About Our New Subscription Rates

As is always the case when rates of any kind are raised, we have heard some complaints about our new subscription rates. For the most part, however, our readers understand that the cost of getting the paper to you has risen appreciably. An official source informs us that since 1970, the in-county second class postage rate has increased more than 1600 percent when at the same time the inflation rate in that period is 207 percent. Decreased mail volume as a result of the Feb. postage rate hike and federal budget cuts may result in another postage increase in mid 1992, rather than in 1994 as predicted earlier by the Postal Service.

You are reminded you can save on the cost of your paper with a subscription. In-county subscription rates are \$15 per year and elsewhere in the United States is \$18, including military APO and FPO mailings. This breaks down to 29¢ a copy in-county and 35¢ per copy out of county, compared to 50¢ at the store news racks.

Students and those on a fixed income may want to consider buying 6 month subscriptions at half the yearly cost.





EDITOR'S NOTE: The following came as a letter to the editor from a Santa Anna native, 1949 graduate of Santa Anna High School, son of Louise Moore and the late Doug Moore, Sr. Doug Moore, Jr. is a Chief in the Media Support Branch Office of Public Affairs. for U.S. Air Forces in Europe. He is stationed at Ramstein Air Base, Germany. Doug writes:

That Santa Anna News photo of the townspeople gathered at the post office to show their support for our armed forces was heartwarm-

As a Santa Annan who drifted away more than 40 years ago to serve my country with the U.S. Air Force, I feel that our overwhelming victory over Saddam Hussdin's Iraqiforces should send a message to all-Americans: the sacrifices our nation made to build a strong military force were well worth it.

In peacetime it is somewhat popular to criticize the military. After all, we're a drain on the economy, not really doing anything except playing war.

spent defending why we train as we do, why we need state-of-the-art equipment, why people are our most important asset, and etc. Of course, I've also had to explain some of the "dumb" things that we've done, such as paying for overpriced pliers, hammers and toilet seats. Few people understand that the military is made up of more than a million components-ranging from people to pencils--and

an occasional mistake will occur as we go about our daily business. Nor do they understand that we make an honest effort to find and correct these mistakes.

But, I want to talk about the war and some of the people who were in

I was very close to this war from the very beginning on August 2, 1990, when Saddam Hussein sent his army into Kuwait. My base--Ramstein Air Base, Germany--was instrumental in supporting the

As a result, much of my career in buildup of United States and coali-Air Force public affairs has been tion forces. Our aircraft parking ramps were filled to capacity most of the time for six months. Aircraft were landing and taking off around the clock as hundreds of C-141, C-5, C-130 and commercial aircraft came here to change crews and load and unload cargo.

A very good friend and colleague of mine--U.S. Air Force Captain Brad Schuldt--was one of the war's early casualties. He was enroute from here to the Gulf early on August 29th. Unfortunately, the C-5 carrying him crashed shortly after takeoff, killing 13 people.

Brad was at my office the afternoon before he left, to borrow a portable word processor to use in the Gulf. He looked forward to going to the Gulf and I'll never forget him saying he was so proud that the United States had taken a tough stance against Iraq's aggression. In the months since. I heard hundreds of our young soldiers and airmen echo Brad's sentiments.

I'm convinced that Brad and his

fellow warriors who lost their lives during Desert Shield and Desert Storm did not die in vain.

Our command, the United States Air Forces in Europe, was represented in the Gulf by more than 10,000 personnel and 200 tactical fighter aircraft. The United States Army in Europe deployed approximately 100,000 troops with their tanks, artillery and other weapons. It was an awesome logistics effort, and a tribute to the training that we've conducted here for so many

As our people were leaving, reservists and national guardsmen were arriving to set up contingency hospitals and take over many of the duties that had been performed by active duty people. Many of these citizen soldiers came from secure, comfortable hometown surroundings on very short notice, but they came prepared to do everything necessary to support the war effort. Their contributions and sacrifices

I personally was fortunate enough to go to another country and help finalize the deployment of a fleet of KC-135 tanker aircraft, which were used to refuel B-52s enroute to bomb targets in the Gulf. Those KC-135s and the people who flew and supported them came from several bases in the United States on very short notice, in most cases only hours. Incredibly, the aircraft were serviced and ready to fly within hours of their arrival over here.

I was on the second KC-135 that refueled a B-52, a seven-hour mission filled with tension and exhilaration as it neared its climax. The sight of a B-52 less than 20 feet behind and below you is spectactular, and the fact that a 20-year-old airman was controlling both it and

Even certain fringe benefits such as the value of the personal use of a company car should be included.

