7th Grader To Be Honored For High College Entrance Score

Dawna Snipes, a student at Santa Anna Junior High will be honored for her academic achievement at a statewide ceremony on June 10, 1991 at Trinity University.

The recognition ceremony is sponsored by the Duke University Talent Identification Program (TIP) to salute

seventh-graders from Texas who qualified in TIP's eleventh annual Talent Search. All students invited to the ceremony have earned scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American Col-

lege Testing Assessment (ACT) comparable to the average scores of college-bound high school seniors. Dawna is the daughter of Tommy and Susan Snipes. Mrs. Snipes is a teacher in the local school.

The students will receive certificates of distinction at the ceremony. The highest Scorers will also receive summer program scholarships and books.

TIP conducts recognition ceremonies in each of the 16 states it serves in the Southeast, Midwest, and Southwest. Over 57,000 mathematically and verbally able seventh graders were identified by the program this year. TIP offers additional educational opportunities for gifted students in seventh through tenth grades.

TIP is a non-profit educational organization established in 1980 with a five-year grant from The Duke Endowment. The program receives continuing support from student fees, individuals, corporations and foundations.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend.

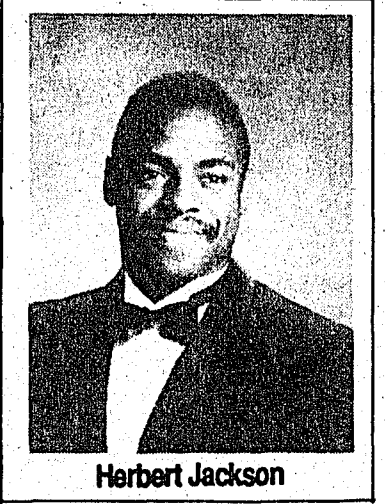
Graduation is scheduled for Friday, May 31 at Mountaineer Stadium at 8:00 p.m. State Representative Bob Turner will be the guest speaker.

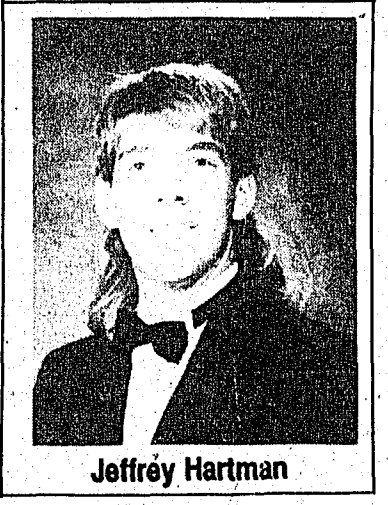

City Council Takes Care Of Business Also Listens To Complaints

The City Council took care of some important business during their regular monthly meeting last week but apparently also had to spend considerable time hearing complaints.

Checking the minutes as submitted to the Santa Anna News by the City Secretary, they revealed five complaints brought to the attention of the council. Four of the complaints were taken note of, none apparently requiring any council action.

However, the final one mentioned will be checked out more thoroughly.

Mayor Gale Brock opened the meeting with an invocation and told those gathered the invocation would become a part of every meeting. Jan Brixey, representing the Yellow Ribbon support group, had asked for a place on the agenda, but a brief report of the Veteran's Memorial Park project and dedication was given by councilwoman Karen Morris in Mrs. Brixey's absence.

Councilman Tom Hays was appointed Mayor Pro-Tem.

Appointed to the Library Board were Alice Spillman, Betty Key, Barbara Simmons, Imogene Powers and Patsy Starr.

BROWNWOOD—Services for Martin "Marty" Lehnis IV, 45, of Glendale, Ariz., formerly of Brownwood, were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, May 14, at Davis-Morris Funeral Home, Brownwood, with the Rev. Joe Priddy officiating. Interment was in Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mr. Lehnis died May 8, 1991 in Wickenburg, Ariz. after a sudden illness.

