# Band To Sponsor Spring Clean Fling

The SAHS Band will be presenting the Santa Anna Spring Clean Fling. This activity will be a push to help "Spring Clean" the city as well as raise more funds needed to support their spring trip to San Antonio, May 2-4.

The Spring Clean Fling is slated for Friday, April 12th from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and will include a variety of different town cleaning activities. The primary activity will be "Trashathon '91". Prior to the fundraising date, students will

canvass the community asking for pledges for each pound of trash they will collect on April 12 from streets, vacant lots, yards,

highways, and any other trash they might find. The trash will be collected at a central weighing station where their work will be accounted, afterwards the students will return to the public to collect their pledges.

A second activity will be a "Free" car wash which will include washing, drying and vacuuming. A free-will donation will be appreciated at the car wash location. Students will also recruit your participation before the date of the wash.

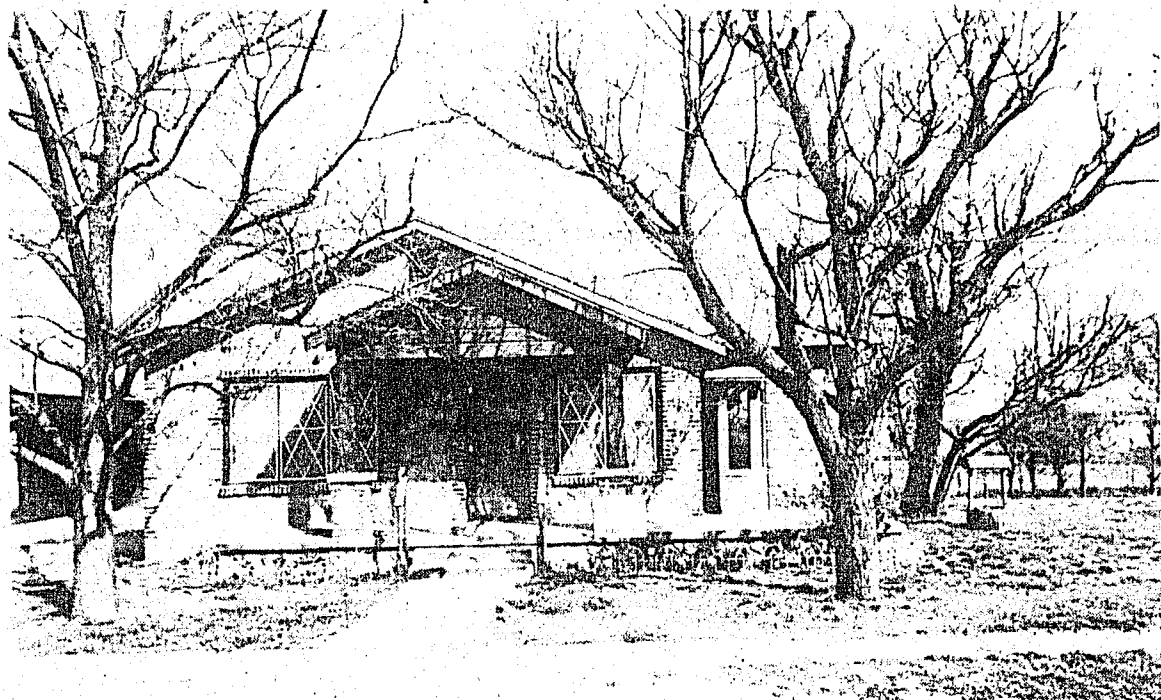
The third part of this one day town cleaning will include a window wash for downtown businesses. Again, prior to the April 12 date, students will be

## A.D. Donham Relays Friday

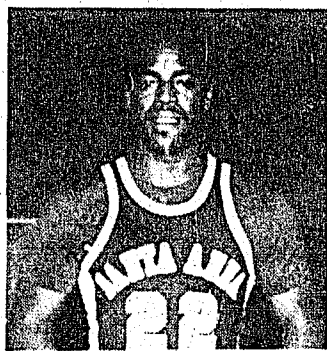

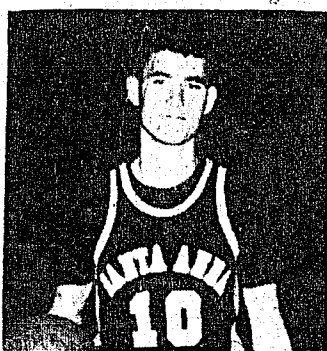

She was born January 22, 1900, in Lockhart, the daughter of William Howard and Emma Frances Ratliff Zachary. She had lived most of her life in Santa Anna where she resided on farmland two miles south of town that had been her home since the mid 1920's. She was a homemaker and a member of the Christian Church.