Alimony, cancelled debts, bartering and other types of taxable income are covered in Publication 525, Taxable and Nontaxable Income.

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

Legislative Session Report

AUSTIN, MARCH 19-Mid March has come and gone, ushering in the second half of the 72nd Legislature's regular session. Since my last letter to you a good many things have happened at the Capitol. Some good. Some, I'm not too sure about just yet. Foremost among the "not too sure abouts" are public education funding and taxes.

This week a conference committee of the Texas Senate and house is expected to take action on a compromise plan to equalize funding the state's system of public education. Quick action is necessary if the legislature is to meet the Supreme Court's April 1st deadline. Failure to beat the clock could lead to the imposition of a court ordered plan, a scenario I view as imperative to avoid. Consequently, I am working with conferces to develop a plan that not only meets the stiff standards of the court, but also does everything possible to protect the interests of all school districts in the 24th Senatorial District.

It is vital to understand that the Supreme Court's order makes a sharp jump in our property taxes virtually inescapable unless we find another source of revenues. Latest projections show some Texans would see their property tax bills double under our current system of school funding. This fact is one of the biggest reasons we're hearing renewed talk about a corporate and personal income tax. You should know that I will not support either, until two things occur:







meals and snacks throughout the There's a good deal of confusion

about fats today, says Mary Helen Gunkler, registered dietitian and staff nutritionist for Total cereal. So much attention has been focused on specific types of fat-saturated, monounsaturated and polyunsaturated-that the message of overall fat moderation is often forgotten. One important fact to remember about fats is that equal amounts of them all contribute about the same number of calories. For example, vegetable oil has 120 calories per tablespoon. A tablespoon of vegetable shortening or lard contributes 115 calories. Butter and margarine both provide approximately 100 calories per tablespoon.

Whatever type of fat you choose, it will contribute more than twice the calories per gram as protein and carbohydrate. For example, one gram of fatwhether it's olive oil or butter-has nine calories, while one gram of protein or carbohydrate has four calories.

No more than 30 percent of daily calories should come from fats, according to the dietary recommendations of major health organizations. In a 1500-calorie diet, this would be no more than 450 calories, or 50 grams of fat.


Certainly, the differences in types of fats can't be ignored. Scientific study has identified a strong relationship between a diet high in saturated fats and the incidence of high blood cholesterol, a major risk factor for heart disease. Substituting monounsaturated and polyunsaturated fats for saturated fats may help lower blood cholesterol levels.

mokeless tobacco in the previous 30 days was close to that found in a nationwide survey (8.8 percent Texas vs. 9.8 percent nationally). However, Texas 10th graders were more than twice as likely to be heavy users (20 times in the previous 30 days) than 10th graders nationally.

'We have the same problem with snuff and chewing tobacco that we have with cigarettes - children start using it, and by the time they. realize their mistake, they are addicted to nicotine", Todd said.

"Tobacco use is not adult behavior - it is juvenile behavior. If children want to act like adults, then they should stop using tobacco. That's what most adults are doing",


Dr. Robert Bernstein, Commissioner of Health, said that smokeless tobacco was advertised in the 1970s as an alternative to cigarettes, with slogans like "take a pinch, instead of a puff"

"Since both forms of tobacco use can result in nicotine addiction and cause cancer, the only real choice offered by such slogans is between the risks of lung cancer and oral cancer", Dr. Bernstein said.

He added that survival rates for persons with either lung cancer or oral cancer are two of the lowest among the major cancers.

Todd attributes increased teen tobacco use to advertising. "The overwhelming majority (84 percent) of students surveyed in Texas knew that tobacco use was very harmful, yet more than half had tried tobacco in some form. Knowledge of the harmful effects of tobacco seems to be quickly eroded by slick ads associating tobacco use with success, confidence and adventure", he said.




Q> My in-laws, who live in another state, have suggested that my husband and I apply for a home equity loan as a down payment on a new boat. What are these loans and what is your opinion of them?

A> With a home equity loan, you can borrow against the equity you have accumulated in your home. Texas, however, does not allow home equity loans because of a provision in the Homestead Act. In states that allow home equity loans, you can use the money for almost any purpose, such as a down payment for a new boat. But, in Texas, that would be a violation of the Homestead Act. There has been some talk in the past in Texas about allowing home equity loans, but these discussions have never reached fruition.