He was born November 21, 1945, in Santa Anna to Martin and Georgia Frances Barlett Lehnis. He graduated from Brownwood High School, received a bachelor's degree from Tarleton State University and a master's degree from Texas A&M University. A lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army reserves, he was a roadmaster for Santa Fe Railroad, and had lived in Arizona since 1986. He was an Eagle Scout, vigil honor member of the Order of the Arrow and was lodge chief of the Otena Lodge of Order of Arrow. He attended Philmont Scout Ranch in northeastern New Mexico and attended National Jamborees in Colorado Springs, Colorado and Valley Forge, Virginia, where he was an honor guard for former U.S. President Lyndon B. Johnson. He was an Outstanding Scout for the Comanche Trail Council, a Methodist and a member of DeMolay. On August 28, 1976, he married Jane Stoltz in San Antonio.

Hussein will be included with Jack the Ripper, Nero and Hitler in the evil side of man while Gandhi, Abraham Lincoln, Mother Teresa and Martin Luther King, Jr. stand on the good side.

Charles Chapman, costume designer for the Palace of Wax, said the evil side of the "Spirit of Man" depicts man's inhumanity to man and the injustices in the world.

"It's not only what a man has done but also what he represents," Chapman said.

Peter Carsillo, resident wax sculptor for the Palace of Wax, said adding Hussein to the museum's room of evil and infamy was inevitable.

"A man who would destroy his own people deserves to stand next to history's most notorious villains," Carsillo said.

He adds that he has not purposely tried to make Hussein look mean nor evil.

"I'm just trying to capture a likeness. I'll let Hussein speak for himself," Carsillo said.

Library Notes
Check It Out

The U.S. Department of Education has noted that "parents are their children's first and most influential teachers." Most parents want their child to learn to read and write, but often they don't know what they can do to help them.

Parents can do several things to help their children acquire the skills and concepts needed for reading:

— Play matching games with the child. The ability to categorize things (such as buttons, blocks, beans or toys by shape, color and size or groceries by food groups) is an important thinking skill.

— Knowing the letters of the alphabet can be encouraged when children look for the letters of their name on signs, in magazines or in the newspaper.

— Visual discrimination, or being able to identify small differences between such letters as p, q, b and d, is an important skill for reading. Matching pictures in a deck of cards, playing lotto games, or matching the dots on dominoes can help children with this skill.

— Auditory discrimination, being able to distinguish between such similar sounds as b, o, d, in or n, is also an important skill in learning to read. Matching objects beginning with the same sounds (house, hut, hamburger) or listening for different sounds (sound boxes can be made by placing beans, nuts, bulk tea, salt, soda, etc. in metal bandage boxes; tape the boxes closed). Talking about which makes the loudest or softest noise or how the sounds differ can assist children with this important skill.

— Praising children for their efforts and displaying their work enhances the child's sense of self-worth. When children feel good about themselves and their abilities, acquiring reading skills is easier.

— Modeling reading enhances the child's interest in reading. As they see you read and hear you talk about what you learned from reading, they will be encouraged to learn to read.

Parents are often unaware of the important role they play in their child's achievements. Parents are sometimes intimidated by school professionals, who, they feel, have an expertise that they don't. Sometimes parents don't feel competent enough to deal with school work and may not understand how important they are in helping their child learn to read.

Parents should remember that they are key players in their child's school success. Spending time playing games, reading together, and working with the child can help the child acquire reading skills.

Appraisal Board Approves Budget

The 1992 budget for the Coleman County Appraisal District was approved at the Monday, May 13, meeting of the Board of Directors. The new budget, an increase over the current year, will be studied by the taxing entities in the county and a hearing held at a later date.

Chief Appraiser Bill Jones reported on tax collections, with the 1990 total just over 90 percent and about the same as this time last year. However the collections are approximately \$70,000 under the amount at the end of April 1990.

Routine business included reading of the minutes of the last meeting and approval of bills and accounts for the past month.

Mr. Jones announced that the Appraisal Review Board will meet this week to organize, with new members being T. J. Dalton and William Brown. Marian Johnson is the third member of the group.

Last Saturday was a special day in my life in that I was able to take part in a very satisfying experience. I took a car load of items to the recycling drop-off center here in Santa Anna.

For some time I had been making plans to make the recycling center in Brownwood a regular stopoff and, as is often the case with good intentions, had never gotten around to doing it. Now that there is one situated right here in town, I am pleased no end.