She married Charles M. Moseley on September 8, 1917, in Hamlin. He preceded her in death December 12, 1968.

Mrs. Moseley was a charter member helping to form the Santa Anna Cemetery Association. She was an active member of the local garden club for many years and a member of the Chat and Stitch Club. For many years she enjoyed her hobby of china painting until she was unable to create the artistic work.

Survivors include three daughters, Charlotte Moseley of Santa Anna, Zelda Ruth Sullivan of Marble Falls, and Sarah Frances Calhoun of Lago Vista; six grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Blanche (Mrs. J.C.) Grantham, 92, died Monday, March 11, 1991 in Brownwood Regional Hospital.

Graveside services were at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday in Santa Anna Cemetery with Rev. Jasper McClellan officiating, directed by Santa Anna Funeral Home.

She was born August 28, 1898, the daughter of J.W. and Telitha Tate Collier. She graduated Santa Anna High School in 1918. She married Joseph Cecil Grantham in Santa Anna, April 18, 1923. He preceded her in death June 16, 1942. Mrs. Grantham was a lifetime resident of Santa Anna where, at one time, she owned and operated Western Auto Store for many years.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church and Eastern Star, where she was a Past Worthy Matron and Deputy Worthy Matron.

When the phone rang at the Green residence last Wednesday night, little did Vicki and Joe know until they heard the voice on the other end of the line that U.S. Marine Vernon Valdez was calling

to assure them that he was just fine! He had just arrived back into Saudi Arabia from Kuwait and waited in line for 12 hours to make that call that Vicki will never forget. She knew in her heart that

he had been involved in the ground war, being in the 1st BN, 1st Marines, who were some of the first to move into Kuwait. Sure enough he was involved in the taking of the airport but was elated to report that he didn't lose any buddies in the battle. He did know of several who were wounded.

He asked his mom to say thanks to everyone who had written, to those responsible for sending the "yellow ribbon support picture", and those who showed their support by being in the picture. In fact, he said he had gotten "oodles" of mail and was grateful for every single bit.

One especially interesting bit of news Vernon had for his mother was that of having received a letter from a woman in California who had taken his address from her hometown newspaper, The Santa Anna News, and had written him. In the letter she mentioned she had

attended high school with brothers Frank and Steve Valdez and wondered if Vernon could be related to them. He is, of course, Steve's son. When telling his mother the story, Vernon was unable at the moment to think of the woman's name, but if she is reading this article, she can be well assured her letter was certainly appreciated by a young Marine so far away from home in a very precarious situation!

Cleta Bowen relates that both her sons, PFC Jacky Duquette and SPC 4 Craig Duquette, both U.S. Army 101st ABN, are still somewhere in

Iraq. Jacky's wife, the former Melissa Stanislaw had received a telephone call from him. He is in touch with Craig and both are reported to be fine.

Reports are that Amy SGT Jerry Malcar may be on the way back to Fort Bliss in El Paso. A mechanic on a Patriot Missile crew, Jerry was among the first to go to Saudi Arabia back in September.

A call to his parents assured Ken and Jan Brixey that Marine L/CPL Ken Brixey is fine, although still in Saudi Arabia. His assignment at the present time is guarding some Iraqi POW's until they are returned to Iraq.

No word from others of Santa Anna military representatives in the Persian Gulf. We have checked with parents and other loved ones, and are assured they will advise us when word is received from them.

All of the families have expressed their appreciation for the outpouring of local support and concern shown for them and their soldiers.

TSTI was created by the Legislature in 1965 to provide Texas business and industry with a state-of-the-art work force. Since its inception, the institution has grown to seven components with more than 8,000 students.

