from these counties elected him to his position. He is hopeful that the lines can be re-drawn so that he can retain all, or most of his current district.