We should be proud that here in Santa Anna, we are ahead of the pace and already have a recycling collection center in operation before we are told to do so by some government agency. If we all take this seriously and try in every way possible to make it work, we will not only be helping our environment, but will be helping ourselves by cutting eventual expenses of the City.

We, being human, are always complaining about why someone doesn't do this or that for us. Now we have an opportunity to do something wonderful for ourselves and for our environment.

How about joining the parade to the recycling dropoff center located at the back of Bradley Lumber Company yard! It will be open each Saturday morning from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. 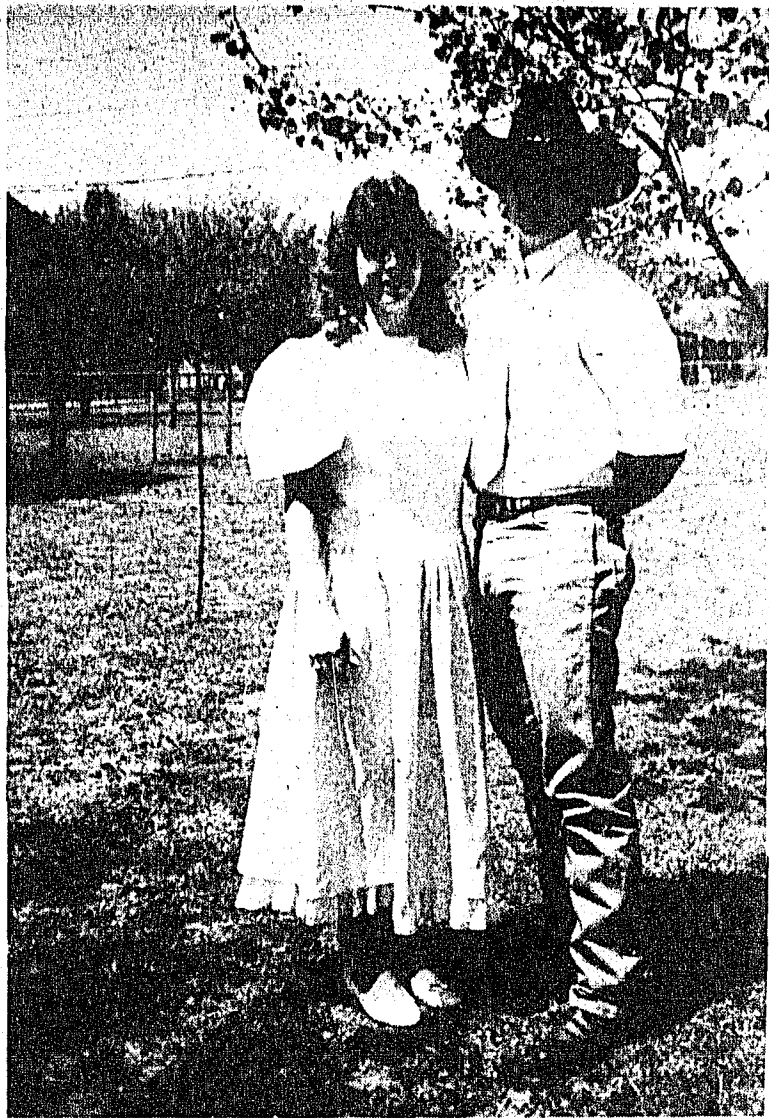
Remember that all these items go in separate containers.

She has received departmental awards in math, history and business, she won first place in district UIL Accounting competition and advanced to regional in 1990. She also won first place faculty award in the 1990 Bangs Science Fair and also advanced to regional.

AUSTIN - The legislative activity in the Texas Legislature is definitely full speed ahead, as the 72nd Legislature proceeds into the final few weeks of regular session. Representative Charles Finnell of District 80 and I, along with our staff people, have prepared a substitute for House Bill 1969. This bill corrects a Hospital District problem for Jacksboro Hospital District, which is in Representative Finnell's district, and Cisco, in Eastland County. The bill will permit the districts to pay their hospital bonds as they come due with tax money and will correct a major problem. A group from Cisco was here to testify before the House State Affairs Committee hearing to exhibit their strong support for the legislation.