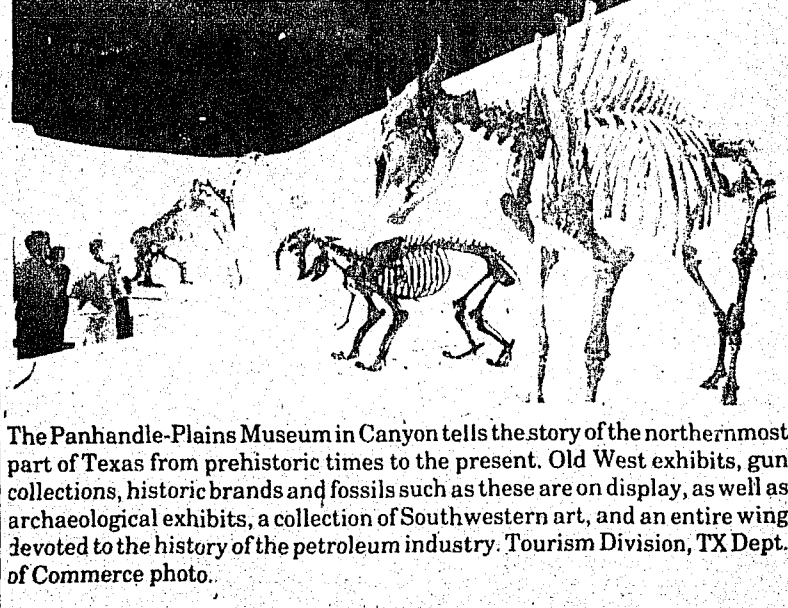

Press mixture firmly and evenly in pan. Refrigerate at least 2 hours. Cut into bars, about 3x1 1/2 or 2 1/2x2 inches, 18 or 12 bars.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): No adjustments are necessary.

## ASCS Signup Deadlines Near

The ASCS (Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service) office of Coleman County reminds us that Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter recently announced a March 15 deadline for signup for the Conservation Reserve Program. Under new CRP provisions, land eligibility requirements will be expanded to include not only highly erodible land, but also other cropland acres that reduce the impairment of water quality or improve wellhead protection.

Signup for the 1991 Farm Program began March 4 and runs through April 26. Base and yield notices have been mailed and you can now begin planning for your participation. In order to give you personal time that will be required by the new farm program, it is important to make an appointment. Call or come by the office to ask for a time that is convenient for you.

**RECONSTITUTIONS**—If you buy or sell a farm or for any reason need to divide or combine farm land, you must make a request for reconstitution prior to the end of the April 26 signup deadline. This is necessary for the combination/division to be in effect for the 1991 crop year.

**FOREIGN INVESTORS** Are required to notify the county office where the land is located within 90 days of the date of purchase.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by the ASCS is established under law without regard to Race, Religion, Color, National Origin, Sex, Age, Disability, and Marital Status.

## Electric Co-Op Will Sponsor DPS Commercial Driver Test

The DPS is now testing all currently licensed commercial truck and bus drivers.

All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded are required to have a commercial drivers license (CDL) by April 1, 1992. Bus drivers, including school bus and church bus drivers, who drive buses designed to carry 16 or more passengers, including the driver, will also be required to obtain a CDL by the same date.

Exempt from the CDL requirements are farmers, when they are driving within 150 miles of their farm, military personnel, recreational vehicle operators, emergency vehicle operators, and fire fighters when operating fire fighting vehicles or equipment.

Commercial drivers who must carry the new CDLs cannot renew their current licenses due to expire

between now and April 1, 1992. They should plan to visit the DPS Driver License offices for CDL testing as soon as possible and no later than one month before their license expiration date.

To ensure that all commercial drivers in Texas who must have the CDLs obtain them in time to avoid penalties, the DPS Troopers have set a special date for CDL testing in this area. The test will be conducted on April 11, 1991, from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the Coleman County Electric Co-Op, 200 W. Live Oak, Coleman, Texas.

For applications and details on taking this test, contact your local Drivers License Office as soon as possible by calling 625-2600. Free CDL handbooks are available at all drivers license offices.

