OMM Hospital Publishes Financial Statement Indigent Care, Salaries, Staffing Addressed

Hospital Sets Up Phone Bank

Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital administrator, Glen D. Bunn, announced today that the last audited Financial Statement

(September 30, 1990) is being published today (Thursday) in the Chronicle Democrat-Voice and the Santa Anna News.

The audit is conducted each year according to guidelines of the Federal Government. Overall-Morris uses the firm of Altmiller, Lukert and Company of Olney,

Texas. The firm specializes in hospital accounting and audits numerous hospitals in the area.

This fiscal year, the hospital has been "writing off" \$49,000 per month. Out of that figure approxi-

mately \$36,000 are "write offs" due to Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements. Approximately

\$12,000 per month are "write offs" due to indigent, charity and bad debts.

Throughout the years, Overall-Morris has provided indigent care

for Coleman County; however, hospital attorney Don Johnson ex-

plains that a county without a hospital would have to contract a "mandated provider relationship"

with a hospital outside the county to provide for the county's indigent. Hospital officials feel that any such

hospital providing those services to a county without a hospital would demand adequate payment.

By law, Texas counties must set aside 10% (GRTL) General Revenue Tax levy for indigent health care. After that amount is

met and used, a county would be eligible to apply for matching funds from the State of Texas. Hospital

officials have not found any hospitals who have received funds of this type from the State.

In the State of Texas, an indigent patient is eligible to receive up to \$30,000 per year in health care or to be hospitalized up to 30 days per year whichever occurs first.

Without a hospital, Coleman County would have to contract

indigent care services from Brownwood, Abilene or San Angelo.

According to Bunn, one of the "hottest" election rumors on the "street" is that hospital salaries are "too high".

Dr. Mike Edington, Board President, addressed this false rumor.

Dr. Edington said, "I can assure you that the figures you have heard on the street are incorrect from the administrator to the housekeeper." He said, "you can be assured that administrative salaries are deter-

mined by hospital size, education and years of experience. In determining salaries, we utilize reports

of the Texas Hospital Association and salaries of similar hospitals in the area."

The administrator recommends all other hospital salaries to the board. The same criteria is used to determine all salaries.

Glen D. Bunn, administrator said, "The majority of our personnel have not had raises in 3 to 4 years because of our financial situation but our employees have been pa-

tient and understanding. They are the most loyal group of employees I have ever worked with. They love Coleman and Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital."

For instance, a new RN can start out for at least \$5.50 per hour more in Abilene than we pay experienced RNs. Bunn said, "That's loyalty and love for Overall-Morris."

Another "street" question, says Bunn, is, "Why does it take so many employees for Overall-Morris with so few patients?"

Doctor Morris Mann said, "People who are not familiar with hospitals, do not realize that a hospital must be staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year. Plus, allowance is made for vacations, holidays and sick time." Doctor Mann said that it takes 4.1 employees to staff one position around the clock. Hospitals staff for 168 hours per week while most businesses staff for 40 hours."

Chief-of-Staff, Dr. J. P. Jones said, "Hospital staffing has been

very conservative the last few years, but even more so this last year."

Doctor Jones said that he does not feel the hospital is over-staffed to meet government requirements.

Doctor Donald Pope said, "even though the hospital staffing may seem excessive to the laymen, staffing guidelines of Medicare must be met