The Texas Chamber of Commerce hosted a breakfast meeting which I attended on Tuesday morning. They presented a program on "Lawsuit Abuse", which I found extremely timely and informative. Then, as a member of the Cultural and Historical Committee, along with some other members of the Texas Legislature, we were taken by bus to San Antonio, guests of the Mexican-American Caucus, and view an exhibit of the Cultural and Historical Splendors of Mexico shown at the San Antonio Museum of Art. This was fascinating and educational. The exhibit will remain in San Antonio through August 4th and will then be moved to Los Angeles. I would encourage one and all to make the trip to San Antonio to see the display.

Legislatively, I believe there is a good possibility of getting HB 5, the Product Liability reform, out of the Senate Committee and acted on. This reform of Product Liability is important protection for the small retailer and wholesaler from unfounded lawsuits. I suggest you contact your State Senator's office asking for the Senator's hearty approval and vote for this bill.

The House approved on second reading, Thursday, a House Resolution asking for a Constitutional amendment referendum exempting property owned by non-profit water supply corporations from ad valorem property tax. I feel that this is especially important in the 65th District, since we have several rural water supply corporations located in the district.

A bill passed the Texas House this week mandating that school districts employ a counselor for elementary, K through 6th grade. I voted against the bill, not because I do not agree with the concept, but because I feel that mandates without funding must end for our public schools. The bill passed by a vote of 74 to 51. House Bill 284, a bill which I supported, passed the House this week and has been sent to the Senate. This piece of legislation makes it difficult to get a suspended driver's license reinstated.

I feel this is especially important in the case of DWI.

A large number of controversial subjects have been, and are about to be on our agenda, dealing with a variety of issues, such as: the reduction of state tax on horse racing, a bill to permit marriages of persons of the same sex, the establishment of a penalty if either a physician or patient has the AIDS virus and does not notify the other, a bill which would permit casino gambling on Pleasure Island at Port Arthur, a mandate of school districts with 1,000 or more to employ a business manager, and a piece of legislation to allow qualified citizens to carry a concealed weapon. These are only a few, there are numerous others.

As graduation time for public schools draws nearer I have attended, or am scheduled to attend and speak at several Junior/Senior Banquets and graduation commencement exercises. I thoroughly enjoy taking part in these functions, look forward to them, and hope I will have an opportunity to see some of you on one of these occasions.

Redistricting plan maps will be available within the next few days. As you read about these changes in the districts over Texas please keep in mind that the House will have to vote on the final plan. Any plan that you view prior to that House vote is not final or official. This particular issue is very gut-wrenching for sitting House members because of the changes redistricting usually bring about in the make-up of each member's district. Stay tuned. This is a hot issue that will get no way but hotter.

Let me again thank you for your participation in good state government. Your visits, letters and phone calls indicate that the citizenry of District 65 pay attention to the vital issues of the day and are willing to take a stand. It is so important to me that you let me know your opposition or support for pending legislation. Please let me continue to hear from you. Just call (512)463-0644 or write, P.O. From The Desk Of Temple Dickson

Legislative Session Report



AUSTIN—These are the final days of the regular session of the Legislature and the Texas Senate and House will attempt to do as much work as possible before we adjourn Monday the 27th.

The past two weeks have seen the Senate approve a redistricting bill which, against my wishes, took Llano County and a small part of Taylor County out of my district. On the other hand, the plan adds to District 24 the good people of Callahan, Coke, Menard, Mitchell, Shackelford, Stephens and Young counties. I look forward to working for them.

Also approved in the Senate in recent days, my bills to:

—reorganize the Texas Department of Commerce to straighten things out and save money, increase efficiency and increase the department's responsiveness to the taxpayer;

—promote environmental protection while protecting the financial security of thousands of our small business owners who bought property containing leaking underground storage tanks or property contaminated by leaking tanks;

—prevent thousands of at-risk students from dropping out of school and thousands of others from avoiding challenging courses by revising the No Pass No Play rule, shortening the period of suspension from six to three weeks.