We encourage everyone to prepare and take advantage of this opportunity to test on April 11th. This testing date is sponsored by Coleman County Electric Co-Op.

## Watching Washington



The National Energy Strategy (NES) unveiled by the Administration last month gets low mileage in our drive to achieve energy security.

The war in the Persian Gulf is but one of the reasons excessive dependence on foreign oil is risky and expensive. Until our economy is better insulated from oil price shocks our economic health is at risk.

Last year the United States produced 1.7 million barrels a day less than in 1985 and consumed 1.2 million barrels a day more. We made up the difference with imported oil. Our imports from the Persian Gulf are up by 400 percent over the past five years. By consuming more energy, producing less and importing the difference, we are writing our own recipe for increasing dependence on foreign oil.

In the aftermath of the war, the need for a new direction in energy policy couldn't be more clear. America needs an energy policy that encourages both the domestic production and conservation of energy. But the NES does neither.

It offers an empty tank of ideas for energy conservation. The average American consumes 484 barrels a year; that's more gasoline than his British, Japanese, and Italian counterparts combined. Although Germany and Japan produce far less energy than we do, they have been able to insulate themselves from the shocks of foreign oil through aggressive promotion of energy conservation and greater efficiency in energy use.

In the late 1970s we made major strides in boosting energy efficiency and cutting our dependence on foreign oil. Average gas mileage of our cars, for example, grew by 15 percent. But 1990 was the second year in a row that our auto fuel efficiency actually declined. That's why I will be cosponsoring a bill to increase the fuel efficiency standards of automobiles. We also need to search for other ways to conserve energy.

The NES offers only low octane proposals to promote domestic energy production. Producers who have seen oil prices in free fall too often over the past five years know the most urgent need is for price stability.

Establishing a floor price is the most effective way to accomplish this. A University of Texas study last year found that a \$20 a barrel floor price would increase production 520,000 barrels a day on average over five years. Unfortunately, a floor price is not a realistic option unless it has the enthusiastic support of the President.

I was able to gain approval for some production incentives in the last session of Congress. They are a start, but a comprehensive energy policy must do a lot more to boost production.

The U.S. also has enormous reserves of natural gas and coal that are not being used. In addition, we need to explore alternative sources of energy such as ethanol and nuclear energy. Research into enhanced recovery techniques should also get more federal support.

Although this Administration's first attempt at an energy policy falls well short of what's needed, they have raised the level of debate and that's useful.

Our troops won a great victory in the Persian Gulf, but there's no need to tempt a repeat performance. Continuing to tie our economy to energy from that region is the shortest and surest route back.

## The Next Vehicle You See May Run On Natural Gas

Natural gas-fueled buses, trucks and cars will soon become a common sight in many urban areas around the United States, according to the American Gas Association (A.G.A.).

A.G.A. President Michael Baly III says, "Natural gas is one of the best clean-fuel alternatives. Natural-gas-powered vehicles can help clean up smog-plagued urban areas and reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil, one-third of which is used to make gasoline and diesel fuel."

The nation's new federal clean air law requires cleaner mass transit buses beginning in 1994. To achieve the new standards, buses will be required to reduce particulate emissions by 50 percent.

Baly points out that the U.S. already has more than 30,000 vehicles -- mostly in fleets -- running on natural gas and that hundreds of thousands more will be on the nation's highways during the next several years. The U.S. has more than 300 natural gas vehicle re-

fueling stations, with plans to open hundreds more in the next several years, Baly says.

"Natural gas is a proven vehicle fuel, with an excellent safety and efficiency record. In addition, natural gas typically costs only about 70 cents per gallon equivalent, compared with gasoline, which is considerably more expensive," Baly says.

GMC Truck, a division of General Motors Corp., Baly says, is now producing natural gas-powered light trucks.

Other car, truck and bus manufacturers also plan to be providing natural gas and other clean-fuel vehicles in order to help meet demand being created by the clean air law.

The new law also affects fleets of 10 or more vehicles that are centrally refueled, or capable of being centrally refueled. The 22 smoggiest U.S. cities will be required to purchase "clean-fuel" vehicles, beginning with the model year 1998, Baly says.