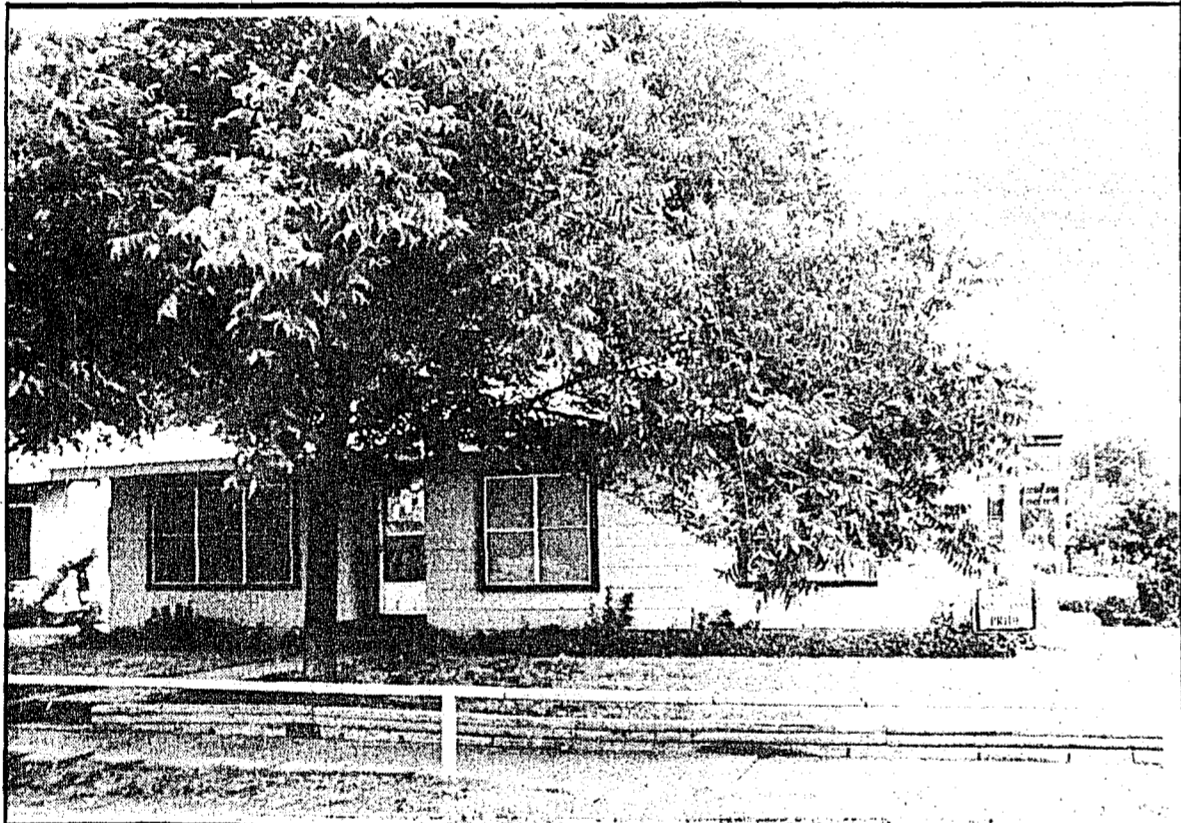

in order to remain open." Doctor Pope continued, "This last year, patient areas were moved to the first floor for more efficient staffing pat-

terns." He said that if patient areas had remained on the second floor, another RN per shift would have

had to be added. He concluded, "I would like to dispel the rumor that the hospital is over-staffed."

throughout the day, with sandwiches and snacks available for the noon meal. An auction of donated items will be held during the afternoon.

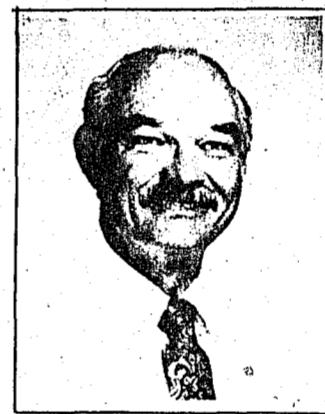

The Santa Anna School Board last week heard and accepted the resignations of elementary school principal Jack Burns and his wife, Karen, who has been the Home Economics teacher for the past two years. Mr. Burns has accepted a job as principal of a junior high at Bridgeport, in the Denton area. Burns has been with the Santa Anna schools for the past four years.