Something else developing in recent days that I find less welcome is an opinion from the Texas Attorney General. The opinion indicates that members of the Legislature are entitled to an additional \$85 per day over and above their current per diem of \$30. That is not my understanding or reading of the Texas Constitution. The people of Texas, only last year, resoundingly defeated the proposition that legislative expenses be increased. To accept this strained reading of the plain meaning of the Constitution, and of the equally plainly expressed feeling of the people, simply would be wrong. It would also cost the state an additional \$15,385 a day. Now, the Legislature may or may not be underpaid, but it should not and will not if I have anything to say—raise its pay in this sort of surreptitious manner.

I close on a proud note. Monday, May 13th, the Texas Senate and House stopped the normal course of business to pay tribute to the men and women of the United States military, past and present. I was privileged to be the sponsor of resolutions honoring all members of the armed services during Armed Forces Week and recognizing the troops of Fort Hood who fought and died for freedom in the deserts of the Middle East. I applaud them all and thank them for their dedication to service.

Recent Surveys By Parks & Wildlife Yield Exciting News At Ivie

Recent gillnet and electro-fishing surveys by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) personnel on O. H. Ivie Reservoir found out some exciting things about the fish populations in the lake. The initial stockings of Florida strain largemouth bass (FLMB) were very successful. The FLMB were found to be very numerous and growing well. Some individuals have already attained lengths of 14 inches, however, the majority were between 7 and 10 inches. TPWD District Biologist Bill Follis from San Angelo, says the FLMB should be 18 inches in length (the minimum length to keep fish at Ivie) by the Fall of 1992. Biologists also found that the FLMB were spawning this year, one year after stocking. This will help the bass build a good population while the reservoir is still filling. Anglers need to remember that both largemouth and smallmouth bass must be 18 inches long to keep and only three can be kept.

Although 195,000 channel catfish were stocked in Ivie in 1990, only one was captured in the recent gillnet surveys conducted by TPWD personnel at Ivie. However, 20 channel catfish between 14 and 22 inches were caught. According to TPWD Biologist John Dennis from San Angelo, the larger fish will serve as brood fish and help to stock the lake naturally while providing a fishery at the same time. Dennis recommends releasing the larger catfish back into the lake so they can reproduce and help stock the lake. Several flathead catfish were also caught in the gillnets. None of the flatheads caught were from the 1990 stocking, but once again, the larger fish will serve as brood fish.

Electro-fishing and gillnetting surveys at Ivie Reservoir this spring showed an abundance of forage in the lake. Last year, threadfin shad were stocked into the reservoir by Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) personnel. The spring sampling showed the TPWD biologists that the threadfin shad survived the winter and reproduced exceptionally well. Threadfin shad are preferred over gizzard shad for

several reasons, according to TPWD Biologist Bill Follis. The threadfin shad will reproduce both in the spring and the fall and the threadfin shad born in the spring will also reproduce in the fall. Also, threadfin shad remain small enough to be eaten during their entire lifetime, unlike gizzard shad which can get up to 15 inches long. These two factors are important when one considers the large number of hungry bass in the reservoir. The threadfin shad provide an excellent forage base for those bass, according to Follis.

This spring, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) personnel stocked 2.5 million Arkansas strain walleye into O. H. Ivie Reservoir. Bill Provine, TPWD Walleye Program Leader, said that the Arkansas strain walleye was selected for Ivie due to TPWD studies on Canyon Lake near San Antonio which have shown the Arkansas strain to be reproducing naturally in the lake. The Iowa strain walleye - which was stocked extensively in the past - has only been found to reproduce up in the Texas Panhandle. The Arkansas strain also grows faster and to larger sizes than the Iowa strain. Walleye must be 16 inches or larger to retain in Texas and only five may be kept each day.

O. H. Ivie was stocked with 499,000 Florida-strain largemouth bass, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife stocking records. It was also stocked with 1.9 million Florida bass this year. Other fish stocked in 1990 include: bluecatfish, 195,000; channel catfish, 195,000; flathead catfish, 3,000; smallmouth bass, 121,000; white crappie, 123,000; copernose bluegill, 333,000. Currently in 1991, 184,000 crappie and 2.5 million Arkansas-strain walleye, have been stocked, in addition to the Florida bass.