Dean Bass, a Santa Anna teacher and coach was hired to succeed Burns as Elementary School principal. Bass is a Santa Anna native, having been reared here and is a graduate of the local schools. He spent 21 years in the U.S. Air Force and three years at Brownwood State School where he served as a house parent and campus supervisor before beginning his teaching career 12 years ago. Ten of those years have been with the local schools as

The board was provided with pertinent information concerning the TASA/TASB (Texas Association of School Boards and Texas Association of School Administrators) convention to be held in September.

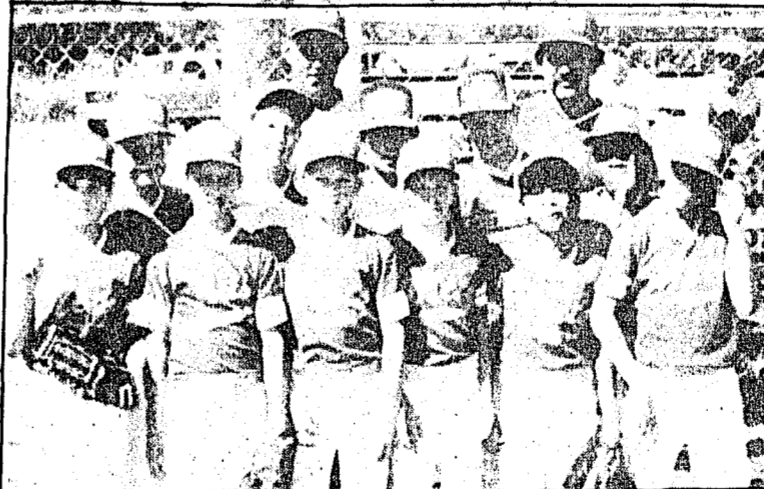
And The Rains Came Tumbling Down! And Down!

First Baptist Church Welcomes New Pastor

Santa Anna First Baptist Church will have a new pastor, Waide Messer who will assume the position, Monday, June 24. He is coming from Riverside Baptist Church of Fort Worth where he has served as Associate Pastor for two years.

The local church has been without a full-time pastor since last October when John Stanislaw accepted the pastorate of First Baptist Church at Florence. Dr. Robert Smith of Howard Payne University has served as interim pastor, with Sunday, June 23, to be his last Sunday here.

Messer, 34, is a native of Gruver in far north Texas. He attended West Texas State University in Canyon and was licensed for the ministry at Stratford First Baptist Church. 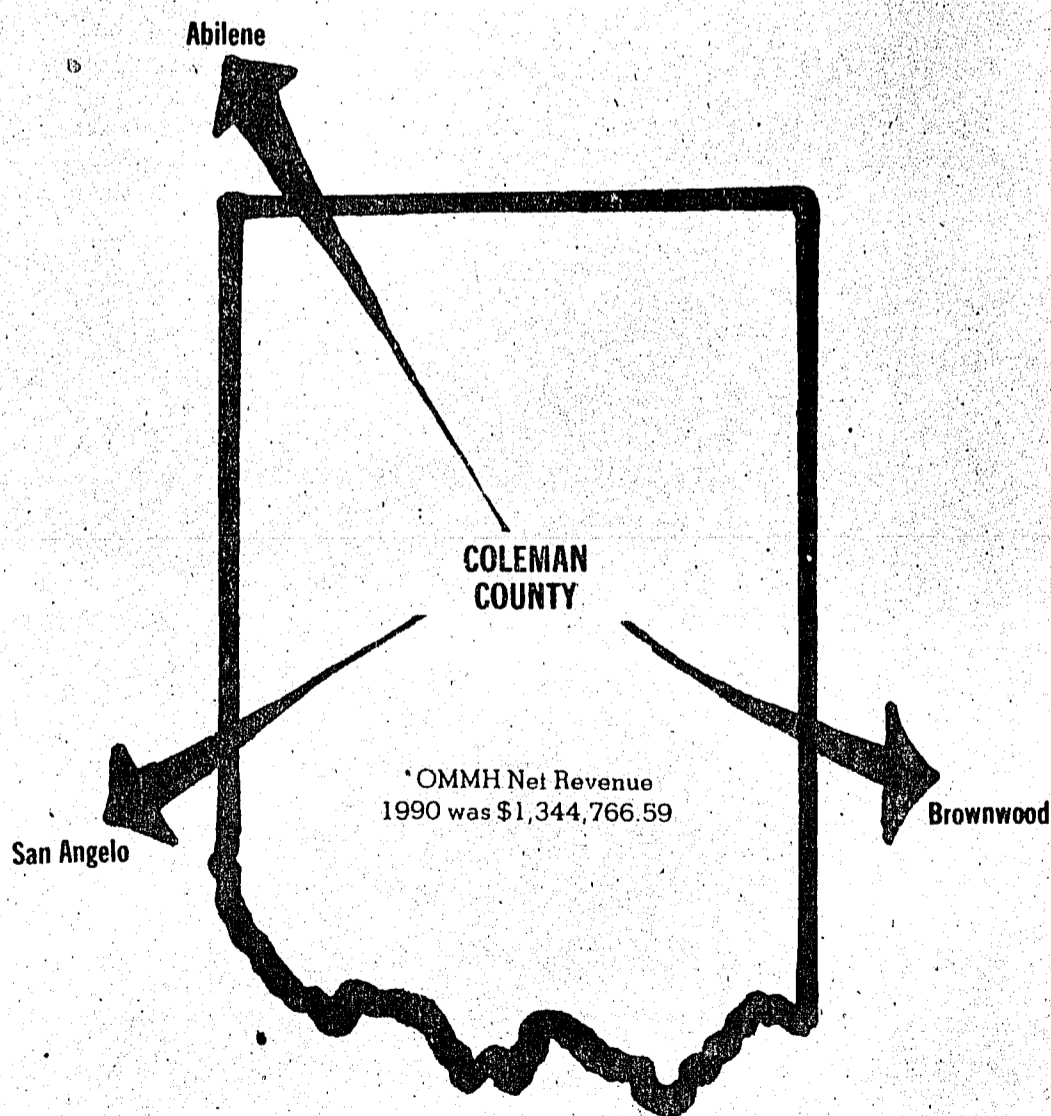

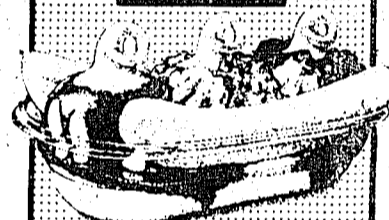

News Briefs

Commodities Will Be Distributed Tuesday, June 25

U.S.D.A. Commodities will be distributed in Santa Anna Tuesday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the Civic Center (Armory) Items available this month are butter, green beans, vegetarian beans, flour applesauce, raisins.

Central Texas Opportunities, the sponsoring organization for the distributions, has no control over what items are available or the quantity of the items. Allocation of all commodities depends on the availability of food items from the U.S.D.A.

All eligible persons will receive emergency food assistance without regard to race, sex, political beliefs, age, national origin, or handicap. Shut-ins are encouraged to designate an authorized representative to pick up for them. Commodities will be distributed on a first come/first serve basis.

Recycle Collection Center Moved

In order to have more space, the recycling drop off center has moved to a new location just across the street from where it has been situated. The collection center is now located at Coleman County Telephone Cooperative warehouse, just to the back (east) of H & H Food Market. The warehouse yard faces the railroad track. The drop off containers will be just inside the gates of the fenced yard at the warehouse.

Maribee Pritchard and Lori Kernes are spearheading the recycling drop-off center. If you need to have someone pick up your recyclable items, please call in advance of the collection time which is 9 a.m. to noon on Saturdays. There will be no phone available at the center. Mrs. Pritchard may be contacted at 348-3873. On weekdays you may contact Mrs. Kernes at 348-3101. Evenings and Saturday mornings before 9:00 call her at 348-3202.

Acceptable items include newspapers, cardboard, paper grocery bags, aluminum beverage cans, food cans, aerosol cans, plastic containers with the numerals "1" or "2" stamped inside a triangle shaped recycling symbol on the bottom of the container. (Please rinse out any containers including cans).

Camp Wanna-Read Gets Off To Good Start Last Week; Children Plant Tree At Library

The first session of Camp Wanna-Read, the library summer reading program, was held Wednesday, June 12 from 9:30 to 11:00 a.m.

The group met at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative meeting room and began the day with a sing-along led by Cathy Ellis. A flag raising ceremony was held behind the future library

building. The flag was presented and the pledge of allegiance led by David Coyle and Jeremy Tomme. The group then moved to the present library for a program about trees given by County Agent Kerry Shropshire. He demonstrated the proper way to plant a tree and talked with the children about the importance of trees. The children learned why it is important to plant trees and protect them. Each youngster participating received an apricot seed to start their own tree. Mr. and Mrs. Key had started "our tree" and shared the seeds with us. The older children will be bringing leaves to share during the next session. Mrs. Shropshire provided information on the identification of leaves.

The children were divided into small groups for the remainder of the morning. Each group visited the library and had an opportunity to check out books. This summer the children will be earning beads to put on a necklace. They will be given a white bead for each session they attend. Colored beads are awarded for each hour spent reading. Beads will be awarded each week so

in West Texas are grateful for every drop. Most nearby rural areas, however, did not receive as much rain Sunday as we here in town.

Some hail has fallen, although none of size to do any damage, according to reports we have received here. Lightning accompanying the storms has wreaked some havoc in certain areas, hitting trees and power lines, knocking out telephones, and in one case, causing a minor electrical fire at the Dominy Oil Co building in Santa Anna on Sunday evening.

The heavy downpour on Sunday also caused problems for city workmen and some residents when the rain water filled the sewer lines in an area in the southern part of town.

Santa Anna's Lake Sealy is running around the spillway and Lake Santana has risen approximately a foot to a foot and half since last week.

Appraisal Board Meets

Routine business was on the Monday, June 10, agenda for the Coleman County appraisal District Board when they met at the Appraisal District Office in Coleman.

Bill Jones, Chief Appraiser, reported the tax collections for the month of May, with over \$61,000 collected, which is about the same as this time last year. The 1990 collections totaled over three million dollars which is 92 percent of the total.

Bills and accounts were approved for payment, and the budget status was reviewed, showing the district to be operating well within the 1991 budget.

The group discussed computer maintenance costs and approved entering a lease plan when the current computer is replaced.

Attending the meeting were Barbara Kingsbery, chairman; D.G. Allen, Max Horne and Dwight Nanny. Jack Knox was absent.

The next meeting of the group will be Monday, July 8.

Routine Council Meeting

Mayor Brock called the meeting to order as the City Council met June 11 for their regular monthly session with councilmen James Spillman, Danny Kellar, Emmitt Simmons and Thomas Hays present. Others present for the meeting were Alys Pelton, city secretary, and Derriell Warnock, Supt. of Operations, Police Chief Carlos Torres, Santa Anna Funeral Home and AMSTAR EMS owner, Jimmy Eisenhower, and John Pearce.

Pearce was present to explain to the council that he is working with emergency management disaster preparedness. He told the council he would be working with disaster planning in the community, but that he felt the biggest problem facing the community right now was that of addressing. Most streets and houses are marked, but it seems there are some that are not.

Officer Torres presented the police report which was accepted with no further discussion.

Warnock reported to the council that the City Utility crew had "pigged" (cleaned out) the water line from the city lakes to the tank on the mountain. He also reported that 6 water leaks had been repaired during May, more than had occurred in the past months. Work has been done on the water plant, including painting and other improvements, all much needed maintenance and repairs. He reported a letter received from the Texas department of Health concerning the old Sealy Hospital building and was awaiting a reply from the owner of the structure.

Negotiations with SK Engineering concerning the waste water disposal plant were discussed and action taken for taking care of a payment owed them.
